MESSAGE TO ALL STAFF FROM THE ENERGY MANAGEMENT TEAM

The college's annual electricity bill is more than \$715,000. Facilities Management and Planning, in cooperation with the Energy Management Program, is working on several energy savings projects. These projects include replacing old inefficient lighting with more energy efficient lighting, decreasing lighting levels, and making new spaces as energy efficient as possible. SAVE ENERGY: ENABLE THE SLEEP MODE ON YOUR MONITOR

Now that you've gotten in the habit of turning your monitor off when you leave work, you can pat yourself on the back. Then you can enable the power management feature for your monitor and save even more energy! When monitors are in sleep mode, they use 7 percent of the energy that they use when they are on.

You can set your power management feature so that the monitor goes into a sleep mode after you have not used your computer for an amount of time you specify (say 15 minutes). Your monitor will wake back up as soon as you hit the mouse or touch the keyboard.

Most of us have screen savers on our computers but screen savers do not save energy. When a monitor is set to go into sleep mode, the screen goes blank and your monitor is using about 93 percent less energy. If all of us set our monitors to go into sleep mode and our monitors are "asleep" for three of those nine hours per day, we will save another \$1,848 per year. Along with the savings we generate by turning the monitors off at night, this adds up to a total of \$20,618 in savings!

How to enable the sleep mode on PCs: Double click on the "My Computer" icon on your desktop. Double click on "Control Panel." Double click on "Power Management." Under the "Power Scheme" option, choose "Home/Office Desk." Set the "Turn off Monitor" option to a reasonable amount of time--15 minutes for example.

Please note that some computers do not respond correctly when the power management features are set. If you have problems with your computer, you may need to turn this feature back off. Contact: Energy Management Team, ext. 3279.

If you haven't donated blood within the last eight weeks, please take advantage of the Lane Memorial Blood Bank Bloodmobile spring visit to campus on Friday, April 19, from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. The visit is a service project of the LCC Latino Student Union.

Americans expect that a plentiful, wholesome blood supply will be available should they or their loved ones need a transfusion -- for emergency or routine surgery, childbirth, or even for scheduled treatment. Yet only 5 percent of healthy Americans eligible to give blood actually donate each year. And there is no substitute for human blood.

No, you cannot get a serious disease by giving blood. All supplies are sterile and used only once.

Call Pete Peterson at ext. 5655 for an appointment. The entire process should take no more than 45 minutes. The Bloodmobile will park in the service way near the Student Health Services, first floor of the Center Building.

The basic checklist: You must be in good health, at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds. You wait eight weeks since your last donation, have not lost weight significantly in the last two weeks. You must present your photo ID at the time of donation, and should eat a meal with protein and carbohydrates two-four hours before donating. Using medications such as aspirin or those for allergies, blood pressure, etc., will not necessarily prevent you from donating (call LMBB for confidential answers to medical questions, 484-9111).

Reasons for deferral or rejection: You must wait one week after taking antibiotics for infections. You must wait six months after a serious illness or major surgery. You must wait 12 months after ear or body piercing, having tattoos or permanent makeup applied; after exposure to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; after a shot for hepatitis exposure; or if you have had a blood transfusion or organ transplant.

You cannot donate if you have AIDS or test positive for the HIV virus, or have participated in high-risk behaviors; if you have a history of hepatitis; if you have insulin-dependent diabetes; or if you have respiratory or cardiac conditions. Submitted by Pete Peterson.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. INSTRUCTOR TO PRESENT AT INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

Jerry Ross will present a paper titled, "Global Technology Education in the Context of the Gramscian World-view," at the 2002 International conference of the Global Business and Technology Association (GBATA) in Rome, Italy, on June 25. Ross was notified by Nejdett Delener, associate dean of academic affairs, GBATA International Conference chair, that his paper was accepted for presentation after a blind review. The conference is jointly sponsored by St. John's University and the State University of Management, Russia.

Abstract of paper: The Gramscian context refers to the writings and vision of Antonio Gramsci, which have an increased relevance for society today. His comments on the organic intellectual and the need for mass education can be applied to problems we face today in preparing young adults for the digital age. The need for mass technical education is based on the revolution in the marketplace and in technology itself, which increasingly demands highly literate and trained problem solvers. The "digital divide" is the technological "other side" to the uneven benefits to be derived from an unconstrained global privatization. Only a critical pedagogy can provide the more radical but much needed break from formal "single loop" problem solving and the "surveillance-based" education of the past. Chardin's notion of noosphere now extended to the cyberspace "membrane" is a powerful metaphor for holonic, systems-based democracy required for a truly democratic global civic society. The global community college has been proposed as a model for a changed world. Global mass technical education can be advanced worldwide through implementation of the goals of the Bologna declaration combined with serious efforts to overcome the digital divide.

Reasons for deferral or rejection: You must wait one week after taking antibiotics for infections. You must wait six months after a serious illness or major surgery. You must wait 12 months after ear or body piercing, having tattoos or permanent makeup applied; after exposure to anyone with hepatitis or jaundice; after a shot for hepatitis exposure; or if you have had a blood transfusion or organ transplant.

You cannot donate if you have AIDS or test positive for the HIV virus, or have participated in high-risk behaviors; if you have a history of hepatitis; if you have insulin-dependent diabetes; or if you have respiratory or cardiac conditions. Submitted by Pete Peterson.

APRIL 10 BOARD REPORT

Following are highlights from the April 10 Board of Education meeting.

President Mary Spilde reported that the next state revenue forecast may mean another two to three percent reduction for community colleges and that the legislature will convene another special session on June 4. She also noted that first-week FTE for spring term was 3,067, a 3.4 percent increase over last spring.

Seventeen speakers advocated for various concerns including student ballot measures, pre-engineering, Adult High School, noncredit tai chi, and theater production.

Noncredit tuition rates were approved for summer term at \$2.65 per credit hour, or \$80 per 30-hour class.

Five measures were approved for the student ballot with the notation that ballot language was a non-binding recommendation to college administration. Students will vote whether to continue the \$2.25 OSPIRG fee; increase the student health fee from \$6 to \$8 per student per term; increase the ASLCC fee

from \$5 to \$6 per student per term; add a \$1.75 fee for The Torch; and add a \$1.13 fee for an Oregon Student Association campus organizer position. Student elections will be held May 13-15.

The Efficiency Work Group report was distributed and will be receive further board review. Administration is studying the report and will discuss recommendations with stakeholders before any implementation. The report is available at <http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/031802recommet.htm>.

A renewable-energy program option was added to the energy management technician associate degree program. The option will train students to install renewable energy applications such as photovoltaics. Funding is provided by the Eugene Water and Electric Board and Bonneville Power Administration.

LCCEA provided further details about its budget proposal which it first presented in March. The board granted administration time to review the additional information and meet with LCCEA. The board will continue discussion at its May meeting.

Parking fee proposals were reviewed. Administration was directed to proceed and report back in June.

A budget policy was adopted to reserve unanticipated carryover for meeting the uncertainties of state budget and potential revenue decreases, effects of unpredictable enrollment, unfunded PERS liability, and one-time expenditures for emergent physical plant and equipment needs.

All votes were unanimous. The meeting adjourned at 12:23 a.m. The next regular meeting will be Wednesday, May 8. After board approval and any corrections, minutes are posted at <http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm>. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

BOND UPDATE FOR APRIL 22

JUST HOW BIG IS THE WTC? The Workforce Training Center is the largest bond project on the west side of campus with approximately 78,800 square feet. Consider this: if the entire facility was one level and laid out end-to-end, one and a half football fields could fit inside of the WTC and there still would be room to spare. The only larger project on the main campus is Building 16, which houses the Science and Math departments and contains approximately 86,600 square feet. Undertaken the beginning of 2001, the WTC is moving ever closer to substantial completion on or about June 17, 2002. One indicator that the project is almost complete is the relocation of the passageway through the facility. In order to finish the remodel of several classrooms, storage rooms, and the College Now area, the passageway moved to a completed permanent hallway further south within the facility. Within the rest of the WTC, loose ends are being tied up in most areas except the prep kitchen, which will be completed by Lane trades personnel this summer. Carpet will be completely laid on the first floor of the remodeled area this week, lighting installation is underway, and painting is all but complete in a majority of the facility.

ELEVATOR STRUCTURE AWAITS HEATING AND COOLING UNIT. The mechanical room next to the elevator contains the machinery that propels the elevator up and down. The company that manufactures the elevator requires installation of a heating and cooling unit within the machine room in order that temperatures do not drop below 40 degrees nor exceed 90 degrees, thereby assuring proper functioning of the equipment. Installation of the heating and cooling devise did not occur earlier do to an error of omission by the architects; however, the unit is on order with installation and inspection anticipated by the end of April.

ALS STOREFRONT REVEALED SHORTLY. Within the next couple weeks the temporary construction wall in the main lobby of the Center second floor will come down to reveal the inviting storefront entrance to the new Academic Learning Skills and Tutoring Services area. The glass entrance

will allow you to see the main reception area, portions of Tutoring Services, and until completion of the project, installation of HVAC components, carpet, and casework within these spaces. Currently, electricians are finishing up running conduit and electrical wire, installation of sheetrock continues to define greater portions of the project, and classrooms adjacent to the second floor lobby are being taped and textured.

THERE'S NO SUBSTITUTE FOR GOOD PLANNING. Bond project managers are currently putting their heads together in order to produce the most efficient construction schedule possible for the Center 4th Floor Remodel. Construction schedules are really the organization of work by its nature and time elements in a sequential manner from the start to the finish of a project. The sequence is not random but occurs in a predetermined manner dictated by the nature of construction. For example, you must clear and level the site before you pour foundations. Furthermore, you must also know that the site prep takes a particular number of days to occur and the pouring of foundations another specific amount of time. The nature and time of each element of construction is then plotted on a horizontal bar graph spanning the days and months of the year. In this way, project managers are able to have an overall view of the project and yet see the individual detail at any given time. In addition to the nature and time elements of the remodel, bond project managers are also deliberating about some unique aspects of work on the Center 4th floor that directly influences the schedule. For example, the managers are devising both a safe and effective way to transport materials on and off the floor and the most practical way to place the huge air handler units on top of the building. The tentative schedule shows construction commencing in September of this year, shortly after completion of relocation activities. Currently, the architects and engineers are at the 50% mark in the preparation of the construction documents.

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SPANISH PROJECT NAMED INNOVATION OF THE YEAR

The League for Innovation in the Community College is pleased to announce that the Spanish Program's "Learning Strategies Project" has been honored as this year's Innovation of the Year at Lane Community College. The award was presented at the April 26 in-service. Members of the project team include Devon Budz, Juan Cuadros, Roma Cusimano, Armand Gagnon, Elizabeth Hall, Matthew Luke, Sylvie Matalon-Florendo, Bojana Stefanovska, and Gloria Zabala. These faculty and their successful project will be recognized in a national publication produced by the League for Innovation, a 35-year-old international organization dedicated to catalyzing the community college movement.

The development of this creative approach to learning began during a review of the Spanish program two years ago. It was evident through student evaluations that a new type of student support system was needed to help students become more effective language learners. The Spanish faculty analyzed recurrent student complaints and then identified specific strategies that would help learners overcome obstacles in a proactive and responsible way. The result has been a multi-tiered approach that incorporates a range of learning strategies.

Since this new approach to student learning was introduced in fall 2001, student comments have been extremely favorable and instructors report a marked positive change in classroom environment fostered by lower levels of student anxiety, students' growing sense of community and ownership in the program, and increasing levels of student success.
