

## BOARD REPORT

Twenty speakers from an overflow audience advocated for resolution of the faculty contract at the December 12 Board of Education meeting. Comments proceeded after a 6-1 board vote to waive the 20-minute maximum time limit for statements from the audience. Lucille Salmony voted no.

The management employees working conditions agreement for 2001-02 was approved 5-2. Robert Ackerman and Dennis Shine voted no, citing concerns about disparities among the different employee group contracts.

The Foundation received consensus support to serve as the primary coordinator of college fundraising efforts.

In unanimous action, the board completed approval of budget assumptions for 2002-03 (most of the assumptions were approved at a previous meeting); authorized KLCC to spend \$191,000 in private donations to retain Netzel Associates, Inc., of Culver City, California, as a fundraising consultant for a new main campus facility; awarded a contract for \$196,650 to Project Development Group of Vancouver, Washington, for mold remediation in Building 4; and approved advisory committee memberships for 2001-02.

Unanimous personnel action included the appointments of Pamela Harrison, financial aid advisor, Student Financial Services, effective November 26; Brandi Judd, financial aid advisor, Student Financial Services, effective November 19; and Christine Marshall, administrative specialist, Academic Learning Skills/English as a Second Language, effective November 8; and the retirements of Weltzin "Bill" Blix, faculty, Art and Applied Design, effective January 1; Joe Farmer, director, Foundation, effective December 31; Kurt Schultz, faculty, Health and Physical Education, effective December 31; and Fran Thomas, faculty, Health and Physical Education, effective December 31.

## GO FOR BAROQUE ON FRIDAY

"Go for Baroque!" a concert of music from the Baroque era, will be presented at Central Lutheran Church, at 18th and Potter in Eugene, on Friday, January 11, at 7:30 p.m. A free pre-concert lecture will be given by Marc Vanscheeuwijck. Ticket prices are \$8 and \$6 for Lane staff and students. All proceeds go to the individual lessons scholarship fund at Lane. This concert is a collaboration of the Lane music program,

Central Lutheran Church, the University of Oregon's Early Music Program, and the community. It is connected with a learning community at Lane called Go for Baroque! This learning community looks at the Baroque period through multiple lenses by involving seven classes and eight instructors in music, art, literature, history, science, writing, and gender issues.

A variety of Baroque musical styles spanning the entire period will be performed this Friday. The Lane Chamber Orchestra, directed by Ron Bertucci, teams up with David Bender on Molter's piccolo trumpet concerto, and with Lane student Amy Mills on a Purcell aria from Dido and Aeneas. Other Lane instructors on the program include LeeAnn Sterling and Elizabeth Hoffman (recorder and traverso flute), Barbara Myrick and John Jarvie (traverso and guitar), as well as two Lane students, Andrew Isom (tenor), and Nicholas Schaal (harpsichord), doing works by Loeillet, Caccini, and Telemann. UO early music performers include Marc Vanscheeuwijck (baroque cello), Alice Blankenship (baroque violin), Bryce Peltier (sackbut), Steve Vacchi (dulzian), and Jeanne Neven (harpsichord), performing various works by Fontana, Picchi, and Castello. #### TO STAFF MEMBERS WHO DEAL WITH GED TEST-TAKERS

There are several changes beginning that change the way the Testing Office must conduct the GED testing. The GED Testing Service has ended the 1988 test series and is starting a new series. It requires us to give group sessions with common start times and to proctor in the room, so we are required to end drop-in testing.

1. Tests will be in scheduled sessions. There will be three on Tuesdays and four on Thursdays.
2. Students will need to make appointments for tests to prevent overflow and to give time to set up test materials.
3. Evening GED testing will only be available Thursdays.
4. Test-takers will be required to attend a registration session before they do their first test. Its content includes hearing directions, filling out forms, and watching a required video explanation of the math answer sheet and the calculator. The Testing Office will hold Registration sessions Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 9 a.m., and it is expected that several GED Prep classes will also conduct partial registration sessions. Evening students may call to arrange a session.
5. The fee will be rising if approved.

## BOND UPDATE

**COUNTY RELEASES CONSTRUCTION PERMIT.** Last week, Lane County's Department of Public Works/Land Management Division released the construction permit for the remodel of the Center second floor. After waiting on the permit for several months, LCC carpenters are now busy framing up the area. Completion of the project is slated for the end of spring term 2002, with Academic Learning Skills tentatively scheduled for relocation to the area the second half of June.

**SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION OF PA ADDITION DRAWS NEAR.** DPR is scheduled to reach substantial completion on the addition to the Performing Arts facility on January 28. LCC's painters continue working on the interior of the addition and are waiting for several days without rain in order to complete exterior painting. Carpet installation is already underway and once completed, cabinetry installation will take place. This week you should see exterior site work commence as grading activities prepare the ground for work on sidewalks and the bases for light fixtures. The PA staff plans to relocate to their new offices in the addition during the second half of March. Moves to remaining areas in the addition will take place in June.

**WORKFORCE TRAINING PROGRESSING ON SCHEDULE.** Work in all three areas of the Workforce Training Center is progressing on schedule towards a substantial completion date of April 9, 2002. The exterior envelope, which is comprised of the roof, siding, brick veneer, and windows, is complete. Installation of interior doors is underway and framing is almost wrapped up. HVAC work is taking place throughout the entire facility. Installation of data grid and electrical lines is underway in the remodeled portion of the facility. At the site of the exterior elevator adjacent to Buildings 1, 2, and 3, work is nearing completion on the roof and brick veneer of the structure. Installation of windows will finish-up shortly thereafter. The elevator cab is installed and ready for review by state elevator inspectors. Completion of the elevator and associated walkways is scheduled for late January. When the project is finished, construction fences will come down and the areas around the elevator will be graded and cleaned up. Landscaping will occur in the late spring or early summer when the site is drier.

**COMPLETION OF CENTRAL PLANT UPGRADES DELAYED.** Completion of improvements to the heating water portion of the Central Plant Upgrade have been delayed approximately three weeks from the original December 24 date. The delay occurred because several critical components, which have long lead times, were not ordered early enough by the contractor. Substantial completion is now scheduled to occur on or about January 15. The delay should pose no interruptions to heating services on the main campus.

**LCC TAKES ON RESPONSIBILITY OF GENERAL CONTRACTOR.** A significant money saving tactic during bond construction has been to use LCC as the general contractor on several remodels on the main campus. When LCC assumes the responsibility of the general contractor, a project manager, who coordinates and oversees the work, is appointed from the FM&P trades staff. LCC's carpenters, electricians, painters, and plumbers primarily carry out remodeling activities, with private sub-contractors providing various work as needed.

While the trades remodeling schedules are not driven by a desire to avoid financial penalties associated with failing to meet substantial completion on contracted dates, as is the case with outside general contractors, the remodeling schedules are generally driven by the academic calendar. This means that relocating departments have specific dates by which they must be moved: either before classes begin, during breaks between terms, or during lulls in activities. These dates, in turn, dictate when LCC's trades must complete the remodels. For example, after a month's delay due to a hold-up on construction permits,



the carpenters, electricians, plumbers, and painters completed the extensive second floor remodel in Building 4 in only four months and in time for the start of fall 2001 classes. Had the remodel not been completed by the start of fall term, the Family and Health Careers programs utilizing those spaces would not have had any place to operate.

In addition to completing the work on time, the quality of workmanship met and/or exceeded standard general contractor levels. As with the Health Tech remodel and Center second floor, LCC trades will also undertake work on the Center fourth floor later this year.

As evidenced by past and present involvement with bond construction, having LCC as the general contractor for several bond remodels is a smart move. Proper management and scheduling, expeditiously carrying out duties, professionalism, and the ability to meet deadlines insures that LCC's trades will save not only precious bond dollars but also produce quality remodeled areas on both the Center second and fourth floors.

Click the "Next" button. Click the "Finish" button.

Make a shortcut to the "LCC Remote 2002" icon on your desktop (right-click and drag to desktop). Double-click the "New Remote" icon.

In the Username field enter your username. In the Password field, enter the password assigned to you. You can delete the old "LCC Remote" icon now from your desktop and the Dial-up Networking folder.

Important: You must make a successful connection for these changes to become permanent. If you do not connect, you must repeat this step until you get a successful connection.

#### MAC USERS

Start your computer as usual

Go to the Apple in the top left corner of the screen. Come down to

Control Panels and then to either PPP or Remote Access. Generally, if you have Mac OS 7.6.1 to 8.0, you will have the PPP Control Panel. If you have Mac OS 8.1 or newer, you will have the Remote Access Control Panel. If you have both, open each to see which has your settings. Replace the old phone number with the new one provided (463-4737).

Note: Once you complete your Remote Access session and close the Control Panel, you will be prompted to save your changes. Please answer OK, or your new settings will be lost and you will have to repeat this process.

## JANUARY BOARD REPORT

The Lane Community College Board of Education voted 7-0 at its January 9 meeting in favor of a recommendation for the long house. The recommendation pledged \$250,000 from capital repair and improvement as matching funds subject to three conditions: (1) that the balance of funds needed for the project up to \$420,000 be raised from external sources by December 2003; (2) that the facility be multi-use; and (3) that in the event external funds are not raised, the \$250,000 pledge will expire in January 2004.



Seven speakers from the audience advocated for the long house, and staff presented supporting information.

In other 7-0 action, the board approved the purchase of a building management control system for the Center Building second floor remodel from Control Contractors, Inc., of Portland, for \$79,803; awarded a contract for the HVAC remodel for the Center Building second floor north to FM Sheet Metal, Inc., of Eugene, for \$94,000; authorized \$76,000 for six seismic improvements with further seismic improvements to be done in priority order as funds become available; and approved a revised plan for the Center Building 4th floor remodel which adds \$847,294 to the project budget but has the approval of affected users and will better serve students, according to staff.

The board approved shifting \$700,000 from bond project seismic funds to the bond project sewage lagoon upgrade for a \$1.3 million pre-engineered package plan to be presented to the DEQ in February. The plan adds purification equipment which would allow discharge into Russel Creek, and concurrent playfield use and irrigation. The vote was 6-0 with Lucille Salmony abstaining after raising questions about the lifespan of the package.

Personnel action approved 7-0 were the appointments of Jessica Alvarado, faculty, Counseling/Human Development, effective January 2-June 30; Beverly Farfan, faculty/coordinator, Cooperative Education, effective January 7-June 15; Jesse Hall, instructional specialist, Advanced Technology Division, effective December 6; Sharrie Herbold, interim health instructor, effective January 7-June 15; Laura Loftus, database and administrative assistant, Business Development Center, effective December 10; Lucille Mathis, Oakridge learning center coordinator, effective December 21; and Cathy Miner, faculty, Mathematics, effective January 7-to June 14; and the retirement of Sue Colvin, director, Personnel Services, effective March 31.

#### CHICKEN SOUP FROM LANE FAMILY CONNECTIONS

Here is a story that illustrates the mission of Lane Family Connections, the child care resource and referral agency for Lane County that resides at LCC. The incident is presented from the perspective of parent consultant Katy Fuller, who assisted the parent.

"I received a call from a parent this morning who was in distress. The first thing that she said was that her 'world had been ripped apart,' then she started to cry. I told her to take a moment and then let me know what was going on for her and her family.

"When she could she said that her family had recently relocated from another state with their three children, twins almost two and an eight-year-old. They needed to make some positive changes in their lives, but it didn't seem to be happening. Her husband was attacked and stabbed over the weekend and needed surgery; she was informed he may not be home for two months. She doesn't have any friends or family and going back home is not an option.

"She needed child care on a variable basis seven days a week, day or night, including weekends. This schedule worked while her husband was home, but she didn't see how she was going to make it work now. Her job is the major income for the family.

"I was able to refer her to four family child care providers as well as provide her with referrals to other community support programs, such as Birth to Three, HUD, and the Parenting Resource Book.

"About 15 minutes after the call the parent called me back. Her voice was full of excitement. The first provider that she called has the schedule flexibility that she needs--and has openings for all three of her children. She was planning to visit the provider to evaluate the quality of care that very morning. She was standing out in the alleyway barefoot, her eyes swollen and red from crying. But, for the first time since her husband was injured, she was crying for happiness; as she was talking on the phone to me she was waving at the child care provider who lives in the same alley!"

In the Username field enter your username. In the Password field, enter the password assigned to you. You can delete the old "LCC Remote" icon now from your desktop and the Dial-up Networking folder.

Important: You must make a successful connection for these changes to become permanent. If you do not connect, you must repeat this step until you get a successful connection.

##### MAC USERS

Start your computer as usual

Go to the Apple in the top left corner of the screen. Come down to

Control Panels and then to either PPP or Remote Access. Generally, if you have Mac OS 7.6.1 to 8.0, you will have the PPP Control Panel. If you have Mac OS 8.1 or newer, you will have the Remote Access Control Panel. If you have both, open each to see which has your settings. Replace the old phone number with the new one provided (463-4737).

Note: Once you complete your Remote Access session and close the Control Panel, you will be prompted to save your changes. Please answer OK, or your new settings will be lost and you will have to repeat this process.

## BOND UPDATE

PA STAFF HOSTS FAREWELL LUNCHEON. Throughout work on the Performing Arts project, DPR's crew has maintained a positive relationship with the Performing Arts personnel and gone out of their way to accommodate educational activities in the building. As a token of their appreciation for doing such a great job, the Performing Arts staff held a "Construction Crews Farewell Lunch" last Monday in the PA lobby. Bimb Kampanatsanyakorn organized the luncheon, which originally started out as a small event but then blossomed into something much larger, with DPR, City View Electric, EMK, bond staff, Performing Arts personnel, the president, and two board members joining in the festivities. Attendees enjoyed a delicious lunch while serenaded by Lane music students. Overall, it was quite a unique way to celebrate the completion of contracted work. DPR pushed hard to complete work on the Performing Arts addition by January 28; however, work on the fire alarm and mechanical control systems will keep the contractor on site until the end of this week. Once DPR's portion of the project finishes up, LCC's staff will begin work on items not included in the construction contract: installation of cabinetry and electrical wiring in the music lab. Performing Arts personnel will move to their new offices in March with the remainder of moves taking place in June 2002.

CENTER SECOND FLOOR REMODEL WELL UNDERWAY. LCC's carpenters are wasting no time putting up framing for the future home of Academic Learning Skills on the second floor of the Center. Completion of significant amounts of framing will allow ALS personnel to tour the area this week and come away with a good understanding of the spatial dynamics of their future space. As work on the remodel progresses, mechanical and HVAC subcontractors will soon join the workforce. Once completed, the second floor remodel will encompass classrooms, computer labs/classrooms, testing areas, group study rooms, a workroom, a lounge, and offices. The project is scheduled to reach completion in June 2002.

CENTER FOURTH FLOOR DESIGNS REVISED. After much discussion, Bob Mention and PUG members from English Foreign Language and Speech and Social Science have produced a revised 4th floor remodel plan that contains, among other things, a strongly desired element by both departments: larger classrooms. Currently, the fourth floor contains six classrooms that vary in size from 496 square feet to 1,090 s.f. After the remodel, the floor will have seven classrooms ranging in size from 1,050 s.f. to 1,255 s.f. In addition to classrooms, the remodel will also contain multiple computer classrooms/labs, tutor and listening labs, conference rooms, and offices. The main administrative offices for EFL&S and Social Science will also relocate to the west side of the floor on either side of the west stairway entrance. Construction is tentatively scheduled to occur in two phases. The bond office hopes to have preliminary plans and cost estimates by the middle of February. If development of construction plans, the bid process, and release of building permits goes smoothly, the remodel should begin in August 2002 and reach completion during the summer of 2003.

FOCUS ON WTC CAUSES DELAY ON ELEVATOR. Work on the freestanding elevator adjacent to Buildings 1, 2, and 3 has occurred in spurts and starts. This is not atypical when a contractor has several projects underway on a site, especially when one of the projects is considerably larger. Since



Chambers' focus has always leaned toward the WTC facility rather than the elevator, bond personnel must regularly motivate the contractor to expedite completion of the elevator and thereby allow students to more easily access various parts of the campus. The metal cover and gutters are now on the elevator's upper roof and the entire walkway from the elevator to Parnell Loop is scheduled to be poured this week. The elevator project should reach completion during February. Turning to the WTC, installation of interior doors and lights is complete in CIT's portion of the facility. The large training rooms in the conference center are painted. Installation of drywall began last week in the Training and Development addition and continue in the remainder of the facility.

**SEISMIC UPGRADE TO FOCUS ON CRITICAL AREAS.** This month the board approved \$76,000 for the most critically needed seismic upgrades on the main campus. The improvements include repair of a girder support at the northwest corner of Building 2; adding additional support to the southeast terrace stairway; reinforcing beam channels at the Forum's south entrance; stabilizing the library stacks; repairing and upgrading the terrace beam at the Forum; and bracing light fixtures on the first, second and third floors of the Center. In reality, LCC is located in one of the safest places in Lane County as far as seismic activity goes. Geologic reports indicate there are no active surface faults within 30 miles of the campus and underlying rock is not subject to foundation bearing failures such as liquefaction or slope instability. Nevertheless, because Lane was originally constructed in the 60s, long before current FEMA codes, areas of the campus not included in the current upgrade will be addressed in order of importance, as funds are available.

**SEWAGE LAGOON UPGRADE RECEIVES NEEDED FUNDS.** By focusing on priority seismic work and postponing other seismic upgrades, the board recently approved moving \$700,000 remaining in the seismic fund to the Sewage Lagoon Upgrade Project. In so doing, \$1.3 million is available for installation of a pre-engineered package treatment plant. Used successfully for decades, package treatment plants work well in small, uniformly loaded systems such as LCC's lagoons. The plant will disinfect sewage, reduce levels of alga, and dechlorinate wastewater before its release into Russel Creek. During the summer, the lagoons will store processed effluent before filtering, disinfecting, and pumping it into the playfield irrigation system. The upgrade is needed because the lagoon system, built approximately 30 years ago, no longer complies with DEQ standards for effluent discharge. The project is expected to go out to bid in the spring of 2003 and reach completion approximately one year later.

**APPROVAL NEEDED TO ENTER BOND CONSTRUCTION SITES.** Human beings are curious creatures, and it can be tempting to take a quick peak at construction progress by entering a site. However, remember that bond construction sites are closed at all times to any individual who is not directly involved in construction activities or part of the Bond Project Management Team. Buildings under construction are the property of the general contractor until officially turned over to Lane. Entering construction sites, even after workers are gone for the day, poses particular liability issues. Foremost, the bond office does not want anyone injured on a site. Additionally, well meaning LCC personnel can inadvertently walk on concrete that is not completely set up or brush against painted walls that are not completely dry. Occurrences such as these can cause extra work for the contractor with ultimate financial responsibility for such setbacks possibly directed to the bond office. Therefore, please contact the bond office and arrange for a tour if you would like to see how a project is progressing.
