COLLEGE PREPARES TO TRIM ANOTHER \$2.8 MILLION THIS YEAR

Lane will cut an additional \$2.8 million from its current-year budget following a directive from the governor to state-funded agencies to reduce their budgets in response to the state revenue shortfall forecast of \$482 million.

The \$2.8 million reduction is in addition to a \$5 million reduction made last spring. The current general fund of \$69,597,518 is 7 percent smaller than last year's and another \$2.8 million reduction will shrink the budget another 4 percent.

"It was my hope that we would have this year to stabilize after the very difficult choices we made last year," President Mary Spilde wrote in an e-mail to staff last week. "However, the uncertainties that I talked about in board meeting after board meeting during spring term are now upon us."

Lane's Board of Education considered a local option levy for the November 5 ballot at a work session on August 26. A levy would net about \$1 million for the college. However, the board decided not to pursue a levy at this time because it would reduce tax revenues for local K-12 schools, bring in far less than what Lane needs to restore service levels, and is a limited solution for what administrators and board members unanimously agree is a statewide funding crisis for public education. The board may consider a levy in the future.

In the meantime, the board directed administration to develop plans for rebalancing the 2002/03 budget. College executives will focus on this for the next two weeks including consulting employee groups and student leadership. Budget recommendations will be presented at the next board meeting on September 11 to be held at Lane's Florence campus. Final decisions will need to be made in early October to give students as much notice as possible.

"We intend to try to minimize impact on students as much as possible but undoubtedly students will see a difference in services and offerings," says Spilde. Students should prepare for fewer choices, limited hours of operation, and longer timelines for processing applications.

Strong demand for college offerings continues. 2001/02 enrollment reports show mostly-credit FTE (full-time-equivalent) up 8.3 percent over the previous year. Summer mostly-credit FTE is up 13.8 percent over a year ago, as of fourth-week reports. Financial aid applications are up about 23 percent from last year. Annual registration, which allows students to register in advance for a full year, has 2,635 students enrolled for this fall, compared to 1,965 last fall. New student registration begins September 3 and classes begin September 23.

The president is impressed with staff resiliency and their dedication to providing excellent service to students in such challenging times. In her e-mail she told staff, "I am confident that together we can figure a way through this mess and make the best decisions for the college." Submitted by Joan Aschim.

LONG HOUSE BLESSING IS MORNING OF SEPTEMBER 11

The Lane Community College Foundation and the Native American Student Association invite tribal elders, students, staff and community members to a blessing ceremony for the Lane Native American Long House on Wednesday, September 11, at 11 a.m., at the site where the long house will be built, just north of the tennis courts and overlooking the track in the northwest corner of main campus. Ceremonies will include drumming and singing followed by a meal of elk, salmon and other traditional Native American foods. NASA coordinator Frank Merrill first proposed building a long house in 1993. Since then, supporters have developed a design concept, identified the site, and are in the process of fundraising. The vision for the long house is to provide educational and cultural enrichment activities for students and the community in a safe place of gathering. The long house also is expected to contribute to a welcoming atmosphere for diversity on campus, and to attract more Native American students.

Larry Romine of Eugene was appointed to the zone 5 position on the Lane Community College Board of Education at a special telephone meeting on September 6. He will complete the unexpired term of George Alvergue, who resigned for personal reasons. The term expires June 30, 2003.

Board members cited the value of Romine's former board and community college experience in helping address serious issues in the coming year. Romine served on Lane's board from May 1997 to March 2001, including a year as vice chair. He was Lane's public relations director from 1966 until his retirement in 1992. He is a former student and instructor at Clark Community College in Vancouver, Washington. He has a doctorate in educational policy and management from the University of Oregon.

Romine will take the oath of office at the next board meeting on September 11.

DON'T MISS OUT ON MEDICARE

Medicare becomes available at the beginning of the month in which you become age 65, whether you are retired or still working. You should apply prior to the month of your 65th birthday. When you enroll in Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), you also are automatically enrolled in Medicare Part B (medical services by doctors, clinics, outpatient tests), unless you tell the Social Security Administration that you don't want Part B because you have group insurance through employment. When your employer group plan is ending, you need to enroll in Part B with the Social Security Administration. When you enroll in Part B within their time limit, you pay the normal monthly premiums. Late enrollment in Part B will require you to pay higher premiums. For answers to your questions or to enroll in Medicare contact the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213. You should also consider purchasing a Medicare Supplement plan from a private insurance company. If you are a PERS retiree, you may contact PERS Health Insurance Program at 1-800-768-7377.

INSURANCE IN RETIREMENT

FACULTY employees must have two years of immediate prior coverage with OEA Choice or HMO Oregon before retirement to be eligible to carry their insurance into retirement. Once you retire, you cannot add dependent(s) or change insurance carriers.

MANAGEMENT employees need to remember that changing insurance carriers and/or adding dependents must be done at the open enrollment prior to the date of retirement so that the insurance coverage may continue into retirement.

BOARD REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 11

Lane could lose anywhere from \$280,000 to \$2.8 million in current-year funding, President Mary Spilde told the Board of Education at its September 11 meeting in Florence. The final amount depends on legislative and voter action this fall. Because of the uncertainty, Lane must plan for the \$2.8 million loss, Spilde said, in response to last month's directive from the governor to state-funded agencies to cut their budgets. Spilde consulted with employee and student leaders to develop options for the board. She

recommended proceeding with fall term offerings as advertised; continuing spending restrictions such as limiting travel and raising the bar on posting vacancies; and adding no extra class sections except for classes mandated by program policy or supported by tuition.

Winter and spring will bring deeper cuts, Spilde said. She recommended using unrestricted carryover, adding no extra class sections, reducing the number of regularly scheduled sections, reducing the use of part-time noncontracted classified staff, and considering a temporary tuition surcharge. The board directed Spilde to further develop the proposals including budget amounts for action at the October 9 meeting. Board members called for legislative and taxpayer action to fund public education. Until then, said the president, students will endure longer lines, longer processing times, and fewer choices.

The board conducted a first reading of a proposed board policy to increase tuition each December to keep up with inflation. The policy will be up for action at the next meeting.

Larry Romine was sworn in to the zone 5 seat to complete the unexpired term of George Alvergue. Jim Salt participated in his first board meeting as faculty union president.

In action, the consent agenda passed 6-0; (board member Robert Ackerman was in Salem); and the board gave 6-0 approval for final implementation of the management compensation system.

Under statements from the audience, Kathleen Koontz described efforts to increase nursing instruction in Florence; Diane Burch encouraged the board to remember the value of the Florence campus as it makes budget decisions; and Rob Spooner said Lane should meet more local needs at less cost.

Board members said a conversation with the Florence Advisory Committee held earlier in the evening was positive and encouraging.

What did students tell us? On the spring term 2002 ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes, Lane found that:

- 97 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's general environment is welcoming and accepting to all students, regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.

- 96 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's instructors strive to create a classroom environment that is comfortable and fair to all students regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.

- 61 percent of the respondents reported that a major reason they chose to attend Lane was because Lane "offered the courses they wanted" (compared to 56 percent of all Oregon community college respondents).

NEW AT THE LIBRARY

Those of you who visited the library this summer were witness to most unlibrary-like chaos: sights and sounds of construction, coils of wire and cable, piles of not-yet-functioning computers, and library and other college staff moving so quickly they appeared to be in several places at once. So noisy! So boisterous! Everything out of place!

Why? So we could build an electronic classroom in which to teach our students. Last year, librarians provided instruction to 179 classes (4,475 students), who sat passively and computer-less in an open area of the library while librarians held up large cardboard blowups of library web pages. This year, bibliographic instruction will be very different. In our new 24-workstation classroom, students will receive hands-on instruction in the use of online resources. Librarians will use the classroom's interactive whiteboard to display, mark up, and print web pages; they will use the classroom's document camera to display print resources.

When not in use for library instruction purposes, the classroom will be an open Internet lab (yes, email will be allowed) although priority will be given to course-related Internet research. Printing will be free from a wide variety of online educational sources. There will be 26 additional public access computers outside the classroom walls, so individual library users will still have access to Internet resources when the classroom workstations are unavailable.

We hope you will call us at ext. 5355 to schedule your classes for a presentation in this new facility, or talk to your library liaison (didn't know you had one? - go to <http://www.lanecc.edu/library/liaison.htm>) about developing or assisting students with library-related assignments. We hope all faculty and staff will visit the library this year, and learn what your library has to offer.

We would like to say a very heartfelt thank you to Bob Mention, Lynn Atkins, Danny Avalos, Dennis Mills, and all of the electricians, painters, computer services folks, carpenters, and everyone else who worked so hard this summer to help us realize this dream. I would also like to thank all of the library

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BOND UPDATE FOR 9/25/02

FOURTH FLOOR REMODEL BRINGS BIG CHANGES FOR RETURNING STAFF AND STUDENTS. During the summer, two major changes occurred concerning the Center fourth floor: relocation of functions and personnel from the fourth floor to offices and classrooms across the main campus and erection of a significant amount of scaffolding on the southwest corner of the Center building. Although a logistically complex task, by the end of last week, the bond team successfully moved all personnel and functions from the fourth floor. How much stuff needed relocation? Throughout the packing and moving process, the bond office sent 3,000 moving labels up to the fourth floor for use in marking boxes, equipment, furnishings, chalkboards, and miscellaneous items for relocation. If they're not on the fourth floor, where did all the people go? The English, Foreign Language and Speech (EFL&S) main office is now in Center 260, accessible from an exterior door on the southeast corner of the building. The main office for Social Science is in Building 20, along with a portion of the department's faculty. Faculty for EFL&S and the remainder of Social Science are located in various offices in Buildings 1, 2, 6, 11, 15, 16, 17 and the Center. Also relocated across campus are the labs and classrooms for Instructional Computing. The open lab is now in Building 13 (Electronics Annex) Room 108; the Social Science computer lab is also located in this modular. The two Macintosh classrooms are in Building 13 (Electronics Annex) Room 104 and Building 5 (Physical Education) Room 126.

In addition to personnel and functions, the presence of scaffolding at the southwest corner of the Center second floor is a daily reminder of the fourth floor remodeling project. Here are some important

details you should know about the scaffolding and adjacent work areas. In the vehicle passageway below the Center terrace, special permit parking spaces 1-6, and parking on the southern side of the building are unavailable throughout the remodel due to the presence of several large dumpsters. Barriers erected around the dumpsters and shoots will provide safety and reduction of dust within the area. As mentioned in an earlier update, the demolition waste from the fourth floor will be dropped down shoots that fit over the concrete air vents on the second floor terrace and continue downward into the dumpsters below. In order to prohibit vehicles on the southwest side of the Center, a stop sign is positioned in the middle of the lower traffic lane. During construction, pedestrians can still access the first floor of the Center through the southern doors. The Forum and its elevator can be accessed from the lower passageway and the first floor outside the Center. The staging area for the fourth floor project is between the west and east sides of Building 18, within the vehicle passageway. Before long, positioned inside the staging area, a boom lift, which looks like an extremely large forklift, will transport building materials from the first floor level up to the fourth floor construction entrance. Naturally, chain link fence encompassing the staging area provides pedestrians using the sidewalk between the Center and Buildings 1 and 19 a safe passageway during construction. Turning to the Center terrace, a large opening in the scaffolding allows for uninterrupted pedestrian movement past the southwest corner of the Center. Before any construction materials are moved onto upper portions of the scaffolding, bond team members will erect canopies that extend out approximately 6 feet from both the south and north sides of the archway. The canopies, in addition to netted sides on the upper scaffolding walkway, provide additional safety precautions at the site.

As construction sites around the scaffolding and terrace are set up and secured, demolition is officially underway as Lane's electricians begin disconnection of light fixtures. Last week, bid documents went out to contractors for such things as the HVAC system and acoustical ceiling tile work. Held on September 20, a pre-bid conference provided contractors with the opportunity to gain greater insight into the project and view the Center fourth floor. Bid openings are scheduled for October 4.

HAVE YOU SEEN THE NEW ADDITION TO THE LIBRARY? Is it a classy, card catalog system; boundless, beautiful books; or even a dashing Dewey decimal system? Nope, it is something long overdue for the library: a new computer classroom. The new classroom has 24 computer/Internet stations with interactive abilities within library information and research classes. Moreover, the classroom offers a separate space from the greater library in which the 50 to 75 presentations regularly given for college instructors can take place without disrupting other library activities. When sessions are not occurring in the classroom, the computers are available for all students to conduct research, thereby bringing the total number of computers available for information searches to 50, up from 36 before the remodel.

ARCHIVES RELOCATION COMPLETE. After spending several years scattered between locations both on and off campus, the archives is finally consolidated in an area of the Center basement formerly occupied by temporary classrooms 019, 020 and the multiple office space of 018. Bond movers relocated boxes of valuable archival materials from the Building 13 (Electronics Annex) Room 101 modular, and although the modular has only about 750 square feet, movers had two full days of work to relocate all the materials and furnishings to the new location. The new digs for archives certainly has the look and feel of what you might expect in a storage space for important college materials: high ceilings, concrete walls, a quiet atmosphere, and rows upon rows of open metal shelves occupied by neatly arranged and labeled cardboard boxes. LCC trades personnel undertook the remodel of the Center basement in order to provide a temporary solution to the storage of archival materials. Archives sojourned in provisional facilities over the past few years after bond activities caused its dislocation from the tunnels.

ACADEMIC LEARNING SKILLS (ALS) and TUTORING MOVED IN. After several delays related to completion of the fire alarm system, the staff and faculty of ALS and Tutoring are finally moved in and carrying out activities on the northern portion of the Center second floor. The new facility provides for the first time on campus a centralized tutor area. Besides the large open area where tutors from multiple disciplines are located, the center also contains areas for counseling, testing, group study, and a computer lab. The Academic Learning Skills portion of the remodel contains 6 classrooms, a tutoring and study room, a computer lab and beginning fall 2003, an open study lab. Taken together, the remodel provides ALS and Tutoring a much more spacious and accommodating area to facilitate students' academic achievements at Lane.

The construction job shack is gone, the relocation of staff and functions is complete, and the new residents of the Workforce Training Center are entering their first academic year in Building 19. While educational activities unfold within the facility, a member of Chamber's crew is finishing up items on the punch list, which are aspects of construction that need repair or completion. The HVAC system is

operational but some temperature fluctuations may occur, as with other projects. However, with programming at the central plant complete, the HVAC technician can now respond to requests for adjustments to temperature and air flow as the system is fine tuned through the next four seasons. Approximately 200 pieces of furnishings for the conference center, the majority of which were chairs, arrived the beginning of the week. Portions of the center are tentatively scheduled for use in November. The preparation kitchen, that area of Building 19 that has yet to be completed, passed the underground plumbing and electrical inspections. Next up, pouring the concrete floor for the kitchen by the end of this week. The preparation kitchen should reach completion the end of November 2002.

Two men meet in the roof garden of a hospital cancer ward: Mr. Parmigian, a cancerous Armenian greengrocer, and Mr. Landau, a Jewish fine art dealer, who is just in for tests. Parmigian has survived much. He relishes every waking moment, and he's filled with a kind of surreal inspiration. He goads Landau to unburden his "secret Kaballah." This difficult encounter of two mismatched people turns into a tour de force for the actors--as the Christian Science Monitor called it, "A theater experience to be treasured."
