## Hope Scholarship and Lifetime Learning Tax Credits

\* What are the Hope Scholarship and Lifetime Learning Tax Credits?

HOPE. Beginning on January 1, 1998, students or their parents may be eligible to claim a Hope Scholarship Credit against their federal income taxes. Generally the Hope Scholarship Credit may be claimed for the qualified tuition and related expenses of each student in the taxpayer's family who is enrolled at least half-time in one of the first two years of postsecondary education and who is enrolled in a program leading to a degree, certificate, or other recognized educational credential

LIFE. Beginning on July 1, 1998, taxpayers may be eligible to claim a Lifetime Learning Credit against their federal income taxes. The Lifetime Learning Credit may be claimed for the qualified tuition and related expenses (CREDIT or NON- CREDIT CLASS) of the students in the taxpayer's family who are enrolled in eligible educational institutions.

\* Form 1098-T. This is an IRS information return that LCC is required to mail to most students who registered for a credit class and paid qualified tuition and related expenses from January 1, 1998 through December 31, 1998. There is no financial information on this form. Text printed on this form does tell them they can request a class/expense report from us.

\* Who qualifies for the tax credit? This will need to be determined by the taxpayer and their tax preparer. First and foremost, LCC can not provide tax advice, or have the taxpayer leave with the perception that they have received tax advice. A student must contact their tax preparer or the IRS for tax advice. The IRS can be contacted at 1-800-829-1040 or they can visit the IRS website at <http://www.irs.ustreas.gov/prod/hot/not97-60.html>. Proposed regulations were published in the Federal Register/Vol. 64, No. 3/Wednesday, January 6, 1999 ([http://www.gpo.gov/su\\_docs/fedreg/a990106c.html](http://www.gpo.gov/su_docs/fedreg/a990106c.html)).

The only thing we can provide students is the class/expense report.

\* Detailed class/expense report. Can be printed for any student, i.e., credit, non-credit, ABE, and HSC. This report is a listing of the student's financial transactions and class schedule for 1998. This should provide the student information needed in preparing their tax return and calculating their tax credit, if eligible. GIVING THIS REPORT DOES NOT MEAN THEY ARE ELIGIBLE FOR ANY OF THE TAX CREDITS. Students should call the IRS or talk with their tax preparers.

\* Where can students get a copy of their class/expense report? Students can get the Class/Expense Report by calling grade line at 541-747-0076 or by calling or going to: any Kiosk location; the Student First! Center; College Finance; DTC; Thurston CLC; Willamette CLC; Churchill CLC; Oakridge CLC; LCC at Cottage Grove; LCC at Florence; and, Flight Tech.

\* Parents requesting class/expense reports.--We can give or mail reports only to the STUDENT at the address listed on the system. We can not mail or give information to the parents or change addresses on the parent's request.

\* FERPA. All student privacy rules apply. We can not give any information to anyone other than the student without a release.

## DISABILITY PRESENTATION A GOOD ONE FOR MANAGERS

Disability Services strongly suggests the following Ron Stewart presentation on Friday, Feb. 5, 8-10 a.m. To reserve a space call Ext. 2150. "Technology Access and the Law" is for institutional managers and administrators involved in setting institutional policy for technology and technology-related programs and services. The presentation looks at the variety of national laws that affect adults with disabilities in the post-secondary educational environment and explores the issues and challenges institutions face when addressing access to their technology-based programs, facilities and services by individuals with disabilities. Emerging trends in this area are also addressed, along with the presentation of a process for the development of a comprehensive institutional plan for technology access.

## SOCIAL SCIENCE INSTRUCTOR AWARDED DIPLOMATE STATUS

Ruth J. Bichsel, Ph.D., has been awarded status as a diplomate of the American Board of Psychological Specialties. The board was established by the American College of Forensic Examiners to recognize the experience and education of individuals engaged in forensic examination in their field. Individuals approved for diplomate status must achieve proficiency in a variety of topics, procedures and ethical standards, and must meet rigorous criteria of the diplomate program. Information obtained from such highly skilled experts is often used in criminal cases and court testimony, with implications of local and national significance. The diplomate program is registered with The National Certification Commission.

The American College of Forensic Examiners is a multi-disciplinary association comprised of a group of professionals actively engaged in forensic examination and consultation. Running for the At-Large Position 7 seat is Adell McMillan of Eugene, a retired UO administrator, and Michael Rose of Eugene, a retired Lane English instructor. Incumbent Adam Young of Eugene, a UO student, is not running.

This year's election does not include the Zone 1 seat covering west Lane County, held by Larry Romine of Veneta, nor the Zone 4 seat covering east Lane County, held by Kathleen Shelley of Vida.

## COLLEGE COUNCIL REPORT

President Jerry Moskus raised the committee question at the February 2 College Council meeting. Lane's governance structure relies on committee work and the same people are often asked to serve; how can we improve participation and how well is the system working? One councilor said some committees are more visible than others, which may create a false impression of limited participation. Others suggested cataloging committees to reveal duplication or repetitive membership, but a previous effort to do this did not pan out. It was noted that front-line staff need back-up support to allow them to participate, and students face time conflicts and the turnover inherent to two-year campuses. Council agreed that committees need a clear charge and clear reporting relationships, and should record and report their progress to the college community. Councilor Michael McDonald and guest Adrian Rodriguez volunteered to help Moskus seek further solutions to committee structure and the governance system.

Council next meets on February 16 to hear the Strategic Planning Team response to council's comments on the first draft of the college strategic plan, and to review the process to finalize the plan.

## BUDGET UPDATE

In a memo to all employees on October 15, 1998, the Budget Leaders (Jerry Moskus, Mary Spilde, Larry Warford, Marie Matsen, and Tracy Simms) outlined the budget development process for the 1999-2000 budget. Timelines in that process called for budget hearings during the first part of February. We have determined that reductions are not necessary to balance the budget next year. However, some reductions might be necessary in order to fund some new activities. That determination has not been made at this time.

In the coming weeks, each group (Instruction, Student Services, College Operations and Executive Services) will make funding recommendations with program adjustment money allocated to each. The Budget Leaders will allocate some funds to activities on a collegewide basis. When these recommendations have been completed, we will schedule hearings at that time.

We now have safe goals and enough of the, to carry AYSO Region 93 into the future for quite some time." Over the years, Ed and his students have fabricated more than 100 sets of goal posts for various organizations including Kidsports, the University of Oregon, Lane, and Oak Hill School.

## ARCHIVES DISPLAY ATTRACTS VOICE FROM LANE'S PAST

When an exhibit of "Lane Community College: The Parnell Years" was posted on the Archives web site, David Spriggs e-mailed archivist Elizabeth Uhlig. Spriggs designed the college seal, the Titan mascot and the first Torch masthead in 1964/65.

He was a technical drafting student at Eugene Technical Vocational School when it became part of Lane Community College in the October 1964 election. Administration put out a call for a college seal and Spriggs' design was selected. He and his father made the bronze casting of the seal at their home foundry. It's now mounted on the Center Building second-level courtyard wall facing Business. Take a close look at the dashes representing text in the open book: the dashes spell Spriggs' name in Morse Code. "The David and L are on the left page and Spriggs is on the right page, reading from the top left down then top right down."

After students voted in the Titan as a mascot, Spriggs again created the winning design. "I specifically designed the helmet on the character so that you could not see his face. He's a mythological character so I wanted to keep his identity somewhat of a mystery."

Lane used three more of Spriggs' designs. He designed the masthead of the Titan Roundup, Lane's first newsletter which served both students and staff, then the first masthead of the Torch student newspaper. "My last design accepted at LCC was the coat of arms for a student organization known as the Veteran's Club."

Spriggs lives in Cottage Grove. Board of Education member Larry Romine wrote the monograph which the online exhibit features; Elizabeth Uhlig designed the exhibit.

## BOARD REPORT

Lane County is one of the most expensive places to live in the US, Brian Rooney of the Oregon Employment Department told the Board of Education at its February 10 meeting, but at least employment growth is good. Rooney spoke during the strategic conversation on workforce and economic trends. Chuck Forster of the Lane Workforce Partnership added that the cost of housing has turned away some prospective businesses. Carol Fairbourn of the Employment Department said more businesses are using temporary workers. Board Chair Roger Hall questioned whether Lane should support training programs which do not lead to a family-wage job, but Forster said many people still need lower-level jobs just to establish themselves for skill upgrading later on. Gary Pierpoint of South Umpqua Bank said the community learning centers have done much to improve Lane's physical accessibility. The board holds strategic conversations as part of its leadership role under policy governance.

In action, the board reappointed Kenneth Kuhns & Company as the college auditor; approved more than 600 people to program advisory committees, and rejected proposals for an energy institute training coordinator. The board approved the appointment of Theodore "Mike" Mayer as Campus Public Safety director; the temporary appointments of Joe Escobar, Eileen Thompson and Ken Zimmerman as instructional technology support specialists for the Strategic Learning Initiative; and the retirements of Joan Adams from Career and Employment Services, Bob Boettcher from Science, Mike Hopkinson from Media Arts, Judy Lingo from Business Technologies, and Linda Myers and Darlene Ogan from Cooperative

Education. The board approved a revision to the asset protection policy, and conducted first readings of revisions to policies on agenda planning and the board-president relationship.

The next meeting is set for March 10.
