OCTOBER BOARD REPORT

The Board of Education unanimously approved the annual evaluation of President Jerry Moskus at its October meeting. "We believe that this will be President Moskus' finest year," said their written statement.

"A very strong field" of 23 candidates for the position of president was received, consultant Dale Parnell reported. Three applicants are women. The board accepted the applicant pool with a 6-0 vote (Ralph Wheeler was absent).

In other unanimous action, the board approved purchase of an automated broadcast system for the college's cable channel, elevators for the Mechanical Technologies and Forum buildings, negotiations with

Driftwood Shores for Elderhostel accommodations, a food contract for the child care co-op and lab, personnel appointments, and resignations from Budget Committee members James Reeves of Zone 4 and Lawrence Salmony of Zone 2.

A new board policies on parliamentary procedure received a first reading, and a revision to how buildings are named under the asset protection policy was debated. First reading of a new policy on affirmative action was postponed so policy language could be strengthened.

A board committee to develop criteria for president emeritus was not formed.

Benchmarks for 1999/00 showed that headcount enrollment was 42,337; 15.3 percent of county residents age 15 and older were served, and 12,449 reimbursable FTE was counted. Also reviewed were a benchmark on the number of FTE by reimbursement category, and the quarterly financial report.

The president reported that summer enrollment was up 8.9 percent in FTE and fall was up 7.1 percent in FTE. He commended staff for handling the increases very smoothly. In other news, he reported that the restructuring team was at work, that Lane's financial aid default rate was down, and that one in three Lane students receives financial aid, but this same third produces half the college's FTE.

Under statements from the audience, instructor Stan Taylor said land use issues have come up in neighborhood and county discussions of the Oregon Military Department plans to build an armory across from main campus. Vice President Marie Matsen said college legal counsel is reviewing land use information.

BOND UPDATE

POWER SHUT DOWN SCHEDULED LATE WEDNESDAY EVENING. Electrical connections that will energize the transformer for Student Services requires a final power shut down. The shut down will occur from 11 p.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 8 to 3 a.m. on Thursday, Nov. 9. Buildings that will be affected by the shut down are Industrial Tech, Apprenticeship and Apprenticeship Annex, Business, Administration, Child Care, and the Pizza Hut. The 11 p.m. shut down time will allow those classes and activities that conclude at 10 p.m. ample time to conclude business. However, since the shut down will affect Business, during the power outage there will be no access to network services such as HP 3000, Lane's home page, remote access, GroupWise e-mail, and online classes.

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER OUT FOR BID NOVEMBER 12. With the completion of necessary examination of designs by architects and engineers, final drawings of the Workforce Training Center will go out for bid on November 12. Bids will be opened December 8. At that time, the Bond Project Management Team will make a recommendation for award of the contract. Construction activities will commence the beginning of January 2001.

OPERATORY AREA OF HEALTH TECH TAKES SHAPE. A significant space on the first floor of Health Tech is the operatory area where new dental chairs will be located. Under construction are two operatory lab stations that will be equipped with cabinets and sinks. These lab stations will be positioned so as to divide the eighteen dental chairs into three pods. In so doing, students and dental instructors will find that carrying out their clinical training or instruction will be benefited by immediate access to sinks and work surfaces, greater ease of mobility, and valuable access to immediate student/instructor interaction; all of which is facilitated by a configuration that centers around the lab stations.

STUDENT SERVICES MOVING ALONG AT FAST PACE. On the first floor, painting is completed in a large portion of office and lab space. Restrooms are having tile applied to portions of the walls and floor. Generally, electrical outlets for lights and clocks are in place. On the second floor, 75 percent of drywall activity is complete. Steel stud framing is being applied to sections of the main lobby stairway. On the exterior of the building, the main entrance has had the ADA ramp footings poured allowing development of the passageway.

SCIENCE/MATH ADDITIONS PROGRESSING NICELY. The interior of the west and south additions to the Science building contain offices and classrooms/lab space that are clearly identifiable. Drywall, taping, and texturing are all but complete on the first floor, with final painting having already taken place in many areas. On the second floor over 75 percent of drywall installation is complete. Drywall activities in the south addition are approximately 95 percent complete with construction activities gearing up for December 15 occupancy. The ADA ramp on the west side of the building has had several more sections poured and hand railing installed on the southernmost portions.

HOW HAS BOND CONSTRUCTION AFFECTED YOU? One of the most fun and interesting activities associated with putting out the bond update is the chance to talk to students about construction activities. While some students are shy and reserved, those interviewed last week were quite gregarious and enthusiastic as they commented on how bond construction has impacted their time on the main campus. We follow the proven international guidelines of TNR (trap, neuter, return) method as set forth for the care, control and stabilization of feral cats. This method has been successful throughout the United States on campuses such as the University of Texas at Austin, University of California at Berkeley, University of Washington and Stanford University, as well as throughout Britain.

Lane's colony consists of 14 cats, all of them now neutered. Donations help provide spaying and neutering, medical care, and food for the cats. Anyone interested in donating can make a tax deductible donation to the LCC Animal Support Fund Project #2462 at the LCC Foundation office, set up a payroll deduction through Personnel, or bring your donation to any committee member. Food donations are welcome. The committee of 14 consists of classified, faculty and community members. Abandoning a cat on campus is illegal and can result in a \$100-\$500 fine. FROM THE GROUNDS UP

A report from groundskeeper Frank Drengacz:

As some of you have probably noticed, the two vine maples at the lower Forum have been relocated. They dug fairly easily, or at least as easily as it can get with the "soils" on campus. One maple was moved about 50 feet. It replaced a vine maple that had died. The other maple is loaded on a trailer ready to make the trip to Florence. We are not going to be able to put it in as sheltered a location as the Forum bed. There is a bed on the Florence campus that would be perfect, but it is not accessible. If the tree can handle the winds in the summer, it will make it. At least the winds won't be dry. The folks in the Forum are pretty disappointed that the trees had to be moved. The birds loved them. But everybody said they appreciated that we relocated them instead of just cutting them down. And they all said they had appointments when I told then I had an extra shovel. They had shows to produce or some other lame excuse.

The Florence project is going well. I will be planting this week. I will be using plants donated by Grant's Landscaping. Hopefully I'll be done in about two more weeks. I'm getting a little tired of the Pizza Hut all-you-can-eat buffet.

This is a good time of year to start transplanting. Most plants can be moved pretty easily from now until growth starts in the spring. Ideally plants should be moved at least a month before root growth starts in late winter or early spring. A good guide for sizing the root ball is; for every inch caliper of the trunk, the root ball should be 8" to 10" in diameter. The depth of the root ball should be two thirds the diameter. When transplanting, there has to be compromise between saving roots and saving your back. The 8" to 10" rule usually works. As long as the average size of the roots you are cutting are about the size of a pencil or smaller, the plant should survive. Happy digging!

- Q. HOW DO WE KNOW FOR SURE THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?
- A. When the decision is made to close the college, the college immediately notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other news media. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Please do not call the media. This interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information. Here's where to tune in:

- Q. WHAT ABOUT COLLEGE LEARNING CENTERS AT HIGH SCHOOLS?
- A. Lane Community College Learning Centers at high schools will follow the host high school's closure schedule.
- O. WHEN WILL WE KNOW THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?
- A. Snow closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m. Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day but will open for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

Q. IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED, SHOULD STAFF REPORT FOR WORK?

A. When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions from their supervisor or the media. If one or more facilities are closed and others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

Q. WHAT DO DELAYS MEAN?

A. If the opening of classes is delayed, students and faculty should report to the class or lab they would normally have been attending at the new starting time, provided at least 50 minutes of class/lab time remains. For example, if opening is delayed to 10 o'clock, classes and labs normally in session at 10 o'clock would meet, but only if the normal ending time for that class or lab is 10:50 o'clock or later. The remainder of the day would continue on the regular schedule.

Q. ARE THERE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES?

A. When 30th Avenue seems icy, some people choose to come from the east via Franklin, or to ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, the drivers may choose alternate routes. An LTD route change does not necessarily indicate a college closure.

O. WILL STAFF GET PAID?

A. The College Online Procedures System (COPS) states under Pay: School Closure, General Guidelines For Compensation: All bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors and management employees scheduled to work on the school closure day should be paid as if they worked their regular schedule. Employees required to work when the school is closed on a regularly scheduled work day should be provided time off with pay on a straight-time basis.

Will the lights sufficiently illuminate the area, especially when it's dreary outside? These types of questions were normal considering the distance from floor to ceiling is 40" and currently, there are no obvious indications of lighting fixtures. However, luminaries, as they are called in the construction trade, will be installed in the main lobby. The 14 luminaries, or lights, will be 8" cylinders suspended 36" down from the ceiling by pendulum lines. In addition to the suspended luminaries, along the north and south sides of the lobby at the second floor level, over 30 wall-mounted lights also will be installed. Let there be light! Turning to current construction activities, elevator installation will commence within the next two weeks. Drywall, texturing and painting are moving rapidly around the interior perimeter of the building. The last phase of drywall will occur in the lobby area. Ceiling grid should be totally installed on the first floor this week. The ADA entry ramp will also be poured by November 17.

HEALTH TECH REMAINS ON SCHEDULE. The first phase of the Health Tech remodel is concerned with providing a new area for the Dental program. For the first time last week, dental personnel took a tour of their new facilities. Imagine the delight expressed by staff members while seeing the spacious layout of the new dental department: a layout that will better serve staff, students, and patients than the approximately thirty-year old existing dental lab. The remodel is scheduled for completion in February 2001 with the majority of move in activities occurring several weeks prior to spring term. In light of the February completion date, discussion of moving activities is already underway between the Bond Project Management Team and departmental representatives.

THE 'SPINE' IS POINT OF INTEREST IN SCIENCE/MATH CONSTRUCTION. It is somehow appropriate that construction design of the Science/Math facility would contain an area that the architects refer to as the 'spine.' The spine is the major passageway that runs the entire distance from south to north entrances between the existing Science building and the addition, joining the two facilities into one. Looking at the building from the south parking lot, the spine is the portion of the building that has an elevated, east-west curved roofline. On the interior of the building, the spine has large steel beams that run horizontally, connecting the addition to the Science building. The powerful beams are offset by an elevated bank of windows on the east side that allow ample natural light to filter into both first and second story open walkways. When completed, a suspended wood-slat ceiling will arch above the passageway. Doorways off the spine will provide entrance to Science classrooms and labs on the east and the Science Resource Center and departmental office/reception on the west. In the addition, the Math Resource Center and associated departmental areas are being constructed in the more western portions of the addition. directly adjacent to Science space. The combined affect of architectural elements within the main passageway will render the functional area of the facility, referred to as the spine, as an aesthetically pleasing experience for all. Pictures of the spine can be viewed as part of the Science/Math project at the bond web site.

CANDIDATES SELECTED FOR LCC PRESIDENCY

The Board of Education has selected four candidates to interview for the position of college president. Interviewing will be Dr. Daniel Phelan of West Burlington, Iowa, Dr. Diana Sloane of Davis, Calif., Dr. Mary Spilde of Eugene, Ore., and Dr. Norman Will of Ormond-by-the-Sea, Florida.

Daniel Phelan has 19 years administrative experience in community colleges and 10 years part-time teaching experience in higher education. He has served as president of Southeastern Community College District in West Burlington, Iowa, since 1997. He was executive vice president of educational and student services at Western Nebraska Community College in Scottsbluff from 1995-97, after two years as vice president of educational services. He held various management posts at Johnson County Community College in Overland Park, Kansas; North Iowa Area Community College in Mason City; and Mount St. Clare College in Clinton, Iowa. Phelan earned a doctorate in higher education administration from Iowa State University in Ames in 1990. He has a master's in business administration from Mount St. Clare College. University in Davenport, Iowa, and a bachelor's in business administration from Mount St. Clare College.

Diana Sloane has 16 years administrative experience and 14 years teaching experience in community colleges. She has served as vice chancellor of education and technology at Los Rios Community College District in Sacramento, Calif., since 1997. From 1995-97 she was vice president of academic and student services at Lake Michigan College in Benton Harbor, Mich. She held management positions at Santa Barbara City College, Calif., where she also taught. She taught elementary school in Milwaukee, Wisc., was a public health nurse in New Haven, Conn., and served in Mysore, India for the Peace Corps. Sloane earned a doctorate in educational administration in 1992 from the University of Texas at Austin. Her master's in educational administration is from the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee, and her bachelor's in nursing is from the University of Connecticut in Storrs.

Mary Spilde has 20 years experience in community college administration, including the last five at LCC. She has served as vice president of instruction and student services since 1997, and before that was vice president for instructional services. From 1980-95, she served at Linn-Benton Community College in Albany, Ore., beginning as instructor-coordinator of a pre-employment training program and working her way up to dean of business, training and health occupations. She has supervised training at Kmart Corporation, was a project coordinator at Alcan International in London, England, and was a teacher-tutor at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. Spilde earned a doctorate in post-secondary education at Oregon State University in Corvallis in 1995, where she also earned a master's in education. She has a bachelor's in business and social systems and a law degree from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland.

Norman Will has 16 years experience in community college administration and 20 years teaching experience in higher education. He has served as president of Florida Community College of Jacksonville-South Campus, since 1999. He was executive vice president for academic and student services at Daytona Beach Community College from 1997-99, where he also worked as vice president for academic affairs and dean of arts and sciences. He has taught at Union County College, Upsala College, Rutgers University, and Essex Catholic High School, all in New Jersey. Will earned a doctorate in English from Rutgers University in 1977. He has a master's in English from Seton Hall University in South Orange, New Jersey, and a bachelor's in English from Boston College in Massachusetts.

Lane's Board of Education plans to conduct interviews, hold forums for staff to meet the candidates, and possibly visit candidate campuses, from later this month through early February. A decision is expected mid to late February. The new president will begin work on July 1.

The board developed criteria in the spring and summer, including staff input. National recruitment occurred from July to October. Lane founding president Dr. Dale Parnell served as search consultant. A screening committee of faculty, students, staff, community members, and board members was chaired by faculty union president Margaret Bayless. The committee made recommendations to the board earlier in November on the 23 applications received.

Dr. Jerry Moskus, president of Lane since 1990, announced in March his decision to retire effective June 30, 2001. Board chair Robert Ackerman said Moskus "will be remembered as one of the

outstanding presidents of LCC. His educational leadership gained LCC national recognition as one of the best community colleges in the nation." Highlights from Moskus' tenure include passing a tax base, construction bond, and positioning Lane as a leader in the national learning college movement.

SCAR/Jasper Mountain is one of over 60 agencies in Lane County that receives funding through the United Way. Do you know why Jasper Mountain Center is housed on a castle on a hill outside Jasper Oregon? When you enter, you walk past a knight in a suit of armor. When you watch the children in therapy, you see rich use of fantasy, Star Trek, for example, with its rich characters, or "Abuse busters", a parody of Ghostbusters. This is because children who have had their childhood stolen through abuse and neglect lose a most precious thing-their imagination. Jasper Mountain focuses on not just changing a child's behavior. The staff believe that if you will heal a child you will not only change how they behave, but how they think and how they feel. It is the only center in the state outside Portland that does what it does. Jasper Mountain takes the most abused children in Oregon, the most manipulative, the most damaged, the most forlorn, aged 3-11. It has a very long waiting list. Its staff is a dedicated expert group who try to heal children whose lives have gone seriously wrong, and who have no future and no present, only pasts in which they are horrendously stuck. When my husband and I purchased our last vehicle, we didn't trade in the old one. We gave it to Jasper Mountain. They drive their vehicles until literally the brakes go out. What a shame that such a place goes begging in a society who has so much for itself.

What can I say to you about any United Way Agency, except that I am sure that all these agencies so carefully hidden from our view are struggling to keep afloat and do their good, as Scar/Jasper Mountain does. I just want you to know about this one, that is so close to my heart. One of the children who lived in my home came from Jasper Mountain, and he and every child from there has a very personal and very painful story. BUDGET UPDATE

While Ballot Measures 91 and 8, which would have substantially reduced state resources, did not pass during the recent election, Ballot Measure 88 did pass. This measure raises the deductability ceiling for Federal taxes from \$3,000 to \$5,000. The estimated cost to Lane will be about \$650,000 per year.

However, 2001 is a legislative year and our state funding is unknown at this time. If we assume what the state calls "current service level", our budget picture is not very rosy for 2001/02. With no adjustments to our budget except increases for employee salaries, we estimate our operating deficit to be about \$3.2 million. If the legislature were to give community colleges the \$80 million additional funds we are asking for, our budget would just about balance. We don't think we will get the \$80 million, but we are optimistic that the colleges will get more than current service level.

Some good news is that the community colleges were successful with the Emergency Board last week and Lane will benefit by about \$358,000 for enrollment growth for the current year.

The Governor's Budget will be released on December 1. We will be able to do a better job of projecting our 2001-2002 situation after that date. - Marie Matsen, Vice President for College Operations

BOARD REPORT

In action on November 8, the Board of Education approved the budget calendar for 2001/02; approved the academic calendar for 2001/02; appointed Marston Morgan to Zone 2 and James Hume to Zone 4 of the Budget Committee; accepted the retirements of Russell Bowen from Advanced Technology and Sharon Wendell from Family and Health Careers; and selected March 9 and 10 as retreat dates; all by 6-0 vote. Mike Rose was absent.

Auditor Kenneth Kuhns told the board that Lane received an "unqualified, clean opinion" on its annual audit, the highest opinion possible. Craig Taylor presented benchmarks on goal accomplishment of former students, employment of professional-technical students, prof-tech students' satisfaction with Lane, and transfer students' satisfaction.

Sue Colvin updated the board on the presidential search. The board also heard from consultant Dale Parnell in a work session earlier that evening. The next step is scheduling interviews with candidates.

The board held first readings on a revised policy on asset protection which includes how buildings are named, and a more comprehensive board policy on affirmative action. The board adopted a new policy on parliamentary procedure.

The meeting took less than two hours and followed an open work session and closed executive session. The next meeting is set for December 13. More information is posted on the web at http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/lccboard.htm.

BOND UPDATE

ADDITIONAL BRICK DESIGNATES 60 PERCENT MARK. Application of the third brick on the Millennium 2 Project Signs indicates that bond construction progress has reached 60 percent completion. Approximately \$31.9 million of the \$53.2 million budget has been expended. The budget includes the \$42.8 million bond measure approved by voters, plus interest. Main campus projects underway include the Science/Math Addition, the Student Services Building, and the Health Technology Remodel. Funds also have been used to build a new center in Cottage Grove, add to the Florence center, and to build Community Learning Centers at eight county high schools.

IS YOUR DEPARTMENT MOVING WITHIN THE NEXT SIX MONTHS? If your department will be relocating to new or remodeled areas within the next six months, the Bond Moving Team strongly encourages you to do some "spring cleaning" during the winter months. STUDENT SERVICES CONTINUES FAST PACE. Exterior doors have been hung at all entrance points on the north, south, and east sides of the building. Understandably, the large windows and doors on the west side will be some of the last exterior work undertaken, thereby reducing the risk of damage to the vast expanse of glazing. Workers are readying the permanent door framing where the sky bridge meets the Apprenticeship building. Sheet rock is complete on the second floor. Framing and pouring of the ADA ramp at the main west entrance continues.

SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION ON SCHEDULE FOR FIRST QUARTER COMPLETION. Hyland Construction continues to make steady progress toward the March 2001 completion of the Science/Math addition. Sheet rock is complete on the second floor of the west addition. The south labs continue to take shape as PVC webbing is installed over concrete floor slabs. The plastic webbing is comprised of caps approximately 2" in height connected to one another by plastic tabs. The webbing will allow data lines to be run underneath flooring, which will be installed shortly.
