COMMUNITY PERCEPTION STUDY 1999 CONTINUED: LIKELIHOOD OF TAKING COURSES AT LANE

Fifty-seven (57) percent of those surveyed reported a likelihood of taking a class through Lane in the next three years; 27 percent reported that they would be "very likely" to do so, and 30 percent "somewhat likely" to do so. Those who reported that they would be "very" or "somewhat likely" to take a class through Lane in the next three years were asked if they would take a class at Lane for one of several possible reasons: The most popular reason for taking a class is "for personal interest, a hobby, or self-enrichment" (88 percent); followed by "to perform better in a present career or job" (54 percent); "to train for a new career" (45 percent); "to explore different kinds of jobs or careers" (36 percent); "to earn a two-year associate degree" (32 percent); "to earn college credit for a four-year degree" (32 percent); and "to complete high school or earn a GED" (6 percent). LANE TO CELEBRATE OPENING OF ELMIRA CENTER

Lane Community College will celebrate the opening of its new learning center at Elmira High School on Thursday, March 16 from 5-7 p.m., including a formal dedication at 6 p.m. There will be informational tables, demonstrations, mini-classes, entertainment and refreshments. The center is located at 24936 Fir Grove in Elmira.

Although Lane has offered classes in the area since 1966, the new 3,000-square-foot facility provides comprehensive access to college classes and services for residents of Elmira, Veneta, Noti and Crow. "This is a shared facility for Lane, the high school and the community," says college President Jerry Moskus. "Without the Fern Ridge school district's willingness to build on-site, this wouldn't have happened. The college can use the high school's classrooms and labs, and now they can use our facilities and technology, and the community can access the college."

The center offers a variety of credit and continuing education classes such as telecourses, online courses, and independent and guided learning studies as well as traditional classroom instruction.

Services include college admissions and registration. Internet and E-mail access is available for \$1 per hour or \$36 per term.

Facilities include a computer lab, a large classroom and a small conference room available to community groups. High school students will use the center during college off-hours, and the college will use high school rooms for some evening classes.

The center was built at the same time as a high school capital improvement project. The college and the school district realized significant savings by sharing infrastructure and architectural costs. Lane has opened similar centers at Thurston, Willamette, Oakridge, Churchill, and McKenzie high schools. Construction is underway at Junction City and a minicenter is open at Harrisburg. BOND NEWS: STUDENT SERVICES PROJECT WILL CLOSE DRIVEWAY AND SIDEWALK

The next major construction project on Lane's main campus is the Student Services Building. Construction will begin in late February or early March. Chambers Construction of Eugene was awarded the contract for \$3,748,270 at the Jan. 22 Board of Education meeting.

Construction will cause the closure of the west end of the old bus lane that goes from the Apprenticeship Building past the Electronics Annex modulars. The section of the drive to be closed is from the west entrance to the southwest corner of the Business Building. Vehicles which use the drive to reach the Center Building, Forum Building, or other buildings bordering the drive, will need to enter from the east, turn around, and exit the same way. Signage will be installed to regulate back-and-forth traffic on the one-lane road. The closure will take effect sometime in late February.

Pedestrians accessing campus from the west parking lot will need to use the main entrance walkway over the fountain pond, or the Health Tech Building ramps, or the Apprenticeship Building sidewalk. Construction will close the sidewalk, which parallels the south end of the fountain pond.

The new Student Services Building will be two stories with 37,450 square feet of offices, service areas and other rooms. It will house admissions, registration, student records, financial aid, payments, counseling, testing, career and employment services, tutoring, and veterans services. It also will be home to student government, student activities, disability services, substance abuse prevention, and multicultural and women's programs. Funding is provided by Lane's \$42.8 million construction bond.

COMMUNITY PERCEPTION STUDY 1999 CONTINUED: PREFERRED HOURS FOR CLASSES

Those respondents who said they would be "very" or "somewhat" likely to take a class at Lane in the next three years were asked if they would consider taking a class at Lane during various time slots. The responses indicate that the most popular time slot is weekday evenings (73 percent), followed by Saturday afternoons (57 percent), Saturday mornings (56 percent), weekday afternoons (44 percent), and weekday mornings (37 percent). Those who said they would be "very" or "somewhat" likely to take a class through Lane in the next three years were also asked which of three length formats they prefer. The most popular length of class was 12 three-hour sessions (68 percent), followed by 6 six-hour sessions (18 percent), and 36 one-hour sessions (8 percent). BOND NEWS: MAIN CAMPUS PROJECT UPDATE

SCIENCE/MATH. Science staff felt a shudder last Thursday when a cement truck backed under a protruding lateral concrete beam and got stuck. The truck was able to pull clear and the beam is being inspected for structural integrity. Facilities manager Mike Ruiz called it an informal seismic test. (Seismic upgrades are planned for this and other remodels.) This week's activities include some underslab braising by the plumbers, and plans are being made for asbestos removal. Asbestos is present in exterior transite board and in the mastic which holds ceiling tiles in place, both of which will be disturbed by construction.

CHILD CARE. Walls for Building 4 (ASLCC Child Care Co-op) should arrive this week. Building 3 (Preschool) has most roof trusses in place, Building 2 (Infant/Toddler program) has windows and doorframes installed, and Building 1 (Early Childhood Education and Lane Family Connections offices) has a nearly-complete roof, interior drywall, and exterior primer.

BOND UPDATE

COLLEGE TRADESPEOPLE continue to save the college money with their quality performance, initiative and creativity. Most recently, painters Steve Wickwire and Don Migliozzi obtained special training to apply fire-proofing paint in the Welding Technology Building, saving the college half of what it would cost to have the contractor do the work.

COMFORT LEVELS will be more pressed as construction shifts into higher gear with the Student Services Building and other projects. The bond office is working with Personnel and meeting with folks who will be closest to construction sites to identify and minimize health and comfort issues as much as possible.

WELDING BUILDING code problems have been resolved in principle, and an occupancy permit is expected soon. Lane tradespeople are installing some owner-supplied items in the meantime. Fireproofing painting should take about two weeks. Welding and jewelry programs should be operational in the new building by the start of spring term.

THE CHILD CARE complex continues to grow. Walls are up on Building 4, and roof trusses should arrive this week. Roof trusses are set on Building 3, and roofing is in progress on Building 2. Building 1 has a finished roof and exterior doors and windows; gypsum board has been installed indoors. Lane Family Connections is scheduled to be the first occupant. They will move in around the first of May.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION masonry is complete, glu-lam floor and roof beams have been set; floor joists and roof trusses are installed; and sheathing has been placed. Completion is set for late April.

SCIENCE/MATH BUILDING foundations are more than half poured. Some retaining walls will be poured soon. Some plumbing work is being done under the existing building. Plumbers are working from 5 to 8 a.m. to minimize disruption to classes. The project is now about five weeks behind schedule due to delays caused by the structural engineers.

A STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING pre-construction orientation meeting is set for Wednesday, Feb. 16. On-site construction mobilization is expected by early March.

THE WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER bid has been rescheduled to June.

THE HEALTH TECH remodel should bid in April, and construction should begin mid-June.

SEWAGE LAGOON UPGRADE discussions with engineers, college staff and the Oregon National Guard point to tertiary treatment as the minimum upgrade necessary. An outfall line to the coast fork of the Willamette is being considered. The college and ONG are discussing an interagency agreement to cover upgrade costs. ONG wants to use the lagoons for a facility it plans to build across 30th Avenue. The facility would include classrooms, a large hall, parking and other amenities which Lane could use. ONG is considering a skybridge, tunnel, or shuttle to cross 30th.

A NEW LTD BUS STATION is being designed. The current shelters are temporary. Construction of the permanent station is scheduled for this summer.

ELSEWHERE, the Junction City learning center has exterior walls, roof trusses and interior framing, and is a little ahead of schedule. The Elmira center will open March 16. A breezeway for the Florence Center addition should be constructed soon and completed in early April.

FMP BUILDS EQUIPMENT SHED, GRINDER SHELTER

FMP also is building a shelter for the Cookie Monster, the brand name of a comminutor, or sewage grinder, installed in a channel beside the sewage lagoons. The college recently replaced the old grinder with a new one. The shelter will extend equipment life and improve working conditions for maintenance crews. COLLEGE COUNCIL REPORT

The discussion that captivated College Council on Feb. 15 wasn't even on the agenda. It began with the topic of charters, or guidelines for work groups. The Board of Education has directed administration to draft language for a policy encouraging the use of charters. This led to a discussion of another board directive, for a decision appeals process. The prospect of an appeals process raised several questions, concerns and speculations. There was wide support for the point that if you had a good shared decision making process and good communications in the first place, you would rarely need an appeals process. Councilors explored current barriers to decision making and communications, such as increased workloads; multiple competing priorities; a cultural reluctance to refuse work; a cultural reluctance to confront decision makers; and the lack of accountability, technology, and others. For example, one person described the difficulty of balancing a production-intensive job with the time it takes to attend meetings or keep up with e-mails, which provide information necessary to making good decisions. Others recalled how the grade-change policy process was sidetracked, unavoidably, by Y2K preparations. No one arrived at any tangible solutions but felt that the discussion should be continued.

In other business, council approved the proposed wording of the policy on charters; advised the president on changing the language of Executive Limitations from negatives to positives; and reviewed an early draft of the March 8 board agenda. Council's next meeting is set for March 7.

BOARD REPORT

The proposal to build a longhouse received the most attention at the Feb. 9 Board of Education meeting. Several speakers from the audience advocated for the project. Native American Student Association coordinator Frank Merrill reviewed the project+s history since 1993. Although there is no bond funding for the project, bond manager and architect Bob Mention provided professional advice on what it would take to proceed. Long discussion wrapped up with a unanimously approved motion directing staff to do a site plan including cost estimates for building and maintaining the facility, and stating board approval of the project concept.

In other action, the board extended support for the bus pass program for one year, accompanied by a directive to staff to negotiate a better deal with LTD. The consent agenda was approved including accepting the retirement of Sharon Thomas from English effective June 30; and rejecting bids for new lathes and milling machines for Mechanical Technologies. The board supported the harassment policy on race/ethnicity or national origin, which will be completed and then communicated to the college community.

During monitoring report reviews, the board said administration was doing a great job of providing information and communications, but consensus was not reached on whether the board should have sole power to name a presidential successor in the event of emergency. Discussion will continue with a first reading of a draft policy in March.

Postponed to March were discussions on a resolution calling for affordable education, and a construction labor agreement.

BOND UPDATE: STUDENT SERVICES PROJECT WILL CLOSE DRIVEWAYS, SIDEWALK

The driveway in front of the west entrance fountain known as Dale Parnell Loop will be closed to vehicles when construction of the Student Services Building begins on Feb. 28. BOND PROJECT UPDATE

STUDENT SERVICES. Chambers Construction says it will set-up on Monday, Feb. 28, for the Student Services Building Project. This is when road and sidewalk closures will take effect. The driveway in front of the west entrance fountain known as Dale Parnell Loop will be closed to vehicles, which will be restricted to parking lot drive-through aisles. The south half of the loop will be enclosed by construction fencing but pedestrians will still have access to the main entrance sidewalk over the fountain pond, as well as Health Tech Building ramps and sidewalks. The sidewalk to the south side of the fountain pond will be closed. Also closed will be the west end of the old bus lane by Apprenticeship, from its west end to the southwest corner of the Business Building. Vehicles will still be able to access the Center Building, Forum Building, and other buildings along the lane, by entering and exiting from the east end.

CHILD CARE. Building 1 interior walls are being primed for texture. Building 2 interior mechanical equipment is being installed; roofing, siding and windows are installed; insulation is being installed. Building 3 plywood roof sheeting is being installed. Building 4 walls are set and roof trusses are being installed. Sidewalks for Buildings 1 through 3 are being set-up for pouring.

SCIENCE/MATH. Asbestos abatement work is planned for finals week. Exterior work will occur during the day but is expected to involve only hand tools, no power equipment. Interior work will be done from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. The material to be removed is non-friable and should cause no air quality disturbance. Asbestos materials must be removed before X-raying for seismic upgrading can be done. Similar asbestos abatement work will occur on all remodel projects. In other work, various footing, concrete pouring, and plumbing work continues. The project is still about five weeks behind schedule due to structural design work problems.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Power will be connected this Friday. The storage shed has received permit approval. Roofing is being installed and electrical, mechanical and plumbing work continues indoors. The project is on schedule with substantial completion expected in late April.

WELDING. Welding and jewelry programs are expected to conduct major moving during the term break, and to offer classes in the new building effective spring term. Fireproofing painting will begin next week and take about two weeks to complete. A "punchlist" walk-through by the college, contractor, architects and others, should occur this week.

BOND NEWS: A BID BELOW BUDGET DOESN'T MEAN MONEY'S LEFT OVER

When a construction bid comes in under the target budget, it doesn't necessarily mean there's money left over to reinstate building features originally cut to meet the target. Consider the recent bid for the Student Services Building, for example. The successful bid was \$3,748,270, and the board-approved "target" budget was \$3,944,842. It's tempting to assume there was \$196,572 left over, but there wasn't. The reasons why illustrate the complexity of funding major construction projects.

First of all, after the target of \$3,944,842 was established, \$210,420 was added to make sure the building met ADA requirements, and then another \$17,154 was added as an energy management incentive, bringing the total target to \$4,172,416. Prior to going out for construction bids, the bond project manager identified \$361,940 in labor and materials that could be performed, or purchased by the college. These "owner-supplied" items were therefore excluded from the contract document on which contractors bid. Since the owner-supplied items would be paid by the bond, the \$361,940 had to be subtracted from the total target, leaving \$3,810,476 as the conceptual target by which contract bidding would be gauged (whether the bids were "high" or "low" relative to the target). The successful low bid was \$3,748,270, only \$62,206 less than the conceptual target, and much less than the \$196,572 which appeared to be "left over," if you didn't know all the details. The \$62,206 is not available to add back features for three reasons. First, the money needs to be available to cover any unanticipated construction expenses during the project.

An example of such an expense on another project is the more-extensive-than-predicted rock removal for the Science Building site preparation. Second, the money needs to be available for any "change orders" that occur during construction. An example of a change order, again from another project, was when a parking lot had to be re-excavated to create a stronger base for parking at the Welding Building. Third, the Facilities Management Committee has adopted the position that when a project goes out to bid, it has been determined that the project meets the minimum requirements of the organization(s) and users involved. Minimum requirements cannot change for purposes of construction after a project bids. FMC decided that any money left after construction, unanticipated expenses, and

change orders, will be returned to the bond general contingency account. The FMC then allocates this fund as it deems appropriate. The Bond Project Management Team hopes this helps explain how bond funds are allocated, and why money isn't necessarily available to add back features when a bid comes in under the target budget.
