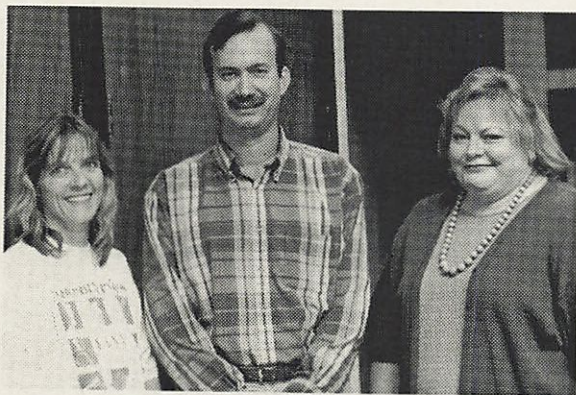

Disability Services staff win Schafer awards

Disability Services staff won a \$250 Pat On The Back cash award from the LCC Foundation's Eldon G. Schafer Endowment for Innovation this year. The award was presented at the employee reception on Oct. 29. The award recognizes Jane Love, Len Heflin, Leigh Alice Petty and Cathie Reschke for their work in producing the Disability Services Student Handbook last summer.

Leigh Alice also won her second Seed-Money grant from the endowment. The grant will cover the start-up costs of a Disability Services mentoring program. If successful,

student fund-raising activities and/or the Disability Services budget will be the source of the program's lower continuation cost. A mentoring program for students with disabilities has never been tested at any Oregon community college. The grant will pay for materials and training of the volunteers and guest speakers at monthly support group meetings.

Implementation of Students First!

The Students First! Project Management Team has started the phase in of five Students First! Projects. The projects are: 1) streamline federal loan processes; 2) streamline and improve the admissions application for credit students; 3) create a team-based advising system in at least one academic area; 4) initiate the career and work information center; 5) initiate the integrated service delivery concept called the Students First! Center. The acceleration of these five projects will serve to focus the efforts of other teams, such as the Information Dissemination Implementation Team, whose work is vital to the success of these five projects.

The Project Management Team thanks everyone who has committed time and energy to implementing Students First! recommendations, and those who provided suggestions on how to accelerate Students First!. Once fully implemented, the outcome will be improved services that help students succeed at Lane. - *submitted by the Project Management Team: Donna Koechig, Marie Matsen, Susan Phillips, Mary Spilde, Linda Waddell*

Council tackles college initiatives

College Council tried to weave major college initiatives into a cohesive fabric at its Nov. 4 meeting. They reviewed a list of a couple dozen projects ranging from Students First! to the Strategic Learning Initiative to diversity goals and felt none should be eliminated but were concerned about the number of projects, overall integration, workloads, closure, outcomes, communications and participation. Council speculated that the situation could be due to a workplace changing from the desk to the meeting room, a cultural habit of not setting deadlines, the same people serving on too many committees, lack of prioritization, and others. One idea was to find out who the players are and ask for timelines and results. Another was to divide projects into those that are part of the infrastructure and those with shorter lives. Council did not arrive at a satisfactory conclusion and will continue discussion at its next meeting.

Council also reviewed the Nov. 12 board agenda, which includes a proposal to name Lane's instructional forest after late biology instructor Jay Marston, an idea which won unanimous council approval. They next meet on December 2.

Classified Professional Development Team sets new policy

The Classified Professional Development Team has decided that the following policy will take effect at its winter term half-day training: At all off campus trainings accompanied by a meal, only those staff with confirmed reservations prior to the training will be able to participate in the meal. 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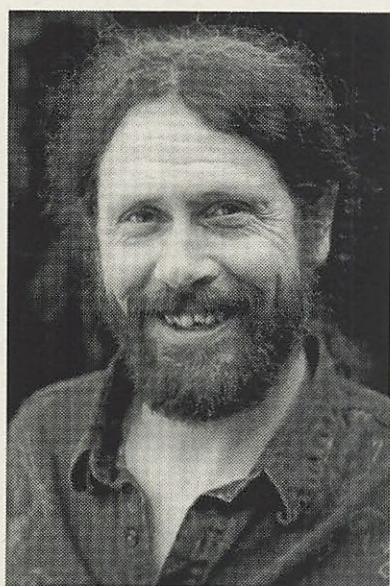

Ken Zimmerman wins Schafer innovation award



English instructor Ken Zimmerman has received a \$500 Pat-On-The-Back Award from the LCC Foundation's Eldon G. Schafer Endowment for Innovation. The amount is the largest ever given in the Pat-On-The-Back category and recognizes Ken for developing and teaching Lane's first world-wide-web-based on-line course, Writing 123. Ken donated hundreds of hours to develop the course. The course enrolled 55 students in 1996/97.

Ken "has become a key resource for faculty and other staff working on web projects," wrote endowment chair Lucy Schafer Kinsman. Ken serves on the Web Site Steering Committee and TACT and has conducted several software workshops for faculty. He has helped develop computer-assisted curriculum outside his own discipline, including one for hydraulics.

Ken has taught part-time at Lane for nine years and was appointed to a full-time interim position this fall. He also taught writing as a graduate teaching fellow at the University of Oregon where he earned a master of fine arts in creative writing in 1988, and at Oberlin College in Ohio where he completed a bachelor of arts in creative writing and communications in 1978.

Some students should delay paying tuition until January

Students who register for winter term credit classes at Lane shouldn't pay for them until January to qualify for the new Hope Scholarship. The Hope Scholarship is actually a tax credit. It will allow taxpayers to reduce their taxes owed by as much as \$1,500 a year for tuition and fees – but only for tuition payments made after January 1, and only for college credit classes.

Students who think they may qualify for the Hope tax credit should register in December to get the classes they want, but delay paying until January. Students who don't pay when they register will automatically be billed. Then, students – or taxpayers who claim students as dependents – may claim the credit on their federal income taxes. To be eligible for the Hope tax credit, students must be enrolled at least half-time in their first two years of a credit degree or certificate program. Students who have completed two years of postsecondary education are not eligible.

Details of the Hope Scholarship are still being worked out by the federal government. For more information, students should consult the IRS or a tax advisor. They may also refer to the American Association of Community Colleges web site at www.aacc.nche.edu.

Friedman of Eugene; awarded a lighting installation contract to Ericson Electric of Junction City; appointed Richard Romanek of Veneta to the Budget Committee Zone 1 seat; appointed Cj Mann of Springfield to the Budget Committee Zone 3 seat; and approved the academic calendar for 1997/98.

Instructor Pete Peterson provides expert testimony in libel trial

Journalism instructor (and *Torch* news and editorial adviser) Pete Peterson was one of five expert witnesses to testify in a Lincoln County libel trial Monday, Nov. 3. The suit, brought against the editor of the South Lincoln County News, alleged that the editor was negligent in publishing a news story about a property title company involved in a controversial land use planning issue. The company asked \$300,000 for special damages because of an error in the article. "It was a complicated situation, but the question about libel was basic," says Peterson: "Did the editor fail to follow normal journalism procedures in reporting this important story? "After examining the steps the editor had taken, I testified that he had exercised due care." At the end of the five-day trial the jury deliberated for about an hour and voted 12-0 in favor of the editor: The title company did not prove the editor was negligent. Peterson says, "The jury members understood the crucial role the local newspaper played in reporting a matter of public concern, and that the editor had attempted – under pressure of an immediate deadline – to prepare a story that was an accurate and fair account of the situation."

* Questions and Answers Regarding Weather Closures *

Q. How do we know for sure that the college is closed?

A. When a decision is made to close a college facility, the college immediately notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other local radio and television stations. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Please listen or watch. *Do not call the media.* This interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information.

GuardLine at *The Register-Guard* will be notified; call 485-2000 Ext. 7820.

A *@* BeyondMail message will be sent when possible.

The hearing impaired can call 747-4501 Ext. 7730 TTY to print closure notices on TTD machines.

To avoid complicated messages listing the status of each Lane facility, messages will refer to main campus, Downtown Center, Cottage Grove, and Florence. Downtown Center includes the DTC, Flight Technology at Eugene Airport, and metropolitan community learning centers. Please be sure your colleagues and students at these locations know that Downtown Center announcements refer to them.

Snow closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m.

Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day and reopen for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

Q. If the college is closed, should staff report for work?

A. When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions from their supervisor or the media. If one or more facilities are closed and others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

Q. What do delays mean?

A. If opening of the college is delayed until a certain time, all classes and other activities scheduled to begin before that time are canceled for the day. For example, if the college will open at 10 a.m., all classes that start before 10 a.m. are canceled, even if the class is scheduled to continue past 10 a.m.

Q. How can people with hearing impairments learn of closures?

A. Local television stations provide closed caption service during their news casts and run visual displays when possible.

Q. Are there transportation alternatives?

A. When 30th Avenue is icy, some people come from the east via Franklin, or ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, drivers may choose alternate routes.

Q. Will staff get paid?

A. Business Operations Manual policy states that:

When the college is officially closed, all bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors, and management employees scheduled to work will be paid as if they worked.

If you are required to work during a closure, you are entitled to time off with pay on a straight-time basis.

If you have scheduled leave on a closure day, your leave account will be charged as originally scheduled.

Hourly employees are paid only for hours actually worked.

If the college officially closes after work has started, eligible employees receive leave with pay for the remainder of the work day.

If you are scheduled to report to work before a closure is announced, but have not reported at the time of announcement, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay for hours not worked before the closure, as approved by your supervisor.

If you choose to come to work late or leave early because of bad weather, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay, as approved by your supervisor.

If you choose to work all or part of your schedule during an official closure, you receive no additional pay or time off.

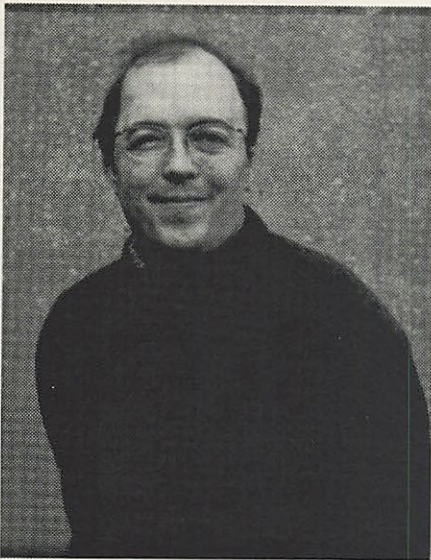

Student's critique included in poetry text

Lane student Kim Larsen of Eugene has an essay included in the textbook "An Introduction to Poetry," ninth edition, edited by X.J. Kennedy and Dana Gioia and just published by Addison Wesley Longman, Inc. The text features over 500 poems and writing assignments including examples of outstanding student writing such as Larsen's.

Her essay is a critique of "My Papa's Waltz" written by Theodore Roethke in 1948. The critique goes against the grain of historic scholarly views of the poem. "Kim took quite a risk in challenging the editors' interpretation," says instructor Karen Locke. Larsen wrote the critique in Locke's Introduction to Literature class. It was Larsen's second class at Lane and her first college essay.

Roethke lived from 1908-63 and became known as one of America's premier poets. He taught at the University of Michigan, Harvard and the University of Washington.

This term, Larsen is taking Locke's Survey of World Literature class while pursuing an associate of arts Oregon transfer degree. She plans to go on to university and study anthropology and archeology.
