2000-01 INNOVATION OF THE YEAR AWARD WINNER ANNOUNCED

This year's Innovation of the Year Award goes to the Evening/Weekend Project. Especially noteworthy for its innovative packaging of programs and its creative, high-profile promotional campaign, this project was designed to place the learning needs of the community first by changing current practices and refocusing resources to serve students in ways that better meet their needs. Great emphasis was placed on this project in response to the 1999 survey of Lane County residents which indicated the need for more classes and programs in the evenings and on weekends. Using fourth week data, 500 more students enrolled evenings during fall 2000 over fall 1999. The Evening/Weekend Project Team, led by Linda Simmons, includes Diane Dann, Shannon Kracht, Debra Lamb, Eilene LePelley, Linda Loft, Kay Lutz-Ritzheimer, Carol Lynn Morse, Ken Murdoff, Sylvia Sandoz, Matt Schubert, and Bob Way. The team worked together to increase the number of complete degree/certificate programs offered weekday evenings and weekends. Their efforts included:

- * Submitting extra section requests to the vice presidents, seeking approval of programs and funding to cover the additional courses;

- * Coordinating expanded student services during evenings/weekends;
- * Developing a team of evening supervisors from existing managers.

BOND UPDATE

FINALLY! FIRST RESIDENTS OF STUDENT SERVICES MAKE THE MOVE. The new Student Services Building (#1) sailed through an April 7 inspection for a temporary occupancy permit. By relocating last week, the Counseling department's administrative staff are the first residents of the new building. Many more moves are tentatively scheduled this month, with all or portions of seven additional departments relocating before June. This week, Disability Services is relocating to the second floor of the facility. Rounding out May's moves are the Substance Abuse Prevention program, the Multi-Cultural Center, a portion of Student Financial Services, High School and Community Relations, International Student Services, ASLCC Student Government and Legal Services, and Student Activities clubs. Seven more departments or areas are moving during June and July; completion of occupancy is anticipated by the end of July.

Since departmental moves are taking place in stages, and in light of security issues, only those areas of the building that are occupied will be accessible to the general public. All unoccupied areas will remain locked until departments slated for these areas begin the moving process. In order to help students locate services within the building, a Students First! receptionist is stationed in the main lobby. The building is accessible through the main entrance and the southern doors. Emergency exits are established at the southern end of the sky bridge and the northwestern doors in the Counseling area. Outside the building, a general passageway is established in a portion of the former LTD passageway between Bldg. 1 (Student Services) and Bldg. 2 (Business). The route also allows southern access to the building by those using wheelchairs. Since elevator construction is scheduled until September 2001 between Buildings 1 and 2, cautionary signs are positioned at critical points along the southern pedestrian passageway. BLOODMOBILE SCHEDULES MAIN CAMPUS VISIT MAY 18

Americans expect that a plentiful, wholesome blood supply will be available should they or their loved ones need a transfusion -- for emergency or routine surgery, childbirth, or even for scheduled treatment. Yet only 5 percent of healthy Americans eligible to give blood actually donate each year. And there is no substitute for human blood. If you haven't donated recently, please take advantage of the Lane Memorial Blood Bank Bloodmobile spring visit to campus on Friday, May 18 from 9 a.m. to noon.

No, you cannot get a serious disease by giving blood. All supplies are sterile and used only once. Call Pete Peterson (Ext. 2655) for an appointment -- the entire process should take no more than 45 minutes. The Bloodmobile will park in the service way near the Student Health Services, first floor of the Center Building.

THE BASIC CHECKLIST:

You must be in good health, at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds, wait eight weeks since your last donation, have not lost weight in the last two weeks, present your photo ID at the time of donation, and eat a meal with protein and carbohydrates two-to-four hours before donating.

Using medications such as aspirin or those for allergies, blood pressure, etc., will not necessarily prevent you from donating (call LMBB for confidential answers to medical questions, 484-9111).

REASONS FOR DEFERRAL OR REJECTION:

You have to wait one week if you have taken antibiotics for infections, or six months after a serious illness or major surgery.

You must wait 12 months after ear or body piercing, having tattoos or permanent makeup applied; have had exposure to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; have had a shot for hepatitis exposure; or if you have had a blod transfusion or organ transplant.

You cannot donate if you have AIDS or test positive for the HIV virus, or participated in high-risk behavior; if you have a history of hepatitis; if you have insulin-dependent diabetes; or if you have respiratory or cardiac conditions.

BOND UPDATE

LOOK AT 'EM GO! Other than site preparation last summer, only three months have passed since Chambers Construction began on site work at the Workforce Training Center location and already significant changes have occurred on the west and south sides of Bldg, 19 (Apprenticeship). On the west, you might have noticed curved wooden forms adjacent to the former LTD route. Once poured with concrete, the forms will be removed to reveal solid curved walls that help to define northern portions of the Conference Center's main lobby. In addition to concrete work, erection of structural steel is taking place. Most recently, six large truss beams were positioned atop vertical steel at the site. Undoubtedly, the truss beams are large and extremely heavy; so heavy in fact, that each truss had to be delivered to campus on an individual large flatbed truck. Once on site, it took two sizeable cranes to lift each truss into its elevated position. Turning to the south side of Bldg. 19, excavation and associated work for footings is finishing up. Footing excavation has occurred with previous bond projects, so it might have come as a surprise that the most northern excavation produced an extremely large hole for a short time. The reason the hole was so large is that footings, or concrete slabs that support steel beams, must be located on native soil. Native soil is soil that has not been disturbed and therefore is extremely compact and hard. When modulars were brought into the area some years ago, a tremendous amount of soil was relocated to the site in order to make a suitable location for the buildings. The relocated soil is not native, and therefore the contractor had to dig down as much as 12 feet in some places in order to hit undisturbed ground. The Workforce Training Center Project is scheduled to reach completion during March 2002. Those departments relocating to the facility are CIT, Business and Industry Services, Training and Development, Cooperative Education, College Now, Hospitality Services, Culinary Arts, and Distance Learning. Building 19 (Apprenticeship) will be vacated the end of June 2001, allowing the entire building to be remodeled and connected to the west and south additions.

HEALTH TECH'S SECOND AND THIRD PHASES BEGIN SOON. Remodeling will begin within the next two weeks on the northern side of the second floor of Bldg. 4 (Health Technologies). As the primary contractor, LCC Trades will alter existing space to produce improved and upgraded facilities. In altering second floor space, a new medical office assistant lab and EMT/paramedic classroom and lab will be located in the area formerly occupied by the Dental Assisting and Dental Hygiene Programs. Larger storage areas and a new conference room will take the place of the tiered classroom in 269. A large computer lab will replace a smaller lab, a small storage area, and an audiovisual room in the general area of rooms 264-268. Additional office space is also being constructed in 275, which currently accommodates medical office assisting courses. During remodeling activities, construction traffic will be limited on the northern side of the facility in an attempt to prevent an excess amount of fumes in the general area.

CHILLED WATER UPGRADE NEARS COMPLETION. The first phase of the Central Plant Upgrade, the chilled water phase, will reach substantial completion on or about June 6, 2001. At that time the chilled water portion of the system will do two things: operate more efficiently and meet the increased

cooling needs on the expanded main campus. The bid for the second phase of the Central Plant Upgrade, which will improve the heating water system, will be advertised the end of May, with work scheduled to commence during August. Substantial completion of the heating portion of the Central Plant Upgrade should occur during December of this year. The original heating system will continue to operate during second phase work, except for the possibility of several short shutdowns. Once completed, the heating portion of the Central Plant will also operate more efficiently and have a greater capacity to warm the increased number of buildings on the main campus.

PERFORMING ARTS PROJECT GENERATES HIGH CONTRACTOR INTEREST. A pre-bid walkthrough conference that occurred last Friday drew fourteen contractors to the Performing Arts facility. A pre-bid walkthrough allows contractors and subcontractors to assess a building and its surrounding area first hand rather than only viewing architectural drawings. During these walkthroughs, contractors oftentimes offer excellent comments to the architects and bond project manager that result in improvement of the project. Moreover, seeing the building and general work site also allows contractors to submit more realistic bid packages. While only a portion of the contractors may actually submit bids, the unusually high number of interested parties for a project of this size and type indicates two things; namely, the job market is favorable to the construction project, and contractors are inclined to bid more competitively. Bid openings are scheduled for May 18.

BOND FURNISHINGS PURCHASES. Many of you in the remaining bond projects are beginning to anticipate the furniture purchases for your project. BLOODMOBILE SCHEDULES MAIN CAMPUS VISIT MAY 18

Americans expect that a plentiful, wholesome blood supply will be available should they or their loved ones need a transfusion -- for emergency or routine surgery, childbirth, or even for scheduled treatment. Yet only 5 percent of healthy Americans eligible to give blood actually donate each year. And there is no substitute for human blood. If you haven't donated recently, please take advantage of the Lane Memorial Blood Bank Bloodmobile spring visit to campus on Friday, May 18 from 9 a.m. to noon.

No, you cannot get a serious disease by giving blood. All supplies are sterile and used only once. Call Pete Peterson (Ext. 2655) for an appointment -- the entire process should take no more than 45 minutes. The Bloodmobile will park in the service way near the Student Health Services, first floor of the Center Building. The basic checklist:

You must be in good health, at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds, wait eight weeks since your last donation, have not lost weight in the last two weeks, present your photo ID at the time of donation, and eat a meal with protein and carbohydrates two-to-four hours before donating.

Using medications such as aspirin or those for allergies, blood pressure, etc., will not necessarily prevent you from donating (call LMBB for confidential answers to medical questions, 484-9111).

Reasons for deferral or rejection:

You have to wait one week if you have taken antibiotics for infections, or six months after a serious illness or major surgery.

You must wait 12 months after ear or body piercing, having tattoos or permanent makeup applied; have had exposure to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; have had a shot for hepatitis exposure; or if you have had a blood transfusion or organ transplant.

You cannot donate if you have AIDS or test positive for the HIV virus, or participated in high-risk behavior; if you have a history of hepatitis; if you have insulin-dependent diabetes; or if you have respiratory or cardiac conditions.

You must be in good health, at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds, wait eight weeks since your last donation, have not lost weight in the last two weeks, present your photo ID at the time of donation, and eat a meal with protein and carbohydrates two-to-four hours before donating.

Using medications such as aspirin or those for allergies, blood pressure, etc., will not necessarily prevent you from donating (call the Lane Memorial Blood Bank for confidential answers to medical questions, 484-9111).

REASONS FOR DEFERRAL OR REJECTION:

You have to wait one week if you have taken antibiotics for infections, or six months after a serious illness or major surgery.

You must wait 12 months after ear or body piercing, having tattoos or permanent makeup applied; have had exposure to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; have had a shot for hepatitis exposure; or if you have had a blood transfusion or organ transplant.

You cannot donate if you have AIDS or test positive for the HIV virus, or participated in high-risk behavior; if you have a history of hepatitis; if you have insulin-dependent diabetes; or if you have respiratory or cardiac conditions.

BOARD REPORT

The Model Two restructuring proposal was unanimously approved by the Board of Education on May 9, with refinements. President Jerry Moskus explained the changes, including a new Human Resources department; a vice president and an associate vice president of Instruction and Student Services; an associate vice president of Instruction; a Business Department combining Business Administration, Business Technologies, and Business Education Center; a Center for Community and Workforce Development department including the Business Development Center, Business and Industry Services, and Training and Development; no merger of Institutional Advancement and the Foundation; and Distance Learning reporting to Information Technology. The board said the structure should be evaluated after a year of implementation. Moskus said the changes kept to the board's cost-neutral directive.

The management classification study was approved with agreement that the system is new for Lane and will take careful implementation. Science Division Chair Steve John said managers gave the study "guarded" support and want to be involved in defining criteria for merit advancement. Moskus said the study creates no initial raises but opens the way. The board holds the purse strings, he noted, because it approves the annusl management working conditions agreement.

Marie Matsen was named acting president for the period after Jerry Moskus leaves and before Mary Spilde begins the presidency. Other personnel appointments were Jeffery Borrowdale as social science instructor, Linda DeWitt as temporary manager of the LASR project; Shannon Gaul as Health and Physical Education coordinator; Kendra Gilds as social science instructor; Jamileh Stroman as English Foreign Language and Speech instructor; and Steve Webb as Advanced Technology/Mechanical Technology instructor. Retirements were accepted for Carol Beckley from College Operations; Connie Jo Clark from Business Technologies; Vicki Levine from Academic Learning Skills; Mike Mitchell from Science; Jean Spriggs from LCC at Florence; and Verne Whittaker from College Finance.

The board also approved: a resolution in response to recent Federal Communications Commission action which will help KLCC obtain radio station construction permits in Central Oregon and Roseburg; a two-year degree for the Recreational Vehicle Diesel Program; dedication of the Moskus Courtyard; and purchase of video equipment for the media arts program.

A strategic conversation with managers ended in board consensus to allow department carryover, provided that oversight be increased. Departments will need to submit spending plans for vice presidential approval, and submit annual expenditure reports. When necessary, income credit program funds may be used to balance the general fund, but a policy on ICP and carryover was not adopted.

The board received reports on the treatment of learners/consumers, students by age group, race/ethnicity of credit students, and gender and enrollment status of credit students.

BOND UPDATE

RESPONSIBILITY FOR BUILDINGS 1, 4 AND 16 IN TRANSITION. Since the early days of design work on #1 (Student Services), #4 (Health Technologies; Phase I), and #16 (Science/Math), the Bond Project Management Team has been responsible for the emerging buildings. However, a transition of this responsibility began when the facilities obtained temporary occupancy permits. Until that time, LCC was not the official owner of the buildings. Now, with LCC as the owner, Facilities Management & Planning (FM&P) will assume greater responsibility for work within the buildings. Generally speaking, modifications to established work spaces that were not included in the original contract are the responsibility of FM&P. Therefore, installation of items such as bulletin boards or display cases that were not in former facilities; changes to established doors, walls, and windows; installation of blinds; or changes to newly installed Steelcase workstations must now be addressed through departmental ICOs to the Facilities Management & Planning department. During the transition period, the general contractor will continue to work on punch-list items while the bond team completes aspects of the original contract, such as installation of casework.

The Bond Project Management Team acknowledges that architectural designs were arrived at several years ago, and some elements of #1, #4 (Phase I), and #16 might need to be changed. It is clear that designing educational facilities is a never-ending process directly affected by changes in personnel, equipment, and pedagogy that require different types of space. In light of the evolving nature of education, the bond team sympathizes with the legitimate need for changes that will occur. At this point however, the responsibility of the team to manage limited funding and assure completion of all scheduled bond projects requires that FM&P, at extension 2216, undertakes all non-contractual project work in #1, #4 (Phase I), and #16.

DPR APPARENT LOW BIDDER FOR PERFORMING ARTS PROJECT. Bids for the Performing Arts project were opened last Friday in the boardroom. Of the 10 bids submitted from various Oregon construction companies, DPR Construction is the apparent low bidder at \$1,082,200. This figure is within the budgeted amount for the project and contains all six alternates. Alternate work will include elements of exterior lighting, acoustic walls, and additional electrical outlets. As agreed on by LCC's Board of Education, once legal papers are available, the president will award the Performing Arts contract. In so doing, the project will get an earlier start than if awarded at the board meeting in June. The contractor is currently preparing for construction activities by working on critical scheduling and mobilization issues. It is anticipated that DPR will begin site work sometime during the middle of June. Remodeling on the second floor will be finished in September 2001. The addition will reach completion in March of 2002.

LARRY WARFORD TO JOIN DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

Dr. Larry Warford, an administrator at Lane since 1978 including the last 10 years as vice president for instruction, has accepted appointment as the national community college liaison to the U.S. Department of Labor, effective June 18.

He also helped establish learning centers at area high schools now being replicated at other colleges across the nation. He serves on the boards of the Lane Workforce Partnership, the Eugene and Springfield Chambers of Commerce, and the Eugene/Springfield Metropolitan Partnership.

His 35 years in community colleges goes back to teaching and administrative positions in Iowa, where among other things, he helped establish Iowa Central Community College in Fort Dodge. He earned his doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Oregon.
