Green is the founder and director of The Campus Computing Project, Green's annual survey on computer usage is highly regarded by campus officials and IT industry leaders. From 1979-1990, Brown performed with Diana Ross's band, including a memorable concert for Queen Elizabeth at Royal Albert Hall in England. Brown even performed with the Beatles on their recording, "My Sweet Lord." Brown loves straight ahead mainstream jazz and recorded several CDs with the late legendary bassist Leroy Vinnegar. Brown is one of the founders of the Mount Hood Jazz Festival and is active in music education. He performs regularly in the Portland area. ## BUDGET UPDATE

The governor's budget announced Friday, Dec. 1, includes an increase of \$45 million dollars for community colleges over the 2001-2003 Biennium. Preliminary figures released by the Department of

Community Colleges and Workforce Development indicate that Lane could receive up to \$2.2 million more in 2001-02 than the college will receive from the state this year. Of course, the budget will not be final until the Legislature approves it, probably after May 2001. Also, since community colleges show the largest percentage increase in the governor's budget and are one of the very few to get any increase, the \$45 million will probably fall under attack on numerous fronts. If the numbers were to hold up, our budget would come close to balancing for 2001-02 at our current level of programs and services. Still up in the air are possible changes to the community college funding formula, all of which would lower Lane's allocation by up to \$1.5 million. Some of the funding formula issues will be decided at the December 8 state board meeting. Lane's Office of College Operations will provide an update on the college's budget situation early in the week of December 11. - Marie Matsen Vice President for College Operations

#### FROM THE GROUNDS UP

A report from grounds keeper Frank Drengacz:

Security had to be called to the Campus Services Building again. I was about to strangle Bob, Mike and Tom. Let me tell you why. I finally finished landscaping the north building at the Florence campus. I was looking forward to getting back to my real love, pruning and weeding. First Tom approaches me about the design for the LTD bus stop landscape. I said I would get right on it. After all, I had promised a design about 6 weeks ago. Then Bob chimed in about a budget for the landscape. I thought fine, I did promise a budget figure about 8 weeks ago. Then Mike adds (he always seems to be the last straw), "we need the landscape done by the 13th (Dec.)". That was it. I went berserk. Dawn, Judy and Robin had to spirit those three rogues away before I did some serious damage.

Anyway, in order for any new landscape to develop, the existing "soil" needs to be replaced. Of course this means the existing juniper must be removed as well. What I am going to try to accomplish before the 13th will be; the removal of the juniper, the removal of 12" of the existing soil, the placement of new soil, "blowing-on" 3" of compost. The only reason I've agreed to this work is the beds are narrow enough so that this work can be done without driving over the excavated areas. A very common mistake amongst professional and amateur landscapers is to work our heavy soils when they are too wet. Frequently the results are fatal for the new plants. When the dry warm weather has returned, then we will till the compost in. I will be using a combination of native and exotic plant material. There will be a little bit of lawn. This way the students can stretch out while waiting for the bus. The art department will also be creating some art work to go in the beds. I think it will be a fun.

So if any of you have been putting off any planting projects till the fall, it is to late. Fall is the best time to plant as long as the soil has been prepared when it was dry. If you aren't doing any soil prep never mind.

## CHECK HOW YOUR STUDENTS DID IN THE NEXT CLASS

You can now check how students fared from one class to the next. The Instructional Technology Infrastructure project of the SLI has just released the first version of an interactive query system for the student data that is sent to the state each quarter. The query that is currently supported allows you to determine the grade distribution from one class to another. Would you like to know how many students who got a C in Math 70 got C's or better in Math 95? What kind of grades do students in Writing 121 get when they go to Writing 122? What about the A students in Math 251? How do they do in Physics 201? You can also check individual sections to determine how well the students succeeded in subsequent classes or what their grade distribution was for the prerequisite courses. The 2000-01 FAFSA's also are still available at the Students First! Center for this current school year.

## BOND UPDATE

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER SCHEDULE REVISION MEANS MONETARY SAVINGS. The Bond Project Management Team has revised scheduling of the Workforce Training Center by replacing the two-phase approach: completion of the Conference Center (Phase I) prior to remodeling the Apprenticeship building (Phase II). The rationale for the change hinged on two elements: the phase approach proved too costly, and evidence strongly indicated that completion of the Conference Center by September '01 was impossible. The two-phase approach had the Conference Center beginning in January '01; Apprenticeship departments and activities moving into the Conference upon completion in September '01; and remodel of Apprenticeship commencing in November '01, with completion in June '02. In the revised schedule, general construction will begin in February '01 and reach completion in March '02. In so doing, a construction contractor can carry out activities in a more holistic efficient manner, thereby saving approximately \$75, 000 in project funds. In the new schedule, two T&D buildings and the former Jewelry Lab will be vacated during March '01, with the Apprenticeship building vacating the end of June '01. Temporary locations for departmental functions and classrooms have been secured for future displaced occupants of T&D and the Apprenticeship building during Workforce Training Center construction. At the time of vacancy, ABSE and AHS will move permanently to the second floor of the current Math/Art building.

FURNISHING PLAN AVAILABLE ON BOND WEB SITE. Furnishings have always been a part of the overall bond budget. Understandably, future residents of new buildings have asked, "Will I get a new computer desk?" "What types of tables and/or chairs will be in new classrooms?" In order to answer such questions, plus provide guidelines for furnishing bond projects, the Bond Project Management Team recommended a Bond Furnishings Plan to the Facilities Management Team. The plan, which was adopted by the FMT on November 20th, sets forth a two-phase approach to furnishing projects. In the first phase, existing furnishings will be moved to bond-constructed spaces which replace existing spaces. This is a conservative strategy to assure furnishing funds for all bond projects. The plan includes office and classroom standards which were developed by the furnishings committees. You can read the Furnishings Plan, which will guide the campus through the process of furniture acquisition and placement, by visiting

**PERFORMING ARTS DESIGNS NEAR FINALIZATION.** The Performing Arts project, which is comprised of remodeling activities and an addition, were reviewed this week by PUG members, architects, and engineers. Once architectural designs are finalized, the proposed schedule indicates that construction will begin on or about April 18, 2001 and conclude in December 2001.

**FUTURE DENTAL LAB TAKES ON MORE DETAIL.** Shortly, the future home of the dental lab will begin to take on more character. Installation of floor covering will begin today. Next week, window glazing will take place and cabinets will be delivered. Over the winter break, a fire-resistant paint will be applied to reinforced steel installed in the breezeway this past summer. Painting should take place intermittently, with work completed in four to five days.

**ONLY TWO MONTHS TO SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION OF STUDENT SERVICES.** Chambers Construction has set February 1st as the substantial completion date of the Student Services building. This means that the building will be sufficiently finished, and as the owner, LCC can take beneficial occupancy by moving things into the facility. After the February 1st date, Chambers Construction will continue to work on a punch list of items to be completed. Currently, work taking place is centered in several key areas: installation of the main lobby elevator, interior finish work on doors and hardware, and initial glazing work at the main west entrance.

**CABINETRY WORK BEGINS IN SCIENCE/MATH ADDITION.** Interior work has progressed to a point in the Science/Math Addition that currently allows LCC's trades to install cabinetry. In addition to cabinetry, final portions of ceiling grid are being installed on the first floor by Hyland's crews. In the south addition, portions of flooring has been laid down and some cabinetry installed. The south addition, which will house multiple Science labs, is scheduled for completion on December 18th. The east addition, which generally provides storage space, will be turned over to the college on or about December 27th.

**LTD STATION MOVES CLOSER TO COMPLETION.** With completion scheduled for January 2001, temporary roofing on the bus shelters has been replaced with permanent skylights. In addition to the skylights, sign display cabinets have been put up at the kiosk, tower, and shelters. Installation of light poles is currently underway. The skylight for the clock tower is expected the first of the year. Discussions continue regarding sculpture that will be positioned at the site.

**LCC'S ELECTRICIANS EXTEND SPECIAL THANKS.** LCC's electricians would like to thank campus staff and students for their patience and understanding during the drilling that took place last week between the Business and Apprenticeship buildings. The electricians completed a large portion of necessary work associated with the transformer and generator that will service the Workforce Training Center. Although work will continue until the end of December, activities will be carried out without accompanying noise disruptions.

## GRADE POSTING REMINDER

Helen Barker Garrett, director of Enrollment Services, reminds all faculty and staff of Lane's policy on the public posting of grades. This excerpt is taken from COPPS and may be view in full at <http://lanecc.edu/cops/posting.htm> .

"Social security numbers listed in alphabetical order by the student's last name can easily be traced to student identity by referencing the alpha name list; therefore, grades may not be posted by the last four digits of the social security number. Students who wish to have their grades posted must decide with the instructor what four numbers to use, and they must be unrelated to their social security number. It is also not acceptable to leave graded homework or test papers in a stack for students to pick up that requires sorting through the papers of all students."

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## BOND UPDATE

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER BIDS TO BE OPENED WEDNESDAY. Bids submitted for the Workforce Training Center will be opened Wednesday, Dec. 20, at 10 a.m. The contract for the apparent low bidder will be awarded at the January Board of Education meeting. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin in February '01 and reach completion in March '02.

LANE TO TAKE POSSESSION OF SOUTH SCIENCE LABS. This week Hyland Construction Company will turn the south Science labs over to Lane. Furnishings for the labs are currently on order, with delivery of tables and stools expected around the second week of January. Diverse activities continue in multiple areas of the new facility, propelling the project towards a spring completion date. Of current interest is installation of patterned tile in restrooms, sheet rock work in the area of the 'spine,' the pouring of concrete sidewalks adjacent to the new south labs, and continued cabinet installation by college carpenters Steve Kayl, Al Mauldin, and Ray Leonard.

CO-OP ED STUDENT PLAYS VITAL ROLE IN COMPLETION OF SCIENCE REMODEL. Within the Cooperative Education program, learning is experiential: theories learned within the classroom are applied in the workplace, thereby taking understanding, knowledge, and education to the next step. Thanks to bond construction activities, the Science remodel on Lane's main campus offered a significant experiential learning opportunity for one student, who, by fulfilling his Cooperative Education requirement, helped rebuild electronic systems in the Science facility as a temporary bond employee. SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION FOR HEALTH TECH ONLY 1-1/2 MONTHS AWAY. With projected substantial completion the first of February, things are really taking shape in the northern section of Health Tech's first floor. Viewing panels have been installed in corridor walls next to the X-ray rooms, clocks are positioned on walls, ceiling grid is completed, beginning stages of ceiling tile installation is underway, and doors have been painted and hung. Carpet has also been installed in the offices on the far east side of the remodel. Exterior glazing on the north side of the building was completed last week.
