BDC'S FARM BUSINESS MANAGEMENT PROGRAM SEES INCOMES RISE

Lane County area farms showed substantial profits last year but the amount of profit varied dramatically by type of farm. According to figures recently released by the Lane's Farm Business Management Program, average net farm income per farm participating in the program was \$96,715, up from \$73,987 in 2000. However, fruit and vegetable farms netted only \$31,528 while field crop farms averaged over \$112,271. The field crop category includes nursery, Christmas trees and seed crops. Livestock farms had the highest net incomes at \$179,881 per farm. Within the livestock farm category, dairy farms were most profitable as a group.

Part of the discrepancy in net income is due to size. Fruit and vegetable farms had average gross cash receipts of \$187,851 per farm, while livestock farms grossed over \$1,000,000. But livestock farms were relatively more profitable also. They generated \$.23 of net income for every \$1 of production. At the same time, fruit and vegetable farms only had \$.15 of profit per \$1 produced.

TODAY: WATCH OUT FOR PAINT

The Facilities Management and Planning paint crew will be painting the exterior of the Business Building starting today. The entire project will last about a month. First, the painters will pressure wash the building. Then with the use of scaffolding on the east side and man lifts on the south and west sides, they will paint the building with an airless paint sprayer. Most of the surfaces will be covered with water-base primer and paint. The painters will make every attempt to keep the noise to a minimum, but some disruption is inevitable. VETO COULD COST LCC ANOTHER \$8 MILLION THIS YEAR

Just one month after the Lane Community College Board of Education adopted a budget \$5 million smaller than the year before, an additional \$8 million cut became a possibility.

Governor John Kitzhaber announced on July 11 that he may veto a legislative bill to delay the final state payment for community colleges this year into the next biennium to avoid further cuts to community colleges this year. A veto would result in an additional 25 percent cut of \$56 million from community college funding, including an \$8 million cut to Lane Community College, or 11 percent of its 2002/03 budget.

"We cannot sustain such a drastic cut," said President Mary Spilde, who attended the governor's press conference on Thursday. "I understand the governor's position that delaying payment is a short-term fix, but the reality is that we're already into the academic year. An \$8 million cut now means we would have to cancel hundreds of classes and lay off employees without time for public input. The impact on students and the community would be severe."

Backing up the president's concerns are second-week enrollment reports for summer term at Lane which show a 10.9 percent increase in FTE (full-time-equivalent) for credit classes, compared with the same time a year ago. The community's need for professional-technical training and transfer classes clearly remains strong.

Spilde said the governor wants to hear from people on the issue. She and Oregon's other community college presidents have asked to meet with the governor to explain the devastating impact of a veto. Cuts could target workforce training, professional-technical education, transfer classes, services to business, and other programs and services in local demand.

SUMMER ENROLLMENT UP

Summer credit enrollment is up, providing the first indication that last spring's budget cuts have not deterred demand for services. Second-week reports show a 10.9 percent increase in credit FTE (full-time-equivalent) classes compared with the same time a year ago, although total FTE, which includes noncredit classes, is down 2.2 percent.

Two factors may be driving enrollment. One is the economy. "When the economy's slow, credit enrollment goes up at community colleges," says President Mary Spilde. "People want to upgrade their job skills, or train or retrain for a new career. At the same time, people have less discretionary income, so noncredit enrollment goes down."

The other factor is new flexibility to add classes on demand. For example, some instructional areas are testing a tuition-based model for adding class sections. Under this model, division chairs monitor daily enrollment reports and as soon as demand develops, they add extra classes. Tuition revenue generated by the demand covers the expenses of the added classes. Typically, tuition revenue goes into the college general fund before being allocated back out for extra sections or annual budgeting. The tuition-based model offers real-time response to student demand.

Some decrease in total FTE was expected due to the elimination of seven programs and the closure of outreach campuses during summer. Tuition isn't thought to be a factor here because of the increase in credit enrollment.

"I think this tells us that the community still knows that Lane offers an excellent balance of professional-technical and transfer education," says Spilde.

The next enrollment benchmark will be fall term 2002; classes begin September 23.

BOND REPORT

DEPARTMENTS MOVE TO WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER. The moves to the Workforce Training Center are underway. Already relocated to Room 249 is the Instructional Technology Center, the first resident of the new facility. Joining the ITC is College Now, which is located in Room 233, just beyond the southern doors of the sky bridge. Tentatively scheduled for relocation this month are Distance Learning, the culinary arts demo kitchen, the hospitality classroom and offices, Cooperative Education, Training and Development, and Computer Information Technology. While moving activities proceed, college trades employees continue installation of cabinets, auditorium counters, computer lab wiring, appliances in the student kitchen, and Steelcase workstations. Subcontractors' quotes for work on portions of the prep kitchen are submitted and within the cost estimate. The deadline for kitchen equipment bids is July 23. Construction on the kitchen will commence when funds are secured. The Bond Project Management Team sincerely thanks all the departments involved in relocation to the WTC for their great attitudes, flexibility, help, and cooperation.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM DELAYS COMPLETION OF ALS REMODEL. Although Lane's trades have completed their portion of work connected with the fire alarm system in the Center second floor remodel, and plans for the system were submitted to the county for review, delays by the provider of the fire alarm system are postponing completion of the remodel. One of the frustrations associated with the remodel is that the fire alarm system used in the Center Building does not interface with any other system. Therefore, rather than seek services elsewhere the bond office must wait for the current provider to install several fire alarm parts and program the system at the central plant. In the meantime, college carpenters and electricians are buttoning up work within the project. In spite of the delay, bond movers are proceeding with relocation of Academic Learning Services furnishings and materials to the remodeled area. It is hoped that fire alarm installation, programming, and inspection will reach completion this week, thereby allowing

for a temporary occupancy permit and complete relocation of ALS functions and personnel. The Bond Project Management Team appreciates the patience Academic Learning Skills personnel have shown during the recent project delays.

NEW ELECTRONIC CLASSROOM IN LIBRARY. With a construction permit in hand and demolition complete, construction on the electronic classroom within the Library is underway. Quotes received from local subcontractors covering work other than that performed by LCC trades, and initial project costs are within estimates for the project. The new electronic classroom will move instruction on library research into an area with updated technology that allows innovative and efficient transfer of information. Furthermore, with a separate classroom, no longer will the instructional classes pose possible disruptions to other library users, as in the past. Completion of the new electronic classroom is tentatively scheduled for September 15, 2002.

ARCHIVES SAYS GOODBYE TO OFF-CAMPUS SITE. Recently, bond movers relocated a portion of LCC's Archives from a leased space off-campus, to the Center basement. The move coincided with ongoing basement remodeling activities for the archive office and work space. The remodel is tentatively scheduled to reach completion the end of summer, at which time the remaining portion of the archives, currently housed in ELEX 101, will also move to the Center basement.

CENTER FOURTH FLOOR SCHEDULING CONTINUES. Bond project managers continue planning activities for the Center fourth floor remodel. Front and forward at this time are formation of bid lists and bid packages. Shortly, architectural plans will be distributed to the various LCC trades shops. In addition to construction planning, organization of personnel and functions for relocation is also underway. Moving activities are always labor intensive and having the departments positioned four floors up only serves to compound the regular difficulties associated with moving. In addition, before any fourth floor relocation can occur, the housekeepers, locksmith and telecommunications specialist must be scheduled to assure that vacated rooms are clean, locks and keys are appropriate, and telephones operational. Only then can the bond moving team relocate fourth floor personnel to multiple destinations across the main campus. It is anticipated that fourth floor relocation will commence on or about August 1.

TAXPAYERS REAP 18.9 PERCENT RETURN ON DOLLARS INVESTED IN LCC

Taxpayers see a return of 18.9 percent on their annual investment in Lane Community College, according to a recent socioeconomic benefits study conducted for Oregon community colleges. The study was presented to Lane's Board of Education on Wednesday.

The analysis shows that every \$1 of tax money invested in Lane returns a cumulative \$19 over the next 30 years. Students enjoy an even better return of 20 percent on their investment of time and money. For every \$1 students invest, they receive a cumulative \$4.99 in higher future earnings over the next 30 years. In addition, a community college education improves individual lives and lessens the demand on state-supported health services, welfare and unemployment benefits, and public safety services, says the report.

JULY BOARD REPORT

Roger Hall was elected chair of the Lane Community College Board of Education for 2002/03 at the July 17 meeting by 6-0 vote. Dennis Shine and Mike Rose were nominated for vice chair; Shine won by 3-2 vote with Rose and Kathleen Shelley voting no; Lucille Salmony was absent.

Kudos and plaques of recognition were given to Robert Ackerman for chairing the board the past three years; and to Margaret Bayless for five years of service as faculty union president. Dave Keebler was introduced as chair of the Advanced Technologies Division.

Bond project news included conditional DEQ approval to proceed with a sewage lagoon upgrade. The board authorized the president to award the kitchen equipment bid for the workforce building rather than wait for the next board meeting, by 6-0 vote.

A real estate appraiser told the board that few if any college holdings were worth selling due to deed restrictions and other issues.

Under Statements from the Audience, Dennis Gilbert discussed nursing program admissions procedures; Cliff Fountain asked for reinstatement of the 50 percent senior tuition discount; and Mike Meyer and Lou Anne Lachman advocated reinstatement of the chemical dependency counselor training program.

The consent agenda passed 6-0 including approval of the June 12 minutes (see the web at http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm); annual appointment of deputy clerks; annual board appointments to community organizations; and personnel action (see related story).

In other unanimous action, the board reaffirmed membership in the Lane Council of Governments; approved zone adjustments to reflect the latest census redistricting; and approved administrative travel policies to recognize frequent flyer miles earned by employees while on college business as a form of employee compensation, and to consolidate airline travel with one agency.

A discussion on the direct and indirect costs of instruction will be continued at an August 26 work session.

The board received a progress report on an assessment of classes and programs offered by Business Administration and Business Technology being conducted as part of the 2002/03 budget reduction decisions.

The board heard an update on a parking permit proposal including that implementation is not feasible before fall 2003, to allow time for collegewide discussion and Banner implementation.

An economic impact study for Lane was reviewed. Among other things, the study shows that every \$1 of tax money invested in Lane returns a cumulative \$19 over the next 30 years, and that for every \$1 students invest, they receive a cumulative \$4.99 in higher future earnings over the next 30 years. As you know, the 2002/03 college budget is not yet loaded in the Banner system. By August 12, the budget office will have loaded Lane's adopted budget in Banner, and finance users will begin seeing budget information when using eXpressLane. However, you need to know that some of these numbers will not be correct.

During the month of August, the budget office will work on adjusting the budget figures in Banner to be the proper values. This is a time-consuming task, made more extensive this year because of reorganization, cuts and changes in the way the college wants to track certain revenues and expenses. You will continue to see budget figures during August, but keep in mind that the numbers are subject to change, especially if you work in an area that was significantly impacted by this spring's collegewide changes. If your department was not significantly impacted, your actual budget is probably about the same as last year.

In September, the budget in Banner should be correct and reflect reorganization and other changes. We will let you know immediately when the budgeting data are active. Until then, no budget checking functions will be activated, nor will you be able to make budget transfers. By making the final adjustments in Banner rather than in COCO and then moving correct data to Banner, the college is saving a significant amount of work, especially for the accounting area and the budget office. In the meantime, it would be most helpful to the budget office if you would limit your telephone calls and questions to those that are absolutely necessary until we get the budget loaded. We will contact departments for clarification if needed.

ARCHIVES COMPLETES FIRST PHASE OF MOVE

The first phase of the Archives move from the off-campus records warehouse to the Archives' new home in the basement of the Center Building was completed last week. To give you an idea of the scope of this project, we moved 3,375 boxes of college records weighing a total of 135,000 pounds or 67.5 tons. These boxes were moved on 105.5 pallets. When the boxes are placed side by side on the shelves, they measure 3,375 linear feet or .65 miles. In addition to the records, 110 shelving units, including 950 shelves, nearly 2,000 posts, and many clips and X-braces, were disassembled, transported, and reassembled.

The move did not include the 520 boxes (20,800 pounds/10.4 tons or 520 linear feet of records) which were destroyed (shredded by Recycling Center) according to the records retention schedule during the past year. A big "thank you" goes to Bob Walen and his workers at SES who made this possible.

The second phase of the Archives move from ELEX 101 to the basement of Center will take place in August. During this move, 596 boxes (large and small) and seven filing cabinets containing photographs, sound and video tapes, and paper records, will be moved. This is the equivalent of 400 linear feet or 16,000 pounds of records.
