## BOND PROJECT UPDATE

BUSINESS TECHNOLOGIES STAFF including Georgia Nissen and others deserve very special thanks for providing ADA access to the first floor of their building via their storage room, conference room and reception area, while the west sidewalk to the building was torn up for STUDENT SERVICES project access to the utility tunnel. Sidewalk access was restored Friday. Also at the project, 118 yards of concrete was poured Monday. Plans are forming up for a skybridge from the new building to Workforce/Apprenticeship. Classrooms on the north side of Apprenticeship probably will be vacated this summer to facilitate the skybridge connection. Overall, the college, the contractor, the architects and the engineers are all pleased with the smooth and rapid progress the Student Services project.

AN EXTERIOR ELEVATOR to improve ADA access to the Business and Administration buildings will be built as part of the Student Services contract. The elevator will be on the west side of the buildings and a focal point for people entering campus from the west. The elevator will rise up near the existing breezeway and will have four stops serving the upper and lower levels of the two buildings.

CHILD CARE Building 1 has most of the SteelCase furniture, interior signage and lockers installed. Toilet accessories will be installed this week. In Building 2, ceiling lights and floor coverings are being installed. Building 3 exterior siding is complete and interior drywall is 25 percent complete. Building 4 framing and roofing are done, 85 percent of the siding is on, and rough-in electrical should finish up soon.

SCIENCE steel erection is going up smoothly. This will continue for several weeks (work will be halted during finals). So far, noise levels have been mostly moderate and bearable. The south side slab and entrance should be poured this week, weather permitting. Some interior work is being done in the chem labs and duct systems, and some underslab work is continuing during off-hours.

THE CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION upper floor has floor coverings about 75 percent installed. Concrete work is finishing up on the exterior ramps, steps and storage areas. A temporary occupancy permit is hoped for by mid-May to allow Printing/Graphics to begin moving some items. Downstairs, the building inspector has questioned the fire resistive adequacy of the boiler fire enclosure. This question must be satisfied before the boiler can be started.

the Laundry boiler is on schedule to be fired up on May 17. Ted Smouse of Facilities Management and Planning will move the industrial dryers; he was the one who originally installed them in their present location.

HEALTH TECH, Phase One involving the north side lower floor should bid in early May with construction forecast to begin in early July. The additional phases are being carefully scheduled with a completion goal of fall 2001 to accommodate upcoming program accreditation visits in Family and Health Careers.

WELDING has mostly graduated from the Bond project to FMP for follow-up work. Classes are in progress. This is the last planned report on Welding for the bond project updates in the Daily and on the Web.

LTD will move to the east side of campus for summer term only, to allow permanent construction of a west side station. The summer term location will require some ramp work and temporary displacement of some parking. The location will be near Machine Technology and will lead pedestrians into campus via the sidewalk enjoyed by many now for its rich landscaping of daylilies, roses, azaleas and flowering trees.

STAFFING CHANGES coming up for the bond project include the assignment of college architect Tom Oroyan as job project liaison to the Workforce Training Center (Apprenticeship) project. Carpenter Lynn Atkins is liaison to Welding, Campus Services and Student Services, and will be liaison for Health Tech. Carpenter Todd Smith is liaison for Science and Child Care. Thanks are due FMP superintendent Mike Ruiz for making these talented staff available to the bond project, and to all FMP personnel for taking on bond-related duties. Finally, Nancy Nichols will be returning to the communications desk on May 9, taking over for Joan Aschim who is taking a short leave, then returning to Institutional Advancement.

#### FROM THE GROUNDS UP: A REPORT FROM GROUNDSKEEPER FRANK DRENGACZ

You've probably noticed Marty, one of the hard-working work-study students, wandering around campus with a blow torch. Actually, it's a weed burner. It's part of our continuing effort to limit the use of chemicals on inner campus. I feel we have made significant progress in that respect. Fungicides are no longer used at Lane. Insecticides are used only on a limited basis, and not used on plant material. They are used only if complaints are received indicating pests are inside the buildings. That leaves herbicides. Approximately 99 percent of the weeds on inner campus are controlled mechanically. The one percent that we can't hoe are the weeds growing in the sidewalk cracks, along building edges, and in the stairs. The weed burner will be able to control the weeds in the sidewalk cracks and around most buildings, but some buildings have painted surfaces down to the ground level. I'm sure the painters would not appreciate us burning off the paint along with the weeds. The burner also won't work on the stairs because the stairs collect litter, leaves, paper, and, well, I can just see The Torch headline: "LCC burns." They'll have a picture of me on the second floor of the Center Building overlooking Bristow Square, playing a violin as the stairs are ablaze.

When we do use any chemicals, we will post signs at the main entrances of the buildings affected. We will post a pre-spray sign and post-spray sign. We take chemical use very seriously. We are working to find other options to reduce and hopefully replace chemical use. Last year, less than one gallon of Round-up was used on inner campus -- 112 ounces. Now that we have a weed burner, that annual total will continue to decrease.

Gardening hint: (It's not really a gardening hint, but...) Keep workplace treats or sweeteners in air-tight containers. That way we won't have to spray for ants!

The Board of Education and Budget Committee meet Wednesday, May 10. The board will hold closed executive session at 4 p.m. for labor negotiator consultations and legal counsel. The Budget Committee meeting begins at 5:30 p.m. The regular board meeting begins at 7:30 p.m.

Highlights from the 7:30 p.m. board agenda: monitoring reports on the treatment of learners/consumers, and president's goal for management responsibility of outreach instruction; presidential search discussion; first reading of board policy on shared governance; action to name the Junction City learning center; action to approve a statewide pledge of community college unity; and action on ASLCC election results.

## BOND PROJECT UPDATE

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION. Start-up of the laundry's boiler is tentatively scheduled for mid-May. A problem with the boiler's flue is being worked on by the architect and engineers. Otherwise, the first floor is 90 percent complete and Laundry should be able to move in early June. Work on the second floor is 95 percent complete. Printing/Graphics should be able to move miscellaneous items beginning May 18. This week, weather permitting, exterior concrete pouring should be completed.

STUDENT SERVICES. Early this week, weather permitting, the north side slab should be poured, and red iron (steel) erection should begin. Noise levels will be moderate to "the low side of high." The ADA ramp and stairway at the main entrance are ready to pour. Footings for the skybridge to Apprenticeship/Workforce have been poured. Apprenticeship 217 and 218 will be unoccupied this summer to permit connection of the skybridge.

LTD. A pre-bid meeting for construction of the permanent station is tentatively set for May 24. College architect Tom Oroyan will be job liaison.

CHILD CARE. Building 1 move-in has been pushed back a week to May 22, due to delays in the commissioning process for the geothermal heating system, and delays in arrival of the system's starter

motors. A commissioning is a technical hand-off of equipment from the installers to the owners who will maintain the system. The front entry should be poured this week. Building 2 light fixtures are in and floor coverings are going in. Building 3 drywall is 90 percent complete. Building 4 electrical and framing inspections are done and ductwork has been ordered. Outdoor storage and the sandbox will be installed later in the summer to allow more soil settling; this site has underground piping as part of the geothermal heating system which was trenched and loose-filled last year.

SCIENCE. Crews are debating whether Science/Math will be taller than Center when completed, counting the addition's penthouse-level mechanical room. See what you think as steel erection continues this week. The south slab has been partially poured and will be finished this week, weather permitting. Roofing will begin to go up on the east addition. Some additional interior walls to be altered are being checked for asbestos. Fans specified for the classrooms are too noisy and different fans will be ordered. Some cabinet and sink changes are under discussion.

OVERALL, the high quality of college-built cabinetry continues to evoke admiring comments from construction professionals and lay users alike. Steve Kayl is Lane's chief cabinet-maker.

HEALTH TECH. The north-side first-floor remodel is tentatively set to begin construction in July 2000. Bond management is optimistic that the remodel will help solve air quality problems throughout the building.

Below is a list of very basic supplies which should be in all kits. However, some areas will need more extensive supplies. Student Health staff will gladly work with different areas

to help you determine what supplies your kit should contain. Just call Ext. 2665 for a free consultation!

Minimal recommended supplies:

- Gauze pads 3" x 3" or larger - about 6
- Gauze pads 8" x 10" or larger - about 6
- Adhesive bandages - different sizes are nice
- Gauze roller bandage 2" wide - 1 or 2
- Triangular bandage
- Wound cleansing agent ( soap and water located nearby is sufficient)
- Emergency blanket - one of those small ones you get in outdoor stores.
- Latex gloves - several pairs
- CPR shield

As important as what is in your kit is what is not in your kit. You are strongly urged not to put any over-the-counter medications in your kit. The purpose of the kits is to provide emergency care -- not to treat minor illnesses. You, and the school, can incur liability if these are not used correctly. Examples would be Aspirin, Ibuprofen, burn ointment, wound treatment creams, eye drops, cough drops, etc. A nice selection of over the counter medications are for sale in the Bookstore. Students can receive many of these items, and assistance in using them correctly, at Student Health.

### WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER NEWS

For some time, the tentative construction schedule has listed the Workforce Training Center as going out to bid in early June, with work slated to begin in early August. However, due to an unforeseen health issue with one of the architects, as well as necessary changes to the kitchen design, the WTC project will be delayed slightly. The updated construction schedule indicates that the project will go out for bid in September, with work commencing in November. Because of the delay, the WTC project will

now be divided into two parts, as was the case with the Math/Science addition last year. During the first phase, which begins this summer, site preparation will take place. In doing this, preparation costs can be minimized by avoiding inclement weather conditions during the fall. Information on the site preparation bid will be released shortly. The second phase of the project will begin when the construction bid goes out this September. Although the unexpected three-month postponement is regrettable, the Bond Management Team believes fewer change orders will be necessary with the WTC undertaking, which will help keep costs within budget. #### EARTH DAY GARBAGE SORT ILLUSTRATES NEED TO REDUCE, REUSE AND RECYCLE

On Wednesday, April 19, as Lane was celebrating Earth Day, student and staff volunteers sorted the trash that housekeeping personnel collected the previous day. The volunteers pulled out and recycled one-half bag of aluminum, one-half bag of glass, one bag of plastic, and six bags of paper. They also sorted out six bags of paper cups. According to these results, the trash contained by volume 8 percent recyclable cans and bottles; 24 percent recyclable paper; and 24 percent paper cups. Fifty-six percent of the material that was thrown away could have been eliminated by recycling and using a reusable mug. Taking these two simple steps could cut Lane's \$50,000 annual garbage bill in half. ### BOND UPDATE

TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF ACCESS ROADS ADJACENT TO THE CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION ON MAY 23 AND MAY 24. Due to asphalt paving and curbing work, the access road that leads to the north of the Campus Services Addition, where the warehouse and purchasing are located, will be closed this Tuesday and Wednesday, May 23 and 24. On both days, vehicle access to the warehouse and purchasing can only occur from the west, past the mail room. Additionally, the access road to the east side of the Campus Services Addition, which leads to Auto Tech, Air Tech and Machine Tech, may be blocked for short periods of time by paving equipment.

LAUNDRY AND PRINTING/GRAPHICS NEAR COMPLETION. With over 90 percent of the work completed and in anticipation of a June 1 startup date, two new washers have been delivered to the Campus Services Addition. Facilities Management and Planning staff are coordinating installation of the washers, one of which weighs 10,000 pounds. The Printing and Graphics project, which is 95 percent complete, began portions of its move last week and will continue moving through Wednesday, May 31. Exterior concrete has been poured, allowing asphalt paving to begin Tuesday, May 23.

STUDENT SERVICES REMAINS ON SCHEDULE as more slab is poured and red iron erected. Footings have also been poured for the sky bridge that will run between the existing Apprenticeship Building and the new Student Services Building.

CONCRETE AND STEEL WORK CONTINUES ON THE SCIENCE ADDITION. The majority of the concrete work on the first floor has been completed while remaining portions of steel are still being set in

the west addition. This week, work on the 2nd floor should become obvious as flooring, framing and roofing activities begin.

BUILDING NO. 1 OF THE CHILD CARE PROJECT NEARS ANTICIPATED MOVE-IN DATE OF Tuesday, May 30. With installation of Steelcase furniture and floor coverings complete, plumbing activities are underway, which will put the finishing touches on the new home of Lane Family Connections. Building No. 2 has approximately 90 percent of the floors covered, with casework installation currently underway. The mechanical room in Building No. 3 has been completed. Currently, drywall preparation work is underway. The completion of insulation work in Building No. 4 has allowed start-up of drywall activity. Work on the exterior siding is being buttoned up.

#### INNOVATION OF THE YEAR AWARD FOR LANE

We are proud to announce that the Innovation of the Year Award for 1999-2000 goes to the Lane County Undergraduate Teacher Education Program. This program grew out of a demand by pre-education majors at Lane. Many of these students needed to maintain their residence in the district, yet there were not enough education major transfer slots in the two local schools of higher education to accommodate the Lane transfer students. Pacific University was contacted, and a unique partnership between Lane and Pacific University resulted in the Lane County Undergraduate Teacher Education Program. The program allows a seamless transfer and completion of an associate arts degree, a bachelor's degree, and teacher licensure with four years of continuous hands-on experience.

This is a cost-effective program for the student who pays community college tuition for the first two years, followed by generous scholarship and aid support from Pacific University for the final two years. The first graduating class of Spring 2001 is finishing its third year this May, with a 100 percent retention rate and high ratings by their mentor teachers and Pacific University staff. 1. OSA is hosting a "Youth Debate" between secretary of state candidates Lynn Snodgrass (current speaker of the Oregon house), and Bill Bradbury, current secretary of state. It hopes to host the debate in the fall at OHSU. A panel of young people will ask questions, and a young moderator and lots of media presence will focus on issues that the younger generation is concerned about. The secretary of state position is an important governmental post. It is second to the governor, and people often move on from this position to other important governmental positions. (Sen.
