FROM THE GROUNDS UP

(A report form groundskeeper Frank Drengacz)

"No I won't!" "Yes you will." "I won't, I won't, I won't!"

That is just a segment of the conversation Dawn and I had when she told me I needed an e-mail address. Well I'm sorry but I had to lay down the law. Hopefully some of you had a chance to see the show that the poppies were putting on at Child Care about mid-May. Actually I became concerned that it was too good of a show. If an earlier flower becomes too dominant, it can shade out the later varieties. So when we had our early taste of summer, I did no increase the irrigation. The poppies have toned it down. I have increased the irrigation now and the other flowers will have their time in the sun.

Our current energy crisis is not only causing problems in our pocket books. The college is reviewing our energy uses, trying to determine where we can become more efficient. Two recommendations can and will affect more trees on campus.

The first deals with the cooling towers and the cedar tree screen at the east end of Mechanical Tech. Three trees in the group of nine are causing problems. Two trees are to close to the towers. Debris from the trees are clogging the tower screens. The debris is affecting the efficiency of the towers. It had been suggested that the debris be routinely be removed. We have discussed this, but it is physically impossible to access the areas where the debris is accumulating. The third tree is far enough away from the towers. Unfortunately, it is growing downwind of the towers. It is disrupting the air flow patterns around the towers. This too is making the system less efficient. Its affect on the air flow will only increase as it grows. The final decision to remove these trees has not yet been made. Discussions are continuing.

The other situation is at the west end of Mech. Tech. The boiler has been undergoing refitting and upgrading. Part of the upgrade, is adding a second fuel tank. The new tank will be placed east of the existing fuel tank. The problem is installing the tank to code. There is a minimum clearance requirement around the tank. Currently, there is an oak tree on the south side and the building on the north side of the tank location. Locating the tank equal distance between the two will not work. LINDA SIMMONS TO ATTEND PRESTIGIOUS INSTITUTE

Linda Simmons is one of only 34 community college leaders selected to attend the prestigious Executive Leadership Institute sponsored by the League for Innovation in the Community College in cooperation with the University of Texas at Austin and the Institute for Community College Development at Cornell University. The institute will be held in Newport Beach, California, from August 5-10. Simmons has been an administrator at Lane for 17 years, including the last seven as executive assistant to the president.

Institute participants were selected from a pool of 100 applicants hoding senior-level positions in community colleges. Vernon Crawley, president of Moraine Valley Community College in Illinois and a board member of the League for Innovation, said, "The review panel was extremely impressed with the quality of the applicants, which speaks well for the future vitality of the community college."

The purpose of the institute is to provide an opportunity for potential community college presidents or those in transition, to review their ability and interests, refine their skills, and participate in discussions on leadership with outstanding community college leaders in North America. The League is an international association dedicated to catalyzing the potential of the community college movement. The League hosts conferences and institutes, develops Web resources, conducts research, produces publications, provides services, and leads projects and initiatives with member colleges, corporate partners, and other agencies. According to Ted Marchese, a senior associate and editor of "Change" magazine, "The League is the single most vital organization in higher education today."

NEW SIGNS FOR A NEW CAMPUS

You may have noticed new signs around campus. As part of a comprehensive wayfinding system, traffic and pedestrian directionals are currently being installed to complement the building numbers that were installed a couple of years ago. The comprehensive wayfinding system includes building numbers, traffic signs, pedestrian signs, overall lot directories, interior signs, accessible route (ADA) signs and main identification signs. The committee is currently seeking funding for building directories, the next phase of pedestrian directionals.

Minor demolition activities have already occurred on the first floor, but upon the relocation of the last occupants construction activities within the entire building will escalate exponentially. Once the remodel of #19 is completed in March 2002, the former Apprenticeship Building will contain general classrooms and house Computer Information Technology, Distance Learning, Cooperative Education, College Now, and the Instructional Technology Center.

BUILDING #1 TAKES ON PERSONAL CHARACTER. After months of taking people into a building defined by drywall, or more recently, completed empty spaces, it is satisfying to see personnel begin to occupy Building #1 (Student Services). Previously sterile workspaces now contain pertinent files, books and records. Pictures of family members, memorabilia and plants add personal touches to desks, and the hum of conversations, intermingled with occasional laughter, season the facility with an additional

element of humanity. Simply put, while the new areas have architectural character, they are now blossoming into living spaces where vital services take place. Moving personnel to new spaces within the facility has gone exceptionally well, evidenced by happy employees bestowing unmentionable amounts of cookies and cinnamon rolls on hard working Bond Moving Team members. On the first floor, portions of Student Financial Services, Perkins Loans and Prior Student Accounts and Sponsored Accounts and Scholarships, have now joined administrative personnel of the Counseling Department. However, the majority of move activity has occurred on the second floor of the facility--specifically, students are now able to obtain services from Student Activities, ASLCC, International/Multicultural Services, Disability Services, and Substance Abuse Prevention. Next week, the Women's Center, TRIO, and nine-month Counseling staff will join current residents of #1. July moves include the remainder of Counseling personnel, Testing, Career & Employment Services, Students First!, Veterans, Photo ID, Student Records, International Student Admissions, and the remaining portion of Student Financial Services.

BOND UPDATE

MAIN CHILLER OPERATIONAL. Lane's electricians and heating-ventilating-air conditioning technicians completed work late Friday afternoon on portions of the chilled water system, enabling the main chiller to be brought online. The next time temperatures begin to climb, the cooling portion of the central plant will respond to warmer weather by supplying cool air for buildings across the main campus. On June 18 and 19, one more brief shutdown of the cooling system will allow electrical switchovers to the system's new controls.

SKYBRIDGE ACCESS TO #19 CLOSES. Beginning June 18, the doors leading from the skybridge into #19 (Apprenticeship) will be closed to regular pedestrian traffic until the Workforce Training Center Project reaches completion next spring. After June 18, the doors can be used only as an emergency exit. Complying with safety codes, Chambers Construction will also establish a safety passageway through the second floor of #19. Should an emergency arise, go through the southern skybridge doors and follow the established safety passage to the eastern, exterior pathway by #19. The southern doors of the skybridge and the safety passageway will remain an emergency exit only until remodeling within #19 is completed during March of '02.

NEW HEAT EXCHANGER SCHEDULED FOR INSTALLATION. As part of the central plant upgrade, installation of a new heat exchanger is tentatively scheduled during the week of June 18. The heat exchanger is the portion of the hot water system that actually heats domestic water on the main campus. In

order for the hook-up to take place, the hot water system must be shut down for approximately three days. An lert will be issued when specific dates for the work are determined. For some time now, nitrates have contaminated hot water due to faulty coils in the current exchanger. Once the installation of the new heat exchanger is complete, the domestic hot water will be safe for drinking. Until Jennifer Hayward of Facilities Management & Planning releases notification about the completion of exchanger work, please avoid drinking or cooking with hot water on the main campus.

Funk and Associates was hired to help design a system that is integrated, durable, easy-to-modify and cost effective; meets national visibility standards; and assists students, the public, and employees in navigating around the main campus and outlying centers.

The comprehensive wayfinding system includes building numbers, traffic signs, pedestrian signs, overall lot directories, interior signs, accessible route (ADA) signs and main identification signs. The Committee is currently seeking funding for building directories, the next phase of pedestrian directionals.

Student related transactions for staff will be conducted at the Students First! windows (class fee payments, etc.). Due to organizational changes and budget constraints, College Finance can no longer afford the luxury of a cashier's window for staff transactions. Beginning July 1:

ALL PAYROLL CHECKS will be mailed to the current address on file. Direct deposit (LADD) is available for mid-month and end-of the-month payroll.

PERSONAL CHECKS may be cashed at Students First! and there is the option of using the ATM machine located on the first floor of the Center Building.

MILEAGE REIMBURSEMENT for use of private vehicles will increase to .345 cents per mile (GSA federal travel regulation) and will be reviewed and adjusted annually as determined by GSA.

TRAVEL ADVANCES/REIMBURSEMENTS will be mailed to the individual's home address. A/P computer runs are on the 10th, 20th and 30th of each month.

PETTY CASH will be reviewed in the accounts payable area and forwarded to operations for processing.

Please try to attend one of the two information sessions that are scheduled for Tuesday, June 26, 10-11:30 a.m., Boardroom, Bldg. 3; and Wednesday, June 27, 2-3:30 p.m., same place.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE BOARD MEETING

President Jerry Moskus received accolades from several people at the June 20 Board of Education meeting for his 11 years of service to the college, and the board unanimously passed a resolution recognizing his achievements and contributions. It was his last board meeting. Moskus paid tribute to several people as well, and praised students for their legislative action on behalf of the college. His last day in the office will be June 27. He begins the presidency of Metropolitan Community College in Omaha in July.

Outgoing board member Ralph Wheeler was presented with a plaque in recognition of his service to students, staff and community.

The board voted 5-2 to raise tuition by \$2 per credit hour, \$1 more than the budget committee recommendation. Proponents cited several reasons for the increase, such as increasing needs and worsening future deficits, which overwhelmed reluctance to increase students' financial burden. Robert Ackerman and Lucille Salmony dissented, and student body president Jennifer Gainer expressed dismay. Later in the budget hearing, the budget was amended to account for additional tuition revenue, and the budget was adopted 6-1, with Salmony voting no. The board unanimously approved purchase of a new administrative software system, and in separate action, authorized a loan to help finance the purchase on a 6-1 vote, with Salmony dissenting.

The consent agenda passed 7-0 including a requirements contract to furnish microcomputers, various annual business actions, and 11 faculty appointments: Sydney Kissinger, Elaine Pray and Cristina Simoni, Academic Learning Skills; Marvin Clemons, Cooperative Education; Tracy Henninger-Chiang, Business and Industry Services; Laura Maitland, Business Technologies; Suzanne Bunker, Jason Jolley and Gloria Zabala, English Foreign Language and Speech; and Jerry Hall and Brian Nichols, Science.

In other business, the board reviewed benchmarks on disability status of credit students, and the percentage of recent high school graduates attending Lane, as well as monitoring reports on treatment of staff, and global board-president relationship.

BOND UPDATE

DPR MOVES ON PERFORMING ARTS PROJECT. DPR's construction fencing is up, the job trailer is on site, and work is underway on LCC's Performing Arts project. At the site of the addition, primary work will focus on the relocation of sand from the volleyball courts to the east side of modular #31. LCC's grounds crew will use the sand for various campus projects. Once sand is relocated, excavation of the site will begin. Second floor remodeling activities for the main office and adjacent faculty office spaces will commence shortly. During construction, the ADA ramps between #5 (Physical Education) and #6 (Performing Arts) will be accessible at three locations: from Bristow Square, from the northern side and eastern, first floor doors of #5, and from the southwest door of #6. The western double doors on the first floor of the Performing Arts facility will be closed for the extent of the project since they open into the construction zone.

FINAL PHASE OF CENTRAL PLANT UPGRADE HEATS UP. Bids for the second phase of the Central Plant Upgrade were opened June 22. Of the seven bids submitted, the apparent low bidder at \$222,987, is Betel Combustion from Central Point. The second phase of the upgrade targets improvements to the heating water portion of the system. This system, which is separate from the domestic water, provides hot water for heating the main campus. When work is completed on a new boiler, fuel tank, valves, pumps, and piping, the main plant will be able to efficiently provide heat for the expanded main campus. The contract is expected to be awarded by the Board of Education at the July 11 meeting. Construction is slated to commence the first half of September and reach substantial completion towards the end of December 2001.

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER ACTIVITY FULL FORCE IN ALL THREE AREAS. Demolition activities within Building 19 (Apprenticeship) have already significantly changed portions of the facility. The first floor of the building has been redefined from multiple classrooms, offices and welding stations into several large open areas. On the second floor, considerable portions of many walls and ceilings are now nothing more than debris. If you have not noticed, a section of the exterior southern wall is opened up, allowing removal of demolition debris from the building. On the south side, upright steel support beams are in place for the Training and Development portion of the facility. Construction on the west side of #19 is also progressing rapidly. Structural steel erection continues to define both floors of the conference center, with the southern portion of the second floor scheduled for a concrete pour later this week. The concrete pour at the southern retaining wall is complete.

CARPENTERS AND PAINTERS TAG-TEAM CASEWORK. The Bond Project Management Team employees three carpenters, two full-time and one part-time, to build and install all the casework in new and remodeled buildings. The bond payroll also temporarily supports one full-time painter who applies finishing lacquer to all the wooden surfaces produced in the carpentry shop. Last week, amidst the smell of freshly cut wood and stacks of soon-to-be-completed cabinetry, the carpenters took a few minutes to list the casework that they diligently labor to produce by differing deadlines. To date, several thousand sheets of plywood have been used to construct cabinets that are fixed to walls, bookcases, shelving, video cabinets, and computer, testing, and reception desks. Once the carpenters finish pieces of casework, the wooden furnishings travel across the hall to the paint shop for a smooth lacquer finish. Longtime LCC painter Steve Wickwire estimates that at least 160 gallons of lacquer are used every month to seal and enhance wooden

surfaces. Basically, a coat of lacquer is sprayed on a wooden surface, the surface dries, is sanded, and then the process is repeated four more times before casework is completed. But wait, there's more! Aside from the casework itself, the carpenters have also installed all the new counter tops in spaces affected by bond construction. Carpenter Steve Kayl figures that no less than 10,000 square feet of laminate has already been installed. And all those new trapezoid tables that are delivered unassembled? The bond carpenters estimate that to date, they have used approximately 15,000 screws to secure mounting brackets for all the table legs. Construction and finishing of the multiple types of casework and furnishings for all new areas encompassed by bond construction is a significant job to which three carpenters and one painter devote tremendous time and effort. If, per chance, you are waiting on casework, please know that the carpenters and painter are completing pieces for your areas as quickly as possible and with the same care as those that are already installed.

PC USERS ASK, "WHY DO I HAVE SO MANY PASSWORDS ON MY COMPUTER?"

This is a common question since the forced password change went into effect. The explanation is that you can have up to five passwords on your computer. Some users have a boot-up password that prevents unauthorized use. Also, most users have a Novell network password. This is the password that the system forces you to change. The hidden password is the Windows password, which is the one that frustrates the smooth password change. It is part of windows and cannot be disabled. Next, you can and should have a GroupWise e-mail password. GroupWise conveniently offers to store that password so that you don't have to type it each time you start your mail (PC users only). We cannot force you to have or change your GroupWise password. You may also have a screen saver password. Finally, you may have an HP3000 password.

To avoid the proliferation of passwords we suggest the following technique. When you are prompted to change your Novell Network password, just say no. Continue your normal boot-up process. When Windows is fully operational, go to the Start button, then up to Settings and then Control Panel. From the Control Panel window, double-click on the Passwords control panel. In the upper half of the window is a button that reads "Change Windows Password." Click this button. You will notice that one entry in the window is "Novell Netware." Make sure its box is checked. If you have a screen saver password, it can be changed from here as well by checking its box. The goal is to change both the Windows password and Novell password at once. Click the OK button. Now enter your current password in the "Old Password" field. Now enter the new password that you wish to use: remember, six (6) characters or more and no re-used passwords. Then go to the next field and re-enter the new password. Click OK and Windows should report success. This process should help you avoid unnecessary passwords.
