TRIO STUDENT PERFORMANCE REFLECTS STRONG PROGRAM SUPPORT

Lane's Women in Transition class quickly beckoned Tina Sledge to pursue her dreams. After completing the class in 1997, Sledge enrolled as a full-time accounting major through the TRIO program. Now en route to the University of Oregon to complete her bachelor's degree in business, Tina is excited for her future but sad to leave Lane's supportive learning environment behind. "Lane is here for the learner," says Sledge, who was the recipient of the Ida M. Crawford scholarship award in '99, followed by a NASP award, and then a Ford Opportunity Scholarship.

She credits the Women's Program, and Jill Bradley in particular, for encouraging her to enter the door of higher education, explaining that the transition program offered her "the safest feeling (I) ever had in a group." Sledge had known for some time that she had an aptitude for the business world and business-related coursework because she had received awards in high school for her performance in similar classes and projects. So the results of the career planning and placement tests she completed as part of the transitions class were all the nudge she needed to pursue a career in accounting. Sledge was apprehensive about beginning school in her 40s, but she could feel herself becoming a stronger student each academic quarter. "I knew if I went step by step, I would build a strong foundation," she says.

Her apprehension was also soothed by other supportive programs and instructors at Lane. "Lane has excellent instructors," Sledge says, "but I can't say enough praise about the math and writing instructors." And as a TRIO student, she experienced "a sense of belonging...the feeling that it was safe to learn and to learn more efficiently." Signing up for practical classes such as "Essential Study Skills" and taking advantage of TRIO program's tutors also contributed to her growing self-assurance. "I got the confidence I needed to apply for a scholarship," she says.

Tina also credits her two daughters, ages 11 and 15, with her success as a student. "We're doing it together," she says.

BOND UPDATE

LTD BUS STATION RELOCATION IS PUSHED BACK APPROXIMATELY ONE WEEK. The targeted date is on or about Friday, July 14. Currently, gLAs architectural firm is preparing the owner contract agreements for construction of the bus station. After completing the paperwork, Hyland Construction will begin construction. As soon as a specific date for relocation is known, the information will be immediately conveyed by a *@* e-mail, and as an alert on the Internet at the bond home page. (Go to LCC's home page, click on College Business and then Bond Construction.) Updates on the relocation date to the east parking lot loop will also be released on Student Activities bulletin boards and the special stanchion at the west entrance by the main fountain. In anticipation of the relocation, the concrete loading dock has been poured in the east parking loop.

THE START-UP DATE FOR HEALTH TECH SHOULD BE DETERMINED THIS WEEK when the Bond Project Management Team meets with Essex Construction for initial pre-construction meetings. In preparation for construction, moving activities are finishing up within areas initially slated for remodeling, allowing contractors to begin demolition within the former areas that have housed the Culinary Arts department. Removal of asbestos in the vacated Laundry facility is complete.

INSTALLATION OF INFRASTRUCTURE IN STUDENT SERVICES IS UNDERWAY, while work on the sprinkler and HVAC systems unfolds. Exterior work is highlighted by the erection of steel arches atop the building. Configuration of the forms for the main entrance and plaza continue. The second floor has had approximately half of the concrete flooring poured.

THE FIRE LANE FOR THE CHILDCARE CENTER has been poured. Tricycle paths adjacent to buildings No. 2 and No. 4 have been staked out, and excavation will commence this week. Landscaping will begin the latter part of this month. Building No. 2 is essentially completed and waiting on final occupancy permits. Installation of cabinetry is taking place in Building No. 3, while floor covering is being laid down in Building No. 4.

GYPSUM SIDING IS UP ON THE WEST SIDE OF THE SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION. The current siding is in the initial phase of construction, which will culminate in a final brick exterior. The main entrance, which is located directly adjacent to the lowest south parking lot, has taken on tremendous definition with the erection of all entry-way steel, barrel trusses and metal decking. Interior remodeling is progressing well within schedule.

TWO SHIFTS IN LAUNDRY SERVICES CONTINUE TO COVER DEMANDS of the heavy workload that must be met during summer months. Engineers are maintaining strong efforts toward a resolution of hot water storage issues.

I imagine some of you on the west side of campus feel as if you are working in the middle of the Mojave Desert. Well, you are close. Because of the new Student Services construction, the irrigation main line for the west side of campus has been disconnected. For this reason the west lawns are beginning to dry out. Unfortunately, the main line can not be reconnected until construction is complete in spring 2001. The lawns will go dormant this summer, but with fall rains, they will green up again. The plantings, including the wildflowers in front of Administration, should do just fine. Speaking of the wildflowers -- I think I've been victimized by some eco-terrorists. Most of the wildflower beds are doing great. However, some of the beds came up 98 percent pigweed. We are starting over on those beds. We will reseed the upper west Center and the upper west Forum beds this week. Actually, these beds were the last to be seeded last spring. Apparently, the pigweed got a head start on the wildflowers. The initial phase of landscaping for Welding will be completed by the first week of July. Child care landscaping will not start until late July. This break should allow the bond crew to start erecting the greenhouse. Dan is working hard on Mondays with the portable blower to clean off all the high-use areas in addition to completing his work. I appreciate their filling in for me while I am devoting my time to bond projects. I hope they appreciate that I did not ask them to clean the ash urns for me too. Go Titans!

LCC BOARD ELECTS CHAIR, VICE CHAIR FOR 2000/2001

Robert Ackerman of Eugene was elected to a second year as chair of the Lane Community College Board of Education at the board's July 12 meeting. Ackerman served as chair in 1999-2000. Ralph Wheeler of Springfield was elected vice chair. Both votes were unanimous. Also serving on the board are George Alvergue, Roger Hall, and Mike Rose, all of Eugene; Kathleen Shelley of Vida; and Larry Romine of Veneta.

BOARD REPORT

ROBERT ACKERMAN WAS ELECTED to a second year as chair of the Board of Education at the board's July 12 meeting. Ralph Wheeler was elected vice chair. Both votes were unanimous.

PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH consultant Dale Parnell told the board that the required presidential qualifications will narrow the field of applicants. "We'll have to go for quality, not quantity," he said, adding that the best way to get quality candidates is to "go after them" by phone and letter, which he will do. The college also will advertise in the Chronicle of Higher Education and Community College Times. The application deadline is October 6, and a hiring decision is targeted for February. Lane's home page has a link to the presidential search Web site at http://www.lanecc.edu/ps/index.htm.

LTD WILL MOVE to the east side of main campus from July 17 until classes begin, while a permanent station is built on the west side of campus, bond construction Project Manager Bob Mention reported. He also said the Health Tech remodel has begun.

MANAGEMENT WORKING CONDITIONS for 2000/2001 were approved. The need for board approval of this annual agreement will be debated at a future meeting.

ALSO APPROVED were the president's authority to approve contracts for student housing; the board policy on tuition and fees; board appointments to community organizations; and personnel appointments.

THE BOARD REVIEWED monitoring reports on treatment of staff and evaluation/accountability of management; and benchmarks regarding minorities as a percent of employees, budgeted contract employees and student FTE, and percent of revenues by source.

ALL VOTES were 6-0 unanimous; Mike Rose was absent. Meeting minutes are posted on the Web at <u>http://lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm</u> after board approval.

BOND UPDATE

JULY 17 MARKED THE OFFICIAL START OF HEALTH TECH REMODEL by Essex Construction. The remodel will be carried out in four phases, with the first phase of work focusing on extensive remodeling to expand space for the dental program on the first floor. The total budget for the first phase is \$876,746. Subsequent phases will center on upper level work and remodeling of adjacent areas for PE and Archives. The current project is scheduled to run from July through January 2001, with initial activities focusing on site preparation and demolition activities. The staging area for Essex is between the Health Tech building

and the tennis courts. Public access to the health facility will continue to be available on both the first and second floor breezeways at the first floor west entrance, the stairway between PE and Health Tech, and the first level corridor between PE and Health Tech. However, the second floor stairwell on the north side of the second floor will be restricted. The project manager for the Health Tech remodel is Lynn Atkins.

CONSTRUCTION OF PERMANENT LTD STATION MEANS BIG CHANGES ON THE WEST SIDE OF CAMPUS. Parking lot restrictions in the west lot (Lot B) and traffic changes will occur simultaneously when Hyland Construction begins work on the bus station this week. The staging and construction area for activities will be on the most eastern portion of the west parking lot. This means that parking restriction will include a portion of Dale Parnell Loop, the area where the LTD station was recently positioned, and portions of the lot extending further west toward Gonyea Road until approximately one third of the lot is enclosed. Note that the northern half of Dale Parnell Loop will remain open for pedestrian traffic only, which means that access to the ADA ramp and main, west passageway onto campus will be maintained. Regarding traffic changes, after completing the sweeping corner adjacent to the Millennium 2 Project sign on Gonyea Road, the road will narrow to one lane. After entering campus property by the Lane Community College sign, the road will change from one-way to two-way and proceed as usual up the hill past the Student Services site. The two entrances to the west parking lot from Gonyea Road will be available as entryways and exits from both locations on Gonyea Road. In conjunction with the Bond Management Team and Facilities Management and Planning, campus Public Safety officers will ensure that directional signage and traffic dividers are in place. Nevertheless, please be alert and careful when navigating the west side of campus during the LTD construction process. If you are unsure about parking restrictions in Lot B, traffic changes, or access routes, refer to the bond Web site for a map that indicates current restrictions and access routes. (Go to LCC's home page, click on College Business, click on Bond construction, and then pick on the LTD Project.)

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION IS DRESSED UP with the addition of various shrubs and trees on the east and south sides of the building. Printing/Graphics has had a directional sign positioned close to the Campus Services main entrance in order to direct those who are delivering or picking up orders from the department.

SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION CONTINUES TO GAIN GREATER DEFINITION with construction on exterior walls and entry ways. Echoing the main south entrance, several smaller awnings have been erected on the west side of the addition. Steel framing for stairwells has been completed at both the south and west entrances. Interior remodeling activities continue to focus on redefining current space with steel stud framework.

CHILDCARE FACILITIES TAKE ON A MORE FINISHED LOOK as tricycle paths are poured and general landscaping activities begin. Within the boundaries of the fire lane, flowerbeds are being seeded with varieties of thyme that will produce beautiful, low-growing red flowers. The thyme will make an excellent addition to the fire lane located between the Childcare buildings because it will soften the look of the central area and requires low maintenance. Childcare No. 2 continues to wait on occupancy permits. Cabinetry work in Childcare No. 3 is progressing. In Childcare No. 4, contractors continue to make progress with floor coverings.

PLAZA FOR STUDENT SERVICES PROCEEDS while cement is poured during work on the initial phase. Preparation for pouring the second half of the second floor is underway. Steel arches continue to be erected.

BOND UPDATE

HYLAND WASTES NO TIME MOVING ON LTD PROJECT. In order to provide Lane with an operable bus station in time for the beginning of fall term, Hyland Construction and Facilities Planning & Management staff are already making significant progress with site preparation: Construction fencing is up, pedestrian pathways are established, and significant amounts of concrete and asphalt paving are being removed. Once all necessary pavement has been removed, contractors will begin establishing grades for foundational gravel work. Construction on the LTD project has required that all or portions of the lighting in the west parking lot (LOT B) will be out until Sunday, July 30.

BIDS FOR SITE PREPARATION OF WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER WILL OPEN AUGUST 4. In the near future, work on the area directly west of the Apprenticeship building will undergo site preparation for the Conference Center portion of the Workforce Training Center. The staging area for the site preparation will be Lot E, better known to most college employees as the lot adjacent (south) to the Apprenticeship building. During all phases of construction on the Workforce Training Center, ADA parking spaces currently located in Lot E will be temporarily relocated directly west, toward the Childcare facilities, and across Gonyea Road to Lot D. The first eight slots on the south side of Lot D will be designated ADA spaces for the duration of the Workforce Training project. Due to upcoming Workforce Training construction, bids have recently gone out for development of a temporary sidewalk on the south side of Lot E. The sidewalk will provide a route from the west parking lots to the central campus area. From Gonyea Road, the sidewalk will run parallel to Lot E, past the Workforce Training Center staging area, and join the existing path that runs down from the south parking lot past the Forum building. Upon completion of the Workforce Training Center project, Lot E will reopen with ADA slots reestablished.

PLAN AHEAD FOR WEST SIDE CONSTRUCTION! When site preparation begins on the Workforce Training Center, construction activities will encompass the majority of the west side of Lane's main campus until shortly before the beginning of fall term. Prior to completion of the LTD project in September, traffic directional changes, restrictions or closures of parking lots, and rerouting of pedestrians on the west side will require patience and caution. Please consult the bond Web site for maps that show closures, restrictions, drop-off/loading areas, and access routes during construction. (Maps can be found at the bond site by clicking on "West Side Traffic Alert" located at the top of the bond home page.) Remember, parking lots on the north, east and south sides of campus have ample parking during summer term, as well as direct routes into the main area of campus.

SLIGHT MODIFICATIONS TO TRAFFIC DIRECTIONALS ON WEST SIDE. Campus Public Safety has mandated that vehicles no longer have the option to make any U-turns on Gonyea Road at the point where Gonyea enters LCC property, due to hazardous situations that have occurred with the modification of traffic patterns on the west side. Moreover, the official loading/drop-off zone in Lot B during LTD construction is between the larger section of the lot and the smaller portion adjacent to the former Childcare modular. Barricades have been positioned at the drop-off area to insure safety of pedestrians. REMODEL OF CENTER BASEMENT SCHEDULED TO BEGIN

THIS WEEK. Currently, demolition activities in the basement of the Center building are underway. Facilities Management & Planning staff are working to redefine space within the Center basement that was formerly occupied by Printing/Graphics. Remodeling activities will produce two temporary, general use classrooms plus office space for the Culinary Arts program. While not part of official bond remodeling that will take place, current construction in the basement will allow practical use of significant space until official bond work begins. Completion of the current remodel project is scheduled for September, prior to the beginning of fall term. REMODEL OF FORMER DAYCARE MODULARS TO PROVIDE NEEDED SPACE DURING BOND CONSTRUCTION. Current demolition activities by Facilities Management & Planning staff at the former infant daycare modular will supply the Culinary Arts program with an area for the demonstration kitchen and a classroom. Remodeling activities at the ASLCC Co-op modular will provide temporary classroom space. Work on both modulars is scheduled for completion prior to fall term.

DEMOLITION WORK IS UNDERWAY IN HEALTH TECH FACILITIES at the former sites of the Child Development Center, Early Childhood Education and the Culinary Arts program. Collaborative discussions between Lane's trades, Essex Construction, and sub-contractors regarding plumbing, electrical, and HVAC systems are currently underway. Special thanks are extended to Ted Smouse for his help in moving the large, obsolete washers out of the old Laundry Services area.

INTERIOR REMODELING OF SCIENCE BUILDING ON TARGET. Work within the Science building is progressing at a rate that will allow occupancy before commencement of classes this fall. Already, completion of sheet rock and texturing in some areas has allowed contractors to begin painting. Floor coverings should be installed next week. Thanks to the contractor's achievements, several rooms should be finished and ready for occupancy in approximately two to three weeks. Brick is being installed on the north face of the west addition. Infrastructure continues to be established on both the first and second floors.

STUDENT SERVICES GAINS GREATER DEFINITION as Lane's "FRONT DOOR" with the erection of curved steel and barrel trusses. Steel studwork progresses on the sides of building. The remainder of the second floor slab has been poured. Installation of infrastructure on both floors continues.

CHILDCARE OCCUPANCY WAITING ON COMPLETION OF ALL ASPECTS OF FIRELANES. Lane's landscaping staff are working to establish a subsurface in the main fire lane access route that will not only be able to support the weight of fire equipment, but provide a suitable base for ground covering. Tricycle paths have been poured at each of the four buildings. Cabinetry continues to be installed in Childcare No. 3. The fire alarm system and cabinetry are being installed in Childcare No. 4. Work on floor covering work is complete.
