## Steve Carter receives award

ABSE faculty member, Steve Carter was awarded the Educator of the Year award at the 42nd annual convention of The Arc of Oregon on April 25. The award is given for using unique and innovative practices that benefit people with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. Individuals nominated must teach students or adults with disabilities, or teach people who teach people with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities.

Earlier this academic year, ABSE was given the Meritorius Service Award by Governor Kitzhaber in recognition of outstanding work in the employment and empowerment of Oregonians with disabilities. ABSE was nominated for that award for programs developed and taught by a group of faculty led by Alice Whitenack and Steve Carter.

## Bond schematic approval delayed until June

The schematic design phase of the main campus bond project is very close to closure but presentation of designs for board approval has had to be delayed until June due to a \$1.5 million cost overrun. In addressing this overrun at an April 30 meeting, the Facilities Management Committee heard recommendations from the Overview Team regarding the number of classrooms, computer labs and testing labs. The FMC then asked the architects and Project Management Team to pursue the following options for getting the main campus project on budget:

- \* Delay remodel of Center basement until after July 1, 2001. At that time, capital repair/improvement funds and in-house labor could do the project. (Possible savings of approximately \$474,000.)
- \* Use in-house labor to remodel second floor north, Center. (Possible savings of about \$330,000.)
- \* Reduce the number of classrooms in current schematics by 10. Analyses indicated that 20 additional classrooms would accommodate an additional 60 sections per term during prime time alone. (Possible savings to be determined.)
- \* Reduce number of computer labs. (Further analysis will yield more complete information.)
- \* Consider reducing the size of the Workforce Training Center. This building could be designed to allow for future addition, or, the possibility of raising funds through the foundation to complete the entire project now was also discussed.
- \* Every new construction project should be looked at carefully for possible reductions.

## Farm income varies by type of farm, program study reveals

Lane County area farms showed substantial profits last year but the amount of profit varied dramatically by type of farm. According to figures recently released by the Lane's Farm Business Management Program, average net farm income per farm participating in the program was \$72,048. However, fruit and vegetable farms netted only \$27,020 while field crop farms averaged over \$143,000 net income. Livestock farms fell in between at \$57,417 per farm.

Part of the discrepancy in income is due to size. Fruit and vegetable farms had gross cash receipts of \$212,600, while field crop farms grossed nearly \$566,000 per farm. But field crop farms were relatively more profitable also. They generated \$.24 of net income for every \$1 of production. At the same time, fruit and vegetable farms only had \$.13 of profit per \$1 produced.

Fruit and vegetable farms incomes were reduced by wet spring weather and low prices for processed vegetables. The field crop category, which includes seed crops and nursery production, enjoyed relatively high yields and good prices. Not surprisingly, both specialty seed and nursery crops are increasing in popularity among area farmers.

The average size of farms participating in the LCC Farm Business Management Program continued to grow. Total assets per farm were \$758,000, up from \$655,000 a year ago. Gross sales per farm were up over \$67,000.

## Board report

At its May 13 meeting, the Board of Education voted 6-0 in favor of a bus pass proposal from a student/staff/LTD team. The \$29, three-month pass will be available to Lane students and employees beginning fall term. The cost of the pass was made possible by a discount to Lane from LTD plus a subsidy from Lane bookstore revenues. The pass is a one-year pilot program.

ASLCC election results were announced late in the meeting and were accepted: Pam Brooks, president; Jeff Stott, vice president; Ronda Green, treasurer; Flame Stewart, events coordinator; Mike Emmons, Brian Tanner, Larry Cox, Stephanie Waguespack, Geri Schweigert, Wanda Lang, Bryan Gates, and James Scoggins, senators. Also approved was a \$1.13 increase to the student activity fee to fund membership in the Oregon Student Association lobbying group.

The board regretfully accepted the resignation of Pat Riggs-Henson effective July 1 and presented her with an honorary plaque, accolades and hugs.

President Jerry Moskus, LCCEA President Margaret Bayless, LCCEF President Alen Bahret, and Management Steering Committee Chair Lloyd Rain signed the labor relations principles and the work roles and relationships transition support memorandums of agreement.

In other action the board renewed the president's contract for three years; appointed Debra Ganser, Christina Salter and Beth Swank as instructors in Counseling and Amy Riggins as fitness center coordinator; awarded a banking services contract to Bank of America; Troxell Communications as supplier of video/data projectors; SAIF as workers' compensation insurer; Computer Systems West as microcomputers supplier; and Funk & Associates as signage consultants.

In other information the board heard that loaning Ashlane funds to build housing could result in high rents so other options are being explored; Lane earned an "A+" rating from Standard & Poor's; the Southern Willamette Private Industry Council and the Workforce Quality Committee are merging; an event to honor Dale Parnell will be held June 10; and bond plans are within \$100,000 of budget. Craig Taylor and Sylvia Sandoz of Research and Planning presented the student/employer follow-up survey.

## Retiree wall of honor to be built

Lane is building a Retiree Wall of Honor as a tribute to past and future retirees. Planning began in January after the Board of Education approved the proposal from President Jerry Moskus. The president convened a committee with the charter to recommend a design and location for the wall. "As the board continued to approve retirement after retirement, there was a growing feeling that we were losing so much of everything that is Lane – indeed the history, culture and memory of the college – and that we needed to do something to honor and remember retirees' important contributions," says Assistant to the President Tracy Simms.

Carl Horstrup, himself a retiree this year and a bricklayer by trade, chaired and led the committee in evaluating and identifying an appropriate site for the wall. The concrete north-south wall near the fountain between the Center Building and the Administration Building was selected.

The wall should be ready for a June 10 unveiling. Retiree names will be etched on beige bricks with a black, moisture-resistant material and arranged in random order in panels six to seven bricks wide. Nearly 400 bricks will be created for the first installation. The panels will begin several feet off the ground to make them more accessible to viewers. Lights reflecting down on the bricks will highlight the names. Source: Therese Picado.

## AAWCC offers leadership award for women students

The LCC Chapter of the American Association of Women in Community Colleges is soliciting applications from eligible women students for its first annual Leadership Award. The purpose of the award is "to assist and encourage women students at Lane to become leaders, giving voice to women who might otherwise not be heard." The award will consist of a scholarship of \$1,500 for one year to be paid in three equal disbursements for the 1998-99 academic year. 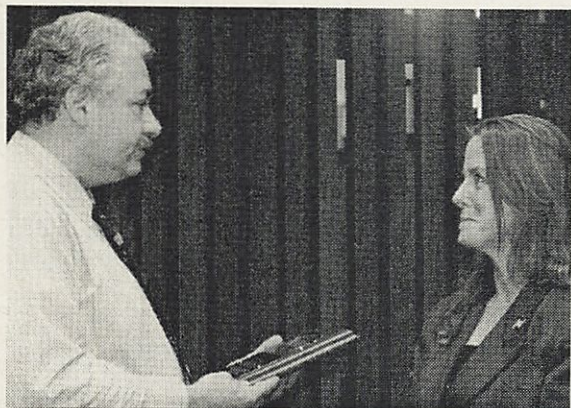
