MOSKUS TO LEAD OMAHA COLLEGE

Dr. Jerry Moskus, president of Lane since 1990, has accepted the presidency of Metropolitan Community College in Omaha, Nebraska, following a unanimous 10-0 vote of the college's board on March 27.

Moskus said that he began to re-think his retirement plans shortly after he announced his retirement in March 2000, and realized that he wanted to continue to work for many more years. He feels that everything has worked out in the best way for Lane and for him. "Lane will have in Mary Spilde a new president who can build on our past accomplishments and lead the college to even greater success," he said. "Metro will be a great place for me to use what I've learned at Lane, and to help a very good college become even more successful." Moskus also said that his being selected for the Metro job is a credit to the quality of Lane as much as to him. "The Metro board members were very, very impressed with the people and programs at Lane."

LANE WINS NATIONAL MARKETING AWARD

Lane won a second-place Silver Paragon Award at the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations annual conference in Denver on March 27. The award recognized excellence for a campaign to promote evening and weekend classes. The promotion was done to let people know that they could earn degrees or complete certificate training programs at night and on weekends after community surveys showed strong demand for evening and weekend programs. The campaign included print and radio ads, billboards, posters, stories in the class schedule, a web page, an annual schedule evening/weekend programs, and news releases. The campaign was a joint effort of Executive Assistant to the President Linda Simmons, Institutional Advancement staff, and Baden and Company. FINANCIAL AID APPLICATIONS UP

The number of students applying for financial aid for the 2001-02 academic year has increased. The number of students applying for the February 15 priority due date increased by more than 600 over last year's applicant pool. This group of students typically represents about one-third the total number of applicants per year. You can ensure the prompt delivery of intercampus mail by preparing envelopes correctly:

Cross out all previous names on the routing envelopes; check both sides.

Write the recipient's first and last names, and the department name. For example: Sandy Wilhelm, Printing/Graphics, not Sandy, DTC.
the first and last name of the recipient and the department (not just one or the other.

Write your full name and department as the sender. That way, the courier knows who to call if there's a question.

Verify department names in staff directory. Things change. For example, Lane Family Connections used to be the Child Care Resource Connection, and they used to be downtown but now they're on main campus.

TEMPORARY BUILDINGS (ERECTED IN THE 60s) COME DOWN TODAY

In the late 1960s, Lane purchased modular buildings from Canadian army surplus to serve as temporary construction quarters for building main campus. Today they're finally coming down. Demolition begins between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. this morning.

During their 30-plus years, the modulares have housed the art department, cafeteria, plumbers and carpenter's shops, facilities office, office skills training, and GED programs. Since 1983 they've been home to the Dislocated Worker Program.

"Many important decisions about the college and the community were made in these buildings," says Patti Lake, director of the DWP. "Our visitors included Senators Packwood and Hatfield, Representative Peter DeFazio, and well over 10,000 dislocated workers who spent many hours here searching out new careers."

The buildings are being displaced by the Workforce Training Center, one of several new buildings funded by a voter-approved bond in 1995. The new facility will house the Lane Workforce Network and other countywide job search services for dislocated workers and other job seekers.

"We're grateful to the community for passing the bond," says Lake. "One thing that hasn't changed in 35 years is great community support for workforce development."

Lake says her staff is excited about moving into better quarters in the future but will miss the familiar old buildings. The modulares are located between the south parking lot and Building 19, Apprenticeship.

Community colleges have been around for decades but faculty have had few academic journals devoted to their unique teaching and learning environment. That will change on April 19 when Lane faculty unveil the Community College Moment, a faculty-led academic journal specifically for community college instructors.

Business administration instructor Maurice Hamington and English instructor Anne McGrail are the managing editors. Both started at Lane in 1998 and both had worked and published at four-year colleges where academic journals are common. They found that their new colleagues shared a craving for a journal which recognized the unique culture of the community college and offered a vision of scholarship that stretched beyond the specialized approach taken at most universities. So they did what community college faculty do: collaborated, innovated, and published a journal of their own.

"Scholarship should include work that takes a hands-on approach," says Hamington, "including the work done in professional-technical programs as well as classic academic disciplines."

The first issue of Community College Moment features 100 pages of versatility. "It's a collection of traditional academic articles and non-traditional work such as art and poetry and projects still under development in a section called 'works in progress,'" says Hamington. "We welcome anything that contributes to the scholarship taking place on community college campuses. We want the Community College Moment to be appealing to an educated but not specialized audience."

Lane faculty authored most of the articles after a call for submissions advertised internally and to colleges participating in the Vanguard Learning Project. Lane dance instructor Bonnie Simoa contributed a pictorial essay on "Amazing Grace," a dance concert about breast cancer produced at Lane this fall. Ethnic studies coordinator Michael Samano wrote an article on, "Strategies for the Institutional Legitimacy of 'Marginal Studies.'" Jerry Ross, who divides his time between oil painting and teaching computer information technology, submitted photographs of his work exhibited in Italy and also wrote, "The Community College Model in Europe." Other works touch on diversity, pedagogy, ethics, and more.

Hamington is excited to see his colleagues published. "I've worked at a number of colleges and universities," he says. "I'd match Lane's faculty against anybody."

The Community College Moment will be published once this year and then biannually beginning in 2001-2002. Helping guide the journal is a five-person editorial board of faculty who blind-review submissions. The journal will be distributed to Lane faculty free of charge. Paid subscriptions will be available and wider distribution is planned for the future.

The public is invited to an inaugural reception on Thursday, April 19, from 2-4 p.m. in the Performing Arts Theater lobby in Building 6 on main campus. KLCC MEETS RADIOTHON GOAL

KLCC's 2001 Spring Radiothon concluded a scant fifteen minutes ahead of the designated end of Radiothon. The goal of \$200,000 was surpassed at 8:45 a.m. on Thursday, April 12. This was the largest fundraising goal in KLCC history. When the phones finally stopped ringing, the grand total reached \$203,705. A total of 1750 listeners called in to pledge support throughout the week of Radiothon. Radiothon began with more than half the goal already in the bank, thanks to 1650 "Thon Busters," who contributed \$100,015 in the weeks before Radiothon. The final \$103,690 was raised during Radiothon. A total of 3400 listeners became members or renewed their membership to KLCC throughout the fundraising campaign. More than 600 listeners used KLCC's secure web site to contribute. KLCC posted humorous photos about the staff and station on the web site to encourage on-line contributions. KLCC member contributions help cover the cost of NPR news, nationally syndicated programs, locally programmed music, community information, live broadcasts of special events, and intelligent entertainment all year long. Over half of KLCC's budget comes from listeners and local businesses. KLCC has never failed to meet a Radiothon goal. – Gayle Chisholm

BOND UPDATE

ACCESS TO SOUTHERN ENTRANCES RESTRICTED. With the T&D modulars demolished, in order for site excavation to take place, Chambers Construction will block off access to the southern side of Building 19 (Apprenticeship) on Monday, April 16. At that time, all doors on the southern side of the building will be unavailable for general use. Complying with safety codes, the southwestern double doors of the building will be designated as an emergency egress, or escape route. The four doorways on the eastern side of the building, which faces Building 18 (Industrial Tech), will provide entrances and exits for the building until the facility is completely vacated in June.

GOING, GOING, GONE! Some folks can point to the old modulars at the T&D site while reminiscing about the long history the buildings have had on the campus. Now, however, these modulars exist only in our memories and LCC's archival record. On April 10, Chambers Construction began bulldozing the well-used modulars into LCC history. Under the protection of multi-colored umbrellas, interested onlookers and local media watched as demolition of the modulars commenced. Today, the last of the buildings will be razed, with general site cleanup to follow. The demolition crew was somewhat selective in the manner the buildings were destroyed and a healthy portion of the materials will be recycled. With the site clear, Chambers will soon begin excavation of the area in anticipation of T&D's new facility, which is part of the future Workforce Training Center.

PERFORMING ARTS BID RELEASED THIS WEEKEND. After a short delay, the bid package for the Performing Arts project will be advertised on April 15 and 16. Bid openings will occur May 18 in the Boardroom. Under this tentative schedule, construction could begin shortly after the end of spring term. Second floor remodeling will be completed in September and the addition will finish up towards the end of March 2002. While the remodeled area will be occupied upon completion, occupancy of the addition should occur during the summer of 2002.

CHILLED WATER UPGRADE CONTINUES. It's easy to determine construction progress when exterior walls are being erected. When activities take place mainly underground, it is a different matter. That is the way it is with the central plant upgrade: you do not see activities occurring because a majority of the work takes place in the tunnels. However, since the contract was awarded the middle of February, work on the first phase of the upgrade, which deals with the chilled water portion of the system, is 35 percent complete. As reported earlier, the central plant upgrade, which includes enlarged piping and greater pump capacity, will provide the expanded LCC main campus community with ample heating and cooling services in a more energy efficient manner. Phase II, which will affect the heating portion of the system, is slated to begin this June.

THERE'S MORE TO COME FOR HEALTH TECH. For the past nine months, the primary focus in the health tech facility has been on the first phase of the remodel: completion of the new first floor dental hygiene and dental assisting facilities. With the first phase all but complete, it will not be long before activities encompassed in Phases II and III begin to unfold on the northern side of the second floor of the building. The remodel is tentatively scheduled to begin the middle of May and reach completion before the start of fall classes. With the college as the primary contractor, LCC's trades will not only upgrade areas vacated by the hygiene and assisting programs, but also engage in remodeling activities in several adjacent locations. Upcoming remodeling activities will produce a new EMT/paramedic classroom/lab, a Medical office assistant lab, a computer lab, a conference room, and several new offices.

MUD TEMPORARILY SUSPENDS TOURS. Construction on the elevator adjacent to Buildings 1, 2, and 3 is generating significant amounts of mud at the Student Services site. In an attempt to prevent mud from being tracked into the new building before LCC takes possession of the facility, tours of the building have been suspended for several weeks. A notice will be carried in The Daily when the facility is again available for tours. Turning to construction activities for the building, two areas that needed to be brought up to code are currently being addressed: a fire door is being installed on the South end of the sky bridge, and the south and main stairways are having the rise and run adjusted and covering installed. This week, LCC's carpenters began tackling that 24 tons of Steelcase by installing workstations in the facility. It

is anticipated that upcoming fire alarm testing will result in a temporary occupancy permit for the building. Moves continue on schedule for the month of May.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT CELEBRATES. This past week, Science personnel honored Connie Rowlett and Ginny Young, administrative specialists in the department's main office. Throughout the lengthy construction and moving process, the women put forth an outstanding effort and displayed admirable patience while simultaneously seeing that the department's activities ran on schedule. Donning hard hats, the women performed a yellow "caution construction" ribbon-cutting ceremony at the entrance to the main office. Amidst festivities in the staff workroom, Science personnel presented Connie and Ginny with a new stereo for the main office. Far from frivolous, the new stereo is replacing an antiquated cracked radio that has been in the main office since 1968. While the new stereo provides the main office with soothing melodies, the veteran radio now graces the department's modest lounge. If you have not seen the new headquarters for the Science Department, take the time to stop by and say hello.

BOARD REPORT

Eleven students and a few others spoke out against raising tuition at the April 11 Board of Education meeting. While the possibility has been discussed, administration has not made a recommendation and the board has not taken a position. Speakers questioned whether funds should be spent on the LASR project to replace administrative software and hardware, or on furnishings for new buildings. The board also discussed whether to use department carryover to help balance the general fund and wavered between doing so now or setting future policy. Vice President Marie Matsen made some carryover recommendations. The board must adopt a budget for 2001-2002 in June. For more information see the budget development web page at <http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/budget.htm>.

In other statements, some faculty advocated for step increases.

In action, the board authorized the president to award the Performing Arts remodel contract since the bid opening will take place a week after the next board meeting, to avoid construction delays; accepted the retirements of Elizabeth Hall from English Foreign Language and Speech, Jeanne Harclerod from Family and Health Careers, and Leslie Rasor from Adult Basic and Secondary Education; and accepted the results of the March 13 election.

The board reviewed benchmarks on students' reasons for attending Lane, importance of skills and effectiveness of training, and the quarterly financial report.

BOND UPDATE

CENTRAL PLANT UPGRADE REQUIRES BRIEF PASSAGEWAY CLOSURES. Due to a concrete pour at Building 12 (Machine Technology) on Friday, April 20, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., several passageways in the general area of the building will be restricted. Specifically, a barricade will prohibit access to the ground floor level around the Center from the lower stairs on the southeast path that parallels Building 12. An ADA ramp is under construction next to these stairs. Another barricade will be positioned at the base of the ramp that is adjacent to the southeast side of the Center and the former LTD route. This ramp provides vehicle access to the recycling area. A final barricade will be put up across the southern portion of the path between Building 12 and the Center. The barricade will be positioned just south of stairway that leads to the upper terrace, enabling the stairway to remain open. The restrictions will provide concrete trucks with a staging area from which concrete can be pumped into Building 12. The concrete will be used to form pads on which pumps associated with the chilled water system will be located. Current work on the system is at the 80 percent mark, with completion anticipated the middle of May.

LEGISLATIVE INDECISION HAMPERS LANE BUDGET PROCESS

Major unresolved financial issues have had a tremendous impact on budget development this year. The most important unresolved issue is the state community college budget which apparently is stalled in the Legislature until after the May revenue forecast. The uncertainty over the community college budget leaves \$3.2 million of Lane's projected 2001-02 revenues in doubt. This issue has brought to a halt other internal budget decisions, such as determining the need for a tuition increase. As a result, the Budget

Leaders have had difficulty completing their work on additions and reductions to the budget. We simply have not had a good revenue target to work with.

The president is under obligation to present a balanced budget to the Budget Committee at its first meeting on May 2. A budget has just been sent to the printers but we are notifying the Budget Committee that this will not be our final recommendation and that we plan to bring additional recommendations in May. However, decisions at the state level (or a continued delay in decisions by the Legislature) could leave our budget still unresolved by mid-May.

We will keep you updated as additional budget recommendations are formulated. As specific recommendations are developed, the president and vice presidents will communicate with employees and students about those recommendations. More specific questions about budget decisions affecting your department may be sent to your vice president (or Tracy Simms if you are in Executive Services). - Marie Matsen , Vice President for College Operations

RESULTS FROM THE EARTH WEEK TRASH SORT

During the trash sort last Wednesday, student and staff volunteers sorted 311 pounds of trash! We sorted about one quarter of Tuesday's trash that Housekeeping collected for us. Of this 311 pounds of trash, only about 30 percent of it was really garbage (that which is not recyclable or fairly easily eliminated as trash. Twenty-eight percent of the garbage was easily recyclable here on campus (14 percent was paper, 5 percent was glass, 4 percent was plastic, 4 percent was cardboard, and 1 percent was metal). Another 6 percent of the garbage was disposable cups. Disposable paper and Styrofoam cups are not recyclable in Lane County and this waste stream can be eliminated. Please remember to bring your own reusable mug next time you get a coffee or soda. The remaining 37 percent of the waste is what we called compostable, such as paper towels, napkins, and food. The reason we made a separate category for compostable waste is because Recycling Services is planning to make large scale composting available to staff and students sometime in the near future. There are not a lot of easy options for diverting this waste now, but there are some. Ways to divert this compostable waste include:

* Don't buy more food than you can eat

* Take your apple core home to compost

* Be conscientious about how many napkins you take and how many paper towels you use. Only take what you really need.

In addition, we are considering installing cloth towel dispensers instead of paper in one building as a pilot project. Using cloth towels instead of paper would greatly reduce trash on campus. What all this means is that we can reduce the amount of material we send to the landfill by about 70 percent. Every year, we could send 250 fewer TONS of material to the landfill and save \$35,000 on our garbage service. Let's try! - Jennifer Hayward
