Board of Education meets Wednesday

The Board of Education will meet Wednesday, July 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Boardroom. Agenda items include college strategic planning, Community Learning Centers, Computer Information Technology staffing, construction costs for the Churchill center, board policies on student intercollegiate activities and use of college-owned equipment, and other items. Oaths of office will be administered and officers for 1997/98 will be voted in.

Top applicant for Florence directorship named

Harold Turnquist of Cottage Grove will be recommended for appointment as Director of LCC at Florence at the July 9 Board of Education meeting. Check him out on the Internet at www.turnquist.net. His estimated start date is August 1.

Turnquist has 17 years in higher education including teaching computer courses at Western Oregon University in Monmouth since 1991, serving as vice president for administrative services at Oregon Coast Community College in Newport from 1988-91, and directing the computer lab at LCC at Florence in 1987. He has a doctorate from the University of Oregon, a juris doctor from the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville School of Law, and a bachelor's from Iowa State University in Ames.

Sixty-one people applied for the post which was nationally advertised when Bill Porter retired after 23 years with Lane, the last eight as Florence center director.

Steve Candee to attend C-SPAN seminar for professors

Political science instructor and cooperative education coordinator Steve Candee has been selected to attend "C-SPAN in the Classroom – Seminar for Professors," from August 14-15 in Washington DC. He is one of 30 candidates selected from 100 applicants nationwide and one of the few community college instructors to be included. The seminar explains how to integrate C-SPAN into coursework and equips participants to share the information with colleagues.

Lane does well in forensics competition

The final results of the Northwest Forensics Conference were recently announced. Of the 692 participants in debate over the past school year, Lane student Alex Anne Ralph came in 12th overall and earned special recognition with a second team all-conference. Lane's Dawn Hedrick was 32nd and earned an honorable mention. As a team, Lane secured third place in division III. Congratulations for a year's worth of hard work and achievement. - Dan Berger

Business Administration FTE continues to grow

Total fourth week FTE topped 200 for programs in the new Business Administration department this year, reaching 204.99. Spring term's fourth week FTE was 63.18, up about 1 percent from last year's 62.82. Winter's fourth week increase was 5 percent and fall's fourth week increase was 7.7 percent. Fourth week FTE increased by 4.2 percent for the year. In addition, retention rates increased each term, rising from 92 percent in the fall to 95 percent in the winter, 96 percent in the spring, and 94 percent overall.

Enrollment is likely to increase again next year because the State Board of Education has approved the department's new certificate programs in Supervision and Business Management. The new programs complement the existing certificate in Sales and Marketing, creating three academic ladders to the AAS degree in Business Management.

Book features Lane as an example of innovation in education

Lane is one of six community colleges held up as an example in "A Learning College for the 21st Century," a new book by Terry O'Banion, executive director of the League for Innovation. His book was published this month by the American Council on Education in cooperation with the American Association of Community Colleges. Chapter 8, "Lane Changes: Transformation at Lane Community College," was written by Lane President Jerry Moskus.

The publishers say many recent attempts at educational reform have failed because the proposed solutions only tweaked the current system of education. This failure has caused many critics to call for a much more expansive wave of reform in which learning becomes a central focus. O'Banion says community colleges are the "ideal forum for creating this new learning paradigm for the 21st century."

The other colleges included in the book are the Community College of Denver, CO; Jackson Community College, Jackson, MI; Maricopa Community Colleges, Phoenix, AZ; Palomar College, San Marcos, CA; and Sinclair Community College, Dayton, OH.

Lane wins four-year, \$180,000 grant

Lane has received a four-year grant of \$180,000 per year to serve low-income students, first-generation college students and students with disabilities through the federal TRIO Student Support Services program. The program will serve about 200 students with a range of student services designed to improve student retention, graduation rates and a higher transfer rate to four-year institutions. Press releases have already generated some good local publicity and interest from students. Students will need to wait until the application and selection process is ready sometime this fall in order to apply. In the meantime, staff fielding questions about the new program should be aware of the following:

- TRIO is NOT a financial aid program, and provides no direct funding to students.
- TRIO participants must be first generation college students, low-income students (specific definitions apply) or students with documented disabilities.
- TRIO participants must be US citizens or nationals or meet residency requirements for financial aid; must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment at Lane; and have a need for academic support, as determined by the selection process.

When processes are in place, information will be available through Admissions, Counseling, Testing, Student Information, etc. In the meantime, Counseling t at 2204 will take the names of interested students. For further information for staff, contact Sarah Ulerick, 2312.

The Board of Education completed annual business at its July 9 meeting. Michael Dubick was voted chair and Roger Hall was voted vice chair for 1997/98. Appointments included Roger Hall to the LCC Foundation, Pat Riggs-Henson to Lane Council of Governments, Kathleen Shelley and Jim Pitney to the Senior Companion Program, Jim Pitney to the Retired Senior & Volunteer Program, Michael Dubick to the Oregon Community College Association, and Kathleen Shelley to the Lane Regional Workforce Quality Committee. Jerry Moskus was appointed district clerk and Marie Matsen, Mary Spilde, Larry Warford and Verne Whittaker were appointed deputy clerks.

The board accepted the retirement of Jim Cox from Instructional computing and appointed interim division chairs Joyce Godels to Family & Health Careers, as of July 1; and Nanci Lavelle to Performing Arts, as of August 15. Division chairs appointed were Patrick Lanning to Health & Physical Education, as of July 1; N. Okolie Uwadibie to Social Science/Business Administration, as of August 20; and Thomas Wiedeman to Advanced Technology, as of Sept. 1. Directors appointed were Donna Koechig for Counseling, as of Sept. 1; and Harold Turnquist for LCC at Florence, as of July 10. Susan Lowdermilk was appointed interim instructor in Art & Applied Design, as of Sept. 15, and Sarah Ulerick was appointed science instructor, as of Sept. 15. Classified appointments do not receive board review. In other business, the board:

- approved a pool of change management consultants for process redesign
- approved Absolute Lighting to install energy efficient lighting fixtures in Administration, Business, Center, and Physical Education Buildings, for \$97,849
- approved McKenzie Commercial to remodel seven Center Building restrooms for \$62,999
- heard from Oregon School Boards Association staff about conducting policy reviews
- accepted a report on a draft strategic planning process for 1997/98
- reviewed a report on the Community Learning Centers and approved \$432,600 for construction of the CLC at Churchill High
- reviewed a report on Computer Information Technology department staffing
- repealed policies on student intercollegiate activities and use of college-owned equipment, which will now become administrative procedures
