GRADUATE WINS FULBRIGHT

Aaron Grieser, former political science and cooperative education student at Lane, has won a Fulbright award to spend a year in Berlin, Germany, researching environmental policy in the East German clean-up. He will graduate with cum laude honors this month from Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts, with a bachelor of arts degree in international relations concentrating in international economics and the environment.

Grieser grew up in Cincinnati, Ohio, studying the German language from kindergarten through high school. He became a drummer in a popular band, competed in rock climbing, and started a landscape business which grew to employ five people. But what he really wanted to do was work for environmental causes, so he moved to Oregon to become an activist.

He enrolled at Lane in 1998. "I entered Lane very insecure about my abilities in academia, and timid about the formal learning environment," he recalls. "Two years later I left Eugene transformed."

He majored in political science and participated in the cooperative education program. Co-op provided him with an internship at a nonprofit organization, the Environmental Law Alliance Worldwide. The internship led to the connections that would later help him win the Fulbright. He also participated in the Phi Theta Kappa honor society, competed on Lane's debate team, formed a political discussion group, and led a group to the World Trade Organization protest in Seattle in 1999. "School is about learning skills and meeting people," says Grieser.

He urged students to take advantage of the opportunities at Lane in a November 2000 letter to The Torch student newspaper. Today he remains a strong advocate of community college education. He credits many at Lane for his success. He calls political science instructor, Steve Candee, his surrogate father and says Candee "opened doors for me that subsequently changed the direction of my life." English instructor Ellen Cantor still recommends critical readings. People in co-op, administration, and others at Lane convinced him that his beliefs mattered. "That made all the difference in my ability to transition from Eugene to Boston, from Lane to Tufts, and from here to Berlin," he says. "Lane was my springboard to the ability to work globally."

After his Fulbright year in Berlin, Grieser plans to attend law school to focus on international environmental law.

E-MAIL IS A PUBLIC RECORD

Would you be comfortable seeing the e-mail you just sent on the front page of The Register-Guard? E-mail is a public record, as per this explanation from the Attorney General's Public Records and Meetings Manual: "Many public bodies use electronic mail (e-mail) for communications. E-mail is a public record. Even after individual e-mail messages are deleted from an individuals computer work area, the messages generally continue to exist on computer back-up tapes, which are also public records. As with any public record, a public body must make all non-exempt e-mail available for inspection and copying regardless of its storage location."

Exemptions from disclosure often have to be determined by legal counsel. Records law is "primarily a disclosure law, rather than a confidentiality law," says the manual. An example of a conditionally exempt record is test and exam materials. May 15 BUDGET COMMITTEE AND BOARD REPORT

The Lane Community College Budget Committee met May 15 at 5:30 p.m. and completed its review of the budget document for 2002-03. The committee voted 10-1 to approve the 2002-03 budget as amended, including a general fund budget of \$69,597,518. Committee member Cj Mann voted no, citing there was too great an impact on professional technical programs. The Board of Education now will be asked to adopt the budget at its June 12 meeting.

Board members convened an executive session following the meeting, and held a 10-minute public session afterward. In that session, the board voted 5-0 to "approve the economic agreement between the college and the association resulting from negotiations mandated by the 1999-05 main agreement and ratified by the association." Board members Mike Rose and Lucille Salmony were absent.

MAY 8 BOARD REPORT

Following are highlights from the May 8 Board of Education meeting.

In her monthly report, President Mary Spilde reported that the state continues to forecast an additional revenue shortfall of about \$250 million which may lead to an additional 2 percent cut to Oregon's community colleges. The legislature will meet in special session in early June to address budget issues. Among other things, she reported that Computer Services stopped 539 e-mail viruses in April, and said College Council recommends limiting smoking to designated areas.

In statements from the audience, one student advocated for Adult High School, and another described how interdisciplinary learning benefited him.

The consent agenda passed 6-0, including minutes and personnel action (see related item). Board member Mike Rose was absent.

The board received an update on the Strategic Learning Initiative including examples of SLI projects such as the "BioBonds: Building Blocks for Your Body" Learning Community combining chemistry and biology. Presenting were Vice President for Instruction and Student Services Cheryl Roberts; faculty Dennis Gilbert, Maurice Hamington, Katie Morrison-Graham, Jeff Harrison, Russell Shitabata, Jennifer von Ammon, and Ken Zimmerman; and two students.

In budget discussion, administration said it stood by its standing recommendations after reviewing the faculty union budget proposal presented last month. The president said some ideas in the proposal were worth pursuing in the next budget process, "but first we must stabilize, then we can strategize."

The board heard summaries of reinstatement proposals from programs recommended for reduction or elimination, including adult high school, broadcast visual design and production, chemical dependency counselor training, law enforcement training reserve academy, physical science, and pre-engineering. The board voted 6-0 to restore pre-engineering classes, citing strong advocacy from business and higher education, exceptional quality, and a relatively low budget impact.

The board passed a supplemental budget for 2001/02 by 6-0 vote. The supplemental budget moves \$996,768 from contingency funds to the general fund to cover increases in employee compensation which occurred since the original 2001/02 budget was adopted last June.

Monitoring reports and noncredit tuition for fall term were postponed. The meeting adjourned at 12:40 a.m.

BOND REPORT

PREPARATION KITCHEN A CRITICAL INGREDIENT FOR CULINARY PROGRAM. Why is the presence of the preparation kitchen so important to the Culinary Arts program at Lane? Inclusion of the kitchen opens the door for the program to step up to the big leagues by achieving national certification from the American Culinary Foundation. In order to be eligible for certification, a culinary facility must

have the ability to duplicate the reality of the industry's standard kitchen. Once completed, the full service preparation kitchen of the Workforce Training Center will have all the bases for kitchen standards covered. Moreover, the conference center portion of the WTC provides the perfect setting in which second year culinary students can fulfill important curriculum requirements: creating, managing, and presenting a banquet for 300 guests. As members of the advisory committee for the Culinary, Food Services and Hospitality programs, the chef from the Eugene Hilton and the general manager from Eugene's Doubletree collaborated with LCC staff and gLAs architects on the design of the kitchen and conference center, further ensuring an environment that will mimic industry standards. Indeed, it seems that our Culinary, Food Services and Hospitality Management Program has widespread support in the private sector, with pledges and donations for construction and equipment currently equaling approximately \$111,000. It is hoped that continued fund-raising efforts in the next several months will contribute significantly to current funding levels. At this time, the only nationally certified culinary school in Oregon is the Western Culinary Institute in Portland. If students want to attend the Portland establishment they must have \$24,000 a year simmering on the back burner. At approximately \$6,000 per year, Lane's culinary program provides an obvious financial benefit. Although Lane's program provides greater accessibility than private schools, Clive Wanstall, interim executive chef in the Hospitality and Conference Services, Business, Workforce Development and Extended Learning Division, indicates that culinary schools are extremely supportive of one another and that the addition of a nationally certified program at Lane only services to strengthen the entire culinary and hospitality industry. Bon appetite!

HEADS UP FOR PASSAGEWAY CLOSURE. This week as the schedule allows, Chambers Construction will remove western portions of the walkway on the south side of Building 1 (Student Services). This means that the southern passageway between Buildings 1 and 2 (Business) will be temporarily closed for about two days. During the closure, when traveling to or from Building 1 to any campus facilities further east, you will have to use the sky bridge attached to the free-standing elevator, the ground level walkway on the north side of Building 1, or the western main entrance by the fountain. Once the passageway work is completed a newly established walkway running east and west on the south side of Building 1 will be open for pedestrian traffic. As part of the contractual agreement with Chambers, the former LTD passageway between Buildings 1 and 19 (Workforce Training Center) must be redone due to erosion during construction activities. An alert will be issued and signs put up when the exact days of work are known.

TIME IS RIGHT TO MOVE THE ARCHIVES. Approximately three years ago, work associated with construction of the child care facilities and the science addition required relocation of the archives from the tunnels. At that time, temporary space for Lane's archival records was located in an off-campus facility on Franklin Boulevard, as well as in ELEX 101, where archivist Elizabeth Uhlig's office was also located. Fortunately, circumstances occurring this summer will once again allow consolidation of the archives on the main campus; completion of the WTC, the movement of departments and functions to the WTC, and the relocation of personnel and functions for the Center 4th Floor remodel. As the Center 4th Floor personnel and classrooms were assigned space for their relocation, classes held in the two temporary classrooms (019 and 020) in the basement were moved to other facilities on campus, thereby providing more suitable environments for classroom activities. In addition to the classrooms, the office space (018) vacated when culinary and hospitality personnel move to the WTC will round out the total area needed for archival storage. Fortunately, the new temporary home for Archives requires a minimum amount of remodeling. The project is tentatively scheduled to reach completion in mid-July; relocation of the archives is anticipated towards the end of July. Reestablishment of a centrally consolidated area for the archives provides two distinct benefits: an environment in which archival access and record keeping can take place more efficiently and the redirection of off-campus storage fees to other bond projects. While obviously a good move, the temporary relocation of the archives to the Center basement is just that, a temporary solution. Since the Archives provide a valuable and necessary function for the college, ultimately, those functions must be accommodated in a permanent suitable location.

CENTER 2ND FLOOR REMODEL STAYS ON TARGET. Significant progress continues on the future home of Academic Learning Skills on the Center 2nd Floor as Lane's carpenters, electricians, and painters maintain a steady pace on completing labs, classrooms, and offices. Trades personnel are also installing ceiling tile in many areas of the remodel and they expect to begin wiring in light fixtures shortly. Carpet installation should take place the last week of May. Importantly, installation of the HVAC system is also underway; completion of HVAC work is the last major construction component within the project and is the area of work that will dictate a completion date for the remodel. Therefore, in order to make the most

efficient use of available space and time, classes were moved from Center 238 to Center 244 in order that HVAC work and classes could continue uninterrupted. The Center 2nd Floor remodel is tentatively scheduled for completion the middle of June.

SUBSTANTIAL COMPLETION CLOSE FOR WTC. Chambers Construction is scheduled to reach substantial completion on June 27. This means that the contractor's work on the facility will be finished and any remaining work will be the responsibility of LCC's trades personnel. Already, the trades are installing cabinetry, shelving, television brackets and whiteboards in portions of the building. With floor coverings in place within the CIT area, Rubensteins' crew is now working on the eastern portion of the second floor. Before long you should see the installation of pole lights take place around the exterior of the facility.

CENTER 4TH FLOOR PLANS NEAR COMPLETION. Last week the bond office received the drawings for the Center 4th Floor remodel, which are 95 percent complete. Bond and facilities personnel will take approximately one week to review the drawings and then return them to the architects for incorporation of any changes and completion of the final 5 percent of the plans. The completed drawings and specs should be submitted to the bond office and the building department on or about June 1. At that time, the bond management team will use the completed drawings to set up bid packages for outside contractors. Contracted work can include such things as installation of the HVAC system and sheet metal, and concrete cutting, among others things. It is anticipated that the bids will be opened and the building permit secured sometime the first part of August, approximately two months after receiving the completed drawings. In anticipation of receiving the building permit in August, as well as the significant workload associated with bond and facilities summer projects, the bond office has hired an additional carpenter and two more electricians. Project managers continue weekly meetings with the trades for organization of multiple aspects of the Center 4th Floor remodel. You can expect to see the staging area for the project located in the grassy area east of Building 20 (pizza hut) sometime in August. Personnel from grounds will level out the area before fabric and gravel is laid down to form an appropriate base for storage of equipment, mechanical items, and recyclable objects. Debris removed from the Center 4th floor will be put in dumpsters located in the old LTD passageway between the Forum and the Center. Jennifer Hayward is working with the project managers to secure outlets for usable materials from the demolition that are not suitable for the remodel.

SAVE ENERGY BY RECYCLING

IN THE BLUE BARRELS, RECYCLE PAPER: According to Weyerhaeuser, recycling 1 ton of paper saves 4,077 kilowatt-hours of electricity. In 2000/2001, Lane staff and students recycled 127 tons of paper and cardboard. That saved 519,233 kilowatt-hours of electricity.

IN THE GREEN BARRELS, RECYCLE ALUMINUM DRINK CANS AND FOIL: Producing aluminum products using recycled aluminum cans and foil uses 90-97% less energy than producing aluminum from virgin bauxite ore mined from tropical rain forests.

GLASS BOTTLES AND JARS: Glass bottles made from 50% recycled material can be produced with 25-50% less energy than glass bottles made from virgin materials.
