## Teleconference to examine student centered instruction

A teleconference series, "Inquiry Based Learning: Introduction to Student Centered Instruction," will begin Thursday, March 5, from 10 am.-noon in CEN 10. ## Students First! Center training update

The Students First! Launching Team has reviewed the original group of requests for training which were received by February 27 and has identified the first group of participants in the initial Students First! Center voluntary training opportunity. This group is scheduled to begin the two weeks of intensive training on March 9, and will begin a four week "hands-on" experience working in the Students First! Center on March 23.

Students First! wants to remind Lane staff that you may still submit requests to participate in the Students First! training, which will include general information and technical training in enrollment, student records, financial aid, student financial transactions and appropriate referrals. We expect to begin the training again on April 6, May 4 and June 1. Each two week intensive training session will be followed by four weeks of on-the-job experience working in the Students First! Center.

All permanent current and recall employees of Lane who currently provide services to students and who use computer technology to access and provide information and services can participate. Consideration will also be given to all other Lane employees, based on ranked qualifications and the needs of the project.

To volunteer for the training, prepare a word-processed statement no longer than one page. Explain how your experience at Lane has prepared you for this opportunity. Submit the statement to Kay Malmberg, Students First! by inter-campus mail, BeyondMail (as an attachment), U. S. ## Classified employee insurance enrollment forms due

Classified employee insurance is changing effective April 1, 1998 to the new Point of Service plan with Regence Blue Cross. Employees who are currently on the traditional indemnity (not HMO) coverage will need to complete a new enrollment form for the April 1 coverage date by Friday, March 13. Employees who are on the HMO (Blue Choice) coverage do not need to do anything for this change to be effective. Provider Directories and other printed informational material on the new plan are available in Personnel Services. This is the same material that was handed out at the presentations on Monday, March 2.

The open enrollment period for adding dependents to classified insurance will be extended beyond the originally published date of March 13. Watch the Daily for a new date!

## Vision care benefit

The need for glasses is very common, by age 65 almost 100% of the population wears glasses. If you need to see a vision care specialist for an eye examination, be aware of the following: Classified are covered by Regence/Blue Cross and are eligible for an exam and lenses every 12 months and frames every 24 months. Faculty (employee coverage only) are covered by Regence/Blue Cross and are eligible for an exam, lenses and frames every 24 months. Management are covered by Regence/Blue Cross and are eligible for an exam , lenses and frames every 12 months. When you receive services from a participating provider, you normally will receive full coverage under these plans (certain services are not covered). When you receive services from a non-participating provider, coverage will be based on a percentage of cost or a defined amount.



It's the sun...it's a book...it's superlogo! After nearly a year of work and input from more than 70 members of the campus community, the college has adopted this new logo:



The first use will be new college stationery and business cards, which should be available by the middle of spring term.

Lane tackled creation of a new logo because the college was using two logos and neither one worked well on the Internet. The new logo will replace both the script logo used on the college stationery and the blocky logo used on promotional materials.

To arrive at this new logo, a college team polled staff for their ideas (spring 1997), selected the design firm of Oslund Design (summer), used The Daily and email to show college staff three designs (December), and refined the design that was favored both by the college and the committee. Over the past two weeks, the refined design was reviewed by the Executive Leadership Team and College Council and shared with the Board of Education on March 11.

The next steps are to:

• Refine basic design for its many uses - stationery, forms, brochures, ads, etc.;

• Design a new home page and secondary pages for the college web site using the new logo;

• And to create and distribute a printed and electronic style manual to make it easy to use.

## Board report

The Board of Education approved a tuition increase with a 5-2 vote at its March 11 meeting. Voting no were Larry Romine and Adam Young. Effective summer term, credit tuition will rise from \$34 to \$36 per credit hour, out-of-state/international tuition will go from \$116 to \$123 per credit hour, and noncredit will go from \$56 per 30 hours to \$59 per 30 hours. The increase, combined with efficiency cuts, will prevent program and service cuts and lay-offs. In the meantime, staff will research a suggestion to charge an equivalent per-hour tuition rate for credit and noncredit; currently, noncredit tuition is less expensive and generates less revenue.

The board gave unanimous approval to a new Fitness Specialist/Fitness Technician Program; the retirements of James Cobb, from Cooperative Education\ Social Science, and Patricia Shelp, Adult Basic and

Secondary Education/Florence; a budget transfer resolution; and reappointment of Kenneth Kuhns & Company as college auditors. The board directed the college attorney to research whether TCI Cable violated its franchise agreement by changing the educational access channel from 12 to 97, and supported Roger Hall's intention to state concern at a city meeting to be held the next day. The board voted 4-2 for staff to prepare a budget item to improve board communications by providing remote computer access; voting no were Larry Romine and Jim Pitney.

The board conducted a first reading of a personal services procedures change, heard a legislative update from Tamara Dykeman of the Oregon Community College Association, a report on curriculum approval and articulation changes, and a Strategic Learning Initiative presentation.

Future meetings include a work session on Monday, March 23, regarding bond projects; a work session on Monday, April 6, to review the college mission, values and vision; and the next regular meeting on April 8.

## Faculty wanted for instructor-student-technology study group

The Faculty-Student-Technology Structure Project Team (FST for short) is inviting faculty to participate in a Strategic Learning Initiative project which will study the instructor-student-technology structure of the learning environment. The project will (1) examine the learning environment in terms of instructor-student, technology-student, and student-student interactions; (2) explore ways to change this structure and its support to create more effective and efficient learning for students and a more professionally satisfying role for faculty; and (3) implement pilot projects to try new ideas. The first stage of the project is to form a collegewide study group which will develop a set of working assumptions for guiding improvements in learning environments. The study group will summarize their findings in an ongoing working paper, accessible to the college community. Study group members will be expected to attend a one-hour weekly discussion meeting and to complete outside readings. Members will receive a stipend of \$150 for their participation. Be aware, relay calls will take more time than direct calls as one party is typing their message, the Communication Assistant reads it to you, and then types in your response. ## Don't miss out on Medicare

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You automatically apply for Medicare when you apply for Social Security benefits. You should apply for Medicare separately if you plan to retire after age 65. When you enroll in Part A (hospital insurance) on Medicare, you also are automatically enrolled in Part B (supplementary medical insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums. These premiums are usually deducted from your Social Security benefits. Late enrollment in Part B may mean you will pay higher premiums. Questions about Medicare, should be directed to the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. To apply for Medicare, go to the Eugene office located at 377 Pearl Street.

## Reminder: Grand opening set for new LCC center in Oakridge

The grand opening of the Lane Community College Learning Center at Oakridge Jr./Sr. High School will be Thursday, April 2, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. Free mini-classes and demonstrations will be offered including Internet demonstrations. Officials speaking from 6-6:30 p.m. will include President Jerry Moskus, Vice President for Instruction Larry Warford, Oakridge Jr./Sr. High School Principal Art Tassie, and Oakridge School District Superintendent Larry Horton. The facility is located at 47997 W. 1st Street.

Lane has held classes at Oakridge schools since 1966 but the learning center is the first facility the college has owned. The center has 2,720 square feet and includes a computer lab with 24 work stations, a large classroom, a small classroom/meeting room, a community outreach office, and independent study areas. It has an exterior entrance and another from inside the high school. Lane's cost was \$335,000, about half the cost for a stand-alone building. Savings came from sharing infrastructure such as roadways, parking and utilities. Construction began October 13.

Classes and open lab time will be offered Mondays through Thursdays from 10 a.m.-9 p.m., Fridays from 10 a.m.-5 p.m., and Saturdays from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. The school will have access to the center for two hours each weekday morning.

The Oakridge center is one of eight. Lane opened a center at Thurston in December and at Willamette in January. Additional centers are planned for Churchill, McKenzie, Junction City, Harrisburg and Elmira high schools. Voters endorsed the idea of neighborhood college centers in Lane's successful May 1995 bond election.

## Lane to receive national leadership award

Lane will receive the David Pierce Organizational Leadership Award from the National Institute for Leadership & Institutional Effectiveness at its national conference March 29-31 in Asheville, NC. Dr. Jerry Moskus, president of Lane since 1990, will accept the award.

The award is based on national research studies of community college effectiveness in the management and implementation of change at the overall organizational level. Emphasis is placed on the effect of change on the student success and the enhancement of economic development in the community.

This year's award criteria were selected in part from the 1997 book, "A Learning College for the 21st Century" by Dr. Terry O'Banion, executive director of the League for Innovation in the Community College. The book features Lane and five other colleges as leading examples of innovation in education.
