In order to offer you a greater choice of vehicle types and costs for the accomplishment of college business, we have developed four sources for renting vehicles. You may now choose vehicles from the State Motor Pool, the Lane County Motor Pool, the Lane Community College Motor Pool or Enterprise Rent-a-Car Company. BOARD POLICIES AVAILABLE TO ANYONE WITH WEB ACCESS

Board of Education policies are available for review on the web. For example, Policy Number A.020 addresses the Treatment of Learners/Consumers. It says, "With respect to interactions with learners/consumers, the president shall not cause, or allow to exist, procedures or decisions that are unsafe, undignified, or unnecessarily intrusive, or that fail to provide appropriate confidentiality or privacy. Accordingly, the president shall not:

1. Use application forms that elicit information for which there is no clear necessity.
2. Use methods of collecting, reviewing, transmitting, or storing client information that fail to protect against improper access to the information.
3. Maintain facilities that fail to provide a reasonable level of privacy, both visual and aural.
4. Fail to establish with learners/consumers a clear understanding of what may be expected and what may not be expected from the service offered.

5. Fail to inform learners/consumers of this policy, or to provide a grievance process to those who believe they have not been accorded a reasonable interpretation of their rights under this policy. ADOPTED: November 9, 1998."

Vice President for Instruction and Student Services Mary Spilde delivered a 21-page report at the May 12 Board of Education meeting reviewing how well the college has done in meeting this policy. THE MAY 12 BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING OPENED with a brief statement by Vice Chair Kathleen Shelley that the president's annual evaluation had been

AN ASSOCIATE VICE PRESIDENT OF INFORMATION SERVICES position will be created to handle the college's technology infrastructure, the president announced. It may take a year to develop the position and fill it with a national search. The associate VP would report to the College Operations vice president. In related business, an interim director of Computer Services will be appointed following Nick Cheshire's retirement.

THE ONLINE PROCEDURES MANUAL was demonstrated by Thwing Havens of Computer Services, member of the project team. The fully online manual features a dedicated search engine and links to related sites such as Oregon statutes. The web address is <http://lanecc.edu/cops/index.htm>.

KLCC's CAPITAL CAMPAIGN to build a new facility on main campus received a 6-0 vote of support, despite member Larry Romine's challenge as to whether the station should be supported since it does not generate FTE and since college funding is driven by FTE.

IN OTHER BUSINESS the board awarded the Welding Building bond construction contract to Dorman Construction of Eugene for \$1.4 million; accepted ASLCC election results; approved amendments to board policies on financial condition and activities, the chairperson's role, the global board-president relationship, and monitoring the president's performance; and hired Bob Mention as bond construction manager, and Robert Purscelley as Florence director. All votes were 6-0. The next meeting is June 9.

BOARD OF EDUCATION WORK SESSION REPORT

The Board of Education held a work session on May 12 to discuss bond construction and the strategic plan. Members-elect participated as well as current board members.

THE BOND PROJECT IS AT A CRUCIAL POINT with outreach activity substantially advanced and main campus construction imminent, said President Jerry Moskus. The goal is to construct the best possible buildings with a minimum of disruption to instruction. Success requires an institutional focus, not a departmental one. To that end, Moskus announced some changes: the incoming bond project manager will report to the president; a group called Instructional Neighborhood Watch will monitor disruption; the project management team will be expanded, probably to include a faculty representative; and the board will be more closely involved in planning. Moskus also called for increased communications including monthly bond reports at board meetings; weekly bond reports in The Daily; more frequent updates on the bond web pages; Project User Group membership feedback to constituents; and more one-on-one conversation around campus. His proposals were well received.

THE WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER PROJECT raised questions in the meantime. Board member Larry Romine and members-elect Robert Ackerman, George Alvergue and Mike Rose said their constituents questioned building another auditorium when more classrooms were expected. Members James Britt and Michael Dubick warned that the past four year's work of the user groups should not be discounted. Britt said it was important to consider whether people were not heard, or were heard but their issue was not adopted, noting that in a democracy, compromise is unavoidable. Changes that would further delay construction also raised concerns. "There's a time when you've got to end the discussion and move forward," said Britt. However, it was agreed that new board members need an orientation to the history and process of the project. Members were asked to submit questions and suggestions in advance.

THE STRATEGIC PLAN was distributed. Romine and Alvergue argued that it was a top-down document built on insufficient staff and student participation. Alvergue also said the plan did not acknowledge that many of the stated goals were already in place. Strategic planning team members present at the work session recounted a broad outreach effort since 1997 including the fall 1998 all-staff in-service session, two College Council campaigns for constituent feedback, numerous web site and Daily updates, and more. Ackerman called for a timeline and Alvergue asked for tangible results. When asked what happens now, Moskus said staff should use the plan to develop implementation at the department level.
