LANE'S TRIO PROGRAM SERVES 200 STUDENTS

February 27 was National TRIO Day. Because access and retention services were an absolutely essential component of the federal strategy to ensure equal educational opportunity, Congress established the TRIO programs 34 years ago. Since 1965, over 10.5 million Americans have benefited from the services of TRIO programs. These programs enable students, regardless of economic circumstance, ethnic and cultural background, and physical ability, to successfully enter college and graduate. TRIO programs are effective: an estimated 2 million students have graduated from college with the support and assistance of our nation's TRIO programs. According to Dr. Arnold Mitchem, President of the Council for Opportunity in Education, "these programs work because they are student-centered, performance-based and non-bureaucratic."

Lane now has its own TRIO program. The TRIO Learning Center has been serving students for almost one year. There are nearly 200 students currently enrolled in the program. They are receiving a variety of services including: individual tutoring by appointment, academic advising, career and personal counseling, referrals to on- and off-campus services, visits to four-year schools, special workshops and classes, and opportunities to attend cultural events on campus and in the community.

LANE LOSES EARLY SUPPORTER

Miles C. Romney died at age 85 last week. He was vice chancellor for academic affairs for the State System of Higher Education when Lane was formed in 1964. "He greased the skids for the college transfer program," recalls Board of Education member Larry Romine, who mentions Romney on page 27 of his monograph, "Lane Community College: The Parnell Years." Romney is quoted in the monograph as saying, "SSHE had a major role in the oversight of standards [on hiring lower division collegiate instructors]. We could approve or disapprove hires. I formed a committee of top people, eight or nine, from the University of Oregon and Oregon State University. I made sure they were all people who were supportive of community colleges. ... We helped the community colleges by evaluating the training of faculty. We weren't trying to control; we were trying to help. Our review gave them a good solid base when they applied for accreditation." Romney's work also made it easier for students to transfer credits. A memorial service will be held March 7 at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints at 3500 W. 18th Avenue in Eugene.

5. Applicant is responsible for making internship arrangements.
6. Applicant must be approved by division chair.
7. Internships must be completed by August 31, 1999.

NCC SPEECH CHAIR TO LEAD WORKSHOP ON GENDER COMMUNICATION

Dan Berger, Ph.D., chair of the Speech Department at Northwest Christian College, will facilitate a free workshop, "Intimate Communication 101: Understanding Female and Male Styles," on Saturday, March 13 from 9 a.m.-12 noon at Marist High School Library in Eugene. The presentation is part of the 1999 Voices of Peace lecture series, sponsored in part by Catholic Campus Ministry at Lane.

Berger has taught interpersonal communication since 1987. He will explore how effective interpersonal communication can lead to greater intimacy and ultimately interpersonal peace. Focussing on his area of specialty, intergender communication and marital intimacy, Berger will address the topic from a variety of perspectives. BRAINSTORMING SESSION ON STUDENT RETENTION SCHEDULED FOR NEXT WEEK

How many students leave Lane without completing their programs or meeting their goals? Why do they drop out? Perhaps your department has developed retention methods that help students succeed. PREPARE YOUR HARDWARE FOR MARCH 7 POWER OUTAGE

Lane main campus will be closed on Sunday, March 7, for a planned power outage to allow utility crews to replace primary service wires. Since computer and printer hardware may have problems if left on when power is cut, Computer Services has some requests. Before you leave on Friday, March 5:

1. Turn off your computer, monitor, local printer, fax and/or other local devices.
2. Turn off any network printers. For this one time, ignore any note that says the printer is not to be turned off.
3. Locate the XCD box on the back of the network printer. The XCD box is a gray or black device attached to a port on the back of the printer. The XCD box will have the words "print server" somewhere on it and two cables going into it. One cable will have a round or cylindrical end and the other will look like a phone jack.
4. Make a note or drawing of the two cables attach to the XCD so you can remember how to reattach them.
5. Disconnect both the cables from the XCD box to switch off both power and data to the device.
6. Check all equipment BEFORE March 5 to make sure you know where to find power switches on equipment, XCD boxes and cables, etc. If you have problems, call the help desk at Ext. 4155 for assistance.

VISION CARE BENEFITS REMINDER

The need for glasses is very common: by age 65, almost everyone wears glasses. If you need to see a vision care specialist for an eye examination, be aware of the following benefit information.

--Classified staff are covered by Blue Cross/Blue Shield and are eligible for an exam and lenses every 12 months and frames every 24 months.

--Faculty (employee coverage only) are covered by Blue Cross/Blue Shield and are eligible for an exam, lenses and frames every 24 months.

--Management are covered by Blue Cross/Blue Shield and are eligible for an exam, lenses and frames every 12 months.

When you receive services from a participating provider, you will normally receive full coverage under these plans (with some limitations, and certain services are not covered). When you receive services from a non-participating provider, coverage will be based on a percentage of cost or a defined amount.

DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare

Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

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LEAGUE PRESIDENT TO RETIRE

Terry O'Banion will retire in December after 23 years as president of the League for Innovation in the Community College. Jerry Moskus, chair of the League's Board of Directors, said, "Few, if any people have worked harder on behalf of community colleges than Terry O'Banion, and his retirement is certainly well deserved. But it will not be well received by those of us, and we are many, who depend on his leadership. Much of the success of community colleges, and certainly of the League for Innovation, is a result of his positive, professional and inspirational presence." The League has begun a national search for O'Banion's replacement.

COLLEGE COUNCIL REPORT

The second draft of the strategic plan is much more concise and organized than the first draft, College Council agreed at its March 16 meeting, but councilors still delivered a point-by-point review including questions and concerns. Most comments centered on language clarifications but some revealed divergent philosophical viewpoints. One concern, for example, was whether synthesizing the document into a manageable size diminished the importance of critical issues such as workforce training and diversity. It also was noted that many people are looking forward to a how-to, or tactical plan, to give work-a-day meaning to the more visionary strategic plan. President Jerry Moskus said he sees the strategic plan leading to how-to plans at the department level. Another observation was that participation in initiatives like this is hampered by inconsistent department meeting schedules. Several councilors supported a suggestion to evaluate the strategic plan feedback process so lessons learned can be applied to the next project. The planning team will address this second round of feedback, but what happens next was not mentioned.

In other business, council reviewed the Board of Education draft agenda for April 13. They also learned that the board has discussed how to orient new board members and is continuing to work out how "monitoring" will function under policy governance. Monitoring is the periodic review of compliance with board policies. Monitoring serves in part to evaluate the president. The board may ask council to play a role in the monitoring process.

Finally, council heard an old refrain that Lane still needs a better internal information flow, that staff need to be able to ask questions and get answers. Tracy Simms said she is meeting with Institutional Advancement to discuss the issue.

Under O'Banion's leadership, the League grew from a small beginning to an internationally known organization. In 1998, the League was recognized by Change magazine as "the most dynamic organization in the community college world." Change also cited O'Banion as one of 11 national "idea champions" who set the agenda for higher education; he was the only community college leader on the list. The League board has appointed O'Banion as a senior league fellow and president emeritus. He will continue to speak, write and develop projects promoting the learning college. A national search for his replacement is underway.

OSPIRG SUIT DECIDED IN LANE'S FAVOR

A decision was reached Friday by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Portland that Lane may use student fees to fund its Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group chapter. Three students filed suit in 1995 challenging the use of mandatory student fees to fund OSPIRG. The district and appeals courts found OSPIRG to be "germane" to the purposes of "promoting extracurricular activities, teaching specific skills and instilling civic activism, and creating a forum for vigorous debate and free exchange of ideas." The courts also found the funding statute to be "content-neutral and aimed at expanding campus speech by funding programs 'advantageous to the cultural or physical development of students.'" The appeals court decision parallels one delivered in February regarding a similar OSPIRG suit against the University of Oregon. Disputes over the use of student fees are occurring nationwide. The U.S. Supreme Court recently agreed to hear a case involving the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

APRIL PROCLAIMED COMMUNITY COLLEGE MONTH

Governor John Kitzhaber has signed a proclamation designating April as Community College Month in Oregon, in keeping with a national annual recognition of community colleges. The proclamation highlights community college offerings including professional technical education, academic transfer education, two-year degree programs, certificate programs for employment, adult basic skills education, and continuing and community education, for more than 350,000 Oregonians. Nearly two-thirds of all students in public higher education in Oregon are served by community colleges. The proclamation encourages all citizens to recognize the value and opportunities available to them through Oregon community colleges.

As part of Community College Month, Gov. Kitzhaber will present awards to selected scholars from the state's colleges at a ceremony on Friday, April 23, at 11:30 a.m. in the governor's ceremonial office at the capitol in Salem. Afterwards, the students will be honored at a luncheon with community college presidents and board members. Lane's scholars will be introduced in tomorrow's Daily.
