Introducing Lane's web calendar

Tomorrow, the college's web site will have a new feature: an on-line events and meetings calendar accessed by visiting Calendars on the college's home page. The calendar will list events, meetings and other timely things of interest. Anyone anywhere in the world who has access to Lane's web site can view the calendar.

Here's how it works. Each department that wants to enter items will be given a password and instructed how to use the calendar. The password used to enter an item also must be used to change it. Events will automatically disappear as they occur. Events specifically intended for the public also will be forwarded to a community-wide calendar sponsored by HometownOnline. There is one password per department listed in the college directory.

The calendar is being developed by Institutional Advancement with encouragement from College Council and the Web Site Steering Committee and funding from a \$1,500 grant from the Schafer Innovation Fund and \$1,500 in matching funds from the president and each of the vice presidents.

Several departments have participated in a pilot project and already have their passwords. Their calendar items will be on-line on Friday. When your department is ready for a password and instructions, e-mail Therese Picado in Institutional Advancement. Also, visit the calendar and let her know via e-mail how it works for you. It's anticipated that there may be bugs to work out at first, but the calendar should prove to be a real service to staff, students and community members.

The following criteria will be used for determining award eligibility:

- * Internships are to address the Oregon education reform agenda.
- * Internships are to be with local employers within commuting distance of the college.
- * Internships are open to all state approved credit disciplines and must be related to one of the following CAM areas: Arts and Communication, Business Management, Health Services, Industrial and Engineering Systems.
- * Applicants are to show how their internship will enhance/articulate curriculum with work force needs.
- * Applicants are responsible for making internship arrangements.
- * Application must be approved by division chair.
- * Internships must be completed by June 30, 1998.



C-SPAN enters the classroom

This fall, students in Steve Candee's American Government classes may see history being made right before their eyes. Their classroom soon will feature C-SPAN, the national television network which provides live coverage of Congress.

Candee, a political science instructor and cooperative education coordinator for the past 11 years at Lane, has participated in the "C-SPAN in the Classroom" program and has looked for ways to incorporate the program more fully into the curriculum. Last summer he participated in C-SPAN's Seminar for Professors held August 14-15 in Washington, DC. Of nearly 5,000

program members, he was one of only 27 participants selected to attend the seminar, the only community college instructor, and the only attendee from Oregon. He was joined by professors of political science, journalism, speech, and media arts.

C-SPAN is valued as an educational resource because it has no commercial sponsors and avoids political bias. "C-SPAN is like a fly on the wall," says Candee. "They simply record what happens, free from the editorializing that takes place on other networks. Even the camera angles they use are selected to avoid any appearance of political bias." He notes that while the Congressional Record is an edited document, C-SPAN provides the only actual account of what transpires on Capital Hill.

While at the seminar, Candee received \$350 in coupons redeemable for C-SPAN videos and other education materials, and he enjoyed one serendipitous moment: he met US Secretary of Labor Alexis M. Herman one day in the elevator during the UPS strike.



Board report

The Board of Education approved the faculty contract with a 5-0 vote at its Oct. 8 meeting; Pat Riggs-Henson and Adam Young were absent from the room during the vote. In a 6-1 vote, the board authorized staff to explore loaning Ashlane funds to a nonprofit agency to build and operate housing for the exclusive use of low-income Lane students. Jim Pitney voted no, citing concerns that the college should not get into the housing business.

In a 4-3 vote, the board approved principles and criteria for the 1998/99 budget process. Roger Hall, Pat Riggs-Henson and Larry Romine voted no, objecting to a criteria favoring the community learning centers and lack of any criteria favoring faculty retention.

The board endorsed Ballot Measure 52, which would use lottery funds for K-12 bonds. Adam Young abstained saying he was unable to vote for anything related to gambling or against anything potentially helpful to schools.

In other action, the board approved naming the main campus west entrance driveway after Dale Parnell, with a ceremony to be held later; approved purchase of lighting fixtures for several campus buildings; approved budget transfers; and approved Robert Clark as interim media arts instructor. The board reviewed the draft affirmative action plan.

Speakers included faculty union president Margaret Bayless, who introduced other union officers; county

commissioner Peter Sorenson, who advocated for an LTD bus pass and the administration's Ashlane proposal; classified union president Alen Bahret, who advocated for part-time employees, several of whom attended the meeting; computer information technology instructor Bob Barber, who called for action on part-time faculty recommendations in the Future Faculty Task Force report; and past faculty union president Dennis Gilbert who advocated for part-time classified employees.

In his report, President Jerry Moskus noted that he was misquoted by The Register-Guard for the first time in 7-1/2 years in this week's bond story. "What I said was, 'It won't matter as much 50 years from now that we stayed on schedule as that we did a good job in our planning and construction." He also said he delivered the keynote speech at Colorado Mountain College's 30th anniversary on Tuesday and that he judged clam chowder at a recent Florence community festival.

Wendell Anderson honored

Wendell Anderson, part-time instructor for Business Technologies, received an honorable mention in a writing contest sponsored by the Oregon Council of Teachers of English. Anderson received his award in the short essay category. His essay, along with 15 other winning entries, was read at OCTE's annual conference on Oct. 10 and will be included in an anthology, "Teachers as Writers: Models for the Classroom," to be published by OCTE.

Legislative team endorses BM 52

The Legislative Action Team endorsed Ballot Measure 52 at its Oct. 2 meeting and sent a recommendation of endorsement to the Board of Education, which followed suit at its Oct. 8 meeting. If passed, it will authorize \$150 million in state lottery funds for elementary and secondary school capital construction, maintenance and equipment projects. Strategic Learning Initiative update

From the SLI Leadership Team: Over 300 faculty and staff, including 90 part-time faculty, participated in the in-service activities in September. We have received very positive feedback from those who attended. We are seeing a spirit and energy among the faculty that is very exciting. It signals to us the importance of really making sure that projects move along and come to fruition.

Since the in-service, we have been compiling and synthesizing all of the information collected at the Tuesday overview session. We expect to use this to further the goals of the SLI. Several projects are currently underway. These are projects with college-wide impact that were started last spring by the SLI Leadership Team. All of the project teams have had at least one meeting since then and draft charters outlining the goals of each project have been developed. In addition, the servers to support MAC and NT technology are up and running; the UNIX server will be up very shortly. The SLI WEB site has been developed. Check it out on Lane's home page under College Business. We will be adding more information and opportunities to communicate on-line with each other very soon.

We expect many new innovations to come from division, department and discipline discussions as well as from individual faculty members. We encourage you to develop a proposal for any existing project area or to propose a new project area. We will publish the process for submitting these proposals within the next two weeks. In the meantime, gather your best ideas, discuss them with your colleagues and connect with the SLI.

The SLI is truly a grass roots project. We do not have everything thought through and nicely packaged. We are all creating it and all our thoughts, ideas and action will make it successful. If you are not involved yet and wish to do so, please contact one of the leadership team.

Groundbreaking celebration planned for Oakridge

The beginning of construction of the Lane Community College Learning Center at Oakridge High School will be celebrated on Monday, October 27, at 11:45 a.m. Voters endorsed community learning centers in the May 1995 bond election.

Lane has offered classes in Oakridge since 1966, but offerings have been limited due to the city's geographical isolation and limited access to technology. Lane Outreach Coordinator and member of the Oakridge Community Response Team, Deborah Fay, believes that this effort will "address a critical need identified in Oakridge's community planning process— the need for easier access to college classes and programs."

Lane Vice President of Instruction Larry Warford is confident the Oakridge center will accomplish improved access. "By using the high school as the center for community learning and incorporating advanced technological innovations, Lane will be able to increase its offerings in Oakridge and provide access to other community resources, including Oakridge's federally-funded One Stop Center." Stressing the collaborative nature of the effort, Lane President Jerry Moskus sees the new Oakridge center as an opportunity to create vital connections with the community. "We've had a presence in Oakridge, but never a place of our own," he says. "We look forward to working with our neighbors in Oakridge."

The 2,500-square-foot center will include a computer lab with 24 work stations and spaces for distance-learning activities, meetings, classes, testing/counseling, community outreach, independent study, and other needs. There will be an exterior entrance visible to the public and an entrance from inside the high school. The center is slated for completion for spring term 1998. Construction began October 13.

Sealants are available for adults and children for \$2 per tooth. Full mouth x-rays are available for \$15. Other services include nutritional counseling, polishing and recontouring of fillings, and bacterial microscopic evaluations, all at no cost.

Students perform the services under professional supervision. Graduates of the college's two-year degree program in dental hygiene consistently enjoy a 100 percent employment rate. Lane offers one of only five such programs in Oregon. To make an appointment, call 2206.



Meet Jeff Harrison



Jeff Harrison was appointed full-time English instructor for one year this fall to teach Shakespeare, English literature and composition sequences. He joined Lane part-time in spring 1996. "One of the major changes this allowed was teaching literature; as much as I love teaching comp, I prefer the balance that teaching both lit and comp provides."
