MEETINGS SET TO SHARE BUDGET REBALANCING INFORMATION

Two meetings have been scheduled to present information on rebalancing the 2003/04 college budget and to gather feedback. President Spilde is developing rebalancing proposals for the October 9 Board of Education meeting. The fifth special legislative session left Lane facing a \$3.2 million funding reduction for the current year, unless voters pass an income tax increase on January 28, which would reduce the funding cut. However, plans must be made now to minimize impact on the rest of the year. Several options to be developed might include elements of reductions, use of carryover, and a tuition surcharge. "We will provide the board with at least three combinations of these elements for discussion," she advised staff in an e-mail last month. Get some information and share your ideas.

DIVERSITY INSTITUTE ACCEPTING WORKSHOP PROPOSALS

The Eighth Annual Oregon Diversity Institute will be held November 7-8 at the Red Lion Inn in Salem. ODI addresses historical and contemporary issues of access, social justice, human rights and equity. ODI promotes respectful, open and honest interactions amongst people and communities of diverse abilities and backgrounds. The theme for this year's conference is, "Keeping the Spirit: Building Inclusive Communities During Uncertain Times." The keynote speaker is Tim Wise, senior advisor to the Fisk University Race Relations Institute in Nashville, Tennessee. One of the most prominent white anti-racist voices in the United States, he specializes in dismantling racism in institutions and eliminating racial bias. His writings have appeared in hundreds of newspapers and magazines throughout the world, as well as a number of scholarly and professional journals. Articles about his work have appeared in the Los Angeles Times, Washington Post, New York Times and San Francisco Chronicle. Wise received the 2001 British Diversity Award for best feature essay on race and diversity issues. He is the recipient of the National Youth Advocacy Coalition's Social Justice Impact Award, in recognition of his contribution to the struggle for equality. He is also a featured commentator and consultant for the three-part PBS series on race released in 2002. MULTI-CULTURAL CENTER VIDEOS EXPLORE WIDE DIVERSITY OF TOPICS

Videos will be shown in the Multi-Cultural Center this term on Wednesday evenings at 5:15 p.m. so that more staff, students and faculty have the opportunity to attend. Three videos are scheduled for October 2:

1) "Science or Sacrilege: Native Americans, Archaeology and the Law" (57 min). Discusses the issue of the controversy between Indians and scientists on the excavations and study of Indian burial grounds and remains. Examines the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) passed in 1990, its underlying moral and political issues, its practical consequences, and the prospects for science in the post-NAGPRA world.

2) "White Shamans, Plastic Medicine Men" (26 min). Documentary exploring the popularization and commercialization of Native American spiritual traditions.

3) "Without Reservations: Notes on Racism in Montana" (28 mins). Native Americans in Montana reflect on the prevalence of racism in their state. Various questions are considered. What is racism? Is covert and ignorant stereotyping less racist than overt racism? How is an entire culture degraded through casual use of racist imagery? How are children affected by racism in schools and the media?

REMINDER: LIBRARY OFFERS NEW ELECTRONIC CLASSROOM

The library now has electronic classroom in which to teach our students. Last year, librarians provided instruction to 179 classes (4,475 students), who sat passively and computer-less in an open area of the library while librarians held up large cardboard blowups of library web pages. This year, bibliographic instruction will be very different. In our new 24-workstation classroom, students will receive hands-on instruction in the use of online resources. Librarians will use the classroom's interactive whiteboard to display, mark up, and print web pages; they will use the classroom's document camera to display print resources.

When not in use for library instruction purposes, the classroom will be an open Internet lab (yes, email will be allowed) although priority will be given to course-related Internet research. Printing will be free from a wide variety of online educational sources. There will be 26 additional public access computers outside the classroom walls, so individual library users will still have access to Internet resources when the classroom workstations are unavailable.

We hope you will call us at ext. 5355 to schedule your classes for a presentation in this new facility, or talk to your library liaison (didn't know you had one? - go to <http://www.lanecc.edu/library/liaison.htm>) about developing or assisting students with library-related assignments. We hope all faculty and staff will visit the library this year, and learn what your library has to offer.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. We'll very briefly look at population realities for who makes up the U.S., schools, and the workforce with factors such as race, age, economics, and immigration and review some "diversity definitions," such as stereotype, power, privilege, and prejudice. FROM WARNINGS TO TICKETS

Now that we're into the third week of fall term, Public Safety goes from our "friendly reminder that you are parked illegally" to issuing tickets. Staff and students have now had two weeks to learn the system. Ticket fines have increased this year from \$15 to \$20 for general tickets, and from \$60 to \$80 for parking in the ramp area. Handicapped violations remain at \$120. So, what do you do if you, or someone you know, gets a ticket that just doesn't seem reasonable or fair? There are directions for protesting tickets on each and every ticket. The key thing is that you must contact Public Safety and do something before 10 days. I'm finding that some people choose not to deal with tickets until they show up on their college bill. It then becomes a priority. However, the tickets have gone to billing and canceling/reducing them takes the time of several staff members. This is not a productive use of staff time, or my time. So my message is, contact Public Safety within 10 days or the ticket is yours, along with the bill. You'll find the officer very reasonable and willing to listen to why you should not have gotten the ticket -- not that they always will agree with everyone. If you disagree with the officer's decision you can appeal to me, if you started the process within 10 days of getting the ticket. So, please help us all have a great fall term by parking legally and, if you do get a ticket, reading the directions for protesting it and contacting public safety within 10 days! Thank you. COLLEGEWIDE EMPLOYEE SICK LEAVE BANK

Effective immediately, an agreement has been reached between the classified and faculty unions, the Management Steering Committee, and the college to provide an employee sick leave bank for all active LCCEF and LCCEA unit members and managers.

The sick leave bank is to be used when needed by an employee in the case of a catastrophic illness or injury, as documented by a qualifying physician, that exhausts the employee's accumulated sick leave, or prior to qualifying for long term disability. The process for this is as follows:

1. Either the employee in need, or another employee aware of the need, can initiate a request to Human Resources for the transfer of bank hours to the affected employee.
 2. All LCCEF members (.500 FTE or greater), LCCEA members, and Managers may donate up to five days (40 hours) of sick leave in any fiscal year. Donations will be kept confidential, as will the names of the recipient(s).
 3. Donations will be made via an email to Sharon Daniel daniels@lanecc.edu. Please indicate in the Subject line "Sick Leave Bank".
 4. Future calls for donations will be on as needed basis when bank hours are exhausted.

BANNER TRAINING REMINDER

As many of you know, the college is changing to a new administrative software system called Banner, and the LASR Project is responsible for implementing this system. The college's financial transactions are now being done in Banner. The college will begin using the human resources part of the system in January, and students will begin using the system in the 2003-2004 academic year.

The Banner system provides an opportunity for staff and students to exchange many kinds of information with the college electronically rather than through paper processes. For example, many Lane staff will be able to report timesheet and leave information to Human Resources by using a computer and an Internet connection. Staff will also be able to change their own addresses, telephone numbers and other personal information in the same way. The college is calling this electronic self-service tool "ExpressLane".

In order to be ready for these changes, staff members who have never or rarely used computers will need training. AMERICAN INDIAN LANGUAGES PROJECT WINS SCHAFER GRANT

The LCC Foundation's Eldon G. Schafer Endowment for Innovation awards were announced at in-service. BOARD REPORT FOR OCTOBER 9

The Lane Community College Board of Education began its October 9 meeting with a unanimous resolution honoring George Alvergue. Alvergue and his wife Flo were present to witness a reading of the resolution and hear many heartfelt accolades from colleagues in instruction, the board, and the president. Alvergue served on the board from 1999-02 and before that, taught history and political science at Lane for 27 years. He was saluted as an uncommon advocate for the college, a distinguished instructor who inspired thousands of students, a strong spokesperson for the Center fourth floor remodel, and other contributions.

During statements from the audience, several students opposed a recommended policy to annually adjust tuition for inflation; Adults with Special Needs spokespeople said budget cuts of part-time faculty would hurt their program; and an instructor provided information about the inflation index being considered for use in the tuition policy. President Mary Spilde responded with a call to work together to inform the public and legislators about the need for funding community colleges to curb budget cuts and tuition increases.

In action, the board appointed board member Dennis Shine to the American Association of Community College Trustees Diversity Committee, and awarded a contract for some Center fourth floor remodel work, by 7-0 vote; and appointed Sandie Hitchcock to the Budget Committee Zone 4 position by 6-0 vote.

A discussion of how to rebalance this year's budget in light of another state funding shortfall led to agreement to take action at a special meeting on Monday, October 21, at 5:30 p.m. in the Boardroom, to provide more time for reviewing options and obtaining feedback. Options presented by administration included a variety of class section reductions and adding a temporary tuition surcharge. Questions also

arose about finding further savings in non-FTE producing areas of the college or in salaries, to avoid section cuts or tuition increases.

The board did not take action on the proposed policy to annually adjust tuition for inflation according to the Higher Education Price Index (HEPI), but there was majority consensus for the concept, and administration was directed to come back with further proposals.

The board heard reports on the success and limits of tuition-based classes piloted this summer; reviewed benchmarks on unduplicated student headcount, number of FTE by reimbursement category, and percent of FTE by reimbursement category; and heard the monthly bond and LASR updates.

The meeting adjourned at 11:15 p.m. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

KLCC MEETS RADIOTHON GOAL

KLCC's 2002 Fall Radiothon came to a nail-biting finish as the fundraising minutes ticked away. The ambitious goal of \$235,000 was exceeded as the phones kept ringing past the scheduled end of Radiothon. With more than \$33,000 to go at 5 a.m. on October 10, and Radiothon scheduled to end at 9 a.m. whether the goal was reached or not, KLCC listeners rose to the challenge. Over 500 listeners made the call, raising \$34,845 during the final four hours. On a listener's suggestion, many pledged in the name of their cats and dogs. The pet names were then read on the air, adding to the morning's entertainment. This was the largest fundraising goal--and biggest Radiothon finish--in KLCC history.

The final total of \$236,660 surpassed the goal by \$1,660. A total of 3,403 listeners became members or renewed their membership. Of those, 1,992 called during Radiothon, and 1,411 were "Thon Busters" who contributed early.

KLCC member contributions help cover the cost of NPR news, nationally syndicated programs, locally programmed music, community information, live broadcasts of special events, and intelligent entertainment all year long. Two-thirds of KLCC's budget comes from listeners and local businesses. KLCC has never failed to meet a Radiothon goal. Contact: Gayle Chisholm.

BANNER PAYROLL IS COMING. WILL YOU BE READY?

As many of you know, the college is changing to a new administrative software system called Banner, and the LASR Project is responsible for implementing this system. The college will begin using the Human Resources part of the system in January, and students will begin using the system in the 2003-2004 academic year.

Beginning in January 2003, all employees will be required to enter their exception time (leave taken) and positive time (hourly work) via ExpressLane. To prepare you for this change, the LASR Project has scheduled a series of trainings on the use of ExpressLane for a variety of employee services including hours worked and leave taken (Web Time Entry). These trainings are scheduled for the last two weeks of October and the first two weeks of November. Linda Osak is the instructor for both the instructor-led sessions and the drop-in open labs.

In addition, Human Resources will be conducting a college wide test of the system on November 18 and 19 in preparation for the January 1 "go live." You have an opportunity to participate in this test to help ensure that your pay in January will be correct. You must attend the training (either a class or lab) in order to participate in the November payroll test.

Registration is through Classline at 747-0644. When asked to enter the term, enter 2 and then the # sign. When asked for your 9-digit student number, enter your social security number or assigned student number. When asked to enter your four-digit access code enter your month and year of birth followed by the # sign (for example, January, 1982 would be entered as 0182). When asked to enter an action code, enter 2*, the registration number and press the # sign. Press 8# to disconnect. BOARD REPORT FOR OCTOBER 21

At the Lane Community College Board of Education meeting on October 21, eight speakers advocated keeping the Adults with Special Needs program at the Downtown Center; Rob Spooner advocated for a proposal to expand service at Florence; and Bob Baldwin said the classified union supported tuition price indexing and a rebalancing option to cut no class sections but add a tuition surcharge.

The board discussed feedback from its annual self-evaluation and reviewed criteria for the president's annual evaluation.

The board voted 6-0 in favor of budget adjustments for 2002/03, and to temporarily reduce class offerings and raise tuition spring term if voters reject a tax measure on January 28. The \$2.5 million in adjustments avoid significant impact on students while addressing 84 percent of an anticipated \$3.1 million shortfall, should the tax measure fail. Adjustments include continuing to delay hirings, defer maintenance, restrict travel and other belt-tightening measures and efficiencies. Also included are savings from previous cost-cutting and extra tuition revenue from increased enrollment summer term. If the measure fails, Lane will cut 243 class sections and add a tuition surcharge of \$2.50, both spring term only, and spend \$150,000 in board contingency funds. The shortfall will be about \$1 million if the measure passes.

Discussion of the college vision, mission and core values was deferred to a dedicated work session to be scheduled.

The board accepted the resignation of Lucille Salmony and began the process to solicit applicants for appointment to the Zone 1 position.

The meeting adjourned at about 8:45 p.m. The board then convened an executive session for labor negotiator consultations. After approval, minutes are posted on the web at <http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm>. Report submitted by Joan Aschim.

BANNER PAYROLL IS COMING. WILL YOU BE READY TO SUBMIT YOUR MONTHLY LEAVE FORMS ON EXPRESSLANE?

As many of you know, the college is changing to a new administrative software system called Banner, and the LASR Project is responsible for implementing this system. The college will begin using the Human Resources part of the system in January, and students will begin using the system in the 2003-2004 academic year.

Beginning in January 2003, all employees will be required to enter their exception time (leave taken) and positive time (hourly work) via ExpressLane. To prepare you for this change, the LASR Project has scheduled a series of trainings on the use of ExpressLane for a variety of employee services including hours worked and leave taken (Web Time Entry). These trainings are scheduled for the last two weeks of October and the first two weeks of November. Linda Osak is the instructor for both the instructor-led sessions and the drop-in open labs.

In addition, Human Resources will be conducting a college wide test of the system on November 18 and 19 in preparation for the January 1 "go live." You have an opportunity to participate in this test to help ensure that your pay in January will be correct. You MUST attend the training (either a class or lab) in order to participate in the November payroll test.

Registration is through Classline at 747-0644. When asked to enter the term, enter 2 and then the # sign. When asked for your 9-digit student number, enter your social security number or assigned student number. When asked to enter your four-digit access code enter your month and year of birth followed by the # sign (for example, January, 1982 would be entered as 0182).
