EFFECTIVE WEB DESIGN TELECONFERENCE

When bad weather strikes, tune in radio or television news to find out if there are any college closures or delays. Do not call the media; this interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information. The following frequently asked questions and answers are on the web at http://www.lanecc.edu/instadv/weather.htm.

Q. HOW DO WE KNOW FOR SURE THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?

A. When the decision is made to close the college, the college immediately notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other news media. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Closures are reported to:

O. WHAT IF I AM HEARING IMPAIRED?

A. The hearing impaired can call 463-3079 to print notices of closures on TTY machines.

Q. WHAT ABOUT COLLEGE LEARNING CENTERS AT HIGH SCHOOLS?

A. Lane Community College learning centers at high schools follow the host high school's closure schedule.

Q. WHEN WILL WE KNOW THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?

A. Weather closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m. Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day but will open for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

O. WHAT DO DELAYS MEAN?

A. If the opening of classes is delayed, students and faculty should report to the class or lab they would normally have been attending at the new starting time, if at least 50 minutes of class/lab time remains. For example, if opening is delayed to 10 a.m., classes and labs that normally begin at 10 a.m. or are already in session at 10 a.m. would meet, but only if the normal ending time for that class or lab is 10:50 a.m. or later. The remainder of the day would continue on the regular schedule.

Q. IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED, SHOULD STAFF REPORT FOR WORK?

A. When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions otherwise from their supervisor or hear such instructions in the news announcements. If one or

more facilities are closed and others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

Q. ARE THERE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES?

A. When 30th Avenue is icy, some people drive in from the east via Franklin, or ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, drivers may choose alternate routes. An LTD route change does not necessarily indicate a college closure.

Q. WILL STAFF GET PAID?

A. The College Online Policy and Procedure System (COPPS) states under Pay: School Closure, General Guidelines For Compensation: "All bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors and management employees scheduled to work on the school closure day should be paid as if they worked their regular schedule. Employees required to work when the school is closed on a regularly scheduled work day should be provided time off with pay on a straight-time basis." See http://www.lanecc.edu/cops/closure.htm.

CONSTRUCTION TECH STUDENTS HELP BUILD HOME FOR DISABLED CHILDREN Story by writer Gloria Biersdorff for The Daily

On a cold, clear autumn morning, Lane Community College student Juanita Zaiger deposits a bag of stones from her rock garden on the ground beside Don and Lahna Rasmussen's unfinished addition to their Eugene home. Her offering, which will embellish the rustic masonry flanking the entry, embodies the spirit of this project.

Zaiger, 37, is one of approximately 25 Construction Technology program students helping to create vital living space for the couple and their 12 adopted children, ages 5 to 24, whose disabilities include Downs syndrome, fetal alcohol exposure, autism, hydrocephalus, cerebral palsy and blindness.

"This job would've been impossible without the community's support," says Lane instructor Leonard Keen, who coordinates the 1500 square-foot project that broke ground December 2001 and is slated for completion next summer.

Several businesses donated materials and labor amounting to about \$40,000. Among them are Lyn West Architecture, Gemini Concrete Pumping, Willamette Industries, Tom Charpentier Plumbing, Eugene Sand and Gravel, Trus Joist Macmillan, Willamette Greystone, Sunbelt Rentals, Square-Deal Lumber, Farwest Steel, J K Guckenberger Electrical Contractor and Welcome Home Mortgage. Emerald Valley Glass donated the multitudinous windows that open the cathedral-ceilinged structure to trees, sky and sun.

Rasmussen says she can picture her younger children learning to folk dance in the light-drenched great room. Or they can follow the moves of angelfish drifting in the 55-gallon aquarium installed in the wall that partitions the family room and Rasmussen's study. Student Rodney Raudebaugh donated the aquarium, and will supply the accessories and fish.

Raudebaugh, 41, is repeating the construction and blueprint reading courses that comprise this project in order to continue working on the site.

"I'm here, basically, because of the kids," he says. "They're so willing to help, to learn. I do anything I can to help them feel more a part of something. They're always a pleasure to be around. This is not your normal, everyday job. In my 25 years of working in the trades this is the best project I've ever been on."

Over the course of the construction technology program's 30-year history, students have gained on-site training through building and remodeling numerous structures, both commercial and residential. The program trains people in the technical skills and knowledge required by the construction industry. Students may earn a one-year certificate of completion or a two-year associate of applied science degree.

STEVE CARTER NAMED TEACHER OF THE MONTH

Steve Carter, instructor/coordinator in the Adults with Special Needs program, was named December 2002 Teacher of the Month by KVAL-TV. The station presented him with a recognition plaque and filmed him with his class for a news feature. He says they focused on workplace literacy: filling out job applications, and interviewing skills.

ASN is part of the Adult Basic and Secondary Education Program at Lane. ABSE helps develop skills necessary for improving literacy in reading, writing, math, computer and work (called Adult Skill Development), and the skills needed to achieve a GED. Adults with Special Needs works with students at the introductory levels of Adult Skill Development, Level 1 and 2. ABSE works with students on the main campus, the Downtown Center, Goodwill Industries, and the Employment Department in Springfield, with outreach centers in Oakridge, Elmira, and Florence, as well as with incarcerated adults in the Lane County Correction Center and the Alma Forest Work Camp. ASN is located at the Downtown Center and instructor Liz Purtell also provides educational services to developmentally disabled students in Florence, in addition to GED instruction.

Students in the self-advocacy class nominated Steve for the award by writing and calling the news station. "I was very pleased for many reasons," says Steve, "but chiefly because the students have developed the oral and written skills to not only make their dreams come true, but mine too. This is the intent of the self advocacy class: developing oral and written skills so that students with developmental disabilities can speak for themselves and advocate for their needs in the public arena." Nominating Steve were students Stacey Adair, Michael Cunningham, and Amanda Niemeyer.

The KVAL Teacher of the Month is Steve's third award in five years, following a Faculty Recognition Award last spring and 1998 Educator of the Year Award by The ARC of Oregon.

The Counseling Department has a new class: CG 214 Adlerian Anger Management (registration #00111, three credits), 6-8:50 p.m., Wednesdays, Building 10, Room 250, beginning January 8. Learners will examine how anger can be self-defeating, the ways it complicates personal life and interpersonal relationships, and options to feeling and acting in angry ways. Also, participants can learn to define what is really important, alternatives to using anger as a method of reaching goals, and how to be more personally effective. There will be opportunities to practice skills in class and complete exercises to clarify application. SPILDE'S FIRST YEAR EARNS HIGH PRAISE

President Mary Spilde showed "the potential to become one of the finest presidents in the history of Lane Community College, if not among community colleges nationwide," said Board of Education Chair Roger Hall in his summary presentation of the president's first annual evaluation to the board on December 11. The board approved Spilde's evaluation by 7-0 vote. Following is the text of the evaluation summary distributed at the meeting:

From Roger Hall to Board of Education 12/11/02

December 11, 2002

President's Evaluation

"The Lane Community College Board of Education annually evaluates the college president. The board at its October 21 meeting developed the evaluation process for the period August 2001 through October 2002. The process included review of monitoring reports and the president's work plan; an evaluation instrument completed by the board, the college executive team, and a significant number of employee and student leaders; and a self-evaluation. The instrument evaluated the areas of Leadership and Strategic Direction, Financial Management, Board Relations, Communication and Decision Making/Governance. All information was collected and reviewed by the board chair and vice chair and then discussed with the entire board and the president. The chair offers the following summary to the board and the community.

"Nearly two years ago, the board announced that it had sought and found the very best person to lead Lane Community College and Mary Spilde became Lane's sixth president in August 2001. The evaluation of her first year on the job provides profound evidence of success. All segments of the college community reported that Mary has done an outstanding job as president.

"A review of the president's strengths produced a long list of commendations, a few of which will be mentioned here beginning with exceptionally strong leadership in a year of fiscal challenge. Her broad and deep knowledge, intelligence and quiet competence have served the college well. Mary Spilde is an open and honest communicator who listens well and shares information in a direct and forthright manner. She is deliberative and inclusive in decision-making, respecting and considering everyone's views. She has demonstrated integrity, courage, and compassion in leading the college through a difficult year. She is an

extremely hard worker with a strong commitment to the college, the staff and students. She has remained positive in times of crisis, reacting calmly, providing focus and conveying a sense of optimism. The board finds that President Spilde is a strong advocate of education and an excellent role model who represents Lane Community College well in the community and at state and national levels.

"A review of the president's achievements during the past year also resulted in a long list. Much progress was made on an exhaustive work plan. Most notably, Mary Spilde is to be commended for keeping Lane afloat in a year of unprecedented fiscal challenge. She developed an open, inclusive budget process, built the capacity of the college to weather uncertain financial times and moved the college toward financial health and stability. The board finds the president to be a responsible steward of the community's investment. In addition, the president's intervention at a critical time brought labor negotiations to a successful conclusion. She has worked to restore civility in labor relations and has fostered positive relations with stakeholders through communication and by being accessible. The president has maintained a focus on students and learning and service to the community. In spite of tough financial times, Lane's workforce has pulled together in working toward fiscal stability and educational excellence. The board finds Mary Spilde to be an active leader, well respected and well liked by the board, peers, employees, students, community members, and political leaders.

"The board has asked the president to develop a short list of strategic goals for this year. We look forward to the future with complete confidence in Mary Spilde's ability to lead the college.

"It is the conclusion of this board that Mary Spilde provided outstanding service to the college and the community in 2001-02. It is the chair's opinion that Mary Spilde has the potential to become one of the finest presidents in the history of Lane Community College, if not among community colleges nationwide. The board looks forward to the year ahead."

BOARD ENDORSES MEASURE 28

The Lane Community College Board of Education endorsed Ballot Measure 28 at its December 11 meeting by 7-0 vote in the form of a formal resolution. Following is the text of Resolution No. 477: Endorsement of Ballot Measure 28:

"To respond to the State's growing budget deficit the legislature has placed Ballot Measure 28 before the voters in January 2003. The measure increases personal and corporate income tax rates for three years by one half of a percentage point.

"WHEREAS, the tax increases imposed by Measure 28 are necessary and affordable; and

"WHEREAS, economic development is dependent upon an educated citizenry, and increases in tuition and decreases in available classes reduce affordability and accessibility to education that will adversely impact the economy of Oregon, that is presently in a recession; and

"WHEREAS, failure of measure will require Lane Community College to eliminate 243 classes from its schedule spring term and increase tuition for the second time this year; and

"WHEREAS, the deductibility of state income taxes from federal taxes means more taxes stay in state and limits the amount an individual will pay; and

"WHEREAS, previous budget reductions at Lane Community College have created greater efficiencies, and the state's latest projections show even greater deficits; and

"WHEREAS, property tax limitations have decreased the ability of Lane Community College to control revenues, and the college must rely upon state revenues to maintain comprehensive educational offerings; and

"WHEREAS, the legislature is unable to resolve the budget crises without a vote of the people; "THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Lane Community College Board of Education supports the passage of Measure 28.

"Passed and approved this eleventh day of December 2002."

At a special meeting on December 3, the Lane Community College Board of Education appointed Paul Holman of Florence to the Zone 1 seat by unanimous vote (see Daily, December 9). Three candidates were interviewed: Holman, Francisca Leyva-Johnson of Veneta, and Monte McConnell of West Eugene.

In other business, the board unanimously approved a single health insurance plan for all college employees with OEA Choice, effective January 1. This is a major achievement and helps the college meet cost containment goals set by the board, said President Spilde. The plan resulted from months of bargaining and discussion with all employee groups. Employees united behind the effort to help offset rising insurance costs by joining a single plan, even though individuals risk more out of pocket expenses. An base of more than 1,000 people in one plan will help the college leverage improved rates. Board member Mike Rose said employees sacrifice saves Lane from having to cut more classes and board chair Roger Hall said it helps ensure continued benefits for employees. Adoption of the new plan included corresponding addenda to the classified and union contracts and management working conditions.
