QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING WEATHER CLOSURES Q. HOW DO WE KNOW FOR SURE THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?

A. When a decision is made to close a college facility, the college immediately notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other local radio and television stations. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Please listen or watch. Do not call the media. This interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information.

GuardLine at The Register-Guard will be notified; call 485-2000 Ext. 7820.

A *@* e-mail message will be sent when possible.

The hearing impaired can call 747-4501 Ext. 7730 TTY to print closure notices on TTD machines. To avoid complicated messages listing the status of each Lane facility, messages will refer to main campus, Downtown Center, Cottage Grove, and Florence. Downtown Center includes the DTC, Flight Technology at Eugene Airport, and the metropolitan community learning centers. Please be sure your colleagues and students at these locations know that Downtown Center announcements refer to them.

Snow closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m.

Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day and reopen for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

Q. IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED, SHOULD STAFF REPORT FOR WORK?

A. When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions from their supervisor or the media. If one or more facilities are closed and others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

Q. WHAT DO DELAYS MEAN?

A. If opening of the college is delayed until a certain time, all classes and other activities scheduled to begin before that time are canceled for the day. For example, if the college will open at 10 a.m., all classes that start before 10 a.m. are canceled, even if the class is scheduled to continue past 10 a.m.

Q. HOW CAN PEOPLE WITH HEARING IMPAIRMENTS LEARN OF CLOSURES?

A. Local television stations provide closed caption service during their news casts and run visual displays when possible.

Q. ARE THERE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES?

A. When 30th Avenue is icy, some people come from the east via Franklin, or ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, drivers may choose alternate routes.

Q. WILL STAFF GET PAID?

A. Business Operations Manual policy states that:

When the college is officially closed, all bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors, and management employees scheduled to work will be paid as if they worked.

If you are required to work during a closure, you are entitled to time off with pay on a straight-time basis.

If you have scheduled leave on a closure day, your leave account will be charged as originally scheduled.

Hourly employees are paid only for hours actually worked.

If the college officially closes after work has started, eligible employees receive leave with pay for the remainder of the work day.

If you are scheduled to report to work before a closure is announced, but have not reported at the time of announcement, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay for hours not worked before the closure, as approved by your supervisor.

If you choose to come to work late or leave early because of bad weather, you may take personal leave, vacation leave, compensatory time, or leave without pay, as approved by your supervisor.

If you choose to work all or part of your schedule during an official closure, you receive no additional pay or time off.

FORMER LANE CUSTODIAN MAKES THE NATIONAL NEWS FOR HEROISM

Marty Ravellette, former Lane custodian who advised architects how to design main campus to accommodate people with disabilities, made the national news after rescuing an 86-year-old woman from a burning van on a highway near Durham, NC in October. The woman had been left locked in the van for security after the engine failed and the driver, the woman's daughter, left to get help. The car caught fire and the locks failed. Ravellette and his wife drove by, saw smoke, and stopped. Ravellette, born with no arms, kicked in a window and his wife unlocked the door to free the woman. The story made USA Today, the NBC Today Show, and The Rosie O'Donnell Show. Ravellette worked at Lane from about 1967-72. He now lives in Carrboro, NC, and runs a lawn care service. BOARD REPORT

POLICY GOVERNANCE WAS ADOPTED by the Board of Education on November 9, although the discussion "is not finished," said Chair Roger Hall. Some work still needs to be done, such as writing ends statements for some policies. Ends statements will help address concerns raised about the public's access to the board, said Hall. The board also needs to decide some issues such as whether board members should resign before applying for a job at the college. The intent of policy governance is for the board to "govern with an emphasis on (1) outward vision, (2) encouragement of diversity in viewpoints, (3) strategic leadership more than administrative detail, (4) clear distinction of board and president roles, (5) collective rather than individual decisions, (6) future rather than past or present, and (7) proactivity rather than reactivity."

IN OTHER ACTION, the board approved the management working conditions agreement for 1999, increased bond project architect fees from \$1.9 million to \$2.5 million, awarded an emergency roofing bid to Umpqua Roofing for \$30,190 for the PE Building, approved the 1999-2000 budget calendar, approved budget transfers for 1998-99, and approved an occupational skills certificate program which will combine existing coursework into a one-year program. Personnel appointments approved were John Etheridge as basic skills/GED/AHS instructor and Scott Salsedo as athletic trainer. The academic calendar for 1999-2000 was pulled from the agenda so administration can consider a faculty request to discuss the calendar in bargaining.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, auditors told the board that the annual audit was "particularly smooth" and produced a clean and unqualified opinion, "the best opinion you can earn."

All votes were 6-0; board member Michael Dubick was absent. The next regular meeting is set for December 9.
