Control Panels and then to either PPP or Remote Access. Generally, if you have Mac OS 7.6.1 to 8.0, you will have the PPP Control Panel. If you have Mac OS 8.1 or newer, you will have the Remote Access Control Panel. If you have both, open each to see which has your settings. Replace the old phone number with the new one provided (463-4737).

Note: Once you complete your Remote Access session and close the Control Panel, you will be prompted to save your changes. Please answer OK, or your new settings will be lost and you will have to repeat this process.

YES, THEY REALLY DO LIKE US

What did students tell us? On the spring term 2002 ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes, Lane found that:

-- 97 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's general environment is welcoming and accepting to all students, regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.

-- 96 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's instructors strive to create a classroom environment that is comfortable and fair to all students regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.

-- 61 percent of the respondents reported that a major reason they chose to attend Lane was because Lane "offered the courses they wanted" (compared to 56 percent of all Oregon community college respondents).

ARE YOUR FIRST AID KITS UP TO DATE?

All work areas are required to have a first aid kit which is available to staff to treat minor injuries. In the past there was a list of standard supplies which needed to be in the kit. However, this has now been changed and each area needs to determine what injuries are likely in their area and provide appropriate supplies in their kit. Below is a list of very basic supplies which should be in all kits. However, some areas will need more extensive supplies. Student Health staff will gladly work with different areas to help you determine what supplies your kit should contain. Just call ext. 2665 for a free consultation! Minimal recommended supplies:

Gauze pads 3" x 3" or larger - about 6 Gauze pads 8" x 10" or larger - about 6 Adhesive bandages - different sizes are nice Gauze roller bandage 2" wide - 1 or 2 Triangular bandage Wound cleansing agent (soap and water located nearby is sufficient) Emergency blanket - one of those small ones you get in outdoor stores. Latex gloves - several pairs CPR shield

As important as what is in your kit is what is not in your kit. You are strongly urged not to put any over the counter medications in your kit. The purpose of the kits is to provide emergency care--not to treat minor illnesses. You, and the school, can incur liability if these are not used correctly. Examples would be Aspirin, Ibuprofen, burn ointment, wound treatment creams, eye drops, cough drops, etc. A nice selection

of over the counter medications are for sale in the bookstore. Students can receive many of these items for free, and assistance in using them correctly, at Student Health. Contact: Sandy Ing-Wiese.
