#### FROM THE GROUNDS UP

A report from groundskeeper Frank Drengacz.

The bond work is going well. We are currently working on the Science/Math building. Soil preparation is complete and the crew has completed the rock wall. It turned out great I think. There were no major casualties, just a few smashed fingers and Heather mistaking Jared's head for a rock when she yielded a sledge hammer. Other than that, I think everyone is happy with how it went. The Science and Math departments will plant a native landscape around the building. They have put a lot of time and effort into the planning. They will start with tree seedlings this fall. As the canopy develops, they will plant understory plant material. The planting will be an ongoing process and each planting will add new elements. There will be a natural progression and development of this urban forest. This living classroom will appear "wild" at times, but will mature into a great place.

The LTD bus stop landscaping is almost done. Because LTD contributed funds, we were able to include the plantings instead of only wildflowers. The planting is about 75 percent complete. Some plant material is not yet available. For some plants, tree canopy will need to mature more before they can survive. Just to remind you folks in Student Services, your landscape beds are being used for staging for the Work Force Training. We will not be able to do the Phase 1 landscaping until next summer. We will be planting some color spots in the raised planters latter this month. Go Titans!

## LASR UPDATE

The Oracle database and the Banner software are now installed on the new HP9000 computer. On-site training began last week for programming staff in Computer Services and will continue this week. The training room for LASR is set up in Building 16 (Science) Room 144. While we are waiting for delivery of some of the work-station desks, we have temporarily filled in with tables and have 18 computer stations set up and ready to use. The college will use this facility for both the initial system configuration sessions and



ultimately, for the end user training. It is the end user training that will have the broadest impact on staff at Lane. This training will be scheduled for delivery as close as possible to the time that staff will begin using the system.

As part of the communication plan for the implementation, the LASR Project has scheduled an open forum in the Boardroom of Building 3 from 3 to 5 p.m. on the first Friday of every month starting October 5. Any member of the campus community is welcome to attend, learn about what is currently happening, ask questions and provide input. ## BOND UPDATE

"TRANSFORMATION THROUGH EDUCATION" A WORK IN PROGRESS AT BUS STATION. Creating public art, especially for a long site like the bus station, is a challenging task. Lane art instructor Lee Imonen says that his site-specific sculpture class is giving Lane students the opportunity for a real life experience by designing the station's sculptures, working with the community, experiencing logistics of construction, and presenting concepts for review. The sculptures embrace an origami theme and were chosen from several possibilities by LTD and the LCC Campus Art Committee. The sculptures will be positioned at five locations from one end of the bus station island to the other. The basis of the idea for the sculptures came from the open book incorporated in the college logo. The book will be the most southern sculpture, with each successive sculpture an origami metamorphosis of the book, culminating in the most northern 12-foot piece, the shape of a soaring bird. The large concrete piece already in place at the northern site is the base for the bird and will eventually be covered with mosaic tiles. Lee and his students began work on the sculptures this summer and will continue installing pieces during fall term. If you would like to find out more details about the design, materials or theme of the art pieces, the bus station is the place to visit. Lee's students are creating an overall site plan depicting locations, designs of sculptures, and explanatory information that will be mounted in the cases on the south side of the clock tower before the start of fall term. The bus station was designed by Lane architect, Tom Oroyan.

FLAGS COLORFUL CONVERSATION PIECES IN BUILDING 1. They have been stored in a Facilities Management and Planning office for six years waiting for a suitable home and now they have one above the lobby of Building 1. On Saturday, August 25, 104 international flags were hung from the ceiling of the lobby by bond and Facilities personnel. The flags represent countries of students who have studied at Lane. Colby Sheldon, international student program coordinator, ensured that the flags were hung according to United Nations and federal protocol; therefore, the flags are hung in alphabetical order with no warring countries adjacent to one another. The flags also had to be hung correctly, which means the majority of the flags are hung vertically while four flags are suspended horizontally: Brazil, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, and Sri Lanka, which can be found above the Multicultural Center windows. In the near future, a plaque installed in the lobby of Building 1 will recognize Lane's international students and briefly explain the significance of the flags. Also displayed will be a key that provides locations of the flags. If you have not already done so, take the time, and a friend, to view the flags from both the first and second floor of the building.

SKY BRIDGE AND SAFETY CORRIDOR OPEN. The sky bridge that adjoins Building 1, student services, to Building 19, former apprenticeship, is now open, providing the increasing numbers of students and college personnel on campus with a more direct route to and from southern portions of the campus and Building 1. In order for the sky bridge to be operational, Chambers Construction constructed a safety corridor through the construction area in Building 19. The corridor has eight-foot walls, is equipped with lights, and will soon include a dust barrier. The safety corridor is accessible at Building 19 from the most northeastern door of the building. Signs notifying individuals of the newly opened passageway are posted in southern parts of campus, on Building 19, and in Building 1.

ONE WEEK SHUTDOWN FOR PORTIONS OF HEATING WATER SYSTEM. From September 16 to 23, one of the two boilers that heat water on main campus will be shutdown. Because one boiler will continue operating during the shutdown, you should notice no difference in the supply of domestic hot water. Unless temperatures take a sudden drastic drop, the heating portion of the heating, ventilating and air conditioning system will also provide ample warm air to campus facilities. The second phase of the central plant upgrade concerns itself with the heating water system. The heating water system heats water for HVAC heating as well as domestic hot water use. Current work expands the capability of

the central plant to provide heat and domestic hot water to Lane's main campus area that will ultimately increase by approximately 200,000 square feet with completion of the final bond project.

**PERFORMING ARTS TAKES SHAPE.** Scaffolding at the Performing Arts site will soon come down as the last concrete blocks are put in place. If not complete today, the exterior wall should be done in the next few days. DPR is also hard at work establishing a first floor passageway that will connect the current building to the addition. The new passageway can be found adjacent to the bottom of the stairway. On the second floor, cabinetry is set and installation of floor coverings is currently underway. A temporary occupancy permit is expected towards the end of the week.

**LANE TRADES KEEP HEALTH TECH REMODEL ON TARGET.** Lane plumbers, electricians, carpenters, and painters are keeping up a strong pace of work as the Building 4 (health tech) second floor remodel stays on target for fall occupancy. Painting is complete, ceiling grid is installed and floor coverings are being installed. The second floor remodel is taking place on the north side of the building. Remodeled areas will provide a new medical office assistant lab, an EMT/paramedic classroom and lab, a larger computer lab, an A/V room, a new conference room, larger storage areas, and several offices.

**PROGRESS EVIDENT AT WTC SITE.** Since the end of spring term 2001, evolution at the Workforce Training Center site will provide significant observable changes for students returning in two weeks. On the west side, the conference center portion of the complex has had all exterior studs put up and gypsum sheeting applied to the south wall. Inside, the auditorium steps and concrete auditorium walls are complete. On the south side, the steelwork and decking are almost complete on the portion of the facility that will house Training and Development. Chambers Construction poured the floor slab for the south addition on Friday. On the first floor of the former apprenticeship building, a majority of the steel stud framing is complete, and Chambers is going full bore on electrical, mechanical, and plumbing installation.

**LANE TRADES PRODUCING NEW CLASSROOMS FOR FALL TERM.** By separating remodeling activities on the second floor of the Center Building into two phases, Lane's trades are producing three new classrooms in time for fall classes. The soon to be completed classrooms are located in areas formerly occupied by the Women's Center and Testing. Until the first phase of remodeling is complete, northern elevator service to the second floor is restricted. Restrooms in the northern section of the second floor will be closed until the entire project reaches completion in January 2002. As classrooms are finished up, Lane carpenters and electricians are already engrossed in second phase demolition of remaining northern areas on the second floor. Construction activities should commence by the end of the month. Once completed, the second floor remodel will be ready for the relocation of Academic Learning Skills from the fourth floor of the building.

**OFF CAMPUS STORAGE STRICTLY FOR BOND ITEMS.** With so many relocating departments acquiring new furnishings, many former furnishings must be stored for future projects. The bond office has off-campus storage facilities strictly for items no longer needed by relocated departments. The furnishings, including Steelcase, are not available for general use until all bond projects are completed. When the furnishings arrive at storage, they must be sorted through to determine what is still useable and what must be designated for excess property. Needless to say, inventorying used items is a time consuming and labor intensive job. If furnishings from areas that are not directly affected by bond activities are moved in with bond items, the inventory task becomes much more difficult. Therefore, please direct your requests for storage of non-bond-related items to FM&P general services or excess property personnel. Know that FM&P's capacity to store items is somewhat limited and that bond storage facilities will not be available.

**BOND FURNISHINGS PURCHASES.** Many of you in the remaining bond project are anticipating furniture purchases for your project. Please contact Bond Furnishings Coordinator Mike Hopkinson, Ext. 3232, before contacting commercial vendors about furnishings you might like to purchase. Some items of bond-provided furnishings are standard for the project, with prices and vendors already established. Other non-standard items may or may not require price quotes, depending on the item, the quantity and the cost. The bond office will conduct solicitations for quotes, should they be necessary after we talk with you about your needs.

#### DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact the PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

## BOARD REPORT

President Mary Spilde gave her first official president's report at the September 12 Lane Community College Board of Education meeting. She expressed concern and sympathies regarding Tuesday's terrorist attacks in the U.S., and commended staff for carrying on with sensitivity and teamwork to keep the college running and to provide a caring environment. Spilde updated the board on executive planning, performance measures required by legislative funding, the LASR administrative software project, and other details.

The president's 10-page work plan for the year was approved 7-0. The board commented on areas of special interest including college visibility in the community, more efficient travel and consultant policies, a transparent budget, improved education and retention, improved diversity, work exchanges for faculty and management, a suggestion system, a collegewide compensation policy, and several other goals and activities in the work plan.

In board business, Lucille Salmony was elected vice chair by 4-2 vote. Roger Hall and Kathleen Shelley voted for nominee Mike Rose, and Rose abstained. In 7-0 votes, Salmony and Dennis Shine were elected delegate and alternate, respectively, to attend the Association of Community College Trustees convention in October in San Diego; Munir Katul and Stephen Alison were appointed to the Budget Committee; and the board agreed to conduct its self-evaluation in March and April, meanwhile directing the president to prepare a recommendation on upward evaluation by the next meeting.

A review of community perception benchmarks inspired several questions and suggestions on how to assess and improve awareness of Lane's presence and services.

Stan Barker and Lloyd Rain were named deputy clerks, joining Marie Matsen and Cheryl Roberts, who were named in July;

the child and adult care food program annual contract was approved;

and the Business Development Center was approved to disburse Lane Microbusiness funds to partners Saturday Market and the Oregon Urban Regional Federal Credit Union.

#### MEDICARE REMINDER

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact the PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

I welcome your comments as we explore various ways to share information.

## BUDGET REPORT

The Executive Team has committed to spending approximately half of each weekly meeting working on budget development issues. At the suggestion of the Budget Advisory Group, we will be issuing a weekly report of the budget topics we are addressing. So far, the Executive Team has met September 5 to 7 (retreat format), and on September 10, September 17, and September 24. ET currently is in a preparation and discussion phase around budget development until firm projections for 2002-03 can be made, probably in early November.

At the retreat and in the first two regular meetings, ET discussed the following:

- \* The budget challenges faced by the college in the 2002-03 fiscal year.
- \* The need for a clear budget development process that is inclusive.
- \* A charge to the Budget Advisory Group to focus on the budget process and to ensure widespread opportunity for input prior to the budget recommendations coming from departments and divisions to the Executive Team
- \* The need to communicate widely the assumptions on which budget projections are based.
- \* The desire for the Executive Team to sponsor ongoing college discussions to define "transparent budget."
- \* Work plan for implementing the "Financial Strategies" developed last year by the Budget Advisory Group and approved by the Executive (Leadership) Team and the Board of Education.
- \* Work plan for completing discussions and making decisions about the "Budget Policy Issues" raised by the board last spring.

On September 24, the Executive Team met with the Budget Advisory Group to discuss the charge from ET and questions raised by the Budget Advisory Group about the budget development process. Specific issues discussed were:

- \* The need to clearly communicate to staff and students the budget challenges the college faces for 2002-03.
- \* Program/service review and, because of time pressures, the need to develop a more limited and specific budget review plan for 2002-03 budget development.
- \* The need for clear criteria, which are widely communicated and understood, for making budget decisions.
- \* The need for early, frequent and regular communication about the college's budget situation and about the budget development process.

#### STUDENT PRIVACY LAWS MAY AFFECT YOUR JOB; TRAINING AVAILABLE

Helen Barker Garrett, Lane's director of Enrollment Services/Registrar, reminds all returning and new faculty and staff to be FERPA savvy. FERPA, the Federal Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, is a federal law protecting student privacy. You should know how the law affects your job and our students.

The most common FERPA violation is allowing students to view any other student's ID/social security number. Never post grades with ID numbers, and never pass around rosters with ID/social security numbers.

Helen, and Kerri Houghton in Enrollment Services, have put together a traveling FERPA basics workshop, which takes 15 minutes to an hour, depending on your interest. They will come to your staff meetings, in-services, or other occasions.

"This is to protect our students' privacy and is not meant to deter you from doing your jobs," says Helen. "It's just one more way that we can serve our students well!"

#### FOLLOW THESE DISTRIBUTION GUIDELINES FOR POSTERS

Now that everyone is back in school, the tacky patrol would like us to be mindful of the way we distribute information to students and staff in the common areas of the college. The general rule for guidelines on posting materials is written below. For more information, check out Distribution of Literature on COPPS at <http://www.lanecc.edu/cops/dislit.htm>

General Rule:

1. Authorization for the posting of materials other than as indicated in the following items must be obtained from the director of Student Activities or the designated building supervisor at outreach centers. Once authorized, the distribution will take place in the prescribed locations on campus; should not disrupt the normal operation of the institution; and should not cause a litter problem on the campus. These guidelines will be followed at all Lane locations.

2. Posters, circulars, bulletins, and other publicity material may be posted on designated bulletin boards only.

3. Reader boards may be used in concourse areas and in the cafeteria.

4. Distribution of newspapers, handbills and other printed materials shall be restricted to specific areas on the main campus designated by the director of Student Activities, and to those areas of outreach centers so designated by the building administrator.

5. Materials may not be posted on doors or windows except for student elections.

6. Authorization shall not be denied unless the materials are in conflict with the foregoing guidelines or with state or federal laws.
