Twenty community college and two-year college instructors from around the US will be flown to Orlando FL to spend June 22-26 at Kennedy Space Center. The week will provide pre-determined teams of two to meet directly with a NASA scientist or engineer. As preparation, the teams will have received project materials and have had extensive telephone contact with their teammate and the NASA representative. Our goal is to develop technical laboratory activities suitable for algebra courses. Lane offers workshop for middle and high school girls

A one-day conference for middle and high school girls to literally try their hand at different trades, technical and environmental skills, will be held at Lane on Saturday, May 2 (originally scheduled for April 25) from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Registration deadline is April 17.

The purpose of this event is to expose girls to a broad range of potential career interests as well as life empowering skills that they may never have considered for themselves. Over 20 hands-on workshops will be offered, giving participants an opportunity to have fun and learn while doing things such as repairing airplanes, keeping a car on the road, building furniture for their room, creating a tile mosaic, recording bird calls, and measuring the height of buildings. Women working in these jobs will be present to guide the girls in their use of tools and share experiences of being women in the non-traditional work force.

The conference is free, bus passes will be available, and lunch is included. The event includes door prizes, gifts, and entertainment including KUGN's Nancy Steele and players from the University of Oregon women's basketball team. A session for parents and teachers on supporting girls in non-traditional careers also is planned.

Faculty wanted for instructor-student-technology study group

The Faculty-Student-Technology Structure Project Team (FST for short) is inviting faculty to participate in a Strategic Learning Initiative project, which will study the instructor-student-technology structure of the learning environment. The project will (1) examine the learning environment in terms of instructor-student, technology-student, and student-student interactions; (2) explore ways to change this structure and its support to create more effective and efficient learning for students and a more professionally satisfying role for faculty; and (3) implement pilot projects to try new ideas. The first stage of the project is to form a collegewide study group that will develop a set of working assumptions for guiding improvements in learning environments. The study group will summarize their findings in an ongoing working paper, accessible to the college community. Study group members will be expected to attend a one-hour weekly discussion meeting and to complete outside readings. Members will receive a stipend of \$150 for their participation. The study group will meet on Tuesdays, from 2-3 p.m. beginning April 7. Interested faculty should contact David Shellabarger, Mathematics, via e-mail or at 2123 by April 3. The study group will have its first meeting on April 7 from 2-3 p.m. Members will be notified of the location later.

Additional funding approved for faculty leaves

The Faculty Professional Development Committee has approved additional funding to support short-term faculty leaves. The Professional Activities Committee will review the grant applications. There is approximately \$10,000 in funds available for faculty professional development activities for spring and summer of '98. These funds will first be allocated to any "priority one" faculty, i.e., those who have not used any professional activity funds in the last three years. Funds will be allocated on a "first-come, first-serve" basis. Note: currently all money allocated for faculty who have received under or over the \$1700 cumulative limit has been used up. Moskus elected to national community college board

President Jerry Moskus has been elected to a three-year term on the board of directors of the American Association of Community Colleges. He is one of 15 community college presidents on the board elected by their peers nationwide. AACC is the leading organization for community colleges with 1,039 member colleges. The organization's role is to advocate and serve as a resource for community colleges. AACC was headed from 1981-91 by Dr. Dale Parnell, founding president of Lane. Long-time Lane president Eldon G. Schafer served on the AACC board in the early 1980s. "The vote is evidence of Lane's very positive national reputation," Moskus said when informed of his election. "I will have the opportunity to advocate for the needs and interests of Oregon community colleges."

Lane scholars to dine with the governor

Two Lane students have been named to the Oregon Student Scholars team sponsored annually by the Oregon Community College Association in celebration of April as Community College Month. Danny Armanino and Mitch Allison, both of Eugene, will attend a ceremony on Friday, April 10, at 11 a.m. in Gov. John Kitzhaber's office in Salem, followed by lunch at the Mission Mill. They will be joined by scholars from the state's other community colleges, college presidents, and legislators.

Armanino, 25, is student body president at Lane and is completing an associate of arts Oregon transfer degree in linguistics and teaching. He has a 3.8 grade point average. He is former photo editor of the *The Torch* and a volunteer firefighter/EMT for the Harrisburg Fire Department. He volunteered with the Youth With a Mission relief effort in Mexico. He's from Ukiah, Calif.

Allison, 27, graduated from Lane last term with associate of applied science degree in accounting and a 3.92 GPA. He transferred to the University of Oregon in January. He is a Bethesda Lutheran Church member and has participated in fundraising efforts for McKenzie Willamette Hospital. He's from Los Angeles.

Armanino and Allison both are members of Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society for two-year colleges. The scholars event was founded by OCCA in 1991 to spotlight academic excellence among community college students. A study of 1995/96 students conducted by Lane shows that 80 percent of transfer students said that Lane prepared them "well" or "very well" for continued education at four-year institutions. OCCA research shows 44 percent of 1995 community college transfer students had a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better in the 1996 spring term, 94 percent had a GPA better than 2.0, and community college transfer students graduate with a bachelor's degree at the same rate as students who start at four-year public universities.

Recycling successful

From OSPIRG and the Recycling Committee: Lane is proud to present a growing recycling program. To make this effort a success, it's important that all departments help out. Last year alone, Lane avoided the cost and environmental impact of hauling away 392 cubic yards of waste to the landfill, saved the equivalent of 1,336 pulp trees, and saved mills energy equivalent to 7,551 gallons of gasoline. Board report

An ASLCC proposal to increase the student activity fee by \$1.13 will be on the May student ballot following Board of Education approval on April 8. The fee would fund ASLCC membership in the Oregon Student Association lobbying group for four-year schools; Lane would be OSA's first two-year college member. ASLCC would retain its membership in CCOSAC, the existing equivalent group for two-year schools.

Pat Riggs-Henson said she had arrived at the heart-wrenching decision to resign from the board effective July 1 in light of her recent election as executive secretary-treasurer of the Lane County Labor Council. She is the second longest-serving member on the board, after Jim Pitney.

The board approved administration's rejection of the latest bus pass proposal by a 6-1 vote with Michael Dubick dissenting, and unanimously directed the Lane-LTD

staff committee to present another proposal next month.

In other board action:

- * The president's contract was postponed to the May meeting due to remaining "language issues".
- * Purchase of a computer controlled machining center was approved for manufacturing training, using Carl Perkins grant funds and bond proceeds.
- * Abiqua Engineering of Salem was contracted to analyze Lane's wastewater system to ensure compliance within the college's wastewater discharge permit.
- * William M. Mercer, Inc. was reappointed agent of record for employee benefits insurance.
- * The personal services board policy was updated.
- * Susan Lowdermilk was appointed full-time instructor in Art & Applied Design.
- * The retirement of Marjorie Vignoul from Study Skills was accepted.

President Jerry Moskus made several announcements, including one that changes in the state funding formula will result in \$1 million more revenue to Lane. This will be combined with \$1 million in cuts to cover next year's projected budget deficit.

The board responded favorably to a report on future work roles and relationships. The next meeting is set for May 13.

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Educational access channel restored

TCI cable will change the educational public access channel back to channel 12 effective May 1. Likewise, MetroVision will return to channel 11.

TCI changed the public access channels from 11 and 12 to 96 and 97 last December. An outcry resulted, including calls and letters from President Jerry Moskus, a formal resolution of opposition from the Board of Education, and other action. The new channels couldn't be received by older television sets without a special adapter from the cable company. Reception on some sets was poor. College officials regarded these problems as a barrier to telecourse education, along with the concern that people who habitually tune in lower channels would overlook the telecourse channel. Lane offers about 20 telecourses to more than 800 students each term.

- triangular bandage
- wound cleansing agent (soap and water nearby is sufficient)
- emergency blanket
- latex gloves
- CPR shield

Last year, the foundation awarded 150 scholarships, 117 loans and 52 grants totaling \$90,000. Farmer has directed the foundation since 1988. Since then its assets have grown from \$625,000 to nearly \$5 million. He predicts a bright future as the network of foundation support strengthens and as the local economy improves.
