GRADE POSTING POLICY CHANGES

Helen Barker Garrett, director of Enrollment Services/Registrar, reminds all faculty and staff of Lane's to be aware of Lane's policies on the public posting of grades. For returning faculty, please note that due to suggestions made by a number of departments and Faculty Council, there has been a significant change in the policy.

This excerpt is taken from COPPS and may be viewed in full at <http://www.lanecc.edu/cops/posting.htm> -- "Social security numbers listed in alphabetical order by the student's last name can easily be traced to student identity by referencing the alpha name list; therefore, grades may not be posted by the social security number and/or student identification number. Instructors may use the last four digits of a student's identification number, which is typically the same as their social security number, when posting grades as long as the list is no longer in alphabetical order."

VIDEOCONFERENCING CONNECTS STUDENTS

Tonight, William Koss and Debbie Duke will attend the same English Composition class at Lane, but they will be sitting 50 miles apart.

Koss is one of 13 students attending the class at Lane's community learning center at Elmira High School west of Eugene, and Duke is one of four students attending at the learning center in Oakridge to the east. Their class is videoconferenced. It originates live in Elmira and connects to Oakridge via two-way audio-video equipment.

Students see and hear each other on two large television monitors at each location. One monitor shows the classroom a student is in, and the other monitor shows the connected classroom. A camera is mounted on top of each monitor, and when students want to speak, they use one of a few microphones in the room.

"Videoconferencing allows students from geographically disparate communities to participate in the same class," says learning centers director Deb Lamb. "That makes it cost effective for Lane to offer classes in rural locations, and it saves rural students from having to drive into Eugene."

Videoconferencing is made possible by Lane's partnership with the high schools. The high schools own the equipment and loan it to Lane in exchange for access to the learning center computer labs during college off-hours. Lane built learning centers at several area high schools as part of its \$42.8 million bond project approved by voters in 1995. The centers offer a variety of other classes, services such as admissions and textbook sales, and computer labs.

The videoconferenced English Composition class is offered Wednesday nights from 6 to 9 p.m. Other videoconferenced classes this fall are Introduction to Sociology, Concepts in Computing, and Educational Assistant Training. For details, contact Lamb at Ext. 2915.

BAG NEEDS YOUR INPUT ON BUDGET CUTS BY OCTOBER 19

Although the estimated dollar impact will not be available before November, it appears inevitable that Lane will make substantial budget cuts this year, affecting spending for 2002-03. The Executive Team will also look at revenue enhancements, but increased revenue will not balance the budget. The board and the Executive Team are in agreement that cuts should not take the form of an across-the-board x-percent reduction. Therefore, some programs and services will likely be discontinued. During the next few weeks, the Executive Team will choose criteria for determining cuts to recommend to the board. BAG members believe it is critical to offer input from all employees on the issues ET should consider.

Criteria have not yet been chosen, but could conceivably include total cost of program; cost per FTE; enrollment rate; employment rate; impact on students; duplication of service; community demands/needs; whether activity is self-supportive; and whether there is a way to deliver service more efficiently.

Please comment on these examples and/or propose additional criteria. You may wish to consider how you think your own program or service area ought to be evaluated. Your anonymous suggestions will be compiled by BAG, and submitted to the Executive Team before criteria are chosen, but only if you respond by October 19. In the meantime, here is a summary of information:

- * All changes will be effective February 17.
- * The new prefix will be 463. It will replace all other prefixes with two exceptions: (1) community learning center numbers will not change, and (2) Florence and Cottage Grove will retain their old numbers in addition to receiving new numbers.
- * The new main college number will be 463-3000.
- * The old main number will work for one year from the date of the change. Other affected seven-digit numbers will expire two months after the change.
- * Extensions which currently begin with a 2 will instead begin with a 5.
- * Extensions will be the last four digits of the seven-digit numbers.
- * College staff will be able to dial either the seven-digit numbers or four-digit extensions.
- * The new prefix will make college numbers show up on caller ID screens.
- * A web page with the new numbers will be posted by February 17.
- * Benefits of the new prefix are direct dialing to all phones at Lane, faster service, and the ability to accommodate more calls per line.
- * The next edition of the staff directory will be distributed in February to coincide with the switch to the new phone numbers.
- * Printing/Graphics is offering half-orders of business cards between now and February 17. Full orders are 250 cards and half orders are 125 cards.
