BOND UPDATE

WORKFORCE TRAINING SITE PREP NEARS COMPLETION. Site preparation for the western portion of the Workforce Training Center has progressed so well that work is almost complete. Construction on the western portion of the facility is scheduled to commence this November and run through July 2001.

BOND MANAGERS RESPOND TO EXTERIOR WATERLINE BREAK AT CHILDCARE SITE. What started out as a minor leak in piping to the east of the Childcare facilities quickly escalated to a major problem when a break in the line occurred. The break washed out a vast amount of topsoil and disrupted work on the irrigation system. However, after sizing up the situation early Wednesday morning, the Bond Management Team in conjunction with the Grounds department, took decisive action. By the end of the day, the disrupted areas around the Childcare facilities had been cleaned up, and the site was ready to have additional soil brought in and landscaping activities to begin once again. Turning to occupancy of the facilities, Building No. 2 now contains significant articles for operation of the program by the beginning of fall classes. Final approval of the building is expected this week. Building No. 3 has been given a temporary occupancy allowing furniture and equipment to be moved in. Building No. 4, which will house the ASLCC Childcare Co-op, has also received a temporary permit, allowing moving activities to proceed. Oregon Fencing will be constructing fencing around the facilities. Hyland Construction's job shack will remain at the Childcare site until Sept. 25, at which time it will be moved to accommodate work on the LTD Bus Station.

SCIENCE REMODEL LOOKING GOOD. Furniture is in place with blackboards, white boards, and TV/VCR brackets installed in many of the remodeled rooms within the Science building. To ensure a healthy classroom atmosphere, the HVAC system will be balanced and piping will be flushed this week. At the site of the new West Addition, parking lot paving activities have begun in the south lot. Brick and exterior finish work should be completed in time for scaffolding to come down on Sept. 15. On the interior of the addition, wall texture work is ready to begin. Framing of the first floor is complete except for the elevator/machine room. Second floor ductwork is all but complete with second floor framing underway. South Addition: Roof work is complete except for the installation of flashing. Brickwork continues. East Addition: Durock is installed and ready for application of the stucco like material, EIFS.

HEALTH TECH HVAC WORK NOT AS DISRUPTIVE AS INITIALLY PROJECTED. While the entire Health Tech facility will be affected by an extensive HVAC upgrade this month, the work will be intermittent rather than continuous in nature. Beginning Sept. 9, and continuing through Sept. 20, work on controls and ducts will take place from time to time in only two- to three-hour intervals. The Bond Office will supply residents of the facility with fans that will help with air circulation when the system is shut down due to upgrade work. Seismic upgrade work will also take place in the facility this next week. Three hundred large, steel bolts will be inserted in the first floor breezeway area. The installation is expected to run approximately one week.

RETURN TO ONE SHIFT IMMINENT FOR LAUNDRY SERVICES. If you remember, due to an error by engineers, the boiler installed in Laundry Services was unable to supply enough hot water to meet Laundry's needs. Consequently, an additional boiler and booster are being installed to bring hot water capacity to appropriate levels. Lines have been run from the new boiler, which is positioned in the southeast corner of Shipping & Receiving, to the boiler room in Laundry Services. It is anticipated that within a week, Laundry will be able to return to running one complete crew during regular business hours.

CEMENT FOR STUDENT SERVICES SKY BRIDGE POURED. As work continues on the sky bridge that will connect the Student Services building with the Workforce Training Center, a cement pour of the foundational wall adds further definition to the structure. You may have noticed that the bottom edge of the bridge seems to be lower on just the northeast side. That is because the Student Services building is actually at a lower elevation than the Apprenticeship building. The sloping bridge allows for compliance with ADA codes and

wheelchair accessibility. Adjacent to the ramp at the intersection of the bridge with Students Services will also be a short stairway that leads up to the elevated passageway as well. Before long, Chambers Construction will be making the tie-in to the Apprenticeship building where rooms 217 and 218 are located. LCC trades will then construct a temporary wall at the tie-in that will remain in place until approximately March 2001. Roofing has commenced in all areas. Steel roofing has been installed on the barrel trusses that were recently erected on the west end of the building. Infrastructure work by all trades is proceeding.

LTD BUS STATION CONTINUES ON SCHEDULE. Hyland Construction is moving along with work on the new bus station. The concrete slabs have been poured at both the north and south sections of the drive. Brick pavers have been installed at the Parnell Loop main crossing. Conduits are being placed just behind the continuous sitting wall. Footings for the shelters, kiosks and tower are in place, and the main steel column supports for the shelters have been erected.

WORK IN CENTER BASEMENT PROCEEDS IN FULL FORCE. With permits secured, Lane trades wasted no time in commencing work on the Center basement remodel. Painters, carpenters and electricians are working at such a pace that framing inspection can take place this week, enabling the remodel to be completed by Sept. 20. As soon as furnishings for the ASLCC Co-op are moved into Childcare No. 4, remodeling activities will be able to commence in Modular No. 30. Electrical work in Modular No. 31 has passed inspection. Bond management and Lane trades are dedicated to providing remodeled facilities in both modulars in time for fall classes.

FORMER LCC STUDENT ABLE TO GIVE BACK TO COLLEGE THROUGH BOND CONSTRUCTION. "In a culture that operates in a linear manner, it is refreshing to discover examples of how life comes full circle. TOTAL LTD BUS STATION EXPERIENCE TO BE RICH. First impressions carry a big punch. Not only do they strongly shape our expectations, but first impressions are indeed lasting. Considering the significance of initial impacts, when completed, LCC's new bus station will also carry a big punch. As individuals enter the LCC campus from Gonyea Road on the west, their first impressions of the college will be comprised of a rich, multi-dimensional experience.

For example, those who come to LCC's new LTD bus station will experience a main passageway that is comprised of complementing colors and materials. Interwoven brick pavers passing through the main, concrete vehicle passageway clearly designate pedestrian thoroughfares. A continuous sitting wall establishes demarcation while riders take a break before their buses arrive, perhaps leaning back on gently sloping grassy knolls. Shelters possess clean lines capped with skylight domes that provide protection from elements while allowing the filtering of light. Both deciduous and evergreen trees lend height, color and texture to the bus station as the clock tower reaches toward the sky. New, aesthetically pleasing light fixtures along Parnell Loop provide greater security while enhancing the visual atmosphere. Sprinkled across the plaza and adjoining areas are multiple bushes and flowers lending softness and seasonal bursts of color to the area. Positioned next to Dale Parnell Loop, the richness of the LTD bus station is extended as one's eye is naturally drawn to the beautifully designed and soon to be completed Student Services building, symbolically standing as Lane's new "front door." And if one chooses to continue onto campus in an eastward fashion, imagine passing through such a delightful setting only to be greeted by the beautiful reflecting pond.

While LTD buses will operate at the new station for the opening of fall term, the total experience just described will not be realized until January of 2001, when the station is completed. Until that time, progress continues on a bus station, and plaza that in its entirety will establish first impressions that are worthy of a nationally ranked junior college.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETS WEDNESDAY

The Board of Education meets on Wednesday, Sept. 13. A work session to review the status of bond construction projects begins at 3 p.m., followed by an executive session at 5:15 p.m. The regular meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. The agenda for the regular meeting includes the following: selection of the presidential search committee chair; a discussion about organizational restructuring; budget committee appointments; Resolution 452 opposing measures 91, 93, 88 and 8; Resolution 453 opposing Measure 9; and Resolution 454, opposing Measures 92 and 98. BOND UPDATE

SEPTEMBER 13 POSSIBLE DATE FOR SCIENCE OCCUPANCY PERMITS. Tomorrow is the scheduled date for the fire alarm test within the Science remodel. If all goes well with the testing, occupancy permits will be issued and staff moved into various locations by the end of the week. Materials continue to be transferred to the facility and installation of audiovisual equipment is taking place. Funds allocated by the Facilities Management Committee are currently allowing LCC trades to repair gutters on the Science building. Work on the gutters will be finished before fall classes. West Addition: Windows have been installed on the north side and brickwork will be completed by the end of the week. Second floor framing is proceeding very quickly with 75 percent of the work already finished. Ductwork is also very near completion. South Addition: Mechanical work should be done by the end of the week. Interior framing is expected to begin in approximately one week. Turning to general work being conducted on the project, the roof of the existing Science building is being joined to the new West Addition roof. Parking Lot L, directly south of the project, has been paved and stripped. Multiple ADA parking slots are now designated in Lot L next to the new main entrance of the Science/Math complex. In preparation for the influx of students, sidewalks will be poured this week; all debris will be removed. INFANT TODDLER CENTER OCCUPIED. With all materials transferred to their new facility, the staff of the Infant Toddler Center are busy organizing equipment and materials in their new facility in preparation for fall

classes. Building No. 3, which will house pre-school/pre-kindergarten services, received a temporary occupancy permit this past Friday. Bond facilities maintenance staff proceeded with moving activities over the weekend. Building No. 4 should receive a temporary occupancy permit today. As soon as the permit is secured, moving activities will take place, transferring materials and equipment out of the ASLCC Childcare Co-Op modular and into the new facilities. In regard to exterior site work, labor on the irrigation system nears completion. Once trenches are filled in, planting will take place. Additional clean up work will be completed in areas that were disrupted by the recent waterline break; bark chips will be brought in for a play area and the parking lot swept.

EXPECT TEMPORARY SHUTDOWNS FOR WTC WORK. Although excavation is complete, in order for activities to proceed on the Workforce Training Center site, a conflict with existing electrical and water piping and those slated for the new facility could be addressed as soon as this weekend. Buildings that will be affected include Business, Apprenticeship, Industrial Tech, Training & Development, and Childcare. Currently, engineers are working to refine work tactics so as to minimize the length of disruptions. While the duration of the shutdown is expected to be minimal, as soon as specific dates and times are known, a campuswide alert will be issued.

LTD BUS STATION WILL BE READY FOR STUDENTS ON SEPTEMBER 25. With the main thoroughfare for buses complete, Hyland Construction is focusing on the plaza. Already, one-third of the concrete has been poured, with additional pours scheduled for today and Thursday. All walkways have been completed, all pavers are in place, and erection of steel for shelters is underway. If you have not had the opportunity to see the architectural renderings of the bus station, the LTD display will be available for viewing during in-service activities.

SEISMIC AND HVAC UPGRADE UNDERWAY IN HEALTH TECH. The noisy but necessary work of installing steel anchor bolts has begun in the Health Tech facility. If all goes well, seismic work should be completed by the end of the week. Groundwork continues within the remodel area as Essex Construction focuses on preparation of infrastructure. HVAC work is front and forward as new ducts are installed and intermittent shutdowns allow for improvement of the system. On the exterior of the building, the large, unsightly vent pipes and dryer exhaust structures have been removed from the building.

CEMENT POURED AT STUDENT SERVICES. Cement has been poured at three significant areas within the Student Services project: the sky bridge, elevator shaft and south stairwell. With concrete in place, the main passageways to the second floor and future Workforce Training Center are now substantially complete. Proceeding at a significant pace, approximately 50 percent of roofing is complete.

PROGRESS ON REMODELED AREAS CONTINUES. The Center basement remodel is progressing quickly. Since sheet rock has been hung, texturing and painting are currently taking place. HVAC work will begin this week. Permits have been secured for Modular No. 31, which will house the Culinary Arts program. Sheetrock has also been hung in this remodel, allowing texture work and painting to take place this week. HVAC work was completed at the end of last week. All gas lines have been installed and preliminary plumbing work is finished. Demolition activities will begin at Modular No. 30 this week as soon as ASLCC Childcare Co-Op equipment is moved. The remodel is

expected to pose little difficulty since there is very little electrical, plumbing, or HVAC work that must be addressed.

INSURANCE IN RETIREMENT

Faculty employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice or HMO Oregon before retirement to be eligible to carry their insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add a dependent(s) or change insurance carriers. Management employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement. Any questions regarding this may be directed to Personnel Services at 726-2211.

DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare, contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377. BOARD REPORT

RESOLUTIONS OPPOSING SEVEN BALLOT MEASURES received unanimous support at the Sept. 13 Board of Education meeting. The resolutions opposed measures 8, 9, 88, 91, 92, 93, and 98. Board comment focused on measures 91 and 8 which add up to a 28.2 percent budget cut for Lane and could result in more than 300 layoffs and the tripling of tuition. Chair Robert Ackerman said, "community college education as we know it will be destroyed."

FACULTY UNION PRESIDENT Margaret Bayless was appointed chair of the presidential search committee by unanimous vote. Also serving on the committee are Richard Albright, George Alvergue, Ed Anderson, Bob Baldwin, Roger Hall, Kent Hunsaker, Steve John, Brandon Kilgore, Donna Koechig, Marie Matsen, Jan Oliver, Bob Sisk, and Susan Whitmore. The committee begins screening in October. The presidential search web page is at <http://www.lanecce.edu/ps/jobinfo.htm> .

FOUR RESTRUCTURING MODELS were presented by President Jerry Moskus. The board assigned restructuring as a presidential goal more than a year ago, and Moskus first presented options in October 1999. Some staff at the meeting objected that staff had not yet seen nor discussed the models. After debate, the board voted 7-0 to "focus" on model two, subject to collegewide review. The board called the model a starting point.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- * accepted the resignation of Jonathan Ward from the Budget Committee, re-appointed Cj Mann, and appointed Stephen Alison;
- * accepted the retirement of Susan Burch, instructor, Health and PE;

* directed administration to pursue attorney general's opinion on certain points of construction contract labor agreement language.

BOND UPDATE

LOOSE ENDS WRAPPED UP IN SCIENCE REMODEL. Bond team members, LCC trades, and Hyland Construction workers are in the process of attending to multiple, minor finishing details in the Science building. Finalization of ceiling tile installation has allowed cleaning personnel to step up their pace within classrooms and offices. Floors will be stripped and waxed as soon as all construction work is completed. Interior framing is 85-90 percent complete on the second floor of the West Addition. Insulation and drywall activities continue on the first floor; final painting is already completed in areas on the north side. The South Addition labs continue to gain greater definition and should be ready before winter term. Storage areas in the East Addition have been cordoned off with new walls. Window glazing continues around the building

BOND TEAM AND CHILD CARE STAFF HARD AT WORK. With less than a week until fall term begins, staff of the Childhood Development Center, Infant/Toddler Center, Preschool, and the ASLCC Co-op are working feverishly to get their new facilities ready. This past weekend bond staff members were at the Child Care site helping with completion of move-in activities. Fencing posts and panels will be ready for installation this week. Irrigation lines have been covered and additional landscaping chips applied.

LTD BUS STATION OPERATIONAL THE END OF THIS WEEK. This Friday, the removal of construction fencing from Lot B and traffic delineators on Gonyea Road will signal that the new LTD Bus Station is ready for action. Pedestrian passageways are completed, and although Dale Parnell Loop will continue to contain construction materials and therefore be restricted as a vehicle passageway, all of the walkways that lead onto the campus will be open and ready for use. The plaza will also have a partial temporary occupancy permit that will allow individuals to use and enjoy the station to a greater degree. Remember, as of Monday morning, Sept. 25, LTD will conduct all regular stops at the new station on the west side of campus.

TWO OUT OF THREE MODULARS READY TO GO ON SEPT. 25. As reported, remodeling of current space in the Center basement and the former Child Care modulars will provide classrooms and offices while bond construction is conducted on campus. Both the basement of the Center building and Modular No. 30 will be ready for the beginning of classes this next week. Modular No. 31, which will house the Culinary Arts demo kitchen, will be completed during the week of Sept. 25. Arrangements are being made to provide instructional space for the culinary classes during the first week of instruction.

SKY BRIDGE TIED TO APPRENTICESHIP BUILDING. Chambers Construction workers have sawed through the brick on the north wall of the Apprenticeship building where the sky bridge meets the building. Currently, insulation and wall covering work is underway to provide a temporary exterior wall for Apprenticeship classrooms that are adjacent to the sky bridge intersection. Drywall activities begin this week on the first floor of the building. Installation of metal roofing that will cover the barrel trusses will also begin this week. The large air handlers that were stored on the passageway between Student Services and the Apprenticeship building are now installed atop the Student Services facility.

HEALTH TECH UNDERGOES MULTIPLE REMODELING ACTIVITIES. While remodeling activities on the Health Tech building have only been underway for a short time, already the staff and faculty are familiar with HVAC, water and power shutdowns. Not surprisingly, inside the first floor remodel, tremendous work on ductwork and infrastructure lines has already taken place. The bond office has provided residents of the entire facility with fans to

help with air circulation during intermittent HVAC shutdowns. In the first floor passageway, angle metal is being installed as part of the seismic upgrade. Current remodeling activities are scheduled to be completed March 2001.

ENGINEERS CONTINUE TO LOOK AT EXISTING POWER LINES AT WTC SITE.
This past weekend, water was shutdown to the Child Care facilities in order that work could be conducted on lines at the Workforce Training Center site. Since power lines are located in close proximity to waterlines, engineers were present at excavation. By discovering how the power lines are laid out, engineers will be able to determine the most effective way to proceed with work on electrical lines. Resolution of issues pertaining to infrastructure lines has prompted architects at gLAs to recommend that the Conference Center portion of the WTC go out to bid in late October. In light of Oregon's weather patterns, the bond office is looking at applying rock to facilitate drainage at the excavated site.

EVENING PROGRAM OPENS NEW DOOR FOR STUDENTS

Mechanic Ruby Larson works 50 hours a week running his own auto repair business, Avant Carb. He wants to upgrade his skills but "there's just no way" he can fit a traditional weekday class into his schedule. This fall, he doesn't have to. He's enrolled in automotive technology instructor Michael O'Higgins' class, Electrical and Electronic Systems, to be held Tuesday and Thursday evenings at Lane's main campus. It's one of hundreds of new classes now available at night.

This fall, Lane is offering night classes in 17 credit degree programs, compared to only three such programs previously. That adds up to 700 classes, 34 percent more than a year ago. In addition, 23 noncredit programs are available at alternative times.

Project coordinator Linda Simmons said Lane is responding to community demand. A survey conducted for the college last October showed 73 percent of respondents requesting weekday evening classes and 57 percent requesting Saturday classes. Simmons says the college has committed to a three-year pilot. The program includes evening, weekend and online classes, and telecourses. Services are available later too, such as the bookstore, cashiering, registration, and other student assistance.

Larson starts class on Sept. 26. He says he has an ulterior motive besides polishing his own skills. He's looking to hire another mechanic, perhaps a recent auto tech graduate. The auto electronics class will be a good place to start networking, he says.

AN HONOR AND A PRIVILEGE

President Jerry Moskus welcomed faculty to the academic year on Sept. 18. It was his last fall welcome address; he will retire on June 30, 2001, after a decade of service to college and community. The president recalled hallmarks of the past 10 years, noted current challenges, and laid out goals for the coming year.

Past achievements include Students First!, which consolidates services in one location, and charging for all credits instead of just the first 12, a practice since adopted by all other Oregon community colleges.

We hired an affirmative action director, developed an affirmative action plan, and required diversity training for hiring committees, said Moskus, but have more work to do to improve diversity at Lane and meet the needs of students.

We moved from adversarial to interest-based bargaining to seek win/win solutions, and we reestablished our national reputation for excellence through innovations like the Strategic Learning Initiative, the community learning centers, and others, but "most of all, thanks to great teaching."

We adjusted to the shift from local to state funding and the resulting funding formulas based on FTE. We helped the community through economic transition with training programs for dislocated workers and employers, including customized programs that helped attract Symantec, Sony and Hyundai to the county.

We won a \$42.8 million bond to improve and expand facilities. "If you're ever feeling unappreciated, think about that," said Moskus. "No other community college in Oregon has that kind of support from voters, and very few have passed a bond request on the first try."

We've avoided crisis through "10 years of fiscal uncertainty," from the property tax limitation measure passed in 1990 to the resulting series of funding formulas. Moskus recalled that the first formula would have cost Lane \$8 million; he successfully negotiated a more workable plan by offering alternatives. Besides fighting at the state level, Moskus cited "sound fiscal management" by college staff for our stability.

Our greatest achievement has been fighting ignorance with lifelong learning, said the president. Lane delivers quality learning experiences in a caring environment to more than 42,000 people a year, he said. "We must test everything with the question, will this enhance learning?"

Addressing the present, the president called for changes in three aspects of college culture. One is how we try to do everything at once. "Sometimes I feel we are committing random acts of progress," he said. Another is being too process oriented and he called for more emphasis on results. A third problem is

having too many pecking orders, which can be minimized by remembering our comprehensive mission and valuing each other and each student.

The president then listed four main goals for the coming year. One is to "complete the critical phase of bond construction" with minimal disruption to learning. He invited listeners to contact their department chair with any concerns or check the web for up-to-date bond construction information [<http://www.lanecce.edu/presoffc/board/lccboard.htm>].

Another goal is to submit a balanced budget that "represents the best thinking of a wide range of members of the college community." He said a budget deficit of \$3 million is projected for next year, and noted that several measures on the ballot could severely impact funding if passed into law. For example, measure 91 could cost Lane \$4.6 million and measure 8 could cost \$15 million, together adding up to a 28.2 percent budget cut. On the up side, he said, enrollment is up, the college received \$270,000 from the legislature for growth, and community colleges will ask the next legislature for \$80 million.

A third goal this year is to increase service as measured by student FTE. To this end he advocated high school recruitment, student retention, and evening/weekend program expansion.

Finally, the Board of Education has directed the president to develop and implement a restructuring plan "to address organizational issues and improve performance." He is forming a team of faculty, students, managers and classified staff to refine the board's preferred structure. They will hold all-employee hearings to gather more input.

Moskus concluded on a personal note. "I want to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your support over the last 10 years," he said. "Being president of Lane Community College is an honor and a privilege, and I look forward to working with you over the next nine months." [Submitted by Joan Aschim, IA]

WORKING TOGETHER SERVES STUDENTS BETTER

A collaborative effort by the Bookstore, Library, Computer Services, Enrollment Services, Financial Aid, Student First!, Counseling and Advising, and Student Activities made a significant difference for students lining up to buy books during Bookstore week (Sept. 18-22), and on the first two days of classes as well.

A combination of factors made a significant difference in the number of students getting through the lines usually associated with the start of classes each term. Among them are: the advent of the Early Orientation Program, which advised over 460 additional new students during the summer; keeping the college open during faculty in-service on the Monday of Bookstore week; and setting up eight additional computers in the library (used to print out class schedules only). The Bookstore reports that an additional 1,140 students (over last year's numbers) made it through the lines last week. Students entering the Center lobby commented on the missing kiosk lines and mentioned their appreciation for the auxiliary schedule printing services offered in the library. It is estimated that 1,000 students were able to print out their fall class schedules using the library computers, versus waiting in line for one of the four Center lobby kiosks. - Helen Barker Garrett, Enrollment Services/Registrar
