INSURANCE IN RETIREMENT

Faculty employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice or HMO Oregon before retirement to be eligible to carry their insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add dependent(s) or change insurance carriers.

Management employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement.

DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

POLITICAL SCIENCE CO-OP STUDENT GETS D.C. JOB

Rep. Peter DeFazio has hired Gina Rossini as a staff assistant for his Washington D.C. office. Rossini, 20, is a former Lane student who interned in DeFazio's Eugene office last year through Lane's Cooperative Education political science program coordinated by Steve Candee. "This is a high profile job in my office and it's important to have someone from Oregon in this position," DeFazio said. "Gina will be the first point of contact with visitors and callers. The position requires confidence, poise and knowledge of a variety of issues. I'm sure Gina will be up to the challenge." Rossini also studied at the University of Oregon and Arizona State University and plans to complete her undergraduate degree in African studies and international relations at American University. Gina's dad is study skills instructor Frank Rossini.

BOARD REPORT

The Lane Community College Board of Education began reviewing new policies based on policy governance at its September 9 meeting. The board's intent is to undertake a stronger leadership role and step back from administrative management.

President Jerry Moskus said the community college funding formula has changed again, this time removing the "floor" which protects colleges from reductions in funding, and setting a five-year deadline to achieve equity. The board supported his opposition to a related state proposal to fund equity colleges directly, bypassing the formula.

The board approved granting, rather than loaning, \$1.5 million in Ashlane settlement funds toward affordable student housing. Requests for proposals from housing developers will be issued by the Housing Policy Board for Lane. The remaining \$.4 million from the settlement will be allocated as student housing stipends.

The consent agenda was approved including rejection of automated purchasing software proposals, purchase of an advanced manufacturing training system for Business & Industry Services students, award of a Wildish Building remodel bid, and approval of 14 personnel appointments.

Michael Dubick announced that he would not seek re-election. He has served on Lane's board since 1994. Five of seven board seats will be up for election in March 1999.

The president's monthly report covered several topics, including that Lane wants main campus to be the site of a School District 4J football field; that management employee negotiations are continuing; that we are exceeding labor consulting services contracted hours; and other items.

The board meets again October 14. For more information about board meetings, contact the President's Office at 2200.

BOARD OF EDUCATION CHANGING TO POLICY GOVERNANCE MODEL

The Lane Community College Board of Education will undertake a stronger leadership role and step back from administrative management under new policies given a first review at the September 9 meeting. The policies emerge from a policy governance model. The policy titled Governing Style directs the board to "govern with an emphasis on (1) outward vision, (2) encouragement of diversity in viewpoints, (3) strategic leadership more than administrative detail, (4) clear distinction of board and president roles, (5) collective rather than individual decisions, (6) future rather than past or present, and (7) proactivity rather than reactivity."

The other policies are Treatment of Learners/Consumers, Treatment of Staff, Financial Planning and Budgeting, Financial Condition and Activities, Emergency President Succession, Asset Protection, Compensation and Benefits, Communication and Support to the Board, Global Governance Commitment, Board Job Description, Agenda Planning, Chairperson's Role, Board Member's Code of Conduct, Board Vacancies, New Board Member Orientation, Global Board-President Relationship, Delegation to the President, Board Committee Principles, and Monitoring President Performance.

The 20 policies are linked to ends statements and together with state-mandated policies will constitute the entirety of board policies. Previous board policies which do not meet the governance model will be reassigned as administrative policies and procedures.

A first reading of the policies is scheduled for the October 14 meeting.

Policy governance is a national trend. Lane's board consulted eight other community colleges in Colorado, Illinois, Kansas, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Central Oregon Community College in Bend.

VICE PRESIDENT LARRY WARFORD CHOSEN FOR AACC COMMISSION

Vice President Larry Warford has been selected to serve a three-year term on the American Association of Community Colleges Commission on Economic and Workforce Development. The commission will work with and advise the AACC board and staff on public policy issues, professional development, and program initiatives of the association. Pat-On-The-Back Certificates go to: Sandy Ing, Mona Arbuckle, Sharon Kealoha, Ann Metzger, Nadine Wilkes, Sydney Wilson, and Donna Zmolek, Student Health; John Healey, Health & PE; and Fred Lundgren, City of Springfield Fire & Life Safety; for collaborative work in securing the use, through a long-term loan, of an on-site defibrillator for Lane Community College. This cooperative agreement between Lane and the City of Springfield Fire & Life Safety marks the first time a defibrillator has been placed in a community setting other than a medical center or with a police, fire or EMT unit. While we hope it won't be necessary to use the defibrillator, we are prepared if it is needed at Lane.

A Pat-On-The-Back award of \$250 goes to Linda Ericksen, Business Technologies, for creating 14 innovative online courses in computer software. Three of these course offerings were developed from existing three-credit courses and 11 additional courses were developed from scratch. Linda's innovative work has greatly expanded student access to Lane.

An Innovation Grant of \$5,000 goes to Sue Norton and Elaine Phillips, Child Care Resource Connection, for implementation of a pilot mentorship program for child care providers.
