The two entities are now working together to remodel the new building to fit the needs of the agency. The remodel is expected to be completed by spring. Lane's construction technology program offers a two-year associate of applied science degree and a one-year certificate of completion in construction technology. DONATIONS NEEDED TO HELP FERAL CATS

The LCC Animal Support Committee works diligently to humanely control the feral cat population on campus. Cats are trapped and taken to a veterinarian where they are neutered or spayed and vaccinated. If the cats can be tamed, we locate homes for them. The adult cats, who are often too wild to be tamed, are returned to campus where they are fed and monitored seven days a week by volunteers. These cats are now neutered or spayed and cannot add to the campus cat population. Over the past five months, approximately 11 kittens have been caught and placed in homes; six to seven adult cats, who were too wild to be tamed, have been caught, neutered or spayed, vaccinated and released back on campus. Currently, there are under 20 cats living on college property. The committee relies on private donations to buy food and pay for veterinarian costs. The small fund has been nearly depleted by the costs incurred recently to sterilize and vaccinate these 18 cats and kittens. Your donations, in any amount, will be greatly appreciated. We also collect cans and bottles which are returned for refund and the money placed in the cat fund. We ask for your support and understanding as the committee works to assure the humane treatment of these unfortunate animals. A reminder: abandonment of animals is punishable by a fine; we do not advocate this

MEDICAL OFFICE ASSISTANT GRADS PLACE IN TOP 1% ON CMA EXAM

Fifteen graduates of the medical office assistant program at Lane took the national Certified Medical Assistant examination (administered by the American Association of Medical Assistants twice each year) in June to earn the CMA credentials. The AAMA notified Lane on September 29 that all 15 students passed the exam. When compared with graduates of 228 other medical assistant programs who had five or more certification candidates taking the exam, Lane's graduates' average scores were in the 99th percentile. That is, 99 percent of the programs represented in this exam had average scores lower than Lane's graduates! - Joyce Garibay

ENROLLMENT UP

The first day of classes at Lane saw a 5.5 percent increase in full-time equivalent (FTE) students over last fall at the same time. A headcount estimate won't be available until the end of the fourth week of the term, as students add and drop classes and sign up for both credit and noncredit courses. However, last fall Lane enrolled 18,432 students.

Officials attribute the increase to added sections of classes, more evening classes, and Lane's new outreach centers at Churchill, Oakridge, Thurston and Willamette high schools.

Main campus traffic and parking is congested mornings, but may lessen as students purchase the LCC Fast Pass, a \$29 per term LTD bus pass for Lane students and employees, available for the first time this fall. The pass is on sale at Lane's main campus and Downtown Center bookstores.

This past summer the Computer Services System Team (Thad Cowdin, Carolyn Cruz, Lee Hallin, and Ardene Toney) installed a new firewall, web server, and Netscape Enterprise server and upgraded the UNIX operating system. What does this mean in layperson's terms? Well, thanks to the new firewall configuration and webserver upgrade, ":1080/lcc/webpages" was excised from the web path, making all of our addresses mercifully shorter and more manageable for publishing and informational purposes. In addition, the new firewall allows us to perform secure transactions on the web, such as those requiring credit card and social security numbers. With the new firewall, this confidential information can be transmitted between secure sites, thereby preventing the illegitimate use of this information. The new firewall also gives us the capacity for real audio and video, i.e. sound and pictures, on the web.

Installing the other servers allows us to access the most current capabilities, maintain support with software contracts and be year 2000 compliant. SHAKESPEAREAN ACTING AND THE GLOBE THEATER TOPIC OF EVENT

An illustrated talk, "Shakespeare: Relishing The Language," will be presented on Wednesday, Oct. 21, at 3:30 p.m. in the Blue Door Theater on main campus, with actor Graham Christopher. Christopher is an education actor with Globe education. He will use his acting skills to describe the rich experience of being in the Globe, and the unique relationship between audience and player. The workshop gives the participant the opportunity to play with a small segment of a Shakespeare script, as if it were for a performance in the Globe. Christopher has been a professional actor for almost 20 years, and he has toured with companies throughout the UK. He spent two years on the road with the Medieval Players Theater Company, visiting Australia in 1986 with The Taming of the Shrew, in which he played both Bianca and Biondello. His varied work at Globe Education includes a Macbeth workshop for eight-year-olds, a King Lear workshop for senior citizens, and workshops specifically for teachers of Shakespeare in the classroom.

STRATEGIC PLANNING IN-SERVICE REPORT

The Strategic Planning activities at in-service engaged a large part of the campus community. Results of the "Report Card" activity show that 267 classified staff, 266 faculty, 50 managers, one board member, and 10 "others" completed a college "Report Card". The total of 594 represents nearly half of all Lane employees. Participants were from main campus (83 percent), the Downtown Center (8 percent), Florence (2 percent), Cottage Grove (1 percent), and "other" LCC locations (8 percent).

Responses staff provided indicated that Lane is a student-focused college. When asked about the amount of time spent working with students in our jobs, 55 percent reported they spend 60 percent or more of their time engaged with students. Among those staff working closely with students, 56 percent thought Lane was doing a "excellent" or "good" job as "a learning organization that defines success by how well it meets the needs of its learners", and 9 percent thought the college was doing a "poor" or "unacceptable" job. MOSKUS ELECTED CHAIR OF LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION

Jerry Moskus, president of Lane Community College since 1990, was elected 1999 chair of the board of the prestigious League for Innovation in the Community College at the League's 30th anniversary celebration held at Maricopa Community Colleges in Phoenix from October 8-9.

"With his national leadership on key community college issues and his recent election to the board of the American Association of Community Colleges, Jerry Moskus is an ideal leader to help the League make its transition into the 21st century," said Terry O'Banion, president of the League.

The League for Innovation in the Community College is a consortium of leading community colleges organized to stimulate innovation and experimentation in all areas of community college development. The League serves as a catalyst, project incubator, and experimental laboratory for community colleges throughout the United States and Canada. Lane is the only League college in Oregon. The January 1998 issue of Change Magazine called the League "the most dynamic organization in the community college world."

Moskus was elected to a three-year term on the AACC board in March. He has chaired the Oregon Community College Presidents Council and the Southern Willamette Research Corridor, and has served on numerous other local and regional organizations. Under his leadership, Lane won the David Pierce Organizational Leadership Award from the National Institute of Leadership and Institutional Effectiveness in March. The college is one of six colleges profiled in O'Banion's book, "A Learning College for the 21st Century," published in July by ACE and AACC.

KEISLING AND DEFAZIO TO VISIT

Two speakers are scheduled for Steve Candee's government classes this month: Phil Keisling, Oregon Secretary of State, will speak to the State and Local Government class about the upcoming election, vote-by-mail and other issues on Thursday, Oct. 22, from 10-11:20 a.m. in CEN 402. Peter DeFazio, Representative of the 4th Congressional District, will speak to the American Government class on Friday, Oct. 30, from 11-11:50 a.m. in CEN 402. Guests are welcome to both speaking events, but seating is limited.

BOARD REPORT

The Board of Education approved budget principles and criteria for 1999-2000 at its October 14 meeting. Also approved were a Zenger-Miller instructor pool; a contract increase for labor negotiations consulting; and the personnel appointments of Robert Clark as interim media arts instructor, Duane Partain

as culinary instructor/coordinator, and Clive Wanstall as chef instructor. An official first reading of policy governance policies was held. The policies are available for review.

The board heard that enrollment was up 7 percent in FTE and 11 percent in headcount by the end of the second week of classes, although continuing registration activity may change the percentages. Moskus attributed the increase to more evening and weekend classes, the opening of the community learning centers, and a possible change in the local economy. "Usually we don't get an enrollment increase like this unless the economy's poor. My guess is the economy in this area is not as good as we think. There probably aren't as many jobs available this year as last year." Vice President Larry Warford added that 1,000 people have registered for telecourses, compared to 714 last fall.

In other reports the board heard that Lane is still in the running as the site of a new 4J sports stadium; that Florence building schematics have been altered to relocate a lab and classroom, and that facilities staff is aware of current maintenance needs; that the Physical Education Building roof must be replaced, including an immediate partial repair; that the student loan default rate has dropped to 24 percent from 30 percent; that there have been no student lines in College Finance or Students First! but lines still persist in the Bookstore and information kiosks; that the unions will distribute paper copies of the Work Roles and Relationships Agreement; that student government registered 1,300 student voters; and that Lane is negotiating a training agreement with Monaco Coach which plans to add 200 jobs. President Moskus said he has been elected 1999-2000 chair of the League for Innovation. Roger Hall announced that he will not seek re-election to his At-Large position in the March election.

Due to the Veteran's Day holiday, the next board meeting will be held on Monday, Nov. 9, in the Boardroom.

STRATEGIC PLANNING IN-SERVICE REPORT

As part of the Strategic Planning "Report Card" activity, we asked 1) How important was each value to the college and its mission, and 2) How is the college performing in each of the value areas. Here are the results of "How well is Lane performing in this area?"

Again, we calculated the average response from all responses to each question to determine the ranking of the college's performance on these value areas. Note that no value area average fell lower than 2.9 ("Good"). In order (from best performance down) the rankings were: Lane is comprehensive (1.3); the mission statement (2); the vision statement (2.1); Lane is a community leader (2.2); Lane is (financially) accessible (2.2); Lane is innovative in its approach to life-long learning (2.3); Lane is a community of learners (2.5); Lane is learning centered (2.5); Lane is (technologically) accessible (2.5); Lane is respectful (2.5); Lane practices good stewardship (systems and procedures support its mission and values) (2.6); Lane honors diversity (in its students and staff) (2.6); Lane honors diversity (seeks to expand understanding and appreciation) (2.6); Lane practices good stewardship (uses resources in a prudent and ethical manner) (2.7); Lane is collaborative (flexible) (2.7); Lane is (physically) accessible (2.7); and Lane is collaborative (fosters trust) (2.9), (practices open communications) (2.9).

HEADCOUNT UP 11 PERCENT

You knew enrollment was up when the term started: main campus parking lots were as full at night as in the day, and traffic backed up every morning on I-5. Second-week enrollment reports affirm the anecdotal evidence: headcount is up 11.2 percent, and full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment is up 7.2 percent.

CARL HORSTRUP GETS THE BEST KIND OF THANK-YOU

Carl Horstrup, semi-retired department chair for Industrial Technology, recently visited Julia Craig's eighth grade class in Drain to talk about college and careers. A few days later he received 31 thank-you letters and a date for a November 13 field trip to main campus.

Some excerpts from student letters with spellings unchanged: "What you said really got me thinking about what I am going to be when I get older...." "I want to go to LCC because its close and I think it is a good collage...." "The students and I are very interested in the jobs you teach people to do like Computer programing and flight technology. We have decided to visit you on November 13." "I never knew you could pick out from so many jobs...." "I have an interest in a couple of things like autobody, flight technology, electrical, and especialy chief school (my dad is a chief)...." [Chef?] "I will not be going to LCC because I am going to veterinarian school." "I liked your speech on the classes because it wasn't boring ... when we go on a tour of the collage I hope to see the wanted chef school." "You helped alot of kids in our classes. Now they know that they can get a good education in their home state."

Teacher Craig wrote, "The majority of students in this group had believed it to be popular to have poor grades and poor attitude. Although this feeling had been trenched into years of practice, I can see a clear change in their attitude and hope for themselves. Most now have a hope toward the future that I don't believe existed previously." Watch for the kids on November 13.

STRATEGIC PLANNING TEAM REPORTS ON IN-SERVICE ACTIVITIES

The group discussions about the strategy statements at the September 22 in-service yielded a huge amount of data. Today's report will focus on the first question of the afternoon's discussion: "Is this the right strategy for Lane to follow?"

Responses to this question were first tabulated as "yes", "no", and "split" votes as reported by each Recorder. The results came out as follows: Life long learning: yes votes, 35 (95 percent), no votes, 1 (3 percent), split votes, 1 (3 percent). Rapidly Technological Change: yes votes, 25 (78 percent), no votes, 6 (19 percent); split votes, 1 (3 percent). Increasingly Diverse Population: yes votes, 18 (67 percent), no votes, 7 (26 percent); split votes, 2 (7 percent). Internal Systems Refocus: yes votes, 26 (74 percent), no votes, 4 (11 percent), split votes, 5 (14 percent). More Students with Fewer Resources: yes votes, 16 (67 percent), no votes, 5 (21 percent), split votes, 3 (13 percent). Demand for Workforce/workplace Training: yes votes, 22 (85 percent), no votes, 2 (8 percent), split votes, 2 (8 percent). No strategy statement received less than 67 percent "yes" votes.

The next task for the team will be to analyze the comments to see why some strategies did not receive higher approval rates. For instance, analysis of the comments on "Internal Systems Refocus" showed that a conflict in the language used in the Critical Issue and the corresponding Strategy statement caused confusion and debate among many, resulting in a high number of "no" and "split" votes. Further analysis of this feed back will be used by the team in deciding if changes to the wording or direction of the strategies is called for.

The Strategic Planning activities at in-service engaged a large part of the campus community. Many felt that the group discussion activity was the most engaging and meaningful of the day. Analysis and synthesis of the written materials is continuing, but we want you to know how that information will be processed and used by the team.

First, all 65 tables reported three "top" ideas for implementing the strategies that address 3 of the 6 Critical Issues. That's 65 tables x 3 ideas x 3 issues = 585 possible responses. Each of these responses is being transcribed. After all are transcribed the members of the Strategic Planning Team will be assigned to read and analyze the comments made under each one of the Critical Issues headings. Team members will be identifying trends that appear from the comments, particularly those that received multiple mentions. COLLEGE COUNCIL PROVIDES YOU A VOICE THROUGH REPRESENTATION

In a revisiting of it's role, College Council suggested minor modifications to seven recommendations presented by a subcommittee at the October 20 meeting: (1) Council will remain a broadly representative advisory group to the president and other decisionmakers; (2) Council should meet twice monthly; (3) Members should represent their constituencies at council meetings and report back to constituencies -- Vice President Matsen said council should make it known that council is a place for every voice to be heard through representation; (4) Council agendas should reflect coordination with Executive Leadership Team and should include relevant reports from ELT and other groups when the reports are not otherwise available; (5) Current membership representation is satisfactory; (6) Council should track its initiatives; (and 7) Council will evaluate its effectiveness in June.

In other business, council reviewed the proposed academic calendar for 1999-2000. Classes would begin September 27, fall in-service would include two weeks, and one in-service day would be held spring term. The calendar goes next to Instruction and Student Services Council. Final approval is needed by November.

Future agenda items include review of a signage proposal, budgeting, final review of the academic calendar; Board of Education agendas, policy governance, work roles documents, and the strategic plan. Council's next meeting is set for Tuesday, Nov. 3, from 1:30-3:30 p.m. in the Boardroom.
