BOND UPDATE FOR THE WEEK OF MARCH 4

PREPARATION KITCHEN UNIQUE AREA WITHIN WTC. While Chambers Construction is approximately one and one-half months away from substantial completion of the WTC, there is a portion of the facility that awaits work by LCC's trades: the preparation kitchen. Originally, a portion of the western conference center included a plating kitchen from which food, prepared in the Center's kitchen, would be served. However, in the spring of 2001 the plating kitchen was changed to a full preparation kitchen and a student demonstration kitchen/classroom was introduced into the WTC plans. With these changes, students of the culinary and hospitality fields can experience first hand the reality of their prospective fields in conjunction with conference center activities. While contracted construction encompasses the costs associated with the instructional kitchen and classroom, fundraising is underway to cover construction and equipment costs associated with the preparation kitchen. The Culinary, Hospitality, and Food Service Advisory Committee is responsible for the fundraising and hopes to raise \$450,000 by May 2002. To date, approximately 38 percent of the funds are accounted for through grants and pledges. LCC trades are scheduled to begin the first phase of work on the preparation kitchen this spring.

PASSAGEWAY THROUGH WTC TO MOVE. Towards the middle of March, the temporary passageway that runs from the northeast corner of Building 19 (Workforce Training Center) to the skybridge will move further south within Building 19. Relocation of the passageway allows for completion of several classrooms and the future home of College Now. Exterior signs indicating the entrance to Building 19 will be moved just before the passageway is relocated.

WALKWAY AND ELEVATOR STAIRWAY TO OPEN SHORTLY. On or about the 15th of this month, the walkway on the north side of Building 1 (Student Services) that runs between the elevator and Parnell Loop will open. The walkway provides a direct route from western portions of the campus to Building 2 (Business) and Building 3 (Administration). In addition to the walkway, the stairway adjacent to the elevator will also open, thereby providing access from the ground level to upper areas of the campus. While the walkway and stairs are tentatively scheduled to open the end of next week, the elevator will not reach completion until the end of the month. Signs notifying pedestrians of the status of the elevator are positioned on the west end of the walkway.

CENTER SECOND FLOOR REMODEL SHAPING UP. LCC trades are moving along at a significant pace on the Center 2nd Floor Remodel as evidenced by the completion of the framing. Certain areas are now sheet rocked and taping and mudding activities are underway. All the plumbing is roughed-in, and completion of the electrical rough-in is expected in the near future. In construction, the term "roughed-in" applies to work that is behind the walls, as opposed to fixtures we see attached to walls, such as sinks or light fixtures. HVAC and hydronic work continues on schedule with approximately 45% of the work complete.

CENTER FOURTH FLOOR PUG CLEAR ON PHASING OF REMODEL. Finalization of the floor plans for the Center 4th Floor Remodel took some time to achieve; agreement about phasing of the project took no time at all. Recently, PUG representatives from the EFL&S and Social Science departments strongly stated their desire to have the remodel take place all at one time rather than being split into phases. The unified desire about a single-phase project is not surprising considering that a multi-phased project would require approximately one year of educational activities to occur side-by-side with construction activities. While a single-phase approach will save significant money and time, it also requires that all personnel and functions on the Center 4th floor be temporarily relocated to other classrooms, computer labs/classrooms, specialized learning areas, and office space--no small task. Nevertheless, after completing a preliminary investigation of possible relocation space, bond staff members are optimistic that a one-phase approach to the construction can take place. Although relocation space is identified within the WTC as well

as areas vacated by those departments moving to the WTC this summer, another space evaluation will be conducted towards the end of March before final relocation determinations are presented to the FMT.

AND WE THOUGHT LAST SUMMER WAS BUSY! From the perspective of the bond office, summer 2002 on LCC's main campus can be summed up in one word: moving. Stretching from the middle of June until the third week in September, 13 departments are tentatively scheduled for either permanent or temporary relocation here at 4000 E. 30th Avenue. Moving means much more than getting a department and all the associated items from one location to another, it also includes set-up of new classrooms, conference rooms, and labs as well as storage of significant amounts of furnishings and items during temporary relocations. Keeping bond movers busy this summer are partial or entire moves of the following departments: Music, Dance and Theater Arts; Academic Learning Skills; Computer Information Technologies; Distance Learning; Cooperative Education; College Now; Culinary Arts; Hospitality; Training and Development; Business and Industry Services; Instructional Technology Center; English, Foreign Language and Speech; and Social Science.

RELOCATING? HERE ARE SOME TIPS. Considering the magnitude of the summer moves, it is critical for relocating departments to trim down materials by reducing, recycling and archiving. Since volumes of accumulated materials and tight work schedules can complicate decisions about what objects to keep or recycle, here are some helpful tips to expedite the crucial task of thinning out accumulated materials.

First, consider if your materials can be archived. Without a doubt, the Records Retention Schedule at LCC's Archives web site will inform you if your materials have archival value. The web site is located at <http://www.lanecc.edu/archive/rrds.htm> and can also be accessed through Lane's home page under College Business, Archives. The Records Retention Schedule provides a complete listing of differing types of media that should be archived, the associated required periods of retention, as well as proper procedures for deposition of materials. If you need to send information to LCC's annals, please contact Elizabeth Uhlig at extension 5466 in order to secure necessary archival containers. Elizabeth is also available to answer archival questions you might not be able to locate at the web site.

For those items not sent to Archives, be sure to consider recycling. Jennifer Hayward, LCC's Recycling Coordinator, indicates that just about every type of paper can be recycled: flip charts, old file folders, magazines, books, even paper ream wrappers. The center also takes used or working office supplies such as binders, file folders, and staples. If you have large amounts of confidential items to be shredded, the Recycling staff can also save you valuable time. Confidential items can be picked up and immediately shredded, or, at the outside, stored in locked containers for a short time until destroyed. If you have questions about materials that can be recycled or the shredding of confidential items, please contact Jennifer at extension 5594.
