FAMILY TUITION WAIVER OR HOPE SCHOLARSHIP?

If your dependent qualifies for the Hope Scholarship, that is probably a better option than the family tuition waiver for paying for classes at Lane. The Hope Scholarship is an income tax credit, which means the tuition (up to a certain amount) is subtracted from your tax liability. Another advantage is that your dependent can register at the normal assigned time instead of waiting until the end of the registration period. CHILD CARE OFFICE INCREASES SERVICE TO MULTICULTURAL FAMILIES

Child care services for multicultural families in Lane County will expand and improve thanks to a \$10,000 grant from The Oregon Community Foundation to the Child Care Resource Connection at Lane.

Grant funds will be used to train more Spanish-speaking child care providers in how to set up a child care business, how to recognize and report child abuse, how to provide a developmentally appropriate environment, and other topics. In addition, more Spanish-speaking parents and parents of other cultural backgrounds will be advised of the resources available to them. Expanded services began with increasing the hours of a part-time multicultural coordinator to full-time. Presentations and workshops also are planned.

TUITION GRANT NOW AVAILABLE

A tuition grant of \$432 is now available to Lane students. This proficiency grant recognizes students who have shown a strong inclination toward a particular discipline, whether or not majoring in that discipline. Staff should encourage students who have shown extraordinary drive and ability in a discipline or other area of service to apply for this award.

Students need to present a project that they would like to perform as a service to the college and/or community. The project needs to be developed with the assistance of a college staff member. The project might be as simple as tutoring or might be more complex, such as a project to enrich the department or college or community. This project might be in the area of research, development of handouts, creation of a booklet, or an event, such as a presentation or performance, or a project of community service.

A committee of faculty, management and classified staff will read all applications and select the winners. The committee will award higher points to projects closely related to the student's field of academic interest. Other criteria will include quality of the project proposal, grade point average, grades in the student's field of interest, and prior service to the college and community. Applications will be due on Friday, the sixth week of winter and spring terms. DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You apply for Medicare - automatically - when you apply for Social Security benefits. You should apply for Medicare separately if you plan to retire after age 65. When you enroll in Part A (hospital insurance) on Medicare, you also are automatically enrolled in Part B (supplementary medical insurance), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B. If you enroll in Part B at the earliest opportunity, you pay monthly premiums. These premiums are usually deducted from your Social Security benefits. Late enrollment in Part B may mean you will pay higher premiums. Questions about Medicare should be directed to the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. To apply for Medicare, go to the Eugene office.

ARCHIVES PROJECT INCLUDED AMONG OREGON'S HERITAGE NEEDS

Five projects to enhance archives and records research and documentation at Lane are among 269 projects listed in the 1998 Heritage Needs Assessment published by the Oregon Heritage Commission this month. BOARD REPORT

BUS PASS SALES to Lane students and staff will continue spring term thanks to the Board of Education. The board voted 7-0 at its January 13 meeting to use \$50,000 in contingency funds to continue the program. Pass sales have exceeded expectations, depleting the subsidy for the one-year pilot program. The board also directed administration to give the Fast Pass program serious consideration during the budget development process. Lloyd Rain, bus pass implementation coordinator, said there has been a 65 percent increase in campus ridership and that there are 200 fewer cars on main campus since the program began.

COMPLAINTS AND APPEALS TO THE BOARD under policy governance hasn't really changed anything, argued some board members, but others said that student and staff perception is a different story. Policy monitoring will allow the board to ensure that student and staff grievance processes are satisfactorily followed, said Roger Hall, and anyone still may address the board under the standing agenda item, "statements from the audience."

IN OTHER ACTION, the board voted 5-2 to require board members to resign if applying for a job at the college; Michael Dubick and James Britt voted no. The board also approved the appointments of Margaret Robertson as Lane's first female technical drafting instructor, and Nadine Williams as new library director.

OTHER NEWS included a first-week winter term FTE increase of 5.4 percent; plans to remove more bushes and alter bulb changing schedules to improve night lighting and security on main campus; and declarations by Roger Hall that he is running unopposed for reelection to his at-large board seat, and by Adam Young that he has withdrawn from the reelection race in anticipation of pursuing a master's degree and possibly moving. The next meeting will be February 10.

COMPANY DONATES \$22,000 PRESS TO WELDING PROGRAM

Pacific Metal Fab of Eugene has donated a \$22,000 Turret punch press to the Fabrication/Welding Technology Program. The press measures about 18 ft. long by 10 ft. wide by 8 ft. high and features a tape reader plus about 400 dies which enable operators to punch holes of various sizes in metal plate without changing equipment.

Instructor Ed Humes says the press is typical of equipment used in today's fabrication industry. He will use the press in his robotics class. "This is a sizable donation for our program and will be a tremendous help to our students' success as welders," says Humes. "The welding trade has changed. Most equipment in modern welding shops is now CNC [computer numeric control] operated."

Chris Laubscher of Pacific Metal Fab says the donation shows how industry-education partnership helps keep students current with technology and keeps a qualified workforce available to industry. He is organizing a new manufacturing partnership.

Lane offers a two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree and a one-year Certificate of Completion in fabrication/welding. Specialized training also is available. Shop salaries average \$18,000-\$35,000 yearly in the Pacific Northwest. Outside the shop, salaries average \$30,000-\$60,000. From Oregon Revised Statute 260.432: "The restrictions imposed by the law of the State of Oregon on your political activities are that 'No public employee shall solicit any money, influence, service, or other thing of value or otherwise promote or oppose any political committee or promote or oppose the nomination or election of a candidate, the gathering of signatures on an initiative, referendum or recall petition, the adoption of a measure, or the recall of a public office holder while on the job during working hours. However, this section does not restrict the right of a public employee to express personal political views.'"

COLLEGE COUNCIL REPORT

The draft strategic plan needs more work, College Council agreed at its January 19 meeting. Councilors reported back from their constituent groups since first reviewing the plan early last month. Some opposing views emerged, for example, how much more discussion of the draft is needed, by whom, for how long, in what format, etc. But consensus was that the document is unfocused and too wordy. Several people wanted a more operational, less philosophical document. Others were concerned about a lack of emphasis on student services and exclusion of some college activities such as the Strategic Learning Initiative. After lengthy discussion, the draft was sent back to the strategic planning team for revision and resubmittal at council's on February 19 meeting.

STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE

The strategic planning team met yesterday and welcomed two new members, Bob Barber and Tamara Pinkas. A new, second draft of the strategic plan will be prepared. The team agreed on a timeline for review: the second draft will be completed no later than February 19 and the review process for that draft will conclude no later than March 19. A three-member subcommittee will develop a review process. They will meet independently and report back to the team at its next meeting on February 2. Also at the meeting, the planning team reviewed a summary of input from College Council and others at the college. Copies of written feedback were included in each member's packet.

Following are four major criticisms of the plan and how they are being addressed: 1. The draft is too wordy. It will be rewritten to be shorter and clearer. 2. The draft does not provide clear direction to departments and staff. The second draft will concentrate on broad strategies relevant to the whole college and describe how the plan can be used at all levels of the college. 3. The draft doesn't place enough emphasis on employees. The team will continue a discussion of this issue. 4. The process did not allow enough time for review. The second draft will be circulated and a month will be set-aside for reactions.

At its next meeting the team will finish its review of the input and begin rewriting the plan.
