KITZHABER TO PRESENT AWARDS TO LANE SCHOLARS

Two Lane Community College students are among 35 scholars from each of Oregon's 17 community colleges to receive the 1999 Outstanding Student Scholar Awards. Robert Darrah and Sile Schaan, both of Eugene, will attend a ceremony with Gov. John Kitzhaber on Friday, April 23, at 11:30 a.m. in the governor's ceremonial office at the capitol in Salem. The students then will be honored at a luncheon with community college presidents and board members.

"These students are shining examples of the outstanding talent that exists in Oregon's 17 community colleges," Kitzhaber said. "We honor them for their hard work and determination to better themselves, their families and our communities."

Schaan is studying nursing. "Returning to college was the hardest decision for my family and I to make," says the 31-year-old honor student. "I am grateful that the college I came back to was Lane Community College. Everyone, from the instructors to the counselors to my peers, has been phenomenally supportive. Being a nontraditional student was difficult at first, but getting involved in campus and academic activities has made the transition easier. This was the best decision I ever made." She plans to transfer to Oregon Health Sciences University.

Darrah, 20, is a classics major with plans to transfer to the University of Oregon. "My achievements haven't come with ease," he says, "but through many struggles and conquests. I thank God for those difficulties which enabled me to strive for success ... I need to thank my family and friends who continue to help me achieve my goals and aspirations, especially my parents."

Schaan and Darrah are active in Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society for two-year colleges. The Student Scholar Awards are sponsored by the Oregon Community College Association in observance of April as Community College Month. The scholars have \$1,000 transfer scholarships made available to them from more than 20 of Oregon's private and public colleges and universities.

MEET MIKE MAYER

TELECONFERENCE WILL ADDRESS Y2K

A live satellite videoconference, "Common Sense, Common Ground: Preparing for Y2K," will be broadcast on Thursday, April 8, from 9 a.m.-noon in Forum 309. The public is invited to attend. Registration is at the door. A donation of \$10 will be requested but not required.

Futurist Robert Theobald, author of "Reworking Success: New Communities at the Millennium," will discuss community preparedness with Cynthia Beal, an Oregon grocer and international advocate for preparedness and sustainability practices. The aim is to empower viewers with common sense, practical steps people can take to prepare for possible Y2K disruptions or any garden-variety emergency, and to inspire communities to create higher levels of sustainability and resilience. Topics to be covered will include securing life essentials such as water, food, medicines, and developing local contingency plans for basic services, utilities and currency.

The teleconference is the second in a three-part series sponsored by Washington State University in Pullman, Washington, and Northwest Regional Facilitators, a Spokane, Washington, nonprofit community organizing agency. The first videoconference, broadcast in January to 100 communities across the United States, Canada and Mexico, featured a discussion of shifting global dynamics and new forms of leadership for the new millennium between Robert Theobald and Margaret Wheatley, author of "Leadership and the New Science." The third and final satellite program in the series will be broadcast on May 27 and will provide information on ways people and communities are approaching the full spectrum of issues relating to resiliency including personal, family, community, and ecology. Time and place will be announced.

ADULT BASIC SKILLS NOMINATED FOR NATIONAL AWARD

The Adult Basic and Secondary Education program is a finalist for the 1998-99 Secretary's Award for Outstanding Adult Education and Literacy Programs. The winner will be announced later this spring by the U.S. Department of Education, Division of Adult Education and Literacy. Lane is one of 18 finalists.

ABSE department head Leslie Rasor says Lane's nomination was based on some of the following criteria: outstanding programs for family literacy, workplace literacy, corrections, and out-of-school youth; an effective and innovative systems approach to student learning; an infrastructure of student services, disability services, and assistance in transitioning to work or college; an emphasis on student outcomes; program performance accountability; program design which meets Oregon's employment and self-sufficiency initiatives; and other factors.

ABSE offers a variety of college-based adult education programs at 21 locations around the county, including corrections facilities. The programs serve specific populations. For example, adults and out-of-school youth can earn an Adult High School diploma or a GED certificate and develop the skills to get a job or enroll in college. They may select the program which best suits their needs, such as GED to Work, GED to College, GED Family Literacy, GED Court School, Adult High School classroom or guided learning options, Workplace Skills Upgrading, or Adults With Special Needs, among others.

One of the most innovative programs is GED Court School. Its purpose is to provide a positive educational experience for youth who left school due to crime, expulsion or delinquent behaviors. Court School combines academic activities with community service, school-to-work opportunities, and social skill-building classes such as anger management. It is a partnership of Lane Community College, Lane County Department of Youth Services, Oregon Youth Authority, and Eugene/Springfield school districts.

BOARD OF EDUCATION AGENDA

The Board of Education meets Wednesday, April 14, at 7:30 p.m. in the Boardroom. Two ASLCC ballot measures are up for approval. One increases the student activity fee by \$1.62 for the Child Care Co-op whose budget has stayed constant for eight years while payroll costs have risen. The second measure rededicates \$2.25 of the activity student fee to OSPIRG.

Y2K AT LANE: STAFF COMPUTERS TO GET STICKERED

Computer Services checked most staff IBM-compatible computers about a year ago for Y2K compliance but has since obtained better diagnostic software and is doing another sweep (see story below). The sweep will not include Macintosh computers, which by design have always been year 2000 compatible. After your IBM-compatible is checked, it will get a green, red or yellow sticker, or a turkey sticker. Green means your software and hardware are compliant. Red indicates the mother board is non-compliant but a BIOS patch is loaded. Yellow means your software is okay, but you have to set the computer date manually after New Year's Eve 1999. The turkey means your computer is non-compliant or that you have declined to have patches installed. Departments must fund their own hardware or software purchases necessary to become compliant. LCC vendors have a contract clause requiring them to deliver compliant products, so it pays to purchase college-supported products. The computer sweep should be completed by fall term. Departments need to provide Computer Services with information as noted in the story below.

MARK HARRIS AWARDED OSU THURGOOD MARSHALL FELLOWSHIP

Y2K AT LANE: KLCC ALWAYS PREPARING

As a member of the news media, KLCC is keenly aware of its responsibility to the listening public. Preparedness is an ongoing activity. "We've always had to be open when the rest of the college was closed," says station manager Steve Barton, referring to snow closures and other events which have caused campus closures. Y2K will be no different.

The station has a battery-powered uninterruptible power supply to keep essential equipment functioning in the event of a power loss, and the equipment itself is Y2K compliant. The uninterruptible power supply is backed up by a generator. Since the generator is powered by natural gas, Barton is exploring the possibility of installing a propane tank. A 500-gallon tank would keep the station going for several days. Most transmitters already have emergency generators with automatic kick-on features. KLCC may install additional generators where needed. "As long as we can fuel the generators," says Barton, "We'll be on the air."

For mobile news coverage, the station has remote pick-up transmitters which can operate off car batteries. Even the staff and volunteers will be powered by a back-up cache of drinking water and durable foods.

Barton coordinated a recent Eugene City Club presentation on Y2K. His feeling is that the community may see some glitches but significant problems are unlikely. Whatever happens, KLCC will broadcast the news as long as it can. Keep your (battery-powered transistor) radio tuned in.

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FLORENCE DIRECTOR NAMED

A career community educator will return to Lane County to serve as the next director of Lane Community College at Florence, pending Board of Education approval on May 12. If approved, Robert Purscelley will begin work effective July 1.

Purscelley has directed community education at Oregon City School District in partnership with Clackamas Community College since 1977. He helped initiate the program. It now offers more than 100 classes per term to 6,000 students and has won national recognition. Purscelley also serves on the OCSD Senior Citizen Advisory Committee. He was named Oregon's Community Educator of the year in 1988. From 1973-76 he was community education coordinator for Willamalane Park District in Springfield.

"Robert will bring valuable experience and vision to the center," said Vice President for Instruction Larry Warford when making the announcement. "He'll find the Florence campus in good shape, thanks to the excellent interim leadership of Debra Lamb, who has worked hard for the Florence community and the college over the last several months."

Lane launched a national search for a permanent director in July after the previous director left for personal reasons. Purscelley was selected from a field of 60 applicants by a search committee including four longtime members of the Florence community and three college staff. Purscelley earned a master of science degree in community education from the University of Oregon in 1978, where he also earned a bachelor of science in recreation and park management in 1973. He graduated with an associate of arts degree in general studies from Lane in 1971 and he is an alumnus of Thurston High School in Springfield.

FACULTY COUNCIL AGENDA

Faculty Council meets today from 3-4:30 p.m. in the Boardroom. The agenda will focus on the rationale for Lane's general education requirements. For accreditation, Lane will need to produce a written rationale of general education requirements (writing/communications, math, human relations, arts and letters, science/math/ computer science, social science) which currently appear only as a list of ways (courses) students can take to fulfill the requirements. Mary Brau is facilitating faculty involvement in the creation of a rationale document. All faculty are invited and encouraged to participate in this important discussion. BOARD REPORT

The Board of Education approved two measures for the May student ballot at its April 14 meeting. One measure continues support of OSPIRG through the student activity fee. The other adds \$1.62 to the fee for the ASLCC child-care co-op. The student activity fee is charged to main campus credit students. Board member Larry Romine questioned how fair the fee was for part-time students.

The board held first readings of revisions to policies on Financial Condition and Activities, Chairperson's Role, Global Board-President Relationship, and Monitoring the President's Performance. Revisions to policies on Board Member's Code of Conduct and Agenda Planning were approved 7-0.

In other business, the board approved the appointments of Fay D'Ambrosia as temporary instructor in English, Foreign Language and Speech, and Al Hill as temporary instructor in Mechanical Technologies. The board reviewed the third quarter financial report and a benchmark report on changes in employee headcount. Formal acceptance of the board election results was tabled due to incomplete precinct reports.

President Jerry Moskus reported that KLCC will seek board approval to conduct fundraising for a new facility. He also noted that Lane is considering a request from Pacific University to hold elementary education classes at Lane, and he announced Symantec has donated over \$100,000 worth of anti-virus and utilities software to Lane.

Moskus and the vice presidents also reported several program kudos. The American Association of Community Colleges recognized Students First! as an exemplary program for the northwest; the National Council of Instructional Assistants recognized the Strategic Learning Initiative as an exemplary program (NCIA earlier commended the Community Learning Centers project as exemplary); and the American Association of Medical Assistants recently accredited Lane's medical office assistant program.

The meeting included a thorough bond construction update (see separate story).

BOND CONSTRUCTION UPDATE INCLUDES DRAWINGS, CONCERNS

The Board of Education received a main campus bond construction update at its April 14 meeting. Inflationary construction costs are not costing the college money, as some had worried. An analysis of market data showed that over the last four years, construction costs rose an average of 1.72 percent while Lane earned an average 5.43 percent in interest. Under arbitrage rules, certain interest earnings will go to the federal government, currently about \$736,000. However, another \$7.5 million in earnings may be spent on construction.

Staff morale was another concern. A recent survey of randomly selected user group members showed generally positive responses but also dissatisfaction. The architects said long hours with the user groups trying to fit needs to budget has been frustrating for those involved and confusing for those waiting for something to happen, but the architects feel that the outcome will be the best facilities possible for the budget. They also explained that the remodeling/new construction project mix created a domino effect which prolonged planning as one change affected another, and which determined the construction schedule, disappointing those at the end of the line. Improved staff communications would help, several argued, including more coverage in The Daily, better use of the bond construction web site, and more efforts to distribute visual information. "Part of this is a 'we'll believe when we see it' problem," said LCCEA president Margaret Bayless.

Nonetheless, construction is imminent. Welding will lead off 13 projects in June with a new building east of Campus Services where parking now exists. A child-care /education complex will follow in July on the west side of campus. Parking will be added nearby. A Campus Services addition also will begin in July. Student services, workforce training, and science/math projects should begin in December, then health technology and Performing Arts projects in March 2000. The Center basement remodel should begin in August 2000, followed by a Math and Art remodel for ABSE in October and the Center second-floor remodel in December. The Center fourth-floor remodel should begin in February 2001. The bond web site is at <http://lanecc.edu/campsvcs/bond/main.html>.

She has co-authored books with fitness guru Covert Bailey. In this training she will introduce 10 guidelines that address the metabolic, psychological and physiological issues to nutrition, exercise and weight management in a way that will "turn you on to health!"
