# IN CASE OF EMERGENCY . . .

The staff in Student Health would like to share with everyone the guidelines to follow if you have a medical emergency situation in your area. Call Student Health at Ext. 6666. This is a separate phone that rings only in case of emergency. Tell the person answering the phone at Student Health as much information as possible, i.e., who is hurt, what the problem is, how it happened, and the location of the patient. "A person is down" is a pretty vague description of the situation and could be a number of things. If cardiac arrest is suspected, the nurses will bring the defibrillator. If a person has sprained their ankle, they'll bring ice packs and a wheelchair. It may be difficult to assess the situation--especially because many times the person who calls Student Health has gotten the information third hand themselves--but the more information you can give, the better.

It would also be a good idea to have someone in the department meet the nurse to show her where the emergency is. Time is of the essence in every emergency. If you have any questions or need clarification, please call Donna in Student Health at Ext. 2668. Thank you for helping us help those in need of medical attention.

### IMPROVEMENTS MADE TO EVENTS AND MEETINGS CALENDAR

In an effort to make Lane's Events and Meetings Calendar more responsive, event descriptions will now not exceed more than four lines of information. The decision was made to curtail descriptions after staff had raised concerns about the slow speed of downloading larger calendar files. After researching the problem and other institutional calendars, it was thought that shorter event descriptions would help in making files less bulky and improve speed of downloading. To accomplish this, a limit of 350 characters was programmed into the event description field. In addition to this change, the new banner graphic created for web pages has been added.

## AAWCC OFFERS LEADERSHIP AWARD TO WOMEN STUDENTS

The LCC Chapter of the American Association of Women in Community Colleges is soliciting applications from eligible women students for its third annual leadership award designed to "assist and encourage women students at Lane to become leaders, giving voice to women who might otherwise not be heard." A one-year \$1,500 scholarship will be paid in three equal disbursements in the 1999-2000 academic year. Payment is contingent upon enrollment status of at least half-time and satisfactory academic progress (3.0 GPA). The award also will pay the applicable costs of the recipient attending an appropriate leadership or professional conference in Oregon, up to \$500. #### GUIDED STUDIES PROGRAM WINS INNOVATION OF THE YEAR AWARD

The Guided Studies Program has won the 1999 Innovation of the Year Award at Lane Community College. Program developers include Mason Davis, Linda DeWitt, Phyllis Geyer, Edna Grass, Gail Hemsoth, Dan Hodges, Pat John, Cheryl Kempner, Ellen Lacey, Carolyn Litty, Carol Lynn Morse, Leigh Alice Petty, Elaine Pray, Leslie Rasor, Alice Whitenack, Tom Wiedeman, John Winquist, and Linda Wong.

The Guided Studies Program is designed for students whose reading placement test scores indicate the need to strengthen academic skills before entering college-level courses. Guided Studies students are required to take appropriate preparatory courses and are restricted from other college-level courses their first term. Their program of studies is tailored according to their educational needs and goals. The program

- \* improves success for at-risk students
- \* contributes to a lowered default rate on Financial Aid
- \* streamlines placement testing and referral procedures for students who score low on reading and writing placement tests
- \* provides successful interventions for at-risk students who have reading and writing skills below college level

The program involves collaboration of multiple units of the college including Counseling, Testing, Advising, Study Skills, Adult Basic & Secondary Education, Financial Aid, as well as the support of academic and technical departments. The addition of a College Success component to the program enables students to expand their focus beyond academic factors to include time management, stress reduction, learning styles, goal planning, decision making, and self management. Student evaluations and staff discussions are used for continuous improvement and overall program evaluation.

The Guided Studies Program was conceived in 1995-96, and a 1998-99 follow-up study showed a positive correlation between guided study participation and course completion and improved grades. It is a proven vehicle for assisting students in successfully pursuing their goals.

The award is presented annually at League for Innovation colleges.

# BOND UPDATE: WELDING, ELMIRA, FLORENCE NEWS

The welding technology building broke ground on June 7, reported Bond Construction Project Manager Bob Mention at the June 9 Board of Education meeting. The \$1.4 million, 19,000-square-feet facility is the first major bond construction project on main campus. It will house fabrication and jewelry programs and will be completed in December. Parking spaces lost to the project will be added back in a paving project on the west side of main campus later this summer. The floor plan for the welding facility can be viewed on the web at http://lanecc.edu/campsvcs/bond/dwgs/welding.htm .

Also this summer, work will begin on the child care complex, the parking lot improvements, and site preparation for the science building addition. A logging road at the south perimeter of campus will be reserved for construction traffic to improve safety in regular parking lots and driveways.

The learning center planned at Elmira High School was bid over budget, President Jerry Moskus reported at the board meeting. The center bid was combined with the school district's own construction bid and there might be misplaced specifications; however, if the construction cost does exceed budget, the center will not be built.

The Florence center bond-funded addition is nearly complete, the president also reported. Separate physical plant improvements have been made.

#### BOARD REPORT

LANE COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON have different strengths which minimize competition between the two institutions, said UO President Dave Frohnmayer in the latest strategic conversation held by the Board of Education at its June 9 meeting. Frohnmayer said Lane is unparalleled in its ability to respond quickly to emerging training needs, as demonstrated with Symantec, Sony and Hyundai, while the university offers research and long-term resources to the community. However, he agreed that state funding practices pit K-12, higher education and community colleges against one another, and he suggested that UO/LCC competition in the continuing education arena is healthy. When asked about collaboration, Frohnmayer and his associates suggested enhancing transfer, dovetailing lower and upper-division offerings in math and pre-engineering, exploiting the local distance learning infrastructure, and lobbying for changes in state funding methods.

OUTGOING BOARD MEMBERS James W. Britt III, Michael Dubick and Jim Pitney, were honored. Adam Young, absent, also was acknowledged. Pitney said, "This has been a great thing in my life ... I am proud to know all of you."

THE 1999-2000 BUDGET passed 6-0. The general fund is \$67.5 million and represents a 6.1 percent increase over the current year budget and includes no program cuts or lay-offs.

THE TREATMENT OF STAFF MONITORING REPORT was delivered by Executive Assistant to the President Linda Waddell. The report acknowledged a need for grievance procedures not covered by employee contracts and for clearer policies for volunteers. Debate centered on whether Lane has achieved a participatory environment. Dennis Gilbert, sitting in for faculty union president Margaret Bayless, said Lane has not achieved shared governance, and he detailed two personnel grievances to demonstrate his point. Board member James Britt asked whether the grievances indicate that an uncollaborative

environment exitsts. Gilbert said he believed so. The vice presidents opposed that premise and said most management supports and tries to create a participatory environment. Classified union president Alen Bahret said lack of release time from frontline positions continues to pose a barrier to participation for support staff. Board Chair Roger Hall concluded that the monitoring report showed opportunity to participate, but the next one should show response and perception as well.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board approved: Management Employees Working Conditions for 1999/2000; fund appropriations for 1998/99; budget transfers for 1998/99; the president's annual authorizations for 1999/2000; and 13 personnel appointments; all with 6-0 votes.

# BOARD OF EDUCATION TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING

The Board of Education will conduct a special meeting on Wednesday, June 30, at 2 p.m., in the Boardroom. The agenda includes bid awards for construction of the child care building, parking lot improvements, science addition site preparation, and a price agreement for building electrical components. The next meeting will be a week later than usual on Wednesday, July 21, in the Boardroom.

# BOND UPDATE

AWARDING OF BIDS. The Bond Project Management Team accepted bids last week for three main campus projects. The recommended bids awards are up for approval at a Board of Education meeting on June 30. Recommended are Delta Construction Company for the parking lot improvement project with a base bid of \$284,825 and total alternate bids of \$121,450; John Hyland Construction for construction of the child care center project with a base bid of \$1,774,729 and total alternate bids of \$121,647; Gary Burnett Earthmoving for site preparation for the science/math project with a base bid of \$97,890 and a unit price for rock removal of \$56.97. Delta and Hyland bids were within budget. As a component part of the total science/math bid, the site preparation did not have a specific dollar figure assigned to it. However, by having the site preparation portion of the project bid separately and prior to the main science/math project, considerable expense was saved. Excavation work undertaken during summer months when weather conditions are more apt to be optimal results in overall lower costs. Construction of the science/math project is scheduled to begin December 1999.

DEVELOPMENT OF SOUTH ACCESS ROAD. Eldon Schafer drive will be the main construction route used during bond construction. Within the next two weeks, Delta Sand and Gravel will begin development of the access road beyond the south parking lot. The access road will allow construction traffic to pass to the west side of campus with the least amount of campus disruption. Signs are being developed to notify drivers on Eldon Schafer Drive and Gonyea Road to the presence of construction trucks and equipment.

PARKING SPACE. Main campus will see an overall increase in parking spaces by fall 1999. More efficient use of space in the west parking lot will result when the two existing gravel lots are paved and lined. Additional new parking will be developed adjacent to the new Early Childhood Education building. Between the two sites, 10 disabled and 242 regular parking stalls will be provided.

THE BOND PROJECT MANAGEMENT TEAM will be available during summer hours to provide information and answer any questions that may arise. All communication received by the BPMT during summer months will be reviewed regularly by the team, the architects, and the Facilities Management Committee. # SPRINGFIELD STUDENT WINS \$2,000 JELD-WEN SCHOLARSHIP

# LANE ATHLETES TAKE LEAGUE HONORS

Lane finished 1998/99 with an significant number of distinctions in the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges, the league for Oregon and Washington.

The Lane men's baseball team won the NWAACC Southern Region championship and the NWAACC conference championship this spring. Coach Donny Harrell was named NWAACC Southern Region Coach of the Year and NWAACC Coach of the Year.

Also this spring, the men's track and field team placed third in the NWAACC Southern Region and second in the NWAACC conference. The women's track and field team placed third in the conference. Both teams were coached by Grady O'Connor.

Earlier in the year, the men's basketball team won its second straight championship in the NWAACC Southern Region and placed second in the NWAACC championship conference. The team established four college records en route to its 29-3 season: best overall record, most wins in a single season, best field-goal shooting percentage, and longest winning streak (21 games). Coach Jim Boutin was named Coach of the Year for the NWAACC Southern Region and Coach of the Southern Region All-Star

Team. The women's basketball team finished fourth in the NWAACC Southern Region and won a play-off berth in the NWAACC conference, with coach Cheryl Duman.

Athletic Director Harland Yriarte was named Outstanding Athletic Administrator of the Year in the NWAACC.

And as if that weren't enough - 20 percent of the student athletes earned a GPA of 3.5 or better.
