## On-line tool helps locate grant funding

Lane subscribes to a powerful resource called the Illinois Researcher Information Service (IRIS) that can assist you in finding the perfect fit between your project idea and a funding source. The "Create or Update Your IRIS Alert Service Profile (UIUC and WWW Subscribers Only)" search screen allows you to search over 7,400 sponsors. ## Board report

The classified contract was approved by a 6-0 vote of the Board of Education at its February 11 meeting; Pat Riggs-Henson was absent.

President Jerry Moskus received an excellent annual performance review. "We feel very positively about the president of this college and what he represents and the growth he's made since he's come here," said chair Michael Dubick. "We're happy to have him."

Retirements were acknowledged for Ruth Albrecht, Linda Danielson, Mary Forestieri, Arthur Tegger, Ruth Coffman, Sheila Early, Sharon Moore, A. Wilson Smith, Lynne Swift, and Charles "Phil" Foster, instructors; Bob McCorkle and Julia Poole, counselors; and Robert Way, division chair. Susan Patterson was appointed temporary mechanical technologies instructor.

A resolution opposing a change of the educational access cable channel from 12 to 97 by TCI Cable passed unanimously. The resolution stated that the change "reduces access for students and ... occurred without proper notification to the college". Lane uses the channel for telecourses.

Bus pass negotiations with LTD were discussed. The board advised staff to keep exploring an option to increase the quarterly class registration fee to help fund a pass.

A budget report projected a \$1.8 million deficit for 1998/99. The president said the Tuition Committee recommends a \$2 tuition increase. He said that without such an increase, the college would face lay-offs, imbalance in the part-time/full-time faculty ratio, and difficulty funding new needs.

Despite some concerns about costs and faculty input, the board approved a new Microelectronics Manufacturing Technician Program with a 5-1 vote. Adam Young voted no.

In other business, the board awarded a supplies contract to Micro Options for the computer-build program, and approved WBSG architects for the learning center at Junction City High School. A presentation on the strategic learning initiative was postponed.
