BOND PROJECT REPORT FOR OCTOBER

After three years of fast-paced planning and construction activity here on campus the Bond Project has rounded third base and is heading for home. Good thing, because we've spent almost all of the bond funds. However, there's enough to pay for the remodel of the fourth floor of the Center Building and the sewer lagoon upgrade.

The Center Building fourth floor remodel is a big job that called for careful planning. An early challenge was finding a way to get materials up to the fourth floor and furniture and waste down to the

ground with a minimum of disruption to the educational activities going on in the building and the pedestrians on the Terraces. The scaffolding structure, plywood chutes leading to a dumpster and the telescoping fork lift were the answer. The next question was to plan an efficient flow of work on the floor. After reviewing several options the approach we selected was to start work at the north end and move towards the south. You can think of it as waves following each other. First, came demolition of all of the existing structure, ducts and electrical lines that didn't fit into the new plan. As the demo work moved south a crew of framers started putting up light metal stud walls at the north. Our electricians came next. Others will follow them until the work has been completed. After the first month of work the plan is going smoothly and we're on schedule. But, as you probably know the course of construction doesn't run smoothly. We've run into a built-up floor over the old light well that was too far out of level and a bunch of air shafts that have to be fire proofed. Both of these were unexpected surprises that will take time and money to remedy. Let's hope there aren't many more surprises.

Work on the improvements to the sewer lagoon system are moving from the pre-design to the design phase. While the functionality and cost control are the principle concerns of the Upgrade, the bond office will do its best to make the added facilities attractive.

Finally, construction of the "new and improved" entrance to the campus from the northeast parking lots is nearing completion. Some brick pavers, guard railings, and landscape materials are all that are left to place. The lighting, the walk, the look, everything is better than before and it's ADA compliant. Tom Oroyan, the college architect, designed the walk and it's a beaut.

Wilson currently serves as the dean of health services at the Pennsylvania College of Technology (since 1990) in Williamsport, PA. From 1981 to 1990, Wilson was the director of the allied dental health programs at Pennsylvania's Lucerne County Community College. In prior years, Wilson was a dental hygiene program teacher at Owens Community College, and a dental hygiene program clinical instructor at Tyler Junior College.

Sonya Christian earned a doctorate in educational leadership, University of California, 2002, a master of science in mathematics, University of Southern California, 1990, and a bachelor of science in mathematics, University of Kerala, India, 1987. Christian currently serves as dean of science, engineering, allied health and mathematics (since 2000) at Bakersfield College in California. From 1996 to 2000, Christian was division chair for the mathematics and computer studies also at Bakersfield College. In prior years, Christian was professor, associate professor, and assistant professor of mathematics at Bakersfield

College, instructor of mathematics at American River College, and an adjunct faculty member at Citrus Community College, Los Angeles Harbor College, and El Camino College.

REMINDER: BANNER TRAINING NECESSARY FOR ALL EMPLOYEES

As many of you know, the college is changing to a new administrative software system called Banner, and the LASR Project is responsible for implementing this system. The college will begin using the Human Resources part of the system in January, and students will begin using the system in the 2003-2004 academic year.

Beginning in January 2003, all employees will be required to enter their exception time (leave taken) and positive time (hourly work) via ExpressLane. To prepare you for this change, the LASR Project has scheduled a series of trainings on the use of ExpressLane for a variety of employee services including hours worked and leave taken (Web Time Entry). These trainings continue the first two weeks of November. Linda Osak is the instructor for both the instructor-led sessions and the drop-in open labs.

In addition, Human Resources will be conducting a college wide test of the system on November 18 and 19 in preparation for the January 1 "go live." You have an opportunity to participate in this test to help ensure that your pay in January will be correct. You MUST attend the training (either a class or lab) in order to participate in the November payroll test. Registration is through Classline at 747-0644. When asked to enter the term, enter 2 and then the # sign. When asked for your 9-digit student number, enter your social security number or assigned student number. When asked to enter your four-digit access code enter your month and year of birth followed by the # sign (for example, January, 1982 would be entered as 0182). When asked to enter an action code, enter 2*, the registration number and press the # sign (this step registers you in the class unless it is full). Press 8# to disconnect. If you have never taken a class at Lane, or need assistance getting registered, call the Continuing Education Department at ext. 5252 (if you are calling from off campus, dial 463-5252). BOND PROJECTS STATUS REPORT

[The following report was submitted by the bond manager to the Board of Education for its November 13 meeting.]

MAIN CAMPUS PROJECTS. The Welding Technology Building, Addition to Campus Services Building, Parking Lot Improvements, Child Care Center, Math-Science Addition, Bus Station, Student Services Building, Central Plant Upgrade, Health Tech., PA-PE ramp, Addition to Performing Arts, Center Building, 2nd floor N. remodel, Library remodel, and temporary space for Archives have all been completed.

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER: College and contractor are negotiating some charges for extra work. Preparation kitchen construction continues on schedule to complete by December 15. Auditorium is 95% complete.

CENTER BUILDING, 4TH FLOOR REMODEL: Lane County building department has issued a building permit. So, we are legal. The main subcontractors are under contract or Purchase Order and are on the job. Demolition has been underway for 6 weeks and is 75% complete. Light metal framing is about 50% complete. The electricians and HVAC subcontractor have started their rough-in work. So far, the 4th floor has yielded a couple of unexpected surprises but in general we are still within our budget and time schedule.

SEWER LAGOON UPGRADE: In the next few days, the engineering firm of Weber Elliott will submit an Owner-Engineer Agreement for the remainder of the design and construction portions of the work for our review and approval. The upgrade will add some new physical facilities near to the existing

lagoons and the Bond office will begin working with the engineers on the final appearance aspect of the project.

UPGRADED NORTHEAST ENTRANCE: The previous northeast entrance to the campus has been upgraded to meet ADA standards. The new walk can accommodate more people and is more aesthetically pleasing than before. Tom Oroyan, the college architect designed the new walk and we were the general contractor for the project.

STUDENTS SAY THANKS TO \$2 MILLION DONOR

The patron who stunned Lane Community College in April 2001 with a \$2 million scholarship donation -- one of the two largest donations in Lane's history -- was honored at a luncheon in the Renaissance Room on Friday.

Bernice Ingalls Staton, who lives in Idaho with her daughter Anne Voillequé, visited Lane to meet with scholarship recipients and President Mary Spilde. Staton's gift created 20 annual need and merit based scholarships of \$5,000 each, 15 for professional-technical students, and five for transfer students. Staton also made a donation to the University of Oregon.

Among the scholarship recipients Staton met on Friday was 39-year-old aviation maintenance student Russell Quinby. Quinby has a flight technology degree and 10 years of military experience. He is studying airframe and powerplant mechanics to prepare for a career as an airtanker pilot. Quinby said the scholarship makes it possible for him to retrain for a new career while living with and caring for his 91-year-old grandfather.

According to Voillequé, her mother's gift to Lane is rooted in the painful memory of having to leave college in her sophomore year because of the Great Depression. "Her parents could not afford the tuition in the late '20s. That experience of the Depression years, she never forgot it; she never forgot how important it is to go to school to get an education, a trade, a degree."
