REMINDER: PREPARE YOUR COMPUTER FOR SUNDAY'S POWER SHUT-DOWN

A power outage planned for Sunday, October 3, from about 7-11 a.m., will affect four buildings including Business, which houses the college mainframe and servers. Therefore, your computer and printer hardware may have problems if left on when data and electrical signals are cut. This includes main campus and at outreach center computers. To protect your equipment, Computer Services requests that before you leave for the weekend:

1. Turn off your computer, monitor, local printer, fax and/or other local device(s).

2. Turn off any network printers. For this one time, ignore any note that says the printer is not to be turned off.

3. Locate the XCD box on the back of the network printer and make a note or drawing of the two cables going into it so you can remember how to reconnect the cables. REMEMBER, the power cable has a cylindrical end and the data cable looks like a phone jack.

4. Disconnect both of the cables from the XCD box.

5. Check all equipment BEFORE October 1 to make sure you know where to find power switches on equipment, XCD boxes and cables, etc. If you have problems, call the help desk at Ext. 4155 for assistance.

The outage also will cut power to Administration, Apprenticeship, and Industrial Technology buildings. The outage will allow campus electricians to energize a transformer to provide power to the new child care buildings under construction on main campus, west side.

BOND UPDATE

PARKING LOT improvements on the west side of campus await landscaping and lighting. The contractor has experienced a delay in obtaining a template for the light pole concrete bases, but has been instructed to provide temporary lighting fixtures, if necessary, by mid-October

CHILD CARE buildings 1 and 2 now have foundations. The contractor plans to finish these two buildings ahead of the others. Walls are being fabricated off-site to reduce on-site materials storage and to expedite construction. The prefabricated walls will go up in just one to two days. In other work, the contractor is planning to inject water into the trenches which contain the innovative ground-loop system which will be used in heating the buildings. The trenches currently have loose fill and saturation is needed to compact the soil for sidewalk and play area construction. This work should occur within the next couple of weeks.

SCIENCE/MATH addition site work is complete. The call for construction bids will be advertised October 10 and bids will be opened November 9. Bond management hopes to schedule user+s group and Facilities Management Committee meetings to review the bids on November 10 for a possible contract award recommendation to the Board of Education that night.

WELDING has a high profile with erection of the red steel superstructure, including roof trusses. This week, additional metal framing will be added to exterior walls and some site clean-up and back-filling is expected. The contractor wants to secure a dry building as soon as possible before beginning interior work.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION work raced along last week. The contractor set up a job shack and conducted demolition and excavation work. About 250 yards more rock than anticipated has to be removed. Last week, crews also uncovered a conduit supplying power to the northeast parking lot lights. The conduit will have to be rerouted. Preparation for entrance into the existing building began last week, well ahead of schedule, and resulting in some earlier-than-expected moving of materials for Purchasing and the Warehouse.

CIT STUDENT HONORED BY MICROSOFT, LEAGUE FOR INNOVATION

Kelly Gibson of Springfield, a 31-year-old computer information technology student who is a father of two and a former logger, has been named a 1999 Microsoft Technology Champion. Microsoft established the awards last fall to honor the League for Innovation in the Community College on its 30th anniversary and to help students pursue information technology careers. Faculty at league member institutions, including Lane, nominate a student who demonstrates excellent academic motivation and generosity in sharing their learning with others. Gibson's instructors said he is "truly one of the exceptional students who comes along only once in a great while." They said he excels at computing whether it's science, theory or applied applications, and has a creative gift. Fellow students ranging in age from 10 years younger to 20 years older than Gibson said he is an outstanding tutor. Faculty surprised Gibson with the award on September 28 after his last class of the day. The award included a letter of commendation from Microsoft and a briefcase containing Microsoft software including Encarta Reference Suite, Office 2000 Premium, and Visual Studio Professional. Gibson and his wife are raising two daughters, ages 4 months and 7 years.

BOARD VICE CHAIR WINS NATIONAL CAREER AWARD

Larry Romine, vice chair of the Board of Education, will receive the D. Richard Petrizzo Career Service Award from the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations at its annual conference to be held March 19-22, 2000, in Portland, OR. NCMPR is an affiliate of the American Association of Community Colleges and presents the award in recognition of exemplary career achievement in community college marketing and public relations.

Romine began his community college career as Lane's first public relations director, hired in 1966. He won recognition for the college for the next 26 years until his retirement in 1992. During that time he was active in NCMPR and won its first Communicator of the Year Award in 1982 for outstanding public relations and management leadership. After retirement, he continued service to the community college by successfully running for election to the Board of Education in 1997. He is the board vice chair for 1999/2000.

Before his community college career, Romine was a reporter for The Register-Guard in Eugene, Oregon, The Columbian in Vancouver, and the Siuslaw News in Florence, Oregon. He taught journalism at Lane, and English and journalism at Clark College in Vancouver, WA. He was adjunct professor of public relations at the University of Oregon, where he earned a master's in journalism and a doctorate in educational policy and management.

Romine is the second Lane person to win the Petrizzo award. It was presented to Dale Parnell, Lane's founding president, in 1991. The award was established in 1990 in honor of D. Richard Petrizzo, former vice president for external affairs for the College of DuPage, IL.

BOND UPDATE

The following Bond Projects Status Report was presented at the Oct. 6 Board of Education meeting.

1. COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS

* Centers at Churchill, Oakridge, Thurston and Willamette have been completed.

* The center at McKenzie is 99% complete.

* Center at Harrisburg doesn't require new construction.

* The Junction City center contracts have been awarded and mobilization is underway. Estimated time of completion is spring 2000.

* Construction of the center at Elmira is approximately 30% complete. Substantial completion is planned for spring 2000.

2. FLORENCE CENTER ADDITION

* The new building is complete and in operation. The new boiler in the existing building is being installed. Covered roof between existing and new buildings has been approved and will be under construction shortly.

3. MAIN CAMPUS PROJECTS

* Welding Building: Construction started May 27. Building slab has been poured and 99% of metal building frame has been erected. Contractor is forming for exterior slabs. Contractor continues to think building will be completed by December 31 per original schedule.

* Contract for Parking Lot Improvements is approximately 99% complete. Lights and handrails need to be installed.

* Contract for Science Site Preparation has been completed.

* Child Care Center: Construction started in early July. Perimeter footings have been poured for the Office Building and Infants and Toddlers building. Concrete slabs for those buildings are scheduled to be poured tomorrow. Project is scheduled to be completed by March 2000.

* Excavation for the Campus Services Addition has started and rock was encountered as well as two electrical conduits. Project should be completed by end of April 2000.

* Math-Science Building is scheduled to go out for bid October 11, and bids will be opened November 9.

* Student Services Building is scheduled to go out for bids around mid-November. Bids would be opened mid December with construction start date of mid-January 2000.

* Workforce Training Building has been rescheduled to go out for bid April 1, 2000.

* Remodel of the Health Tech. Building is planned to go out for bids April 1, 2000 with a construction start date in mid-June.

4. WILDISH BUILDING AND COTTAGE GROVE CENTER have been completed and are operating.5. SEWAGE LAGOON UPGRADE

* DEQ has not issued it's final approval of the engineers proposal for improvements to the lagoon as incorrectly stated in last month's status report. Previous report should have said that DEO issued preliminary approval.

6. GENERAL COMMENTS

* Campus Services forces moved the Art Department kilns from the vard behind the Campus Services Building to one of the test cells for storage while another site is prepared for their permanent location.

* The President, Facilities Management Committee and Bond Management Team have recently reviewed and updated the bond project budget. The result confirms that there are sufficient funds to do the scheduled projects including normally accepted levels of change order contingencies.

* Construction has reached the point where the Bond Management Team is coordinating with Campus Facilities and Curriculum and Scheduling to work out procedures for the moves which various functions will have to make.

CHANGE OF STATUS OF DEPENDENT CHILDREN

Your dependent children should be deleted from medical, vision, and dental insurance coverage when they no longer qualify as dependents. A dependent child is defined as one who is unmarried, under age 25 or 23 (for Oregon Dental Service), residing with you or a full-time student, and reported as a dependent on your income tax statement. When a dependent loses eligibility status, they may be eligible to continue group insurance coverage by applying within 60 days of the qualifying event and paying the premiums for continuous coverage.

COLLEGE COUNCIL REPORT

COLLEGE COUNCIL advises the president and is Lane's most broadly representative group, President Jerry Moskus told council at its orientation on Oct. 5. Council also sometimes makes decisions by consensus and members gather and report feedback from constituents. It was debated what representation means, and how members are or should be recruited. The discussion will continue at the next meeting.

AN ORGANIZATIONAL RESTRUCTURING review has been directed by the Board of Education, Moskus said. He shared his response to date, including five assumptions upon which organization relies: that Lane exists to provide quality learning experiences in a caring community; that the needs of learners come first; that Lane must offer a comprehensive program; that the college should operate as a high-performance system, not a bureaucracy or political system; and that building a high-performance system takes time. Moskus also listed 10 organizational issues, such as business courses that are offered by as many as eight different departments and how confusing this can be to learners. He said he hopes that implementation of any options resolving the issues will include stakeholder consultation with and a timeline.

THE ACADEMIC CALENDAR FOR 2000/2001, as proposed by the vice presidents was presented. The proposal starts fall term on Sept. 25, the same day as K-12 schools and the University of Oregon and moves Lane toward a three-term, 11-week year. Another calendar is under discussion in faculty bargaining. A calendar must be approved by the board in November for counseling, advising and publication purposes.

THERE ARE NEW COLLEGE PROCEDURES governing the personal use of college equipment, including cell phones. Essentially, state law prohibits any use of public equipment that leads to personal benefit not available to private citizens. Cell phone use differs from regular telephone use because the college pays per-call cell phone charges. Council advised an all-staff paper memo announcing the procedures as well as using The Daily and the web. College procedures are posted online at http://lanecc.edu/cops/index.htm.

COUNCIL'S NEXT MEETING is Tuesday, Oct. 19. Meetings are open.

BOND UPDATE

GROVE PLANNED FOR MEMORIAL TREES. At the president's suggestion, a garden for memorial trees displaced by construction is being discussed by some bond, grounds and science staff. Their proposal has the memorial trees embracing a small wetlands which would be developed west of the Science/Math Building. Native plants found in swamps, wetland prairies, shorelines, and deep water would be used. The proposal includes a shallow pond with a boardwalk and a circulation system for clear water. One memorial tree which will be displaced by Student Services building construction is the Eldon Schafer ginko now located west of Business. The Facilities Management Committee will be asked for final approval of the memorial grove proposal.

SCIENCE OUT TO BID. Bids for construction of the Science/Math Building will be opened November 9, the day before the next Board of Education meeting. Bond management hopes to have user groups and the Facilities Management Committee review the bids on November 10 for a possible contract award recommendation to the board that night.

PUBLIC SAFETY ADVISORY

There is an item called a Skimmer that is made in Taiwan and is about the size of a beeper. When you use your credit card to pay a bill, the Skimmer can be put into action. On the way to the register or out

of your sight, someone can simply run your card with the magnetic strip through the Skimmer, which captures all of your card information, including name, address, telephone number, card number and credit limit. The Skimmer, which holds about 100 entries, can download information into any computer. Crooks can then use the blank cards and become a cardholder in minutes. The Skimmer also has an erase button on it, so if the crook is caught, he or she simply hits the button and all the information is gone, leaving no evidence on which to prosecute. In the past, skimming credit cards required at least a laptop computer and a card reader. Please be careful as we approach the holiday season, and always keep your card in sight when charging items. BOARD REPORT

AMENDED BUDGET DEVELOPMENT CRITERIA were approved 4-2 by the Board of Education at its Oct. 6 meeting. The amendment restored criterion supporting an increase in the proportion of full-time positions. Opposing the amendment were Roger Hall and Kathleen Shelley. The amendment was proposed by George Alvergue. The budget calendar is on the web at http://lanecc.edu/instadv/budget.htm .

STUDENT HOUSING contracts will be negotiated for apartments in Eugene following a 6-0 vote. In addition, interest earnings will be used to develop student housing in Springfield. The action followed five years of discussing how to use the Ashlane lawsuit settlement.

PERSONNEL APPOINTMENTS approved by 6-0 vote were Kathleen Caprario as interim instructor in Art and Applied Design; Carrie Fairchild as coordinator/instructor in Family and Health Careers; Wen Harris as interim instructor in Social Science; Allen Hill as interim instructor in Mechanical Technologies; Teresa Hughes as interim instructor in Media Arts and Technology; and David Mahoney as instructor and clinical education director in Family and Health Careers.

LANE'S REVISED MISSION STATEMENT was approved 6-0 based on recommendations from the Strategic Planning Team and the president. The new statement is: "Lane Community College is a learning-centered community college that provides accessible, affordable, high quality, lifelong education through a comprehensive program that includes vocational/career preparation and retraining; skill upgrading; lower division transfer programs; personal development and enrichment; and cultural and community services. Alvergue noted that programs are not listed in order of importance.

STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING plans were presented by bond architect Reid Anderson. The project will bid in early November with a target budget of \$3.9 million. It will be built west of Business where the Sept. 13 groundbreaking ceremony was held. THE RACISM FREE ZONE PROJECT was endorsed 6-0.

REPORTS to the board included a quarterly financial report; benchmarks on unduplicated student headcount; percent of FTE by reimbursement category; and percent of population served. An organizational structure report was postponed. THE BLACK AMERICAN STAFF/FACULTY EMPLOYEES (BASE) group engaged the board in a discussion of diversity at Lane during the work session held prior to the regular meeting. BASE employees recounted racist experiences suffered on campus and in the community. BASE called for the board to improve hiring practices, to participate in Platinum Rule Training, to support student/staff retention activities such as the Racism Free Zone program, and to continue this strategic dialogue. A STRATEGIC LEARNING INITIATIVE report also presented at the work session included presentations from faculty on innovations implemented under the initiative, such as learning communities and technology advances in the curriculum. BOND PROJECT UPDATE

superstructure of the Welding building. The equipment yard and parking lot are being paved. Power will be supplied to the building during the Thanksgiving holiday, necessitating a power shutdown for some buildings. The power shut-down will be announced in The Daily in advance.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Contractors have finished removing rock. Plumbing is being roughed in and crews are preparing to pour footings. An existing sewer line exposed by the site work will be rerouted. A temporary wall has been built inside the existing building to provide occupants some protection from addition construction activity.
