BOND UPDATE

SCIENCE FACULTY AND STAFF PLEASED WITH REMODEL. No longer housed in temporary quarters or classrooms, Science personnel are happy to be settling into newly remodeled areas that are the culmination of many months of dedicated design development. While some staff are in temporary offices until the west addition is completed, attitudes are positive as students fill classrooms that directly reflect the needs and desires of Science personnel. With remodeling activities completed, tremendous activity is taking place in the West Addition. It seems sub-contractors are everywhere on the second floor! Work centers on mechanical and electrical work since interior framing is all but complete. The north side of the first floor, or the side closest to the Forum, is completed to the point that ceiling grid can be installed Ceiling work will commence as soon as taping, texturing, and painting are completed on the south portion of the addition. Once ceiling grid is installed on the first floor, carpet and tile will be laid. Interior framing of labs is finished in the South Addition. It is still anticipated that the labs will be available for classes during winter term. The East Addition, which will provide much needed storage space, is having drywall hung. This addition should be completed by mid-November. The sidewalk that runs on the south side of the Science/Math Addition will be poured this week.

LTD BUS STATION A HIT. As promised, the new bus station was operational for the beginning of fall classes. Buses are running on time and multiple bays designating differing routes clearly display bus schedules. While waiting for their buses, students are already congregating under the shelters and enjoying the company of fellow travelers at the sitting wall. The permanent stop is providing an attractive and practical gathering spot from which riders enter and leave Lane main campus. Currently, brick masons are working on various aspects of sign holders and the clock tower. It is anticipated that the clock tower and permanent roofs for the shelters will be completed this coming January.

CHILDCARE FACILITIES OPEN DOORS FOR CLIENTS. Although getting the three remaining Childcare facilities on line for the beginning of fall term went down to the wire, staff and instructors were able to open their doors for children and parents the first day of classes. The fully operational facilities will have work begin on permanent fencing on October 10. Landscaping work continues with the focus on irrigation work. Future landscaping work will include seeding of grass, planting of trees and shrubs, and development of a 'dry' creek bed.

HEALTH TECH REMODEL CLEARS HURDLE OF MAJOR DISRUPTIONS. If there was a report card for undergoing intense upgrading activities, the residents of the Health Technology building most certainly earned an "A" for the month of September. Electrical and water shut downs coupled with noisy seismic work could be viewed as a necessary major exam that had to be completed before the start of fall term. With the majority of major disruptive activities behind them, residents are more than able to conduct classes and regular activities as remodeling work continues. Currently, interior wall framing is fifty percent complete. Concrete pouring is finishing up this week. LCC painters will postpone painting of installed seismic structures until winter.

STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING GETS A SHOWER. Although brick on the Student Services building looked good two weeks ago, recent pressure washing activities have left the exterior surface looking great. Perhaps you've noticed the large two-story window frames that are on site. The frames will be positioned on the four exterior walls this week with glazing, or the installation of window glass, following shortly. Drywall continues to be installed on the first floor. The second floor has approximately eighty percent of wall framing complete.

OCTOBER 9 ANTICIPATED COMPLETION DATE OF MODULARS. While the basement of the Center building is complete, providing offices for Hospitality personnel and general use classrooms, remodeling activities continue on Modulars #30 and #31. Modular #31, which will house the Culinary Arts Demo Kitchen is scheduled for completion by October 4, providing time for staff to prepare for classes on the 10th. LCC trades are working towards an occupancy date of October 9 for Modular #30, which will house Hospitality and Business and Industry Services.

MIKE HOPINKSON REJOINS MANAGEMENT TEAM. With buildings going up and site preparation being dug down, it is often easy to overlook a significant aspect of what bond monies are providing: new furnishings. The substantial task of seeing that newly constructed areas are provided with appropriate and useful furnishings will now be coordinated by Mike Hopkinson. Previously, Mike worked as a Communications Specialist for the Bond Project Management Team. With the knowledge and understanding developed in his previous position and his years of experience as an instructor here at Lane, Mike is well prepared to step into the position of Furnishings Coordinator.

FROM THE GROUNDS UP

A report from groundskeeper Frank Drengacz:

This month I would like to discuss the plant loss due to construction that will start with the most visible, the London Plane trees at the new bus stop. Originally, all the trees were going to be saved. Then the unforeseen began to happen. The soil cut to accommodate the new sitting wall needed to be extended. This cut would impact six of the smallest trees. The finish cut would be within approximately 2-3' of the trunks. This would severely stress these trees. Healthy trees would weather the storm. These smaller trees were suffering though. I suspect they were infected with a root disease called anthracnose. With this disease it is only a matter of time before the trees would need to be removed. The decision was made to remove them now.

During excavation, the existing power for the parking lot was damaged beyond repair (it wasn't where it was supposed to be). New conduit had to be run from the Health building. The only route for the new conduit was directly in the path of the western most Plane tree. So the tree had to sacrificed.

It was discovered that a storm drain, nearest the flag pole, had never been connected. The route of the new line would travel through the root zone of the largest Plane tree. I had requested that the new line be tunneled under the root zone. That was researched. It was determined the cost to tunnel under the root zone would be prohibitive. An open trench was dug. There was substantial root damage. There was not enough damage to kill the tree. There was enough damage, to the windward side of the root zone, to raise the possibility that the tree might not survive a significant wind storm. An arborist was consulted. He concurred. Consequently, the tree was removed. If it is any comfort to people, the trunks are going to be used at Child Care for climbing structures.

A new free-standing elevator will be installed by the Business building. A new walk will be constructed around the wood deck between Administration and Business. The plants in those beds were moved to the front of Air Tech.

A new door and sidewalk was installed at the northeast corner of the existing Science building. A daylily and a butterfly bush were in the path of the new walk. These plants were removed. The butterfly bush was about 6' tall. We did not save the butterfly bush because it is an invasive plant. It is starting to cause problems in some parts of Oregon.

Of course, all the trees that have been and or will be removed are going to be replaced. They will not necessarily be replaced with the same varieties. Nor will trees be replanted in the same areas. The quantities to be replanted will be greater than those removed.

Since I am already depressed, I might as well tell you that one of the mainstays of the grounds department is leaving. Angie is moving to the Portland area. She has been a work-study student and parttime worker for about four years. She has been instrumental in all of the improvements of the campus grounds. We will miss her.

Graham Christopher, an education actor at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, will appear on Wednesday, Oct. 25 from 7-8:30 p.m. in the Blue Door Theater. The free event is sponsored by Performing Arts and Student Activities.

The Globe Theatre was rebuilt and occupies a riverside site opposite St. Paul's Cathedral in London. It offers a theatrical experience as close as possible to that enjoyed by the audience of Shakespeare's time. BOND UPDATE

SHORT DELAY IN CONFERENCE CENTER CONSTRUCTION PROMPTS EROSION CONTROL. Although architects and engineers are devoting tremendous time to the various bond projects, their heavy work load has required that scheduled construction on the Conference Center portion of the Workforce Training Center be moved back from November 2000 until the beginning of January 2001. In light of the delay, Eugene Sand & Gravel will apply 20 truck loads of gravel to the site prepared for this construction. In addition to the black plastic already in place on the site walls, the rock will promote drainage and prevent erosion during Oregon's notorious rainy season. The new tentative schedule for the Workforce Training Center is as follows:

November 1, 2000: Workforce Training Center out to bid November 30, 2000: Bid opening December 8, 2000: Board awards contract January 1, 2001: Construction begins September 1, 2001: Phase I complete (Conference Center) June 1, 2002: Phase II complete (remodel of Apprenticeship) MODULAR #31, which will house the Culinary Arts demo kitchen, will be operational on

October 9. Modular #30, which will provide classroom space for Hospitality and Business & Industry Services, will be ready for classes during the week of October 16.

FROM THE GROUNDS UP (a report from groundskeeper Frank Drengacz). They are bailing on me left and right. I'm referring to my wonderful crew. 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BOND UPDATE

WHERE'D THE OLD LAUNDRY ROOM GO? Work in the Health Tech remodel is progressing so well that steel stud framing has left the former location of Laundry Services unrecognizable. In the most eastern portion of the first floor, a large classroom and multiple offices are now framed out, with sheetrock activity beginning. Cement flooring is now complete in the west half of the remodel, enabling work to proceed on areas that will contain operatory, sterilization, and X-ray areas for the dental program. Remodeling activities on the first floor of Health Tech are tentatively scheduled for completion in February 2001.

BORDER AT LOT 'A' PROVIDES EXTRA SPACE FOR NAVIGATION OF BUSES. With the new bus station in operation, it has become apparent that the buses require a little more room to make their turns at the north end of the passageway. In order to better accommodate LTD's buses, a curb and planter at the southern end of Lot A will be removed and replaced with blacktop. While the sidewalk will remain, by removing the curb and planter in Lot A, an adequate turning radius will be established for LTD's buses thereby providing a safer traffic environment for all. In regard to the station itself, benches have been installed under the shelters and trash receptacles positioned along the plaza. Bike racks will be installed shortly.

LANDSCAPING AT CHILDCARE SITE ALMOST COMPLETE. Recently, a pale green seed covering was rolled onto various portions of the area around and within the perimeters of the Child Care facilities. Before long, fall rains will transform the pale covering into new lush grass for the staff and children to enjoy and utilize. On the drawing board for the Child Care site is a landscaped stairway using aesthetically pleasing materials rather than concrete. The stairway will offer access to the Child Care site from parking Lots F-J.

PROGRESS ON STUDENT SERVICES VIEWED BY FUTURE OCCUPANTS. Interior activity on the Student Services building has produced spaces that are clearly defined and developed. Already, walls on the first floor are awaiting texturing and painting. Relight, or windows that span half the height of a wall, are ready for glazing. Electrical work is for all practical purposes complete. The second floor is shaping up nicely with steel stud framing almost complete. At the main entrance of the building, workers are backfilling around the first stages of concrete work for the plaza. In light of the progress on the building, various departments that will eventually be housed in the Student Services building have recently taken tours of the facility. After viewing the structure from the outside for so many months, it is always exciting for people to see the interior of the building for the first time. While there is still much to be done, with walls and windows defined, people have been able to get a good sense of the new spaces, as well as the spatial relationship of departmental locations. As usual, the camera captured your friends and colleagues from Disability Services, the Women's Center, Counseling, Financial Aid, Testing, Student Activities and the Multicultural Center as they experienced the interior of the building. Pictures of LCC personnel on tour can be viewed on the bond web site at the Student Services project update.

SOUTH DOORWAY OF SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION A FLURRY OF ACTIVITY. Since remodeling of the Science building has been completed, construction activity is going full force at the west addition. Perhaps of greatest visual interest at this time is the main entrance to the Science/Math building on the south side of the facility. A curved roof sets above the entrance and provides an interesting skyline under which construction workers are carrying out painting, backfilling, and siding activities. When completed, the southern entrance will welcome students with a vestibule and lobby. Already completed stairways lead from the lobby to the first and second floors. These stairways will be complemented in the near future by an elevator. Multiple windows on the south of the entrance will allow sunlight to spill in while students enter through double doors on both the west and east sides. Even though completion of the addition is tentatively scheduled for March 2001, as with other projects, furnishings and equipment will be moved to the new facility prior to the official completion of the project. While work on the main entrance continues, activity in the south addition is also progressing nicely as steel stud framing defines space for anatomy, biology and microbiology labs, and a staff workroom and the mechanical room.

"SHAKESPEARE BY DAYLIGHT" PERFORMANCE/LECTURE TO BE HELD

Graham Christopher, an education actor at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre, will appear on Wednesday, Oct. 25 from 7-8:30 p.m. in the Blue Door Theater. The free event is sponsored by Lane Theater and Student Activities.

The Globe Theatre was rebuilt and occupies a riverside site opposite St. Paul's Cathedral in London. It offers a theatrical experience as close as possible to that enjoyed by the audience of Shakespeare's time. Graham's workshops and talks have engaged student groups of all ages at the Globe for the last six years. Globe Education aims to enhance the understanding of Shakespeare's plays as scripts to be played and heard rather than texts to be read.

The performance lecture draws on Graham's skills as an actor, to describe the rich experience of being in the Globe, and the unique relationship between audience and player. Using some of his favorite speeches from Shakespeare and elsewhere, Graham examines the challenges of "daylight playing" where the audience is seen by the actor. Is the quest for 'emotional truth' as described by Stanislavski then compromised for the modern actor? Graham has actors play small segments of a Shakespeare script, as if it were for a performance in the Globe. His style is engaging and often funny as he tends to assume the characters he describes. ENROLLMENT UP

Approximately 17,500 students have enrolled at Lane this fall, an increase of 10.3 percent over last year at the same time. Full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment also is up, by 4.5 percent, according to second-week reports. Growth is occurring in nearly all programs, including transfer, professional technical, community education, and basic education.

"We're seeing a trend," says President Jerry Moskus. "Community college enrollment used to decline in good economic times as people left school to go to work, but this is changing as we shift from a resource-based to a knowledge-based economy," says Moskus. "The need to upgrade skills is ongoing. Community colleges are convenient, relatively inexpensive, and offer a wide range of options. People understand that learning is the key to a good job and a good life."

Lane is meeting demand by offering more sections of classes, more evening and weekend classes, more telecourses and online classes, and classes at more locations. To pay for the increase in service, the college will have to dip into reserves, says Moskus.

That's what happened last year. Enrollment grew 4 percent in 1999/200, counting 42,337 individuals by year's end. Lane spent \$1.2 million more than it received in revenues last year to meet this demand.

FALL WEB UPDATE

Lane has a new web server as of August 2000. Computer Services expected and has seen improved performance and is anticipating enhanced capabilities as features are implemented over the next several terms. One new capability is the ability to track how visitors are using the site, like what pages they visit most frequently and how they're navigating the site. Site management tools such as these also give demographic information about the user, like where they come from and other profile data. For instance, for the period of 16-29 September, 91,242 pages were accessed with a high of 19,689 pages on 26 September. Visitors came from 78 countries. Lane has over 8,000 web pages on its web site.

The Legong is the most dazzling of all the Balinese dances, and represents the archetype of femininity and grace. The Legong is the first dance young girls learn, which is not to say it is the easiest. The highly stylized movement is danced to the specific and complicated rhythms of the gamelan - the Balinese orchestra. There are many versions of this dance with various scenes from Hindu stories. Despite the dramatic content, the Legong exists purely for the sake of dancing.

BOND UPDATE

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER SITE OKAY AS IS. After further consultations with Eugene Sand & Gravel and the architects, it has been determined that gravel will not need to be applied to the base of the conference center site. When construction of the center was pushed back until the beginning of the year, it was thought that gravel would need to be applied at the site, thereby promoting drainage when winter rains arrived. However, inspection of the site after the rains last week indicated that the earth seems to be handling the water well and not deteriorating as was initially predicted. Construction continues to be tentatively scheduled to begin in January 2001.

LTD BUS SHELTERS EQUIPPED WITH TEMPORARY ROOFS. Because permanent roofing for the shelters will not arrive until the first of the year, temporary coverings of clear reinforced plastic are in place, protecting riders from the elements. Ample lighting installed on the center pillars of both shelters is operational. As promised, bike racks are now positioned at the site.

ENTRANCE TAKES SHAPE AT STUDENT SERVICES SITE. The main entrance of the Student Services building is being defined to a greater degree by excavation of the ADA ramp and the stairway. As you drive by the construction site, on the right side of the main entrance you can see tiers being developed for the ADA ramp. Between the tiers and the concrete forms on the left is the location of a wide stairway. The concrete forms on the right of the main entrance are part of what will eventually be the plaza seating area, complete with benches and planters. As work on the plaza reaches greater completion, Dale Parnell Loop will be reestablished with clearly marked crosswalks guiding people from Lot B and the bus station to the Student Services building.

PROGRESS ON HEALTH TECH CONTINUES AT GOOD RATE. With the majority of interior framing complete, drywall activities are picking up. Sheetrock is currently being hung, with work progressing from the east to the west end of the facility. Cabinets are on order.

WHAT IS THAT BOX ATOP THE SCIENCE BUILDING? Regardless of speculation about a huge classroom, extra offices, or even a facility to track alien activity, the large square structure atop the Science building is really a mechanical penthouse. The 33'x56' structure houses the multi-zoned HVAC system for the west addition. The system itself occupies half of the building with the large ducts that supply and return air to the west addition taking up the remaining space. Turning to construction activities, Hyland Construction continues to make steady progress on all additions. Sheetrock and insulation work has begun in certain sectors of the second floor of the west addition. Infrastructure work is proceeding in all areas. On the exterior of the west addition, the south entrance walkway is gaining greater definition as sidewalk work progresses.

GROUNDS DEPARTMENT CONSTRUCTS STAIRWAY ACCESS TO CHILDCARE. In order to provide a safe passageway from parking in Lot D, the Grounds department has constructed a stairway close to the northwest corner of the lot. The stairway, which is comprised of 4' x 8' pressure treated timbers and compacted gravel, will have handrails installed shortly. Wildflowers will be seeded at the location to provide seasonal bursts of color.

LAUNDRY SERVICES NEARS COMPLETION. As installation of the exhaust system for the booster boiler is completed, a call for inspection is expected shortly. For all practical purposes, once the boiler passes inspection, bond responsibility for Laundry Services is complete.

KLCC MEETS RADIOTHON GOAL 15 HOURS AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

\$190,000 goal surpassed in less than 7 days

KLCC's 2000 Fall Radiothon came to its satisfying conclusion a full 15 hours ahead of the designated end of Radiothon. The goal of \$190,000 was surpassed at 5:55 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 11 -- five minutes before the start of the Presidential Debate. This was the largest fundraising goal in KLCC history. When the phones finally stopped ringing, the grand total reached \$198,005. A total of 1425 listeners called in to pledge support throughout the week of Radiothon. Radiothon began with more than half the goal already in the bank, thanks to 1491 "Thon Busters," who contributed \$95,270 to KLCC in the weeks before Radiothon. Every dollar that came in from Thon Busters reduced the on-air goal of Radiothon. The final \$102,735 came from the 1425 listeners who made the call of support for public radio during Radiothon. The average Thon Buster contribution was \$64, while the average Radiothon contributor pledged \$62. Over 15% of the contributions were made on-line through KLCC's secure web site -- triple the amount of on-line contributions made in this year's spring Radiothon.

A huge thanks goes out to all who made it happen -- our new and renewing members, phone volunteers, office helpers, and "celebrity" co-pitchers!

KLCC member contributions help cover the cost of NPR news, nationally syndicated programs, locally programmed music, community information, live broadcasts of special events, and intelligent entertainment all year long. Over half of KLCC's budget comes from listeners and local businesses. KLCC has never failed to meet a Radiothon goal.

BOND UPDATE:

GLAZIERS UNION STRIKE DISRUPTS CONSTRUCTION. Early Friday morning, picket lines by the glaziers union (window installers) garnered general union support as subcontractors at all job sites honored the picket lines. Consequently, construction activities were generally brought to a halt on main campus. The strike, which centers on the union's desire to have Lane County Glass become a union shop, is in no way associated with any policies or practices of LCC. Attorneys for LCC, construction companies, and labor relations organizations are seeking a remedy that will allow construction to continue while affected parties seek resolution. In the meantime, the college will post signs at each of LCC's main entrances designating Eldon Schafer Drive as a union entrance and Gonyea Road as a nonunion entrance. Echoing the main entrances, each construction site will also have dual accesses. Union representatives will not impede the passage of students, staff or faculty on either Eldon Schafer Drive or Gonyea Road. Be aware that construction vehicles, deliveries, and general congestion will increase on Gonyea Road until resolution to the strike occurs. Thank you for your patience during the strike activities. BOND UPDATE

REDDAWAY TRUCK HAS CLOSE ENCOUNTER WITH STUDENT SERVICES SKY BRIDGE. On October 19, during delivery of LCC materials, a Reddaway truck driver mistakenly took the access road that leads under the Student Services sky bridge. In so doing, the top of the freight box clipped the very bottom of the sky bridge, tearing away a small portion of sheetrock. Since the building is still under the control of Chambers Construction and ownership has not been turned over to LCC, the issue of squaring up damages is a matter between Chambers and Reddaway. The sky bridge will, however, be raised...sort of. According to gLAs architects, the portion of the bridge that was caught by the delivery truck is actually part of a cosmetic architectural line that was incorporated to provide a congruent tie-in between Student Services and Apprenticeship. By removing lower cosmetic portions of the bridge, a 14foot passageway will be established, and the bridge 'raised,' without any disruption to the existing structural integrity of the pedestrian overpass.

BRIEF POWER SHUT DOWN ALLOWS IMPORTANT WORK ON STUDENT SERVICES. Initial work enabling the transformer at Student Services to be energized will occur between 10 p.m. on October 28 and 3 a.m. on October 29. Buildings that will be affected are Industrial Tech, Apprenticeship and Apprenticeship Annexes, Business, Administration, Child Care, and the Pizza Hut. Late hour scheduling allows electrical work to correspond with regular maintenance activities of Computer Services. During a second shut down the first half of November, final power connections will be made.

WORKFORCE TRAINING DOCUMENTS NEAR COMPLETION. Construction documents for the entire Workforce Training Center are approximately 85 percent complete. Part of the finalization process of the documents has been the valuable review by LCC Trades. Bid documents are scheduled to go out early in November. Turning to the site, the white pipe you may have seen stretching from the south wall to the west side foundation of Apprenticeship is performing a vital service. The pipe is channeling water from Lot E into an established roof drainage system of the Apprenticeship building, thereby preventing erosion. Naturally, permanent drainage will be established when construction activities commence in January.

OVERHEAD LIGHTING FOR LTD STATION ON ORDER. While lighting within the LTD Bus Station shelters is installed and operational, permanent overhead lighting for the site is scheduled for installation sometime during the middle of November. It's easy to tell where the lighting will be located. Just look for the orange traffic delineators on the plaza. The delineators are positioned over secured electrical conduit for the lighting.

DENTAL AREA COMPLETION STILL ON TARGET FOR FEBRUARY 2001. Steady progress in definition of spaces and establishment of infrastructure puts the completion date for Phase I of the Health Tech Remodel only four months down the road, in February 2001. The Dental Department anticipates that their move into the new facility will take place after spring break 2001 during a time that has yet to be determined.

PRELIMINARY WORK ON ADA RAMP ESTABLISHED AT SCIENCE ADDITION. On the west side of the Science addition, a sloping passageway has been created. Once finished, the passageway will be an ADA compliant ramp providing main campus access for individuals who park in Lot L. The ramp will have overhead lighting installed at various locations and will intersect established sidewalks adjacent to the Forum. Infrastructure work has proceeded to the point in the south addition that wall coverings will be applied shortly. The south addition's four labs will be ready for winter term classes.

CHILDCARE FACILITIES GET PERMANENT FENCING. Oregon Fence Company is making steady progress on the permanent fencing for the Child Care facilities. The fencing is vinyl coated cyclone wire measuring 6-feet at the perimeters and 4-feet on interior locations between buildings.

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MOSKUS GIVEN DIVERSITY AWARD

President Jerry Moskus received the Commitment to Diversity Award from the Western Region Council on Black American Affairs at the council's annual conference in Eugene on October 14. "Dr. Moskus has consistently demonstrated his commitment to diversity by his participation and support of the WRCBAA and other organizations which focus on the recruitment and retention of diverse populations, including Blacks, Latinos, Asians, Native Americans, the disabled and other groups," said Dr. Marian C. Shivers, president of WRCBAA.

The award follows numerous efforts Moskus has made on behalf of diversity during his tenure at Lane. Besides funding events such as the WRCBAA conference, he hired Lane's first affirmative action director in 17 years and had the college affirmative action plan updated and diversity plan established. He has received commendation from other groups as well, including the local African American Community Coalition and the Northwest Coalition Against Malicious Harassment.

BOND UPDATE

WATER/SEWER OPPERATIONAL AT PIZZA HUT. During the summer, construction activities that took place at the Workforce Training Center (WFTC) site damaged a sewer line that serviced the Training and Development facilities. While the bond office wrestled over a feasible remedy to the situation, T&D's personnel and clients patiently made use of accommodations in the Apprenticeship building. After investigating multiple routes for a temporary or permanent line, and in light of up and coming construction on the WFTC, it was decided to locate temporary water/sewer tanks for the Pizza Hut just east of the building. The tanks will be removed in a few months when permanent hook-ups are made. The permanent lines will specifically accommodate the Pizza Hut and two adjacent modulars, plus any future development that occurs in the general location.

CAMPUS SERVICES ADDITION PASSES INSPECTION. Final occupancy permits have been obtained for the Campus Services Addition which houses Laundry Services and Printing/Graphics. Responsibility for the facility now falls to Facilities Management & Planning.

WHY AREN'T THERE ANY WINDOWS ON THE EAST SIDE OF THE SKY BRIDGE? Good question. The answer: energy calculation, heat loss, and code requirements. In designing buildings, architects must adhere to codes that specify a limit of 30 percent glazing in the total exterior wall area of a structure. Part of the appeal of the Student Services building is the vast expanse of glass on the west and south walls adjacent to the main lobby. Moreover, take a look at the large two-story windows that are positioned on all other exterior walls of the building and provide much coveted window space for personnel offices. Taken as a whole, that's a lot of glass! Architects had originally included windows on both sides of the sky bridge. However, in order to meet glazing codes, general glass reductions were made in the building, among which were leaving windows only on the west side of the sky bridge.

ADA PARKING SPACES AVAILABLE AT SCIENCE SITE. After several delays, ADA parking spaces and the adjacent sidewalk are now available for use at the south side of the Science building. Progress continues on the new ADA ramp located on the west side of the facility. The ramp will provide campus access from Lot L.
