Meet Gail Campbell

Gail Campbell joined Lane this fall as affirmative action/equal opportunity analyst. She has previous experience in labor and employee relations and has owned a manufacturing business and worked as an estate executor, research company manager, and interagency coordinator. She is claimed as family in the Yakima and Warm Springs Nez Perce tribes. She earned a bachelor of arts in English and psychology from Michigan State University in 1968.



"My hope for LCC," she says, "is an embrace of all comers, and an honest appreciation of each individual associated with the college." She seeks an attitude of inclusivity "beyond title, status, pay level and other things that engender feelings of exclusivity ... affirmative action is, for everyone, a door to increased awareness of the world outside our own."

Gail's passion is fly fishing. Over the past 20 years, she has taught fly fishing, worked in a fly fishing store, run a fishing lodge, and volunteered for the Oregon Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers. This November she attended the Second International Festival of Women Fly Fishers in Baja, CA, doing organizational planning as a steering committee member while standing in 91-degree ocean water. She's a certified Casting Instructor (by the Federation of Fly Fishers) and loves to teach. "I like to show others, women especially, that fly fishing is not as hard or

mysterious as it's made out to be, but in fact fairly easy, totally fun, and beautiful as well," she says. "Heretofore, fly fishing's been done almost exclusively by men, then handed down to their sons in the form of an oral tradition." Consistent with Affirmative Action's mission, she's interested in modeling and opening up this sport for women. Gail is the first woman member of the Evergreen Fly Fishing Club in Washington and one of the first few women members of McKenzie Fly Fishers.

KLCC's Don Hein joins national audience research team

KLCC 89.7 FM Program Director Don Hein has been asked to join the Audience 98 team of research associates. Hein is one of eight public radio professionals nationwide who will examine questions about listening and giving that arose from Audience 98 data released in September by David Giovannoni's audience research analysis. The research team will analyze the data and issue reports between January and April 1998. Hein will focus on listeners' programming perceptions, investigating the characteristics of listeners who prefer national to local programming. Other associates will look at topics such as the values of various audiences sharing program tastes, listener's perceptions of on-air fundraising, the impact of underwriting on listener support, and the changing media use among public radio listeners.

Answers to your questions about the college logo project

There has been a lot of interest in the preliminary logo designs. The college logo committee has received many comments and also questions. Here are answers to the most common questions:

- These are preliminary designs. We need your reaction to individual elements within the designs, as well as to each design in its entirety. You don't have to pick one, but can react to the elements in all three. If you already responded and didn't understand that, feel free to send another response.
- We are showing them in black and white because at the moment we are concentrating on shapes. Our final choice will be used in color and black and white.
- We are developing a new logo for the college because it is important for the college to have a strong and recognizable graphic identity. A strong graphic identify increases the college's visibility. Repeated use in connection with college programs and services increases awareness of the college and the variety of its offerings. The college has not gone through a thoughtful logo process for many years and currently is using two logos. The one that appears on college stationery isn't bold enough to serve many of our needs and does not work on the web. The bolder one that is used in promotional materials has been called "unfriendly" and also doesn't work on the web.

Small Business Management program thriving

The Small Business Management program continues to be very popular with local owners of growing businesses. When the fat in food is hydrogenated, some of it becomes "trans" fatty acids, which may increase the risk of heart disease just like the saturated fat in butter. Substitute vegetable oil for butter or margarine in cooking. If you follow a low-fat diet, it's okay to eat a small amount of butter or margarine.
- Many types of shellfish - notably crab, scallops, mussels, clams, and lobster - are actually slightly lower in cholesterol than chicken or beef. Even though shrimp and crayfish have about twice as much cholesterol as meat. they contain much less fat, and their fat is largely unsaturated and includes hearthealthy omega-3 fatty acids.


