GATES MILLENNIUM SCHOLARSHIP NOMINATION MATERIALS NOW AVAILABLE

Nomination materials for the Gates Millennium Scholars program are now available for the 2003-04 Gates Millennium Scholars (GMS) awards. Principals, teachers, guidance counselors, tribal higher education representatives, and other professional educators are invited to nominate students with outstanding academic records, strong leadership potential and commitment to community service. Nominators must act in their personal capacity. Institutional nominations will not be accepted. All applications materials must be postmarked or submitted online no later than February 1.

The Gates Millennium Scholars program was established in 1999 through a grant provided by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to provide Asian Pacific Islander Americans, African Americans, American Indians/Alaska Natives, or Hispanic Americans with an opportunity to complete a college education. The goal of GMS is to promote academic excellence and to provide an opportunity for thousands of outstanding students with significant financial need, particularly those intending to study mathematics, science, engineering, education or library science, to reach their fullest potential. Additionally, GMS provides opportunities for scholars to prepare for leadership roles in their profession and communities through a comprehensive leadership development program. GMS awarded scholarships to 1000 high-achieving students for the 2002-2003 academic year, bringing the total number of students awarded GMS scholarships to over 6,000.

The United Negro College Fund (UNCF), with the support of the American Indian Graduate Center Scholars (AIGCS), the Hispanic Scholarship Fund (HSF) and the Organization of Chinese Americans (OCA), administers the Gates Millennium Scholars program.

In the 2003-2004 academic year, individuals are eligible to be considered for a Gates Millennium Scholarship if they: are Asian Pacific Islander American, African American, Hispanic American or American Indian/Alaska Native; are a citizen, legal permanent resident or national of the United States; have a minimum GPA of 3.3 on a 4.0 scale; will be entering a U.S. accredited college or university as full-time, degree-seeking freshmen in the academic year 2003-2004; have demonstrated leadership commitment through participation in community service, extracurricular, or other activities that reflect leadership abilities; and meet the Federal Pell Grant eligibility criteria. Eligibility for Federal Pell Grant can only be determined though the submission of a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to the U.S. Department of Education, Federal Student Aid Programs.

Student Evan Burns said he had learned from LMBB "that they were low on my blood type, so I decided to help out."

And Jan Kleminsky, staff member in the Computer Services Department, told The Torch, "It's an easy way to give, and hopefully it will be there when I need it."

LMBB nurse Carol Keck said, "We use about 1400 units of blood a month here in Lane County. Forty percent of that blood comes from blood-drives The other 60 percent comes from people donating at the (Blood) bank in Eugene."

BOND PROJECTS STATUS REPORT

From the January 15 Board of Education meeting packet

MAIN CAMPUS PROJECTS: The Welding Technology Building, Addition to Campus Services Building, Parking Lot Improvements, Child Care Center, Math-Science Addition, Bus Station, Student Services Building, Central Plant Upgrade, Health Technology, Performing Arts-Physical Education ramp, Addition to Performing Arts, Center Building, 2nd floor N. remodel, Library remodel, and temporary space for Archives have all been completed.

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER: The bond project manager, the architect and the general contractor have not been able to resolve some charges for extra work. Consequently, we are moving towards resolving our differences through a process called mediation.

Completion of construction for the Preparation Kitchen was delayed due to problems with the hood installation. Those problems have been resolved and the current schedule shows a completion date of January 21, 2003.

THE AUDITORIUM continues to be usable but not complete. The finishing of the top and front of the stage is the remaining element.

CENTER BUILDING, FOURTH FLOOR REMODEL: Demolition is about 95 percent complete. Light metal framing is about 75 percent complete. The electricians and HVAC subcontractor are about 40 percent complete with their rough-in work. Installation of drywall has started and the scaffolding for the exterior windows is in place. We are still within our original time schedule and budget.

SEWER LAGOON UPGRADE: DEQ has issued another set of comments to the Revised Facilities Plan submitted by Weber Elliot, the college engineers. DEQ says they are "minor comments" that must be addressed prior to approval. The comments concern technical issues that will not affect the cost or implementation of the upgrade. The engineers are presently preparing a response to these comments. Final design work will not begin in earnest until the DEQ formally approves the Facilities Plan. Weber Elliott and the college have completed negotiations of the Owner-Engineer Agreement for the design phase of the lagoon upgrade. Later, in this meeting, you will be asked to consider a recommendation to award this contract. Report prepared by Bob Mention.

BOARD REPORT FOR JANUARY

The Lane Community College Board of Education met Wednesday, January 15. An executive session was held at 4:30 p.m. for legal counsel and labor negotiator consultations. A work session on the budget followed; and the regular meeting began about 6:40 p.m.

Gov. Kulongoski's proposed balanced budget for the state reduces funding to community colleges by 8 percent and could cost Lane another \$300,000 or \$400,000, said President Mary Spilde in the work session. This increases Lane's projected funding gap for 2003/04 to \$4.8 million. She also said PERS will announce new liability estimates by early March and that some community colleges are considering issuing bonds in April to address this problem. The board will discuss this next month.

In regular session, President Spilde introduced Dennis Carr, new director of Human Resources, and Bert Logan, new director of Student Financial Services.

In her monthly report, Spilde reiterated information about the governor's budget and added that she will propose a college budget in March with reduction and revenue recommendations. Possible new revenues discussed in previous board meetings include paid parking, a student services fee, and a more aggressive summer program.

Staff are continuing discussion from December about the challenge of cutting so many classes spring term should Measure 28 fail. Analysis has shown that in order to preserve the third section of three-term sequences, and to assure that students graduate, not more than 160 sections can be cut. If M28 passes, no cuts will be necessary spring term.

Spilde said promotional work this month included the first of a series of president's forums with community groups; the college's first quarterly report; and posting monthly highlights on the web (see http://www.lanecc.edu/instadv/monthly/index.htm).

Finally, Spilde condemned racist flyers found on campus and emphasized for the record that Lane is a dedicated to being racism free zone.

The monthly bond update included an annual review; look for this report in a future Daily.

Speaker Dennis Gilbert questioned whether cutting class sections will actually save money. He asked for a definitive list of sections to be cut.

The consent agenda passed 7-0. Included were hiring Weber Elliott Engineers of Eugene to provide engineering services for sewage lagoon filtration design for \$133,408; hiring Control Contractors of Portland to supply and install a building control system for the Center Building fourth floor remodel for \$289,520, plus control system upgrades for 11 other buildings for \$208,256; to purchase a 35,000-gallon hot water tank for main campus from Roy E. Hanson Mfg. of Los Angeles for \$107,325; and to adopt some changes in Oregon administrative rules.

In other business the board approved the purchase of a 1979 Piper Seminole twin-engine airplane for the flight technology program, using board contingency funds to be reimbursed by the sale of an older plane and by assessing the program budget over five years. The new plane will help the program continue its move to self-support. Division chair Dave Keebler said students need flying time on a twin-engine plane to qualify for jobs as airline pilots. He said the job outlook remains strong despite downturns in the airline industry. He said Lane charges \$185 per hour in fees for flight instruction including instructor time.

The board reviewed a benchmark on changes in employee headcount; and monitoring reports on asset protection and financial condition and activities.

The meeting adjourned about 8:10 p.m. The next meeting will be February 12. After approval, minutes are posted at http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?
