Laura Breshears, a second-year student at Lane, has won a \$1,000 scholarship from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. She also has won a \$1,000 Marston Science Scholarship from Lane and a \$300 ASLCC scholarship for International Cooperative Education. "For one student to have won all three of these scholarships is remarkable," says Cooperative Education Coordinator Dixie Maurer-Clemons.

Breshears, 22, plans to earn a bachelor's degree in zoology with an emphasis on cellular biology and genetics, and then get a doctorate degree and work in research. She carries a full academic load at Lane including a cooperative education placement doing chemistry lab work at Borden in Springfield. This summer she will participate in an international cooperative education program in England. She is a 1993 graduate of McKay High School in Salem.

In memory of Bill Kinkel

It was not quite a month past my 13th birthday when I met Bill Kinkel. It's distant memory now, but I believe he was fresh out of college, his first teaching assignment the 8th grade at what was then Thurston Jr. High School. He was our first real Spanish teacher, barely 10 years older than his pupils, more like an older brother. His enthusiasm was compelling, his travel slides and stories riveting. We formed a hazy opinion then, substantiated years later, that he wasn't faking.

He spent that year with us, and the next, and two years later when we were juniors, thankfully was transferred and joined us again at Thurston High. That was the year, by the way, that Lane Community College offered its first classes.

I'd see Bill frequently in the following years--at tennis courts, sporting events, at Thurston High where I'd register his evening classes on site and sell books to his students, back when we did that. I'd see local personalities in his classes; he'd point out spouses and--in time--children of my high school classmates. It seems that, then, you could go home again. He was this part of this college for so many years: the part that is essentially silent and all too often removed and overlooked, but the part that touches so many people. He was the college to many of them--the only part they would ever experience. He represented us very, very well.

In later years, as his teaching load moved to the Downtown Center, we'd talk more of past acquaintances, current travel plans, course ideas for the future, then he'd dash off to class, ready again to hold court for another two hours. Pretty clearly, his enthusiasm and energy, evident in the early '60s, were still legendary and perhaps more contagious nearly four decades later. Stories reached me of adult students literally giving him ovations after particularly notable classroom performances. Such was the value of his work on our behalf.

So now, barely three months before my 50th birthday, I find myself reflecting on the journey of 37 years between our meeting and our parting. At the end, as at the beginning, he was a teacher. He cherished the title, and fulfilled its responsibilities in every way. We are all diminished by his passing.

Lane student wins regional employment award

Shannon Dolan of Cottage Grove, named Student Employee of the Year at Lane, also recently won the state and regional student employee awards and was one of four nominees for the national award. The awards are sponsored by the National Student Employment Association. Shannon will receive a \$50 savings bond from the state and a \$200 savings bond from the region, as well as an engraved plaque from both the state and the region.

Dolan, 30, worked as an office aide for Mechanical Technologies for two years while completing an associate of arts degree.

Supervisors Betty Svarverud and Denine McMurren both said Dolan is one of the best student workers the department has ever had, crediting her with superb skills and a strong work ethic. They said she is an excellent self-directed learner and has proposed several departmental improvements. In addition to performing many complex tasks, she volunteered for a student retention program beyond her normally assigned duties. "This was particularly significant," said department chair Tom Wiedeman, "given that she is a single parent of two small daughters, a full-time student, and a Phi Theta Kappa honor student preparing to transfer to the University of Oregon." Dolan will major in accounting upon transferring to the University of Oregon this fall.

Innovation award goes to Community Learning Centers project

Lane's 1998 Innovation of the Year award winner is the Community Learning Centers project, created by the Community Learning Centers Planning Team: Anne Bacon, Nick Cheshire, Paul Colvin, Debra Lamb, Cynde Leathers, Bea McRae, Carol Lynn Morse, Jerry Nehring, Bob Vogel, and Larry Warford. The CLCs are college outreach centers that will be attached to eight high schools located in Lane's service district. Three of the centers were opened this year at Thurston High School, Willamette High School, and Oakridge Jr./Sr. High School. The centers are scheduled to serve thousands of Lane County residents each year. They will be open six days a week, including evenings. Open houses for the three centers that have opened have attracted people of varying ages from middle school through senior citizens.

The centers capitalize on the latest technology and innovation in moving toward a "learning college." Instruction is delivered via the Internet and computer-based technology. Video technology also will be used for instruction. Each center will be connected electronically to the main campus, and students can access kiosks for college information and services.

During their development the Community Learning Centers have been an exciting innovation for Lane. During the first few weeks of operation, hundreds of people have enrolled in those centers that are open. Collaboration and cooperation by the local school districts has been phenomenal, and they are extremely pleased that the community college is on their campuses.

Main campus bond project estimates still too high

From the Executive Leadership Team: The past two years have seen tremendous involvement from the Project User Groups (PUGs) in formulating designs for future facilities on the main campus. The product of this effort, the design schematics recently posted in the Library, were submitted to a cost estimator early in May. The estimate returned last week shows the project \$3.4 million over available resources. However, gLAs Architects, the Bond Management Team and the Facilities Management Committee feel that there are several components of the estimate that are unusually high and therefore need further scrutiny. The schematics have been submitted to a local firm for a second evaluation, and approval of the design schematics by the board has been delayed until July. We believe the new cost estimates could reveal that current schematic designs are within or slightly over budget. Of course, they might also confirm the current estimate.

In order to continue to move forward with the bond project, decisions will have to be made over the summer months. If the current cost estimates prove to be correct, the Facilities Management Committee and the Executive Leadership Team might need to modify the design schematics to get them within budget and keep the project on a realistic time line. We will make an effort to contact as many available PUG members as possible should design modifications come under consideration. In any case, information about schematic designs, cost estimates, as well as any action that may be taken, will be posted on Lane's website every Monday. To reach this update, click on "College Business," "Bond Construction" and "Design Update." Comments or concerns can be submitted by using the icon at the end of the update.

The Bond Management Team will be available at 747-4501 Ext. 2012 during summer hours to answer questions and give information. All communication received by the Bond Management Team during the summer months will be reviewed regularly by the team, the architects and the Facilities Management Committee.

Board report

James Britt was appointed to the Board of Education at its June 10 meeting. He will be sworn in on July 8. He is an attorney and directs the Office of Student Advocacy at the University of Oregon. He is the first African-American to serve on Lane's board.

An FAA flight safety award was presented to Lane by Portland office director Samuel Inouye. The award recognizes 200,000 consecutive hours and 25 million miles of flight training without a single injury accident. Inouye credited Bob Farrand's leadership and the expertise and dedication of his staff and students for achieving this rare and notable record of excellence. Chair Michael Dubick and President Jerry Moskus accepted for Lane.

The board agreed with a Diversity Team recommendation to proceed with cross-departmental ethnic studies classes including hiring a faculty coordinator. Presenter Kate Barry said this will meet immediate needs and lay the foundation for a future possible ethnic studies program.

In other action, the board approved: the 1998/99 general fund budget of \$65.5 million; budget transfers for 1997/98; president's annual authorizations for 1998/99; a digital audio system for KLCC; vending services; Foodservice groceries; and a classification study for technology positions.

Appointed were Joyce Godels as Family & Health Careers division chair, Maurice Hamington as business instructor, Derek Mpinga as Mathematics division chair, Jill Padgett as business instructor, Mary Parthemer as Student Support Services program director, and Douglas Smyth as counselor. The board also approved schematics for the \$1 million Florence center addition and funding for community learning centers at McKenzie and Elmira high schools at about \$380,000 each.

New logo, stationery and business card design in use

As part of the logo and graphic identify project, the college's stationery, business cards and official memo pads have been redesigned. Last Friday, Printing/Graphics printed the first batch of stationery using the new designs. Beginning this week, the new logo



will be used in lieu of the old logos on all new printing jobs. Departments are encouraged to use up items with the old logos before ordering new ones.

The Graphic Identify Team is working on a manual that will show how to use the logo in different situations. Meanwhile, Printing/Graphics has a draft of the manual and can help you use it in most applications. Don't miss out on Medicare

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

Insurance in retirement

Faculty employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice or HMO Oregon before retirement to be eligible to carry their insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add dependent(s) or change insurance carriers.

Management employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement. - Darlene Sherman

Who is your life insurance beneficiary?

All eligible staff should be sure that the beneficiary on their life insurance is correct and current. If you would like to change your beneficiary on your LCC life insurance and also with PERS, those two forms are available in Personnel Services.
