BOND PROJECT UPDATE

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Printing/Graphics staff have visited their future quarters on the second floor of the addition and like what they see. Graphic designer Shirley Nagy says, "I'm going to spend my first three days as comp time, just so I can sit and look out the windows." The new quarters are being painted, and the ceiling grid is being installed. A slight fire alarm and sprinkler system problem has delayed P/G's expected move-in date to early May. P/G's old space in the Center Building basement will be remodeled into classrooms. On CSA first floor, the complex job of installing a new boiler for the Laundry is picking up steam. The Laundry also is expected to move in sometime in May.

WELDING. Metallurgy, fabrication/welding, and jewelry classes are underway in the new Welding Technology Building, but a "punchlist" of details remain. Dorman Construction was expected to finish its share of punchlist details and remove its job shack on Friday. In the meantime, the Bond Office, Facilities Management and Planning and department faculty are working through a list of other details, from uneven flooring around imbedded electrical boxes to uninstalled paper towel racks.

MATH/SCIENCE. A small dynamite drilling hole with some wires showing was discovered at the site on Friday. Project liaison Todd Smith halted work and sought assistance. Public Safety Director Mike Mayer cleared the area and conducted an examination. The hole and wires were found to be safe. Last week, 359 cubic yards of concrete were poured for the floor slab. This week, back-filling of the south wall of the addition will begin. A domestic hot water shut-off is anticipated so a new valve for Science can be installed; an all-staff e-mail will be issued as soon as details are settled. In other work, framing of steel studs on the east side is in progress, and underslab work in the existing building continues from 3 a.m. to 7 a.m.

CHILD CARE. Building 1 has cabinets installed, sheet vinyl in place, and oak trim installed. Vinyl composition tile also is installed, and various exterior and interior painting continues. Building 2 drywall is being taped, ductwork is being installed, and soffits will be installed this week in the infant crib area. Building 3 roofing is installed, framing is almost complete at the interior mechanical room, and rough-in plumbing is in progress. Building 4 roof framing is half complete, and rough-in plumbing is almost complete. OSHA wants railing installed around attic access hatches. Lane Family Connections is expected to be the first occupant, moving into Building 1 in early May.

STUDENT SERVICES is proceeding on schedule. The project has enjoyed good weather for excavation and other site work. Chambers Construction is benefiting from early planning and organizing prior to moving on site. Last week's digging through asphalt to install a storm sewer line brought complaints from faculty and students in some Apprenticeship classrooms, but the worst of the noise subsided by the end of the week.

TECHNOLOGY TEAM SURVEY RESULTS CONTINUED

Question 9: (Information): Expanding Information via the Web; Have you considered expanding unit/department information available via the Web? Eight-nine (89) percent of the college units that responded indicated they've considered expanding the information available via the Web. Half (50 percent) of the FTE producing areas indicated they wanted to expand information externally, and 40 percent of the non-FTE producing areas indicated the same. Information relating to coursework, instructors, online testing, and event calendars were mentioned as items to have available via the Web.

Question 10: (Information): Staff Barriers to Information Access Question 10: What barriers limit staff access to information such as leave balance, class lists, etc.? Eightseven (87) percent of the responding units indicated one or more barriers to information access for staff. Forty percent indicated training as a barrier, with time (either to train or to learn) as a basic problem. College-wide, over 50 percent of all responding units mentioned access to the HP3000 as a barrier to information. Comments ranged from "not very user-friendly to casual users" to "difficulty getting HP logins." Other comments related to the lack of automating administrative processes within the college for things like Purchasing, Personnel, ICO's, and leave records. TECHNOLOGY TEAM SURVEY RESULTS CONTINUED

* Question 11: (Information): Student Barriers to Information Access.

What barriers limit student access to information such as student class schedules, transcripts, etc.? Seventy percent of those who answered this question identified student barriers to information access (of those, 44 percent were in FTE-producing areas; 56 percent were in non-FTE producing areas). Thirty percent of those who responded indicated, as a barrier, the lack of availability of information on the Web, or the need to come to campus to access information. Twenty-six percent of the respondents cited problems with the kiosks -- not enough of them, too slow, lack of student awareness of the kiosks, or not wheelchair or sight-impaired accessible. These responses come from staff perceptions of student information access barriers. Future studies will also include student input.

* Question 12: (Technology Use): Strategic Projects Units Would Like to Pursue;

What strategic projects involving technology would your unit/department like to pursue? Eightytwo percent of the responding units indicated strategic projects they would like to pursue (of those, 43 percent were in FTE producing areas; 57 percent were in non-FTE producing areas). Twenty-four percent of the units desiring projects would like to develop online courses. Eleven percent indicated projects for enhanced classroom learning. Thirty-five percent indicated a desire to move current offline processes online, such as competency checklists, tutoring, library tour, book ordering, student schedules, transcripts, job applications, financial aid applications, and purchasing. Eight percent of the respondents mentioned document imaging or digitizing records. Eleven percent of the responding units mentioned projects involving technology specifically to increase efficiency. Some suggestions were bulk-mail processing equipment, recruiting tools for Affirmative Action, and a system to capture tutoring hours for generation of FTE. Question 13: (Technology Use): Strategic Projects Units Would Like to Pursue; How many nondistance education courses offered in your department last school year regularly used materials such as email, online discussions and Web pages as supplementary learning tools? Half of all responding FTEproducing areas (10-20) have at least one faculty member who is using e-mail as a supplementary learning tool in non-distance education courses. E-mail is used more frequently than Web pages. Online discussions are used significantly less frequently than e-mail.

Question 14: (Technology Use): Use of Teaching Workstations; How many teaching workstations did your unit/department use this year or need next year? Twenty-seven percent (12 of 45) of responding units indicated they used both cart-mounted workstations and laptops in 1998-99. One-third (15 of 45) indicated they used permanently mounted workstations in 1998-99. Fourteen responding units indicated the need for cart-mounted teaching workstations and laptops in 1999-2000. *Question 15: (Distance Learning): Student Services for Distance Learning; What services could they provide to help student take advantage of distance learning options? Sixty-seven (67) percent of the respondents thought that the college needed to provide services to students who were interested in or currently taking distance learning classes, while 40 percent of the respondents felt that some form of orientation was needed for those students interested in, or who were taking distance learning classes, such as an orientation videotape, or online materials or a variety of related written materials. Other responses noted more Internet access, a variety of course offerings, distance learning-related student services, and training of faculty to teach distance classes.

Easy requirements: You should be in good health, weigh more than 110 pounds, wait eight weeks between donations, eat a meal with protein (milk, meat, eggs, cheese) and carbohydrates within two hours of donating, and bring a photo I.D. But you can't donate if you have AIDS or have tested positive for

the HIV virus, or participated in high-risk behavior; have a history of hepatitis; have insulin-dependent diabetes; have certain respiratory or cardiac conditions. You'll need to wait 12 months if you have had ear or body piercing; tattoos or permanent makeup applied; been exposed to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; had a shot for hepatitis exposure; or had a blood transfusion or organ transplant. And you'll need to wait until the next Bloodmobile visit if you have cold or flu symptoms, are taking antibiotics, had an illness or major surgery in the past six weeks, or your weight has not been stable in the last two weeks. While 60 percent of Americans meet these requirements, only 5 percent donate their blood to local blood banks. But there is no substitute for blood, and healthy people are asked to give it in advance so it will be on hand when emergencies arises. Thanks for being a responsible, giving community member.

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BOND PROJECT UPDATE

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Acoustical ceiling tile is being installed and case work is underway on the second floor. Exterior stairs and an ADA ramp are under construction. Paving of the north side access road should begin in a couple of weeks. The Laundry's boiler is in place on the first floor and will be running in about three weeks. Two new computerized washing machines have been ordered. The machines pose complex plumbing challenges. Printing/Graphics will move sometime in early June; Laundry+s moving date is undetermined.

WELDING. Facilities Management and Planning crews worked over the weekend on a checklist of critical completion items for fabrication and welding, and jewelry. Landscaping is underway with the irrigation system to follow. The welding building is becoming a case study in unanticipated detail: variables which affected the readiness of the new facility varied from technological changes in equipment since plans were drawn and move-in occurred, to seeing things with a different eye in person than they appeared on paper, to the pressure of tight timelines. It's becoming evident that the more users visit their future site while it's under construction, the better that unanticipated details can be caught and taken care in good time.

MATH/SCIENCE. Hyland Construction has agreed to a regular shift of 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. (daylight permitting) at no overtime cost, to lessen the impact of construction on college business. Upcoming work includes pouring the south slab, and erecting some steel. The major steel erection date is set for April 24. Underslab work is beginning to wrap up. Last week's hot water shut-off was insufficient and another will have to be scheduled; a Sunday may be selected instead of a weekday evening, as both hot and cold water may have to be interrupted to part or all of campus. An advance shut-off notice will be e-mailed and run in The Daily.

CHILD CARE. Building 1 carpet is in, the last coat of paint is going on, and SteelCase furniture should be installed beginning next week. Lane Family Connections should move in about mid-May. Building 2 soffets will be installed this week and floor coverings come next. Building 3 roofing, rough-in

plumbing, and HVAC work is finishing up. Building 4 roofing is framed and sheeted. Walk-throughs by the users with the college job project liaison have helped future occupants get a handle on what's ahead.

STUDENT SERVICES is going up fast! The project has enjoyed good weather and Chambers Construction is benefiting from early planning and organizing. Core drilling has been done to tie-in to tunnel utilities. Some digging through asphalt to install a storm sewer line brought complaints from faculty and students in some Apprenticeship classrooms, but the worst of the noise subsided by the end of the week. The outside air intake for the Business Building is being extended upward to minimize possible odors from coming into the building.

They will help you make sure that the new equipment fits the location, has appropriate electrical service, and other details.

MATH DEPARTMENT COMPUTER LAB FINDS ITS FIRST PRIME NUMBERS

Computers in the math department have just discovered two previously unknown prime numbers, 1787363373488812416764791 and 4690767254460090160943. Prime numbers are those

divisible only by themselves and 1, for example, 7 and 11. These numbers are factors of another truly large number with 13,152 digits, and the discoveries were the first fruits of a new project in the math computer lab that looks for factors of several such huge numbers. The computer lab exists for instructional use, and is used by a number of math classes. But when the computers are turned on and not being used by students, the computers keep themselves entertained by looking for prime numbers! If these numbers aren't large enough for you, consider this: One of these computers is currently testing a number with 3,024,850 digits to see if it is prime. Since the currently largest known prime number has "only" 2,098,960 digits, if the number we are testing turns out to be prime, it could put Lane into the Guinness Book of World Records! BOND PROJECT UPDATE

The following Bond Projects Status Report was presented to the Board of Education at its April 12 meeting.

 Community Learning Centers. All Community Learning Centers have been completed and are in operation except the Junction City center. The exterior work is about 80% complete and the interior is about 75% complete. At this point it appears that construction will be completed in May instead of June.
 Florence Center Addition. Construction of the covered breezeway between the new and old buildings has been completed.

3. Main Campus Projects

* Welding Building: All of the regulatory agencies have inspected and approved the building. The contractor has achieved substantial completion and the furnishings and equipment of the welding and jewelry programs have been moved. Spring term classes are being held in the new building even though there are some unfinished elements.

* Child Care Center. The current schedule calls for the following building completion dates: Bldg. 1 - May 1, Bldg. 2 - June 30, Bldg. 3 - July 5, and Bldg. 4: - July 10.

* Campus Services Addition. Construction is on schedule to complete the addition by early May after which both Printing/Graphics and Laundry will be moved.

* Science-Math Building. The south retaining wall has been completed and waterproofed. The concrete floor slabs for the west and east additions have been poured. Erection of the structural steel frame is

underway as is work under the floor of the existing building. The steel studs of the exterior walls of the east additions are installed. The speed of construction has increased substantially over what it was however completion of the entire project is still behind schedule.

* Workforce Training Center. The architects have met with Foodservices people to redesign the kitchen. The revision of the kitchen and the addition of the College High Program to the center have increased the project's cost. We are studying ways to minimize the increase.

* Remodel of the Health Tech. Building. This project has distinct 3 phases: 1, The lower level of the north part of the building; 2, The upper level of the north part of the building; and 3, The PE classroom and Archives. The seismic upgrade part of this project had to be deleted for budgetary reasons. Also, for the same reason, college Facilities personnel will do Phases 2 and 3.

4. Infrastructure Upgrade. The cabling portion of this project is about 50% complete and the equipment upgrade portion is 75% complete. The existing buildings are now upgraded. The upgrade will connect the new buildings as they are completed.

5. Sewage Lagoon Upgrade. The draft facilities plan for the upgrade of the lagoon has been submitted to DEQ for review and comment. DEQ's response is expected by 10/1/00. The Executive Leadership Team and College Council have begun to discuss the Armory's interest in sharing the lagoon.

6. LTD Bus Station. Design Development drawings have been completed and approved by LCC and LTD. The interagency agreement between LCC and LTD has been drafted and is being reviewed by the college attorneys before it is presented to the Board of Education for review. Actual construction of the station is still scheduled for this summer.

7. HVAC Control Systems. Bids for the HVAC control system have been opened and were within the target budget. (The board awarded the contract April 12.)

8. General Comments

* The level of construction caused disruption and anxiety has increased due to more construction activity close to occupied classrooms and offices and because of the haste with which the welding and jewelry programs had to be moved. You asked for a report to be made at the May meeting, which included "Campus anxiety, disruption, and effective communication". I plan to make a comprehensive and detailed report about this matter at that time.

* Finally, lest we get too serious about this, consider some of the things which happened last month: There was a "dynamite scare" at the Math-Science site, a boiler which was too big to fit through the door, a dump truck which broke a water pipe, and a run away fork lift which was stopped by the operators' pick up! Oh, yes, and this time when we had to shut off the water for awhile we remembered to provide KLCC with a port-a-potty.

HELLO FROM DAVID JOYCE

To Daily readers: "Thought I'd take a minute to update you on what I did with my personal leave during winter term. In early January my wife, Kacey (who teaches part-time in the Art Dept at Lane), and I drove down to Phoenix with a big project I'd been working on for almost two years. It's a 10' by 14' mural showing people from that area 'flying' like super-heroes, similar to the one I did for the Eugene Airport 10 years ago. All of the figures in the new piece are hand-colored photo-porcelain baked onto steel, a very complex way to make photographs but the resulting images are extremely durable and long-lasting. The installation went off without a hitch -- the results can be seen in Terminal 4 (International Terminal) at Sky Harbor Airport in Phoenix. Later this spring, the Phoenix Arts Commission's web site will start showing pictures of everyone who 'flew' for the project whether they were included in the finished mural or not. In late January I began a seven-week artist residency in Norfolk, Virginia, where I have been commissioned to make a large public artwork to document the community at the dawn of the new Millennium. I shot almost 15,000 digital images while I was there -- most of them are portraits of local residents. These will be used to construct a series of large photographic mosaics celebrating the diversity and sense of community in Norfolk. The project will be completed in October. Now I'm back at LCC teaching and trying to get to the top of the pile of stuff which accumulated during my three-month absence."

KLCC RACES CLOCK TO MEET RADIOTHON GOAL

The clock ticked and the phones continued ringing as the final hours of KLCC's Spring Radiothon wound down. With \$44,000 left to raise at the beginning of the day, staff and volunteers pondered the likelihood of reaching the ambitious goal of \$185,000 by evening. FREE TUTORING AVAILABLE TO LANE STUDENTS

Did you know that credit students on main campus received over 8,767 hours of free tutoring during winter term? Tutoring Services thanks all faculty for encouraging students to use its free tutoring services. Lane has a large group of exceptional tutors who provide free assistance in the following subject areas: academic learning skills, accounting, advanced technology, computer information technology (including the course CS120), math, music, social sciences, science and writing. Tutors are also hired to work specifically with student groups including the Black Student Union, international students, students who use the Multi-Cultural Center and students participating in the Native American Student Association. Tutors are trained to coach students, not to feed them answers. They are trained to question the students to promote self discovery. They ask questions such as: "What does your book say?" "Let's look at the notes you took in class." "What do you remember from class?"

Tutors are instructed to back up a step and start with the student's comfort level before moving into the confusing area. Sometimes students are disappointed with this approach because they want the answers, quick and simple. Please help the tutors by telling students that they will end up doing some work and really learning the material, instead of skimming over the top toward the goal of a better grade. The onus of learning is always on the student -- not on the tutor. There are times when the centers are less busy. Students can find out which hours are less busy by dropping by the centers on campus. Bookmarks are available that list the subjects and locations, and flyers are posted noting times, in addition to the subjects and locations. LANE NAMED A VANGUARD COLLEGE

Lane has been selected as one of 12 Vanguard Learning Colleges in the United States and Canada for its outstanding record of achievement in improving learning. The international evaluation committee chose Lane from among 94 applicants. The 12 Vanguard colleges will share practices and models with other colleges around the world.

"This project will result in improved learning for Lane students, and students throughout the world," said President Jerry Moskus. "We are proud to join this group of highly respected colleges for this important purpose."

Teams from the 12 colleges will meet for an initial seminar June 17-21 in Scottsdale, Ariz. Besides Lane, the Vanguard colleges include Cascadia Community College (WA), Community College of Baltimore County (MD), Community College of Denver (CO), Humber College of Applied Arts and Technology (ON, Canada), Kirkwood Community College (IA), Madison Area Technical College (WI), Moraine Valley Community College (IL), Palomar College (CA), Richland College (TX), Sinclair Community College (OH), and Valencia Community College (FL).

Lane has been implementing the learning college concept since 1994 and has formed a partnership with the Lane Community College Education Association to foster innovation in improving learning. President Moskus has authored several articles on the learning-centered movement, and a chapter in Terry O'Banion's book, "A Learning College for the 21st Century." Moskus describes the learning movement as "an effort to create more learning options for students."

BOND UPDATE

SCIENCE/MATH. A large crane sets up this week for the beginning of steel beam erection. This work will last through the term and noise levels will increase, but work will be halted for finals. Also this week, the south and east addition slabs will be poured, weather permitting. The east addition steel is in place.

CHILD CARE. SteelCase furniture will be installed in Building 1. The first occupant, Lane Family Connections, should move in about mid-May. Building 2 ceiling grid installation is finishing up and floor coverings should be going in this week. Building 3 insulation is being installed. Building 4 roofing is on. A question has arisen as to whether some of the sidewalks will be subject to sagging over the trenches dug

and filled last summer for the geothermal system; various reinforcements or the use of asphalt are being debated.

STUDENT SERVICES. The sidewalk on the west side of the Business Building should be poured this week, restoring access to the lower-level building entrance. The sidewalk had to be torn up to allow access to tunnel utilities. A vapor barrier and reinforcing bars will e laid in preparation for the concrete floor slab pour on the south side of the new building.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Installation details for the Laundry's new boiler are being ironed out. The boiler should be ready to fire up in mid-May. A ramp is being installed on the addition's south side, and finish flooring is being laid.

WELDING AND JEWELRY classes are in progress in the new facility but various details remain uncompleted. The Bond Office, Facilities Management and Planning and department personnel are striving to work out responsibilities for getting through the checklist.

HEALTH TECH is the next project coming up, with a first-floor remodel of the north side tentatively set to begin construction in July 2000. This will be the dental program's new home.

BOARD REPORT

DALE PARNELL WILL BE INVITED to submit an application and proposal to serve as a presidential search consultant, following a 7-0 vote at the April 12 Board of Education meeting. Parnell is Lane's founding president and is a former president of the American Association of Community Colleges. In related action, Personnel Director Sue Colvin was officially named board liaison for the search process by a 7-0 vote. By a 4-3 vote, the board will hear a presentation on presidential searches by the Association of Community College Trustees. Opposing were Robert Ackerman, George Alvergue and Larry Romine.

A CONSTRUCTION LABOR AGREEMENT recommendation regarding a proposal from local labor leaders will be made by an ad hoc committee of board members and staff, following a 6-1 vote. Roger Hall voted no, stating that legal advice against the proposal was sufficient. However, all board members agreed that the college should respond when labor violations on jobs at Lane become known. For example, the board heard that two workers' wages were delayed by their employer on the Welding Technology project.

TWO OF THREE ASLCC BALLOT MEASURES were approved unanimously for the May 8, 9 and 10 student elections. One measure asks for continued fee support for Oregon Student Association membership, and one asks for new fee support for the Black Student Union. The board opposed a fee increase measure for The Torch, deciding instead to offer funds from board contingency funds for next year.

IN OTHER ACTION, by unanimous vote, the board approved revised policies on executive directions and emergency president succession; awarded a building control systems contract to Control Contractors Inc. of Portland; approved the purchase of engine lathes for Mechanical Technologies from REM Sales Inc., of Connecticut; approved a three-year contract to purchase Flight Technology gasoline from Flightcraft of Eugene; approved appropriations for financial aid for 1999-00; approved the administrative assistant E-commerce program; directed staff to negotiate a contract with the Metropolitan Affordable Housing Corp. for a Springfield property for priority use for Lane students; and approved the Oregon Community College Legislative Committee budget option featuring a student-based funding model. In personnel action, the board appointed Charles Foster as temporary instructor in Mechanical Technologies, Anne Monroe as instructor in Adult Basic and Secondary Education, and Sandy Stice as temporary instructor in Family and Health Careers. The upcoming retirements of Doris Burkland from Study Skills, Jill McKenney from Mathematics, Richard Null from Science, and Jerry Moskus, president, were accepted. All votes were unanimous.

MONITORING REPORTS were heard on the quarterly financial report, the president's goal of an increased campus presence, and changes in employee headcount.

SPEAKERS FROM THE AUDIENCE advocated efforts to ensure better benefits for construction workers; advocated a more safe and welcoming environment for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students and employees; offered the Black Association of Students and Employees as a resource in the presidential search process; and shared information about student need grants.
