BOND NEWS: STUDENT SERVICES CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

The start up of Student Services Building construction began off-schedule on Tuesday due to apparent miscommunication between the general contractor, Chambers Construction, and a subcontractor. Chambers was to begin "staging" activities such as fencing on Monday, but was delayed. In the meantime, the earthmoving subcontractor began work on Tuesday. Chambers was on campus at the time for a preconstruction meeting. Bond project manager Bob Mention stressed the importance of communications and noted that the college requires advance notice of major construction activity. Chambers will erect a temporary fence first, followed by permanent fencing by the end of this week.

ADULT BASIC SKILLS PROGRAM RECEIVES NATIONAL AWARD

Lane's Adult Basic and Secondary Education program received from the U.S. Department of Education, Division of Adult Education and Literacy, the 1998-99 Secretary's Award for Outstanding Adult Education and Literacy Programs. Sharlene Walker, from the Department of Colleges and Workforce Development, presented ABSE with an award plaque on Feb. 22, 2000. Only 17 colleges in the U.S. have received this award, and just two or three colleges in the West.

ABSE department head Leslie Rasor says Lane's nomination was based on some of the following criteria: outstanding programs for family literacy, workplace literacy, corrections, and out-of-school youth; an effective and innovative systems approach to student learning; an infrastructure of student services, disability services, and assistance in transitioning to work or college; an emphasis on student outcomes; program performance accountability; program design which meets Oregon's employment and self-sufficiency initiatives; and other factors.

ABSE offers a variety of college-based adult education programs at 21 locations around the county, including corrections facilities. The programs serve specific populations. One of the most innovative programs is GED Court School. Its purpose is to provide a positive educational experience for youth who left school due to crime, expulsion or delinquent behaviors. Court School combines academic activities with community service, school-to-work opportunities, and social skill-building classes such as anger management. It is a partnership of Lane Community College, Lane County Department of Youth Services, Oregon Youth Authority, and Eugene/Springfield school districts. ABSE can be reached at Ext. 2214.

Distance Learning has scheduled a free teleconference called "Articulation of Two- and Four-Year Programs: Strategic Partnerships for the New Millennium," on Wednesday, March 15, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in CEN 12 (the northeast corner in the basement). LANE TO CELEBRATE OPENING OF ELMIRA CENTER

Lane Community College Learning Center at Elmira High School opened mid-winter term, and will celebrate its opening on Thursday, March 16 from 5 to 7 p.m., with the formal dedication at 6 p.m., at 24936 Fir Grove in Elmira. There will be informational tables, demonstrations, mini-classes, entertainment and refreshments. Although Lane has offered classes in the area since 1966, the new 3,000-square-foot facility provides comprehensive access to college classes and services for residents of Elmira, Veneta, Noti and Crow.

"This is a shared facility for Lane, the high school and the community," says college President Jerry Moskus. "Without the Fern Ridge school district's willingness to build on-site, this wouldn't have happened. The college can use the high school's classrooms and labs, and now they can use our facilities and technology, and the community can access the college."

The center offers a variety of credit and continuing education classes such as telecourses, online courses, and independent and guided learning studies as well as traditional classroom instruction.

Services include college admissions and registration. Internet and e-mail access are available for \$1 per hour or \$36 per term. Facilities include a computer lab, a large classroom and a small conference room

available to community groups. High school students will use the center during college off-hours, and the college will use high school rooms for some evening classes. The center was built at the same time as a high school capital improvement project. The college and the school district realized significant savings by sharing infrastructure and architectural costs. Lane has opened similar centers at Thurston, Willamette, Oakridge, Churchill and McKenzie high schools. Construction is underway at Junction City, and a minicenter is open at Harrisburg. BOND NEWS: STUDENT SERVICES PRECONSTRUCTION MEETING HELD

Before construction of a bond project, a preconstruction conference is held to explain college requirements to the general contractor, subcontractors, and others involved in a project, and review various details. The Student Services Building preconstruction conference was held Feb. 29. Attending for Lane were bond project manager Bob Mention and Student Services job project manager Lynn Atkins. Also present were architect Reid Anderson, representatives from Chambers Construction, and various engineers and subcontractors. Highlights from that meeting:

- · Safety is paramount and includes daily clean-up of the construction site and access routes.
- · Prevailing wages must be paid and contractors were asked to submit monthly reports.
- · The sidewalk by Apprenticeship will NOT be available to pedestrians as the contractor will need the old welding yard for staging.
- · There should be minimal, or no noise, during finals weeks.
- · There should be two day's notice before disruption of utilities.
- · There should be one week's notice of expected construction activities.
- · LCC will do the cabinetry on this project.
- · LCC will provide 15 telephone lines.
- · LCC staff and student visitors need written permission from the Bond Office to tour the project and should contact the Bond Office to arrange an escorted tour, for safety purposes.
- · Material Data Safety Sheets on construction products must be available and current.

Preconstruction meetings are usually held a week or two in advance of start-up; in this case, Chambers cancelled previously scheduled meetings. The delay may have been partly responsible for a miscommunication between the contractor and a sub who began earthmoving work on Tuesday before Chambers had installed security fencing.

PRESIDENT JERRY MOSKUS ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT

Dr. Jerry Moskus, president of Lane Community College since March 1990, announced his decision to retire effective June 2001, at last night's Board of Education meeting.

The advance notice provides the board adequate time to conduct a search for a successor, said Board of Education Chair Robert L. Ackerman. "Jerry Moskus will be remembered as one of the outstanding presidents of LCC," said Ackerman. "His educational leadership has gained LCC national recognition as one of the best community colleges in the nation. At its April 2000 meeting, the board will establish criteria for the position, a method for staff and student participation in the selection process, and a timetable to accomplish these tasks."

Highlights from Moskus' 10-year career at Lane include the following:

- * Won voter approval for an expanded tax base in November 1990.
- * Won voter approval for a \$42.8 million construction bond in May 1995 to fund major renovations and new construction on main campus, a new building in Cottage Grove, renovations in Florence, and learning centers at eight district high schools.
- * Defended funding for Lane under an annually-revised state equalization formula resulting from the 1990 property tax limitation measure, including one proposal to cut funding to Lane by \$8 million.
- * Helped attract three major high-tech employers to the community with implementation of a customized workforce training program, including Symantec Corporation to Eugene in 1993, Sony Disc Manufacturing to Springfield in 1994, and Hyundai Electronics America to Eugene in 1996.
- * Advanced diversity and affirmative action at the college including hiring the first affirmative action director in 17 years, updating the affirmative action plan, and implementing a diversity plan. He received awards from the African American Community Coalition and the Northwest Coalition Against Malicious Harassment for some of his efforts.
- * Increased the Foundation's net worth from \$1.2 million to \$5.2 million.
- * Launched a college presence on the Internet, and upgraded the college computer network system including collegewide e-mail.
- * Restructured the college to place an emphasis on learning and students.
- * Gained national recognition as a leader in the "learning college" movement, including a chapter in the book, "A Learning College for the 21st Century."
- * Implemented interest-based bargaining with faculty and classified employee unions.
- * Attracted national media coverage regarding the value of retraining in economic transition, including stories on the Macneil-Lehrer News Hour (January 1995), CBS Sunday Morning (October 1994), New York Times (October 1994); and The Washington Post (July 1993).
- * Held numerous local and national offices including chairing the League for Innovation in the Community College in 1999, and the American Association of Community Colleges Commission on Learning and Communications Technologies, 1999/2000.
- * Elected on a national ballot to the board of the American Association of Community Colleges.

Throughout his tenure, Moskus has received consistently positive performance reviews from the Board of Education. The board recently nominated Moskus for the American Community College Trustees Chief Executive Officer Award.

Before joining Lane, Moskus was vice president at Des Moines Area Community College in Ankeny, Iowa, and Lincoln Land Community College in Springfield, Illinois. He also held other administrative positions and taught English. He is widely published in academia. He was inducted into the Illinois State University College of Education Hall of Fame Inaugural Class.

Lane Community College serves more than 40,000 people a year and offers lower-division college transfer programs, more than 50 professional-technical degrees, and other programs and services. The college employs more than 1,000 people. The annual budget is \$69 million.

FROM THE GROUNDS UP: A REPORT FROM GROUNDSKEEPER FRANK DRENGACZ

I am sure people are wondering what I do all day. I would like to explain the seasonal schedule. Now that I feel comfortable with the general condition of the plant beds, I can establish a regular routine.

Each building will have four seasonal visits. By coincidence, these visits will coincide with the college calendar. Each visit will include the following work: weeding, of course; raking the beds; light pruning of hedges to maintain their shapes; and a general clean-up of dead or dying leaves and spent blooms.

Season specific tasks will be done as follows:

- * Winter: Prune trees, except spring blooming varieties; prune perennials heavily; cut back evergreen ferns, about every two years.
- * Spring: Prune blooming trees after bloom is over; remove spent flowers on early blooming perennials and rhododendrons; prune early blooming rhododendrons and azaleas.
- * Summer: Prune zelkova trees in the west parking lot; remove spent flowers on late blooming perennials and rhododendrons; prune late blooming rhododendrons and azaleas.
- * Fall: Cut back perennials as foliage fades.

Of course, weeding each building four times a year will not work. Our work-study students or I will spend one or two hours a day weeding during the growing season. The maintenance cycle starts at the Performing Arts Building. I'll work counterclockwise around campus. The Center Building will be the last building done in each cycle. So, wish me luck!

COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS

- * All Community Learning Centers are in operation except the Junction City Center.
- * At the Junction City CLC, the exterior building envelope is 80 percent complete, interior ductwork and electrical has been roughed-in, interior framing has passed inspection and sheet rock is being installed. Project is a little ahead of schedule.
- * The Elmira CLC is now in operation. A Grand Opening celebration is planned for March 16. FLORENCE CENTER ADDITION
- * The new building is complete and in operation. The contract for the construction of a breezeway between the old and new buildings has been executed and construction is underway. Completion of the breezeway is scheduled for early April.

MAIN CAMPUS PROJECTS

- * Welding Building: Contractor has lots of cleaning and small items to finish. LCC tradespeople are moving and hooking up equipment, painting fire protection paint, installing cabinet doors, etc. The plan is to move the welding and jewelry departments during spring break so that they can be operational by the start of spring term.
- * Child Care Center:
- -- Bldg #1: Exterior envelope is 95 percent complete, interior work is roughed in and finishes are being applied. Cabinets are being installed.
- -- Bldg #2: Exterior envelope is 80 percent complete, interior work is 90 percentroughed in, interior finishes will start soon.
 - -- Bldg #3: Exterior envelope is 50 percent complete, interior work is 40 percentroughed in.
 - -- Bldg #4: Exterior envelope is 40 percent complete, interior work is 30 percentroughed in.

- * Campus Services Addition: Masonry is 99 percent complete. Floor and roof framing is complete. Roofing has been laid. Lower level floor slab has been poured. Metal fascia panels are 90 percent in place. Heating ductwork, plumbing and electrical are roughed in. Project scheduled to be completed by end of April 2000.
- * Science-Math Building: Retaining walls at west addition are 60 percent poured.
- * Underslab plumbing is complete, underslab electrical is 90 percent complete at west addition. Steel columns are being fabricated. Project is still behind schedule.
- * Workforce Training Building is scheduled to go out for bid June 1, 2000.
- * Remodel of the Health Tech. Building is planned to go out for bids about April 15, 2000 with a construction start date in mid-June.
- * Infrastructure Upgrade: The Welding Building portion of the infrastructure project has been completed. Cabling for the other buildings is continuing.

SEWAGE LAGOON UPGRADE

* Representatives of the Bond project and the Oregon Military Department (OMD) met with Abiqua engineers again to receive their final report. All present agreed that the first priority is to add tertiary treatment equipment to the Lagoon. The second priority is to pipe the outfall to the coast fork of the Willamette River. Before work can begin we need DEQ review and approval of the final upgrade plan and an interagency agreement between the OMD and LCC. Negotiations on the interagency agreement will commence soon. A preliminary draft of the agreement will be presented for your input and the final document will require your approval. Bill Spoja of the OMD told us they might receive some funds from the National Guard Bureau which could be used within certain conditions for Off-site improvements. Bill will be at the Board meeting to discuss his agency's intentions with you.

PRESIDENT JERRY MOSKUS made a formal announcement at the March 8 Board of Education meeting that he will retire June 30, 2001. Earlier in the day, he sent an e-mail announcement to all staff. Many people at the board meeting lauded his contributions to Lane over the past 10 years, and acknowledged the work to be done in the next 15 months. Board Chair Robert Ackerman called Moskus one of Lane's most outstanding presidents and said that Moskus' best achievement may be the bond construction project. Faculty union president Margaret Bayless agreed with that sentiment, and also saluted Moskus' shift to interest-based bargaining. The president's goals for the next 15 months include completing the critical phase of bond construction with the least possible disruption to learning; completing contract negotiations with faculty, classified staff and managers; balancing the budget for the next two years; expanding enrollment; revising and implementing the affirmative action and diversity plans; developing and implementing a restructuring plan to address structural issues and improve organizational performance; and enhancing cooperation and articulation with local higher education institutions and local schools. Ackerman called for staff and student participation in the process to recruit a successor and invited people to contribute ideas on what they want in a new president, and whether the search should be regional or national, by the April 12 board meeting. He appointed personnel director Sue Colvin as the point of contact for the recruitment process.

A REPORT ON MANAGEMENT ACCOUNTABILITY included an update on a comprehensive study to review jobs and salaries. Chair Ackerman said the study should not be used just to raise wages, particularly in tough budget times. Personnel Director Sue Colvin said the intent is to produce a current, simpler and more incremental salary schedule, and it will not necessarily result in raises.

A REVIEW OF THE BUDGET PROCESS included reminders that the budget document will be presented to the Budget Committee by Wednesday, April 26. In the meantime, budget leaders are making some changes based on staff and student feedback. Lane's budget is adopted at the June board meeting, which includes a formal public hearing.

THE BOARD HELD FIRST READINGS OF A REVISION to the executive limitations policies, including changing them to executive directions; a revision to the policy on emergency president succession; and a revision to the policy on treatment of staff. Second readings will be held in April.

A RESOLUTION ON AFFORDABLE EDUCATION was approved and will be sent to Gov. John Kitzhaber. Chair Ackerman wrote the resolution after learning that the governor's strategy on human investment and core social supports did not include education. The resolution also will be forwarded to the Oregon Community College Association for possible adoption by other colleges.

IN OTHER ACTION, the board endorsed April 9-15 as National Library Week. The consent agenda passed, including: the retirement of Harold Hoy from Art and Applied Design; the appointment of Mark Clark as temporary Mechanical Technologies instructor; the purchase of two industrial washing machines for \$100,150; advisory committee appointments; and reappointment of the college auditor. A building management control systems bid award was postponed.

A BOND CONSTRUCTION REPORT included remarks from Bill Spoja of the Oregon Military Department regarding a proposal to build a 100,000-square-feet facility across 30th Avenue that would use main campus sewage lagoons. Political science instructor Stan Taylor later expressed opposition to partnering with a military agency. Board member George Alvergue complimented bond project manager Bob Mention's efforts to reduce the impact to Apprenticeship Building occupants by hearing their concerns and phasing construction of the Workforce Training Center.

IN OTHER STATEMENTS, student Bobby Hayden said an informal survey he conducted showed strong student support for the bus pass program. Student Susan Whitmore said the governor will visit Lane students on Wednesday, March 15. Mary Spilde said the college will push for increased summer enrollment through programming and marketing. Larry Warford said Lane has provided training to Levi Strauss employees. Marie Matsen said the college is seeking solutions to an air quality problem in the Health Technology Building. She also reported that a ratings report shows that KLCC reaches 3,000 listeners a day and 60,000 individuals a week. Mike Rose reported that OCCA director Vickie Totten Chamberlain has announced her resignation effective June 30. The board's next meeting is set for Wednesday, April 12.

BOARD MEMBER TO RECEIVE CAREER AWARD

Larry Romine, vice chair of the Board of Education, will receive the D. Richard Petrizzo Career Service Award from the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations at its annual conference to be held March 19-22 in Portland. NCMPR is an affiliate of the American Association of Community Colleges. The Petrizzo award recognizes exemplary career achievement in community college marketing and public relations. WELDING PROGRAM MOVES TODAY

The Fabrication/Welding Technology program will be the first instructional program on main campus to move into a new facility built by the college's \$42.8 million construction bond. Major equipment will be moved today.

Equipment to be moved includes a shear measuring about 10-feet by 4-feet by 8-feet and weighing about eight tons. Also moved will be a tensel compression tester, a Turret punch press, an angle roll, and other items. Some equipment already is in place, including 47 blue welding booths built by welding students last year, and a new computer-controlled press break which weighs 18 tons. Movers are expected to use hydraulic jacks, forklifts, dollies and a lowboy truck to move and place equipment.

Lane offers a two-year degree and one-year certificate in fabrication/welding technology, and a one-year certificate in welding processes. Classes include metal fabrication, shielded metal arc welding, gas tungsten arc welding, wire drive welding, metallurgy fundamentals, gas processes, plastics joining and fabrication, metallizing, industrial robotic welding, and blueprint reading. FINALS WEEK TESTS THE BOND PROJECT

The week of March 13 was the first time that construction activity occurred adjacent to classrooms during final exams. Two problems arose. A roller-compactor working the Student Services site caused shaking in the Business and Apprenticeship buildings. An instructor reported that students could not concentrate so the bond office shut down the heavy equipment activity. Heavy equipment at the Science project disrupted finals with noise from the screeching sound of rock scraping, and beeping of equipment backing up. The bond office also shut down that activity.

Bond project manager Bob Mention is considering whether all construction activity involving power tools and equipment should be disallowed during finals week as a matter of course. This would extend the construction period, escalate costs, and possibly affect the schedules of other projects or moving plans, but may be necessary. Part of the struggle is determining conditions that allow both construction and instruction to proceed. Is what's quiet on a construction site still too noisy inside a classroom? "We're all learning here," Mention says.

In the meantime, bond office and Personnel Services have drafted a proposed procedure, and a tip sheet for faculty. The documents outline options for dealing with disruption during regular hours. The faculty sheets will be distributed in intercampus mail. The procedure will be posted in the online procedures manual. Both will be posted on the bond Web site and announced in The Daily. The contractor is completing final inspection deficiencies. There are a few other unfinished details, such as delayed arrival of starter controls for the exhaust fan motors.

When those arrive, Facilities Management and Planning staff will install them. FMP staff continue to apply fireproofing painting. It will be close, but welding and jewelry classes should be held in the new building spring term.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. The boiler for washers for the Laundry should be delivered Friday, March 24 and take a week or two to hook up and debug. On the second floor, an occupancy permit is expected and will allow Printing/Graphics to move in about mid-April. P/G's old space in the Center basement will be remodeled into two large temporary classrooms for 2000/2001. The permanent remodel of the Center basement should begin summer 2001. Outside, sewer pipes were replaced in the surplus yard, and will be covered and paved next. The Facilities Management Committee has approved funds for the surplus yard slab, drainage and fencing. The general contractor is trenching to replace an electrical conduit outside the surplus yard.

SCIENCE. The final section of the retaining wall was poured Friday, March 17. Structural steel also arrived; it's called "red iron" in the trades. Rebar, or reinforcing steel, has been laid in a grid pattern, and is being tied in preparation for pouring the floor slab during spring break. Steel columns and beams are expected to arrive spring break also. Asbestos removal is complete.

CHILD CARE. College tradespeople are installing cabinetry in Building 1, and Lane Family Connections should be able to move in early May. Building 2 is being sheetrocked; its roof is finished. Roof framing and sheathing, and building siding, are being installed on Buildings 3 and 4. The logjam on the mechanical rooms has been broken and work is proceeding. All buildings should be complete by the end of June so the Infant/Toddler program and Child Development Center may move in early July. These programs must move for the Health Tech remodel project to begin.

STUDENT SERVICES. The site has been excavated and filled with gravel. Good news: No rock was encountered! Drilling equipment was set up on March 17 for work on the elevator shaft. Forming and placing of rebar for foundations along the south exterior wall are being done. Two large foundations for the bridge supports have been prepared. The bridge will connect to the Workforce Training Center.

RELATED NEWS. FMC approved funding to relocate the culinary arts demonstration classroom from Health Technology into one of the existing child care modulars.

EXCAVATION for the installation of a concrete path for disabled access to the baseball field bleacher area is underway. This is a Facilities Management and Planning project, not a bond project. INPUT ON PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSOR NEEDED BEFORE APRIL 12

At the March Board of Education meeting, President Jerry Moskus announced his retirement effective June 30, 2001. BOND PROJECT UPDATE

SCIENCE. Weather permitting, 350 yards of concrete will be poured for the floor slab at the Science/Math project on Tuesday, March 28, from about 4 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. A high-tech laser screed machine will be used to level the concrete, and one-man riding "whirly-gig" machines will polish the concrete. This size of pour is one of construction's more exciting and interesting sights to observe. In other news, waterproofing membrane has been applied to the west exterior concrete wall. A variety of plumbing, heating/air conditioning/ventilating, and electrical work continues in the underslab portion of the existing building. The underslab construction workers are voluntarily working from 3 a.m. to 7:30 a.m. which is a great help to the college. Water line work last week revealed many 30-year-old rusted valves which will have to be replaced. This may cause additional water shut-offs or interruptions to hot water. This condition maywill be encountered at other projects as well. Bond and facilities staff are working to develop the least disruptive solution. Shut-off notices will be posted in The Daily or via all-staff e-mail.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. The boiler for the laundry arrived Friday. It will take a week or more to install. Laundry will move in at the end of April or possibly in May. On the second floor, thinwall plaster is about 70 percent complete and painting will begin later this week. Printing/Graphics should be able to move in about mid-April. The access drive on the north side of the building has been paved at the west end. "It's the first time in 20 years that we have no potholes outside the mailroom," says job project liaison Lynn Atkins.

STUDENT SERVICES. Footings are 80 percent poured for the south wall, water lines are in, storm sewer work has been done, and the elevator cylinder has been dug. The Business Building west sidewalk was closed last week, but the south end will be open this week for wheelchair access to the first floor of the Business Department. The portion of the sidewalk in front of Computer Services will remain closed. The entire sidewalk may have to be closed again later for tunnel work, but alternative wheelchair access will have to be provided first. A speed hump and pedestrian crosswalk was installed on the driveway near the site to improve pedestrian safety.

WELDING. College personnel, contractors, engineers and others met Friday to assign responsibilities for a remaining "punchlist" of details. Fire alarm systems were tested and college housekeeping staff worked over the weekend to seal classroom floors and otherwise prepare classrooms.

The metallurgy lab, computer room, and jewelry lab were ready for Monday classes. The main shop floor still has some work to be completed this week.

CHILD CARE. Building 1 casework is installed and floor coverings will be put down this week. It should be ready for occupancy about May 1. Building 2 is finishing up drywall and mechanical work is continuing. It should be finished by the end of June. Building 3 has composition roof shingles going up. Building 4 roof framing is in progress. Some sidewalks have been poured. The complex is about six weeks late due to the innovative but complex geothermal energy system which includes mechanical rooms in each of the four buildings.

STUDENT HEALTH OFFERS SERVICES. Contractors have been given instructions on how to use Student Health in lieu of 911 in case of accidents. The Student Health medical response team can beat 911 by five minutes, which can save lives. The team also has a cardiac defibrillator.

DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE BENEFITS

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within its time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

DAILY WILL PUBLISH 1999 TACT QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS FOR NEXT TWO WEEKS

The Technology Advising and Coordinating Team conducted a survey of all departments and units at Lane during winter and spring of 1999. The purpose of the survey was two-fold: 1) to gather broad information about technology-related issues at Lane; and 2) to help units to begin thinking about the kinds of issues surrounding technology planning at the unit level. TACT purposefully left efforts to gather more detailed specific information about technology issues at the unit level to a future date when technology planning at the unit level was more formally organized.

TACT only asked questions that could not be obtained from a central office or from Lane's central computer system. For example, TACT did not ask how many distance education courses each unit offered because that information could be obtained either from the Distance Learning department or from Lane's central computer system. Following is the first response of 16 that have been tabulated and summarized by TACT.

TRAINING/Workshops, seminars, conferences:

Question 1: How many people from your unit attended technology-related workshops, seminars or conferences during 1997-1998? Eighty (80) percent of responding units had members attending a total of 231 on-campus workshops, seminars or conferences. In many units, some people attended more than one workshop or conference. Forty-four (44) percent had some people attending off-campus local programs; 38 percent had attended in-state sessions, and 49 percent of units had some people at out-of-state technology related workshops and conferences. FTE-producing units had utilized these

training/conference opportunities at approximately twice the rate of non-FTE producing units. For more information, contact TACT at tact@lanecc.edu .

TECHNOLOGY ADVISING AND COORDINATING TEAM SURVEY RESULTS CONTINUED

* TRAINING NEEDS, Question 2: What technology training needs does your unit/department have?

Virtually all respondents had technology training needs that were not being met. In FTE producing areas, 30 percent of the responding departments mentioned the need for distance learning, online courses, and multimedia curriculum training. Another 30 percent mentioned Web-related trainings. Non-FTE producing units mentioned technology training needs in the areas of budgeting, financial aid information, database interactivity, document imaging, and improvement of routine

processes. Thirty eight (38) percent of the responding units mentioned unfulfilled training needs in using MS Office products, and 33 percent desired more e-mail, Beyond Mail, or Internet training.

* JOB POSTINGS, Question 3: Does your department currently include requirements for computer technology skills in your job postings?

In FTE-producing areas, 16 of 20 units responding (80 percent), indicated they currently have requirements for computer technology skills in their job postings for faculty. Over 90 percent of the classified job postings from responding units college-wide have computer technology skill requirements. Fourteen (14) of the 20 responding FTE-producing units (70 percent), and 13 of 22 the non-FTE producing units who hire managers currently have computer technology skill requirements in their job postings for managers. * Question 4: (Software/Hardware): Department Owned Site Licenses, What software site licenses does your department own? Thirty-two (32) of 45 responding units college-wide (71 percent) listed department-owned software site licenses. However, the definition of "site license" varies widely among software vendors, so these data have varying meanings in different units. Some units may have included single copy software in their response even though this is not technically a "site license." The data also indicate that 21 units out of 45 responding units mentioned all or part of Microsoft Office, but it is unlikely that the college owns 21 separate site licenses for MS-Office.

* Question 5: (Software/Hardware): Site Licenses to Help Departments, What software site licenses would help your department? Twenty-three (23) out of 45 college-wide respondents (51 percent) indicated some software would help their department. The responses to this question reflect a combination of needs for site licenses as well as department software/training needs. For example, one respondent indicated the need for authoring tools for the Web, and another respondent indicated the need for Calandar for which the college does own a site license. MS Office (or parts of Office) was mentioned by nine units overall (or 20 percent). Many of the MS Office responses indicated an upgrade to Office 2000 but a few indicated MS Office 97. DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions, or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also

consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

TECHNOLOGY TEAM SURVEY RESULTS CONTINUED

* Question 6: (Software/Hardware): Budget Process for Maintenance and Replacement. Does your unit/department currently include costs for technology maintenance and replacement (hardware, software, etc.) in your budgeting process?

Twenty-five responding units college-wide (56 percent) indicated they included costs for technology in their budgeting process (13 in FTE producing units and 12 in non-FTE producing units).

- * Question 7: (Technology Access): Barriers to Staff Technology Access. What barriers limit staff access to technology (i.e. hardware, software, network)?" Over 90 percent of the responding units felt there were barriers. Almost 60 percent felt that lack of time (time for training) was a major problem. FTE producing areas mentioned budget limitations (70 percent) or outdated hardware as a major limiting factor.
- * Question 8: (Technology Access): Barriers to Student Technology Access. What barriers limit student access to technology (i.e. hardware, software, network)? Almost 60 percent of responding units indicated one or more student barriers to technology access. Most often mentioned were: budget (or outdated hardware); lab facilities, or staffing (lack of instructors); and lab hours (lab hours not long enough) as barriers.
