## Lane to receive two new vehicles from Guaranty and Chevrolet

## Strategic planning project picks director, adds new members

The President and the Strategic Planning Project Team have selected Ron Johnson to serve as project director. Johnson has worked at Lane for the last four years, serving in a variety of capacities for Business and Industry Services, the Business Development Center, and last year as interim chair of Performing Arts. Previously he was executive director of the Eugene Symphony Orchestra.

As Project Director, Johnson will convene the coordinating team, act as spokesman for the project, and manage the work to keep on task and on schedule. Johnson addressed Managers' Forum on December 12. "The board and the president recognize that for an educational institution to function well, operational and strategic planning are both necessary," Johnson said. "Operational planning involves monitoring present performance, present perceptions and present expectations, whereas strategic planning involves revising expectations and moving towards the future. To be meaningful, the plan itself must create the conditions for successful implementation – providing authentic linkages between institutional decision making, operational planning and actual performance on all levels of the college." The strategic planning document itself, when completed, will formally state the mission, values and vision of the college, and outline goals or objectives to be achieved in order to support them."

The planning team has expanded. Original members were President Jerry Moskus, Linda Waddell, Process Redesign/Students First; Craig Taylor, Research & Planning director, Diane Dann, Institutional Advancement director, Sandy Cutler, OSBDCN director; and Susan Phillips consultant. New members are Mary Spilde, Vice President for Instruction and Student Services, Margaret Bayless, faculty union president; Alan Bahret, classified union president; Danny Armanino, ASLCC president; Carol Beckley, College Operations; and a soon-to-be-named representative from the Management Steering Committee. ## College Council report

College Council has changed since the Shared Decision Making Task Force issued its 1991 report which founded council and outlined its mission and membership. Councilors evaluated the changes at their January 7 meeting. They decided to retain current membership, which includes all vice presidents rather than just one as originally specified, and to update its mission to emphasize its role as an advisory group to the president and to provide an open forum for discussion. Councilors will retrieve a revised mission statement from a couple of years ago and review it at a future meeting. Councilors also noted unclear guidelines as to terms of service, difficulty in recruiting new members, and role confusion with the Executive Leadership Team. ELT will share items from its own agenda when a broader discussion is needed until the two groups' roles are sorted out.

Marie Matsen presented the budget picture for 1998/99 which includes a possible \$1.5-\$2 million deficit. Annual staff budget planning is underway: a tuition committee is convening, departments have submitted function sheets and new activity requests, and ELT will soon begin evaluating possible budget reductions.

Council's next meeting is set for February 3.




## David Rothgery speaks at Writer's Club today



Jenny Hardy delivered the following speech at the grand opening of the Lane Community College Learning Center at Thurston High School on December 8. She is English and peace studies instructor Jerome Garger's daughter, and one of Lane's student success stories. The speech is printed here with her permission.

My name is Jenny Hardy and I am in my eighth year of teaching at Maple Elementary here in Springfield.

I knew from the time I was 12 that I wanted to be a teacher. Education was highly valued in my family as both my parents were teachers. Going to college was a natural step that I never questioned. In 1981 I enrolled in the Early Childhood Education Program. I chose LCC because it was close to home, affordable, and the small classes provided a challenging yet comfortable learning environment. My instructors were excellent. They were very approachable and encouraging. I felt like they

expected me to do well, and truly cared when I succeeded. The program fostered a supportive environment among students. We encouraged and helped one another, and became friends.

The combination of theory in classes and practice in working with the children in the child development center gave me a new confidence in myself. I learned I was a natural teacher. I learned to set goals and achieve them. By the time I graduated in 1983 I had many successes; the most exciting was being hired as an assistant teacher at LCC's Child Development Center for the following year. That experience and LCC's excellent reputation in our community led me to land a head teaching job running a toddler center in Eugene.

In the Fall of '85 I enrolled in U of O's Elementary Education Program. I completed two terms of student teaching in Springfield schools, one in 5th grade at Guy Lee, and one in 3rd grade at Thurston Elementary. In the spring of 1990 I substitute taught in many Springfield classrooms, and in the fall was hired to teach 3rd grade at Maple.

This year I have 27 third graders who challenge, test, amuse, delight, and teach me everyday. As class sizes continue to grow, budgets get smaller, and the lives of my children grow more chaotic, my classroom is a safe, loving place where risks are taken, and successes are celebrated. I love what I do and feel very fortunate for all the opportunities that have come my way.

A Chinese proverb says, "Teachers open the door you enter by yourself." Lane Community College opened the door for me, I do my best to open the door everyday for my students.

I'm honored that LCC has chosen me as one of its graduates to take part in this ceremony. I'm proud that they've established a community learning center to serve the people in the Thurston area.

## Board report

At its Jan. 24 meeting, the Board of Education authorized KLCC to apply for full-service stations in the Bend and Roseburg areas. Current translator service can be knocked off the air by other stations. Equipment costs will be covered by fundraising. No additional offices or staffing are needed.

The board will use the same written evaluation form as last year for the president's annual review, and will conduct an oral review in executive session at next month's meeting.

In other action the board appointed Sydney McKenzie of Eugene to the Zone 5 seat on the Budget Committee; accepted the retirements of Fred Beisse from Computer Information Technology; Jerome Garger from English, Foreign Language and Speech; Edna Jellesed from Business Technologies; and Marianne Kimball from Instruction and Student Services; and appointed Roma Cusimano as Spanish instructor, Kyle Hammon as temporary science instructor, Fred Hervert as temporary math instructor, Benjamin Hill as temporary math instructor, Thomas Kadash as mechanical technologies instructor, and Joan Thomas as interim math division chair.

Professional Technical Education Coordinating Committee (PTECC) past chair Jennifer Grant delivered a report. "On the whole, we are delighted with the progress the professional/technical departments continue to make," she said, giving special kudos to the RV technology advisory committee and to the criminal justice program. However, the committee noted continued need for more computers and software and specialized program equipment. They also recommended continuing improvements in ADA access, curriculum updates, data collection, more attention to math instruction, and more advisory committee involvement.

The board will hold a work session on January 29 at 5 p.m. in the Boardroom. The next regular meeting is set for February 11.
