## E-MAIL REMINDER FROM COMPUTER SERVICES

In order to keep the e-mail system from slowing down, the system currently is set up for a 250-day auto clean-up of mail accounts. This means all mail box items over 250 days old is removed and purged from the GroupWise system. A good rule is to plan clean-up or archive your mail account every 90 days when you are prompted to change your password. This will act as a reminder and give ample time to plan. ## DECEMBER BOARD REPORT

Aviation Maintenance Technician program faculty and staff received certificates of appreciation and other accolades for reviving the program, which faced possible elimination one year ago, at the December 13 Board of Education meeting. President Jerry Moskus acknowledged instructors Larry Davis, Jim Brooks, Phil Foster, Mike Riley, Keith Bird, Brian McGlynn, and Cliff Guse, and administrators Sandy Cutler, Bob Way; and Sonja Burdick. Student Gene Lunneman wrote and read a letter of praise to the AMT instructors. In action, the board:

- \* approved purchase of 11 aircraft engines from Textron/Lycoming of Pennsylvania for \$252,000;
- \* awarded an interior signage contract to Kroy Sign Systems of Arizona;
- \* awarded a building management control system contract for the Workforce Training Building to Control Contractors of Portland, for \$395,725;
- \* approved budget transfers for the 2000-01
- \* approved the classified contract;
- \* approved 2000-01 advisory committee appointments and reappointments;
- \* approved revisions to board policies on asset protection and affirmative action.
- \* appointed Sue Roders as Family and Health Careers faculty, Mark Williams as temporary faculty in Instruction and Student Services; and Bonnie Nussbaum and Marie Coonradt as interim faculty in Adult High School;
- \* accepted the retirement of speech instructor Jack Robert, effective March 31.

Presentations included a presidential search update from Sue Colvin; a Vanguard College update from Steven Pruch, Bill Griffiths and Alen Bahret.

Reports include news from President Moskus that the Governor's budget allocates \$45 million to Oregon's community colleges, and Commissioner Cam Preus-Braly has changed the funding formula but discussion will continue. He also noted that the 1999-00 FTE audit was completed with no negative findings, and that staff refined the shared governance appeal process and posted it on the College On-line Procedure and Policy System web site.

Vice President Marie Matsen reported that a planning consultant opinion suggests that the college has a strong case for exemption to the metro plan.

Bond Construction Manager Bob Mention said the start date for the central plant upgrade has been changed from January to March. He said bond projects are 60 percent complete with about two years to conclusion.

Craig Taylor presented the annual benchmark on change in employee headcount.

Sue Colvin reported on compensation and benefits, noting that three Lane employee groups have negotiated salary increases in the last year; wage rates for three job classifications were adjusted; the negotiated market adjustment for classified computer technology employees was extended pending the outcome of the nearly-complete technology study. A management compensation study will be presented in February. There is concern about the escalating cost of group insurance.

Vice President Marie Matsen reported on asset protection and expressed concern about maintenance of facilities and equipment. Chair Robert Ackerman asked why the liability limits of this

policy exceed statutory limit under the tort claims act; college legal counsel will respond. Matsen also reported that Lane's natural gas bill has increased and attributed this to the rise in natural gas prices, deregulation, natural gas supply shortage, and new facilities. She said the college may find a new broker, will study alternative energy sources, and will turn down thermostats. Finally, she noted that Lane's website now includes a budget development component.

Board member Kathleen Shelley reported that she was appointed to the Centro Latino Americano board of directors.

Later in the month, on December 19, the board met in executive on the presidential search. The board next meets on January 10.

Helen Barker Garrett, director of Enrollment Services, reminds all faculty and staff of Lane's policy on the public posting of grades. This excerpt is taken from COPPS and may be view in full at <http://lanecc.edu/cops/posting.htm> .

"Social security numbers listed in alphabetical order by the student's last name can easily be traced to student identity by referencing the alpha name list; therefore, grades may not be posted by the last four digits of the social security number. Students who wish to have their grades posted must decide with the instructor what four numbers to use, and they must be unrelated to their social security number. It is also not acceptable to leave graded homework or test papers in a stack for students to pick up that requires sorting through the papers of all students."

## THERMOSTATS TO BE ADJUSTED

Lane plans to decrease temperature settings from about 70 degrees Fahrenheit to 68 degrees in offices and classrooms, and to about 65 degrees in shop areas, beginning Thursday, Jan. 11. This is an effort to conserve resources and to curb this year's already soaring energy costs. Governor John Kitzhaber has called on Oregonians to use less energy, citing a very tight energy supply for this winter.

The Northwest may face an energy shortage because of growth in the region and less rainfall to power dams than in past years. Natural gas prices have more than doubled in the last year and energy experts at the Oregon State Office of Energy predict that gas prices will increase by more than 50 percent again this calendar year. The office recommends that businesses set their thermostats to 68 degrees Fahrenheit. All state government offices are set at this temperature. Office and classroom temperatures at Lane have been at 70 to 72 degrees. Please plan for this change by bringing an extra sweater to work. Fire code prohibits space heaters. Instead, staff at the Oregon State Office of Energy recommend getting up and moving around a little bit when you start feeling cool.

In addition, please help communicate this change to students by encouraging them to dress warmly, and stressing our commitment to resource conservation and keeping educational costs down.

#### BOND UPDATE

**APPARENT LOW BIDDER REVEALED FOR WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER.** On December 20, bids for the Workforce Training Center were opened. Of the five bids received, Chambers Construction Company is the apparent low bidder at \$6,547,300. This figure includes the base bid plus ten alternates. Generally speaking, alternate work will include a beverage counter; supplementary lighting features and controls; and additional types of walls, screens and counters. Another alternate, for a bridge and elevator at the northeast corner of the Student Services, was included as part of the bid package in order to secure a lower cost for the work. The bridge and elevator will be paid for with bond ADA funds. The Board of Education will be asked to award the contract at tonight's meeting. Construction is anticipated to begin the first part of February and reach completion in March 2002. The Workforce Training Center will house the following departments: Business & Industry Services, Computer Information Technology, Distance Learning, Training & Development, Co-op Education, and College High/Tech Prep. The facility will also provide instructional classrooms for various campus departments.

**ARE PORTIONS OF BOND FUNDS DESIGNATED FOR ARTWORK?** Some time ago, the Oregon Legislature passed a bill requiring that 1 percent of state funding for construction activities must be designated for artwork. Interested Lane personnel have asked if this legislation applies to bond construction. While Lane is a state educational institution, the legislation does not apply to bond construction for two reasons: the legislature exempted community colleges from the requirement, and bond funds arise from voters in the college district and therefore are not state funds. Consequently, while bond funds are providing architecturally designed structures that contain artistic elements, specific pieces of art that will adorn the interior and exterior of new and remodeled buildings must be provided by other sources.

**PASSAGE OF PCC BOND PROMPTS REPRESENTATIVES TO TOUR LANE CONSTRUCTION.** Recently, Portland Community College passed a bond that will benefit all of the institute's campuses, including the Rock Creek branch, which is situated about twelve miles west of Portland, in the Beaverton-Hillsboro area of Washington County. While Rock Creek is primarily earmarked to receive funding for work on the library, it is hoped that funding will also be available for student space. Therefore, Mandy Ellertson, director of Student Services, and three student representatives were interested in seeing how student space was being defined by bond dollars on Lane's campus. The Rock Creek group toured a lounge on the second floor of the Science/Math Addition and the Student Services building. Since Rock Creek students will be involved with the planning of student space, it was beneficial for them to visit Lane's main campus construction and compare and contrast facilities with Chemeketa, which was previously toured. As one student said, "Seeing both colleges has definitely given us two different perspectives."

**FINAL COMPLETION OF DENTAL AREA EXPECTED IN APPROXIMATELY ONE MONTH.** With 95 percent of construction completed, the northern section of Health Tech's first floor looks like a dental hygiene and dental assisting educational facility. Multiple X-ray rooms have viewing panels installed, student lockers are in place, and Lane carpenters are busy installing shiny white cabinetry throughout the facility. While 75 percent of floor coverings are complete, this week, vinyl is being laid down in the operatory area. Dental chairs will be delivered on the 15th of the month, with installation following shortly. Susan Tatar, bond moving coordinator, held a general moving orientation at the dental hygiene and dental assisting regular staff meeting this week. The orientation served to supply important information about packing, labeling, and moving office supplies and furnishings, as well as providing a milieu in which staff could get first hand answers to their moving questions.

**ENERGY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM BEGINS PREPARATIONS FOR MOVE TO SCIENCE/MATH WEST ADDITION.** The west addition is coming up fast on a March completion date. However, the Energy Management Program will be the first department relocated to the west addition in slightly over one month. If occupancy permits are issued, EMP is scheduled to move during February 16-19. By occupying completed offices on the second floor of the west addition in February, the EMP move will vacate ELEX modulars, providing critical time for minor remodeling to take place prior to portions of the T&D's program temporarily relocating to the space. Remaining portions of the west addition will continue to have Lane trades finishing up work that will have the entire facility ready to go in March. In regard to west addition construction activities, cabinets are completely installed on the first floor, and

carpet and vinyl floor coverings are being laid down this week. Wood slat ceilings that will adorn upper portions on the west and east sides of the addition are currently being mounted on supporting grid.

**STUDENTS FIRST! STATIONS INSTALLED IN STUDENT SERVICES BUILDING.** The first stop for future Lane students in the Student Services building is the Students First! stations. The seven stations, constructed off site and comprised of warm oak and a Formica that will coordinate with the floor tile, have now been installed on the south side of the main lobby. Resembling a staggered line of service counters you use at banks, the stations are fully equipped with data/electrical hook ups. The two end counters are ADA accessible. It is anticipated that the terracotta brick, which will be the main lobby's floor covering, will be installed in several weeks. On the outside of the building, the main stairwell and patio has been poured. Metal hand railing installed at the ADA ramp will be painted dark green, and Frank Dregancz is brainstorming some great ideas to soften the look of the ramp area with plants. The ramp walls are actually narrow deep planters. While Frank would like to establish a tall plant species that would soften the angular lines of the area, it is impossible to do so because the plants would grow to be much wider than the planter. Therefore, it is possible that aromatic plantings such as heather; Ceanothus, or California Lilac; or even old-fashioned, thorn-less roses will adorn the planters. Weather permitting, paving at the south end of Dale Parnell Loop could be done by the end of this month.

**JOB SHACK REMOVED FROM LTD SITE.** In light of minimal levels of work left for completion of the project, Hyland Construction has removed its job shack from the northern portion of Dale Parnell Loop. Glazing on the clock tower is finished; however, due to a needed modification of angles at interior corners of the clock case, the clock will not be installed until sometime in February. Juniper shrubs at the site will be removed after weather dries out in order that excess mud can be kept to a minimal at the site. Mock ups for the main passageway signage is being produced, and curb planters are being scheduled for construction. This spring, Frank Dregancz and his crew will use horticulture to transform the bus station with a variety of trees, shrubs, and flowers.

## SPILE TO BE LANE'S NEXT PRESIDENT

A standing-room-only boardroom of onlookers burst into cheers and applause Wednesday night when Dr. Mary Spilde was announced as Lane's next president. "We strove for the best, and we found the best," said Board of Education Chair Robert Ackerman, who noted that selecting a president is the most profound and significant action any board can make. Announcement of the unanimous resolution was followed by a break for congratulations and hugs, including those from Spilde's husband, 17-year-old son, and 12-year-old daughter.

Spilde thanked her family and a long list of members of the college community for their support, including crediting President Jerry Moskus as a mentor and a great boss. She will take over as Lane's eighth president on August 15. "I'm really looking forward to helping, with everybody else's help, to maintain the good work that we've done in the past and to continue to be a really progressive, excellent college," Spilde said. "I'm thrilled."

Spilde was hired as vice president of instruction at Lane in 1995 and was named vice president of instruction and student services in 1997. She currently oversees lower-division credit programs, 14 professional-technical programs, developmental education, and student services. She is accountable for a \$38 million budget and 350 employees. In addition to her college duties, Spilde is an evaluator for the Northwest Commission for Schools and Colleges accreditation authority, vice president of resource development for the board of the American Association of Women in Community Colleges, and president of the National Institute for Leadership Development Foundation. She has served on numerous other organizations at the local, state, regional and national levels. Before Lane, she served at Linn-Benton Community College for 15 years, working her way up to dean of business, training and health occupations after starting out as an instructor-coordinator of a pre-employment training program. She holds a doctorate in education and a master's in education from Oregon State University and has a bachelor's in social science and a law degree from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland.

#### THERMOSTATS TO BE ADJUSTED TODAY

Lane plans to decrease temperature settings from about 70 degrees Fahrenheit to 68 degrees in offices and classrooms, and to about 65 degrees in shop areas, beginning today. This is an effort to conserve resources and to curb this year's already soaring energy costs. Governor John Kitzhaber has called on Oregonians to use less energy, citing a very tight energy supply for this winter. The Northwest may face an energy shortage because of growth in the region and less rainfall to power dams than in past years. Natural gas prices have more than doubled in the last year and energy experts at the Oregon State Office of Energy predict that gas prices will increase by more than 50 percent again this calendar year. The

office recommends that businesses set their thermostats to 68 degrees Fahrenheit. All state government offices are set at this temperature. Office and classroom temperatures at Lane have been at 70 to 72 degrees. Please plan for this change by bringing an extra sweater to work. Fire code prohibits space heaters. Instead, staff at the Oregon State Office of Energy recommend getting up and moving around a little bit when you start feeling cool. In addition, please help communicate this change to students by encouraging them to dress warmly, and stressing our commitment to resource conservation and keeping educational costs down. ## BOND UPDATE

APPROVAL NEEDED TO ENTER BOND CONSTRUCTION SITES. Although several new or remodeled buildings are almost completed and construction workers are generally focused on finishing work, it is important to remember that access to bond construction sites is closed to all individuals who are not directly involved in construction activities or the Bond Project Management Team. Even though heavier work has been completed, construction activities are still underway. Moreover, buildings under construction are the property of the general contractor until officially turned over to Lane. Entering construction sites poses particular liability issues, and even well-meaning LCC personnel can inadvertently walk on concrete that is not completely set up, brush against painted walls that are not completely dry, or smudge established chalk lines critical to certain floor covering work. Any of these occurrences can cause extra work for the contractor, with ultimate financial responsibility for such setbacks possibly being directed to the Bond Office. If you would like to see how a project is progressing, or even measure your future work area, please call the Bond Office at Ext. 2027 to arrange for a tour with a Bond Project Management Team representative.

MOVE COORDINATORS PLAY CENTRAL ROLE IN RELOCATION. As Phase I of the Health Tech remodel, the west addition to the Science building, and the Student Services facility all approach substantial completion dates within the next month, those departments and activities that will be

housed in the new spaces are gearing up for moves that will begin for some, in as little as one month. Key to an area's successful move is the assignment of a department move coordinator. Move coordinators are the primary liaisons with the Bond Project Management Team and are responsible for a multitude of tasks before, during and after the move. For example, prior to a move, the coordinators are responsible, among other tasks, for inventory of items to be moved; the packing and labeling of items; equipment disconnects; and arranging for furniture and equipment set ups. Coordinators can expect to be present during their moves, while making sure that equipment has been connected and all relocated items are accounted for. After the move, coordinator responsibilities center on reporting any difficulties in the new space and attending a debriefing session. According to Susan Tatar, bond project move officer, the most effective department move coordinators are organized individuals who communicate relocation information in such a manner that understanding is facilitated and positive levels of morale are cultivated. Currently, department move coordinators possessing such abilities and traits, and representing six areas, are working with the Bond Project Management Team to assure the best possible move experiences that can be provided.

**DENTAL CHAIRS POSITIONED IN OPERATORY AREA.** Eighteen new state-of-the-art dental chairs have been positioned in the dental hygiene and dental assistant operatory area. The chairs will be installed and staff will be trained by the equipment manufacturer approximately three weeks prior to spring term. The spacious operatory provides ample room for instructors and students to move around the chairs while educational activities are being conducted and quality affordable dental services are being provided. In addition to commenting on the spaciousness of the area, those individuals who tour the space consistently mention on how light the area is. Abundant natural light enters through windows that line the entire north side of the facility, and suspended light fixtures provide illumination from above. Reflecting both natural and artificial light are a multitude of sparkling white Formica covered cabinets and work surfaces within the operatory area. When completed in the very near future, the area will be a fitting residence for LCC's nationally ranked dental hygiene and dental assisting programs.

**GREATEST SQUARE FOOTAGE OF ALL BOND PROJECTS BELONGS TO SCIENCE/MATH COMPLEX.** When all is said and done with construction activities in the Science remodel and the Science/Math addition, the project will have taken the longest to complete of all the bond projects and, not surprisingly, will contain the most square footage of altered or new space. The west addition alone, which has approximately 60,000 square feet, is twice the size of the recently remodeled Science building and contains several thousand feet more than LCC's Downtown Center. Typically in construction, a building appears larger at initial stages before exterior siding is put up and interior space is defined by rooms and corridors; however, the Science/Math addition continues to have a spacious feeling on both floors. Complementing the sizeable general instructional areas and a multitude of necessary offices are interesting architectural designs that cultivate a spacious feeling: an ample inviting southern patio, a balcony that provides a large lush western view, long spans of detailed iron railings leading pedestrians to upper and lower levels, windows positioned on interior walls between passageways and classrooms, curved corner walls providing an aesthetic contrast to right angles in the western entrance area and connecting hallway, and of course, the vast expanse of space from the ceiling to the floor in the main corridor, referred to previously as the spine. You will be able to experience the interior design elements of the west addition for yourself in approximately one month when departments begin to occupy the building.

**FLOORS, WINDOWS AND PARNELL LOOP ARE FRONT AND FORWARD THIS WEEK IN STUDENT SERVICES PROJECT.** Rich earth tones are appearing in the Student Services building as terracotta tile is laid in the main lobby this week. The tile will cover the entirety of the lobby's floor, with a contrasting basketweave pattern that runs from the south front door to the elevator providing interesting detail. With measurements for blinds complete, coverings for exterior windows are in the works. As projected, paving is underway on the south end of Dale Parnell Loop. The Loop will be reopened to traffic after paving is complete and proper traffic signs installed.

## DIVERSE GROUP WORKED HARD TO SCREEN PRESIDENTIAL APPLICANTS

While most of us carry out the academic year with President Jerry Moskus and prepare for the succession of Mary Spilde this summer, 17 people are still catching their breath.

They are the volunteers who served on the presidential screening committee last fall. They were self-selected from constituencies identified by the Board of Education and they represented a diverse group of students, faculty, staff and administrators, board members, and leaders from K-12, higher education, business, and the community. Personnel Director Sue Colvin served as board liaison, and Dale Parnell, Lane's founding president, served as search consultant. The board appointed Margaret Bayless, faculty union president, as committee chair.

"It was more difficult than I expected and also quite fascinating," said Bayless. "We didn't know each other, we didn't know what to expect of each other. There were moments when it felt like a large class of knowledgeable, opinionated people." Camaraderie evolved as team members recognized a mutual dedication to the task and a common love for Lane.

Community members particularly impressed Bayless. "They brought very different expertise. They made us look at the qualifications in different ways, and they served as good role models." Richard Albright, for example, earned considerable respect just for making the 100-mile round-trip from Florence for every meeting, as well as for his views on what branch campuses needed from a college president.

The committee's first task was to paper-screen 23 applications from across the nation. Colvin made the files available on weekends and evenings to facilitate this painstaking task. "People spent a great deal of time on the files and a great deal of time thinking about each candidate's qualifications," said Bayless.

Then they spent a great deal of time in careful deliberation. Finally, eight applicants were chosen for telephone interviews. Members queried their constituencies for suggestions about interview questions and shared feedback with the whole committee. The interviews were conducted by speaker phone. Bayless asked the questions while the group listened, with hopeful tension crackling on both ends of the line during the hour-long sessions.

"It worked surprisingly well," said Bayless. "We were all really impressed at how effective the questions were for soliciting the kind of information that we wanted." More deliberation followed the interviews and on November 8, a week ahead of schedule, the committee presented its recommendation to the board.

"By the time we were done," Bayless noted, "there was this amazing sense of professionalism, satisfaction, pride in the work we'd done, and confidence that we'd done a good job."

The committee's good work was confirmed first by the quality of the four finalists who interviewed with the board and met with staff in open forums in December, and then by the board's well-received announcement of Mary Spilde as Lane's next president.

By all accounts, the group's success was due in no small part to Bayless' outstanding facilitation. She and Colvin both received unanimous resolutions of commendation (and flowers) from the board at its January meeting. As the year proceeds, tip your hat to them and to all the volunteers who helped select Lane's next president. Serving on the presidential screening committee were:

Under the heading of Petty Cash Funds then College Finance Petty Cash Fund ( <http://www.lanecc.edu/cops/petty.htm> ) the policy states that in addition to the completed, signed authorization form, the individual must present original validated receipts for the purchase. Invoices that don't indicate payment, photocopies of unprocessed checks, and photocopies of receipts cannot be accepted. This is a requirement from our auditors to establish a clear audit trail, and to avoid double reimbursements.

Cash reimbursements will not be made if monies owed the college are not in a current billing status, they will instead be applied to the past due account. The cash reimbursements are to be requested by the purchaser only, and purchaser must present photo identification to receive funds. Departments cannot pool receipts and send over one individual to receive the multiple reimbursements.
