GUIDELINES FOR USING THE COLLEGE LOGO

The college has established guidelines for using the college logo, which are summarized below. Print the logo in one color, preferably either black or the college's blue (PMS 287); the two-color version on the college's home page is strictly for that format and should not be used in print form. NEW PROJECT WILL PROVIDE MORE SCHEDULING OPTIONS

Have you ever thought about how courses or parts of courses could be scheduled better? If so, you have the opportunity to share your ideas before you leave for the summer. Lane is looking at creating

new schedules and formats for learning, and your ideas will be considered seriously. A new project team has been developed for this purpose. It's sponsored by SLI, a faculty-led partnership with the administration to improve the learning environment at Lane. Examples of possible opportunities include: offering more intensive courses in the evenings; breaking courses into modules that can be taken at any speed and repeated during the term, so that credit is not lost and courses do not need to be repeated in their entirety; providing alternatives to 50-minute lecture classes; and offering five-day school weeks. AWCC OFFERS LEADERSHIP AWARD TO WOMEN STUDENTS

The LCC Chapter of the American Association of Women in Community Colleges is soliciting applications from eligible women students for its fourth annual leadership award, designed to "assist and encourage women students at Lane to become leaders, giving voice to women who might otherwise not be heard." A one-year \$1,500 scholarship will be paid in three equal disbursements in the 2000-01 academic year. Payment is contingent upon enrollment status of at least half-time and satisfactory academic progress (3.0 GPA). The award also will pay the applicable costs of the recipient attending an appropriate leadership or professional conference in Oregon, up to \$500. An AAWCC member will serve as mentor to the recipient during her award year. LANE FAMILY CONNECTIONS IS THE FIRST OCCUPANT OF THE NEW CHILD-CARE FACILITIES, with a successful move taking place on May 30. WHAT DID LANE STUDENTS TELL US?

- In the recently completed ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes:
1. Ninety-six (96) percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's general environment is welcoming and accepting to all students, regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age or sexual orientation;
 2. Ninety-six (96) percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's instructors strive to create a classroom environment that is comfortable and fair to all students, regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age or sexual orientation;
 3. It was important to 42 percent of the respondents to be able to take on-line/Internet-based courses;
 4. Twenty-eight (28) percent of the respondents thought it was important to be able to complete an entire degree through distance learning;
 5. Fifty-one (51) percent of the respondents indicated they would support a \$1-increase per credit in tuition to increase offerings of popular classes.

LCC TO CELEBRATE OPENING OF JUNCTION CITY CENTER

Landscaping has been done, and, according to the staff at the Junction City School District office, the Lane Community College Jim Pitney Learning Center at Junction City High School is "looking good." On Tuesday, June 13 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., Lane Community College and the residents of Junction City will celebrate the realization of a dream -- providing the rural community with greater access to community college offerings through a comprehensive learning center at the local high school. Festivities will include recognition of long-time college board member and Junction City resident Jim Pitney and a formal dedication of the center at 6 p.m., demonstrations, informational tables, student services, entertainment and refreshments. The center is located at 1135 W. 6th St. in Junction City.

"The community is excited about the opportunities Lane's learning center will provide residents and high school students in the area," says Junction City School District Superintendent Don Anderson. "Many people will have the opportunity to further their education that might never have considered it previously." Although Lane has offered classes in the area since 1965, the new 5,000-square-foot facility provides significantly expanded access to college classes and services. Lane President Jerry Moskus attributes the success of the project to the collaboration between Lane and the Junction City School District. "This is a shared facility between Lane, the high school and the community," says Moskus. "Without the school district's willingness to build on-site, this wouldn't have happened."

The college and the school district realize significant savings by sharing infrastructure costs. The center will offer a variety of credit and continuing education classes such as telecourses, online courses, and independent and guided learning studies, as well as traditional classroom instruction. Services include college admissions, registration, payment services, testing and information about Lane programs and financial aid. Internet and e-mail access is available for \$1 per hour or \$25 per term. Facilities include a computer lab, a large classroom, a small conference room available to community groups, two restrooms and two entrances, an exterior entrance for the public and an entrance directly into the high school. High school students will use the center during college off-hours, and the college will use high school rooms for some evening classes. Lane has opened similar centers at Thurston, Willamette, Oakridge, Churchill, McKenzie and Elmira high schools. A minicenter is available at Harrisburg High School. NOTIFICATION OF UPCOMING POWER SHUT-DOWN on Saturday, JUNE 24 from 8 a.m. to 12 noon. Electricians will be making final hook-ups to the new transformer that will supply power to the Science/Math addition. Science, Electronics, Electronics Annex, and Forum buildings are effected.

HEADS UP FOR PARTIAL CLOSURE OF THE SOUTH PARKING LOT beginning in late June. Due to construction work associated with the new, second-story entrance to the Science/Math addition, a portion of the upper, south parking lot will be blocked off for approximately two weeks. The closure will encompass only the first tier area of the south lot, inclusive of the first drive-down entrance off Eldon Schaffer Drive, directly west to the corner of the construction company's cyclone fence.

HAVE THINGS CHANGED? DO YOU WANT TO HEAD OFF UNNECESSARY COSTS? Considering that designs were developed approximately one year ago for projects that are in various stages of the construction process, it is critical to notify the bond management team if your department has had a change of thinking in regard to the following issues: Have you decided to position equipment somewhere other than where indicated on finalized architectural designs? Are you interested in ordering different equipment than was originally in mind when designs were completed? As important, have new ways of thinking somehow been translated into assumptions about spatial relationships within new or remodeled spaces? Remember, construction will take place as specified on finalized architectural plans. Neglecting to communicate changes in equipment, or its positioning, and different ways of thinking about areas under construction, can result in costly change orders, as well as delays in construction.

IT'S A GREAT TIME TO DO "SPRING CLEANING," for those departments getting ready to move to temporary locations during construction work. Just like our personal residences, sometimes work materials and objects are held onto that are no longer relevant or able to be used. The "moving team" encourages departments to consider streamlining repositioning of their areas by "reducing, recycling, and archiving" those materials and objects that do not need to be transported. In so doing, labor and materials will be freed up to provide a more efficient, effective and satisfying move.

KUDOS TO THE SCIENCE STAFF AND FACULTY as they continue to work effectively and collaboratively with the "bond moving team" in transferring nothing less than a magnitude of complex materials out of the Science building in time for scheduled remodeling.

CHILDCARE FACILITY INCHES CLOSER TO ANOTHER COMPLETION as Building No. 2 received a "punch list" walk-through to review the status of completed work prior to any final inspections. Building No. 3 is proceeding with interior, detail work, while interior walls are being painted in Building No. 4.

CHANGE OF STATUS OF DEPENDENT CHILDREN INFORMATION

Your dependent children should be deleted from medical, vision and dental insurance coverage when they no longer qualify as dependents. A dependent child is defined as one who is unmarried, under

age 25 or 23 for Oregon Dental Service, who is residing with you or is a full-time student, and reported as a dependent on your income tax statement. When a dependent loses eligibility status, they may be eligible to continue group insurance coverage by applying within 60 days of the qualifying event and paying the premiums. ACT STUDENT OPINION SURVEY: PART TWO

What did students tell us? On the recently completed ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes:

1. Thirty-seven (37) percent of the respondents reported they occasionally or frequently experienced difficulty using Classline to register for classes;
2. Thirty-two (32) percent of the respondents reported they would prefer to register for classes using the Internet rather than using Classline, and 33 percent were not sure they would prefer the Internet for registration;
3. Eighty (80) percent of the respondents reported they had access to a computer when they were away from Lane;
4. Twenty-five (25) percent of the students said they would support a technology fee to be paid by all students to improve the availability of computers and related equipment on campus; 31 percent would not support this fee; and 44 percent were not sure. WHAT IS JUNETEENTH?

What is Juneteenth? Juneteenth is the oldest known celebration of the ending of slavery. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19 that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that all slaves were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which had become official Jan. 1, 1863. Later attempts to explain the two and a half year-delay in the receipt of this important news have yielded several versions that have been handed down through the years. On Jan. 1, 1980, Juneteenth became an official state holiday in Texas through the efforts of Al Edwards, an African American state legislator. The successful passage of this bill marked Juneteenth as the first emancipation celebration granted official state recognition. Today Juneteenth celebrates African American freedom, while encouraging self-development and respect for all cultures all over the nation. FIRST AID KIT REMINDER

All work areas are required to have a first aid kit that is available to staff to treat minor injuries. In the past there was a list of standard supplies required to be in the kit. However, this has now been changed, and each area needs to determine what injuries are likely to occur in their area and provide appropriate supplies in their kit. Below is a list of very basic supplies, which should be in all kits. However, some areas will need more extensive supplies. Student Health staff will gladly work with different areas to help them determine what supplies your kit should contain. Just call Ext. 2665 for a free consultation.

Minimal recommended supplies:

- Gauze pads 3 inch by 3 inch or larger -- about 6
- Gauze pads 8 inch by 10 inch or larger -- about 6
- Adhesive bandages -- different sizes are nice
- Gauze roller bandage, 2-inch-wide -- 1 or 2
- Triangular bandage
- Wound cleansing agent (soap and water located nearby is sufficient)
- Emergency blanket -- like the small ones available in outdoor stores
- Latex gloves -- several pairs
- CPR shield

As important as what goes into the kit is what is not in the kit. You are strongly urged not to put any over-the-counter medications in your kit. The purpose of the kits is to provide emergency care -- not

to treat minor illnesses. You, and the school, can incur liability if these are not used correctly. Examples would be aspirin, Ibuprofen, burn ointment, wound treatment creams, eye drops, cough drops, etc. A nice selection of over-the-counter medications are for sale in the Bookstore. LANE TO CELEBRATE OPENING OF JUNCTION CITY CENTER

Landscaping has been done, and, according to the staff at the Junction City School District office, the Lane Community College Jim Pitney Learning Center at Junction City High School is "looking good." On Tuesday, June 13 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., Lane Community College and the residents of Junction City will celebrate the realization of a dream -- providing the rural community with greater access to community college offerings through a comprehensive learning center at the local high school. Festivities will include recognition of long-time college board member and Junction City resident Jim Pitney and a formal dedication of the center at 6 p.m., demonstrations, informational tables, student services, entertainment and refreshments. The center is located at 1135 W. 6th St. in Junction City. "The community is excited about the opportunities Lane's learning center will provide residents and high school students in the area," says Junction City School District Superintendent Don Anderson. "Many people will have the opportunity to further their education that might never have considered it previously."

Although Lane has offered classes in the area since 1965, the new 5,000-square-foot facility provides significantly expanded access to college classes and services. Lane President Jerry Moskus attributes the success of the project to the collaboration between Lane and the Junction City School District. "This is a shared facility between Lane, the high school and the community," says Moskus. "Without the school district's willingness to build on-site, this wouldn't have happened." The college and the school district realize significant savings by sharing infrastructure costs. The center will offer a variety of credit and continuing education classes such as telecourses, online courses, and independent and guided learning studies, as well as traditional classroom instruction.

Services include college admissions, registration, payment services, testing and information about Lane programs and financial aid. Internet and e-mail access is available for \$1 per hour or \$25 per term. Facilities include a computer lab, a large classroom, a small conference room available to community groups, two restrooms and two entrances, an exterior entrance for the public and an entrance directly into the high school. High school students will use the center during college off-hours, and the college will use high school rooms for some evening classes. Lane has opened similar centers at Thurston, Willamette, Oakridge, Churchill, McKenzie and Elmira high schools. A minicenter is available at Harrisburg High School. Voters endorsed the centers as part of Lane's \$42.8 million construction bond. For more information, call the Community Learning Centers main office at Ext. 2907. JUNE BOARD MEETING

Lane's Board of Education tackled a full agenda on June 14. Highlights include adoption of the 2000-01 budget, approval of the faculty contract, and a board policy on shared governance. The board also talked by phone with former Lane president Dale Parnell, who was hired as a consultant to the board in its search for a successor to President Moskus. Moskus will retire next summer. The minutes of the board's May meeting will be posted on the Web later today. The minutes of the June meeting will be posted next month after the board approves them. The infant child care center will be continued for at least one more year using \$18,000 from Strategic Projects. Mailers listing classes for the community learning centers also will be continued for one year with \$10,000 from Strategic Projects. In addition, \$25,000 in Strategic Project money was earmarked to promote 2001 summer term offerings. Diane Dann, Ext. 2592.

BOND UPDATE THIS WEEK IS COMPRISED OF TWO PARTS

The first portion of the update is the "Bond Projects Status Report" as it was delivered by Bob Mention to the Board of Education at the June 14 meeting. Complimenting Mention's report are details concerning individual projects and noteworthy bond activities.

THE BOND PROJECT STATUS REPORT:

* Community Learning Centers: Yesterday (June 13) an "Open House" was held at the Junction City Community Learning Center. Classes will be held beginning summer term. All Community Learning Centers have been completed and are in operation.

* Main Campus Projects:

-- Welding Technology Building: The building has been completed and classes for welding and jewelry programs are being held. There are still a few things which need to be done by facilities staff and the contractor.

-- Childcare Center: This project is on schedule. Building No. 1 has been completed. Lane Family Connections has moved from its former location on Willamette Street and is now in operation. Building No. 2 is scheduled for completion by the end of June. Buildings Nos. 3 and 4 are scheduled for completion in early July.

-- Campus Services addition: Despite a few last-minute code issues, Occupancy Permits have been issued, and both Printing/Graphics and Laundry have moved and are now operating.

-- Science-Math Building: The structural steel frame is 90 percent in place, 50 percent of the concrete decks have been poured, and exterior steel studs and HVAC units have been placed. Remodel of the existing Science building has started and is scheduled to be completed by late September -- in time for fall term classes.

-- Student Services building: Our "dream job" continues; there have been few problems and construction is on schedule. The structural steel frame is being erected, and the steel deck is being placed.

-- Workforce Training Center: Some changes have had to be made in the schedule of this project due to health problems in the architect's office. The project will not be ready to go out to bid until September instead of August, as was previously planned. This means that construction will not begin until November. Consequently, the project will be broken into two parts: site preparation and the building itself. This is similar to what was done for the Math/Science project. The plan is for site preparation work to be done this summer.

-- Remodel of the Health Technology building: Bids for Phase 1 of this project have been opened, and the low bid is within our budget. The board will be asked to award a contract. Construction should begin in July. Completion is planned for February 2001.

-- Infrastructure Upgrade: No change from May report.

-- Sewage Lagoon Upgrade: A proposal to share the sewage lagoons with the Oregon Military Department is under discussion.

-- LTD/LCC Bus Station: Bid documents went out to bidders on June 6. Bids are to be opened Friday, June 23. It is important to begin construction as soon as possible to complete work by the start of fall term 2000. (This ends the Bond Projects Status Report of June 14, 2000.)

BOARD AWARDS HEALTH TECH REMODEL CONTRACT to Essex General Construction for \$681,000 at June 14 meeting. In addition to the base bid, alternates were approved for construction of additional offices and a fan motor upgrade. An alternate for HVAC digital controls is currently under consideration. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin mid-July.

PLANNERS FROM THE OREGON MILITARY DEPARTMENT face considerable opposition to cooperative lagoon proposal. The Oregon Military Department (National Guard) is in the design phase of planning an armory to be constructed across 30th Avenue from Lane. The planners have approached Lane with a proposal to become partners in the upgrade of Lane's sewage lagoons, already part of the Bond Project plan. Many people strongly voiced concerns at the June 14 board meeting regarding the proposal for Lane to become partners with the National Guard in the lagoon upgrade. Lane faculty, residents in the vicinity of Bloomberg Road, and residents of the greater Eugene area expressed varied opinions about why the lagoon project should take place solely as a Lane project to the exclusion of the Oregon Military Department. It is undetermined whether Lane will partner with the National Guard in this project, until further inquiry has taken place regarding the upgrade on the sewage lagoons.

MILLENNIUM 2 PROJECT SIGNS AT MAIN CAMPUS ENTRANCES DISPLAY THAT BOND CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS has reached 40 percent completion. Approximately \$21.3 million of the \$53.2 million budget has been expended. The budget includes the \$42.8 million bond measure approved by voters, plus interest. Main campus projects underway include the Childcare buildings, Campus Services addition, Science/Math addition, Student Services building, and shortly, the Health Technology remodel. Funds also have been used to build a new center in Cottage Grove, to add to the Florence Center, and to build Community Learning centers at eight county high schools.

TEMPORARY RELOCATION OF THE LTD BUS STATION is scheduled, subject to change, for July 7. Relocation of the temporary stop will allow construction to commence on the permanent LTD stop at the main Lane entrance next to Dale Parnell Loop. Additionally, several activities will take place in order that construction on the permanent site can proceed. First, the temporary bus stop will move to the lowest parking level area of the east parking lot. This parking area provides easy access to the "east walk" that proceeds west, past the Daylily Garden, and ends at the courtyard between Machine Technology and the Center building. Second, approximately one third of the west parking lot will be closed off with cyclone fencing so that construction work can take place. The closure will apply to areas on the east side of the parking lot, or those areas closest to where LTD is currently stopping. And lastly, one-way traffic on a section of Dale Parnell Loop will temporarily accommodate two-way traffic; specifically, at the point

where Gonyea Road becomes Dale Parnell Loop and makes the sweep left (east), running in one direction straight towards the Student Services building construction site, traffic will become two-way on or about Friday, July 7 until completion of construction. USE EXTREME CAUTION WHEN DRIVING ON THE WEST SIDE OF CAMPUS ADJACENT TO THE MAIN PARKING LOT AND UP THE HILL TO THE TERRACED PARKING AREAS! Development of intercampus, directional and site location signage for the new bus location is currently underway. Pictures of the temporary LTD bus stop are available at the bond Web site. Go to Lane's home page, select College Business, pick Bond Construction, then choose "LTD" under "Individual Projects."

OCCUPANTS OF THE FIRST FLOOR OF HEALTH TECHNOLOGY are now packing to meet a July 1 deadline for vacancy. Offices and/or classrooms for Culinary Arts, the Child Development Center, Early Childhood Education, Foods & Nutrition, and dental offices will be moved to temporary storage until respective locations are ready to be occupied.

WORK ON ACCESS LANE FOR CHILDCARE BUILDINGS IS UNDERWAY. A road that will accommodate service vehicles as well as provide a fire lane entrance to all the Childcare buildings is being developed in readiness for the pouring of concrete. Exterior painting on all buildings is 95 percent complete. Building No. 1 is completely occupied as staff from both Early Childhood Education and the Child Development Center have moved out of their offices in the Health Technology building and into their new offices adjacent to Lane Family Connections. Building No. 2 continues to be on schedule for a June occupancy by the Infant Toddler Center as finishing touches are being carried out. Building No. 3, which will house the services of both Early Childhood Education and the Child Development Center, is in the stages of suspended ceiling and light work that will enable floor covering to be laid shortly. The ASLCC Childcare Co-op awaits a move into Building No. 4; painting has been completed, and ceiling insulation is underway.

MULTIPLE, SIMULTANEOUS ACTIVITIES ARE UNDERWAY WITH THE SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION. The upper housing of the west addition has been framed, and roofing will begin this week. Steel stud framing on the 1st floor is approximately 85 percent complete, and work proceeds on mechanical systems housed in the ceiling of the 1st floor. Within the current Science building, contractors have begun demolition work, and the power circuits have been cut out and walls dismantled. Contractors were able to begin work in isolated areas of the building as Science personnel completed their move. The Bond management team extends thanks and appreciation to the entire Science staff and the Bond moving team for their outstanding, collaborative efforts in clearing the building.

LAUNDRY SERVICES COMPLETE MOVE-IN IS DELAYED due to insufficient storage of hot water that resulted from an engineering error. The insufficiency was discovered only when the washing machines were tested. The Bond management team is working with the engineers to remedy the hot water deficiency ASAP because this situation directly influences activity on the remodel of Health Technology, as well as Laundry's heavy work load during summer months.

WORK ON THE MAIN ENTRANCE PLAZA OF STUDENT SERVICES proceeds as areas of future steps and plateaus begin to take shape. Removal of the LTD bus shelter next to the Apprenticeship building is underway while the slab is being poured on second floor decking.

LANE'S JIM PITNEY LEARNING CENTER AT JUNCTION CITY HIGH SCHOOL celebrated the facility's grand opening on June 13. With its completion, the Junction City center brings the final, total number of CLCs constructed with bond funds to eight. The center was officially dedicated to long-time Junction City resident Jim Pitney, who served the Lane Board of Education from 1975 to 1999. Approximately 200 people attended the festivities to hear comments by President Jerry Moskus, Vice President Larry Warford, and various leaders from the Junction City community. The new, 4,400-square-foot center includes a computer lab, a large classroom, a small conference room available to community groups, a testing room, and a reception area. The center will offer a variety of credit and continuing education classes such as telecourses, online courses, and independent and guided learning studies as well as traditional classroom instruction. Voters endorsed the centers as part of Lane's \$42.8 million construction bond. For more information, call the Community Learning Center main office in Eugene at Ext. 2907. DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

EMERGENCY BOARD APPROVES \$1.9 MILLION FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES

* ACTION: On Friday, June 23, the full committee of the Emergency Board approved \$1.9 million for community college funding. In a previous subcommittee meeting, Rep. Kurt Schrader (Clackamas) encouraged community colleges to return in November for an additional \$2.56 million -- the remainder of their unfunded \$4.5 million request. Schrader said he wants community colleges to be "first in the que" for any available funds as a result of decreased special allocation resources. However, members of the committee said that community colleges must provide the Legislative Fiscal Office with more data to substantiate the request, based on estimated and realized enrollment growth.

* BACKGROUND: The Department of Administrative Services supported the Community College and Workforce Development's request for \$4.5 million, and the LFO supported \$1.9 million. LFO's estimates show that community colleges need \$9 million, but indicate that \$7 million would flow from additional tuition and student aid, resulting in the \$1.9 million allocation. BOND UPDATE

BIDS FOR THE PERMANENT LTD BUS STATION were opened on Friday, June 23. The current bus station is still scheduled to move temporarily to the loop in the east parking lot on or about July 7. Staff from Facilities Management & Planning are working on a new, permanent ADA ramp that will allow access to the relocated bus station via the east pathway. The new ramp will be located near the southwest corner of the Machine Technology building. As soon as a definite moving date is known, the Bond Communication Office will notify main campus users via The Daily and *@* alerts, and with signage.

LAUNDRY SERVICES IS IN FULL-SWING in the Campus Services addition. While the engineers are still working to remedy issues concerning the boiler, laundry can now be processed at maximum capacity because a second shift was added at night. The night crew will handle washing duties, while the day crew will be responsible for drying and related activities. In this way, the current facility can accommodate the workload of Laundry Services during the busiest season of the year. The cost of running the second crew is being absorbed by the engineering firm. With Laundry Services operating solely out of the Campus Services addition, remodeling activities for the Health Tech building are able to proceed on schedule. In conjunction with the moving activities of the Health Tech departments, Laundry Services will move any remaining equipment and supplies out of the Health Tech building by the end of June.

THE HEALTH TECHNOLOGY REMODEL is fully involved in the first phases of the project as moving activities are being carried out. Thanks to the packing efforts of personnel from Culinary Arts, the Child Development Center, Early Childhood Education, Foods & Nutrition, and Dental Programs, the areas scheduled for remodeling are on target for a June 30 vacancy. Professional removal of asbestos is contracted to take place at the end of the week of June 26.

STUDENT SERVICES has received an additional shipment of red iron. Erection of the iron is currently being conducted by Western Pneumatics. Concrete work on the second floor has commenced, and 70 yards of concrete are being poured in just the first section of work. Two more sections remain to be poured.

CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION EXIST SIDE-BY-SIDE IN THE SCIENCE BUILDING. Contractors have demolished the necessary interior walls, allowing framing of new walls to take place. Classroom 115 already has metal studs erected, redefining existing space in the former, terraced lecture room. The central area where faculty offices were located is completely cleared out and is being readied for construction activities. Regarding exterior work, erection of south addition steel has recently started. In the west addition, the second floor, concrete slab is complete. Currently, work on mechanical and electrical systems, steel stud framing, and roofing are underway. (Be sure to check out the Bond Web site for interior pictures of the remodeling.)

THE CHILDCARE FACILITY will undergo a simultaneous move of Buildings No. 2 and No. 3 during July. Although Building No. 2 is complete except for a few minor code variances, moving will be postponed until next month. Hyland Construction is still in the process of constructing the fire lane that runs between the child-care buildings. Therefore, the inspector will not allow activities in the area by general Lane personnel because of "life/safety" issues. Allowing personnel into the greater child-care area would simply not be safe. In reality, the postponement is not a hardship on Early Childhood Education or the Child Development Center because both departments do not operate during the summer months. Ceiling and light fixtures in Building No. 3 continue to be installed. Ceiling grid work is underway in Building No. 4.

PRINTING & GRAPHICS has already been in its new location for three weeks. Just in case you are not sure of where to take your printing orders, the following information should be helpful. The main entrance to Printing & Graphics is the last door on the south side of the Campus Services building. If you are coming from the Center building, go to the Campus Services main entrance area, turn right, and walk between the Auto Tech and Campus Services buildings until you are almost at the end of the Campus Services facility. The last door of the Campus Services building is the main entrance for Printing & Graphics.

LANE STUDENT REAPS NUMEROUS BENEFITS FROM CAMPUS PROGRAMS

Amy Jensen had a built-in cheering section at Lane's class of 2000 graduation ceremony last month. Besides her four-and-a-half-year-old son and parents, Amy's 15 siblings attended. She is second to the oldest among the children, but explains that she also has two adopted brothers who are the same age. Amy, who finishes her AA degree (Oregon Transfer) at Lane this summer, says she's the first member of her family to ever attend college. She entered Lane through the TRIO program after taking a few classes at the Cottage Grove campus. TRIO Learning Center is a federally funded program aimed to help students stay in school and successfully graduate from Lane before transferring to a four-year institution. The program offers an array of services to its students, including tutoring, computer labs, mentoring, and personal and career counseling. Part of the eligibility criteria include having neither parent with a four-year degree, or passing certain financial criteria, or having a documented disability.

Concurrently, Amy has been completing an elementary education degree at Pacific University. She is one of 18 students who are participating in Lane's program with Pacific, designed specifically to give Lane students an opportunity to complete their AA and bachelor's degrees, and participate in a teacher licensure program that offers practicum experience. While completing her schooling and raising her son, Amy also has maintained a 4.0 grade point average at Pacific University and a 3.98 at Lane, while working part-time at a local credit union. A Ford scholarship has given her the opportunity to stay in school without working full-time, she says, and has even paid for her son's child-care at Lane. Amy is considering going on for her master's degree before applying for a teaching job. She says she is able to meet the demands of her packed schedule because "I never sleep." Describing her experiences at Lane, Amy says she has particularly appreciated the small class sizes. She described Lane's instructors as supportive, understanding, and passionate about teaching. "I was happy to stay as long as I did," she says.
