#### UPDATE FROM THE BANNER STUDENT CORE TEAM

The Banner Student Core Team has been preparing for the implementation of the new integrated software since January 2002. We have spent the year analyzing our current business practices, developing, with input from affected constituencies, best practices, and learning together how to implement these best practices in Banner. We have been mindful that using a fully integrated system has created what we are calling the "One Registrar Environment." Now instead of having different databases for credit and noncredit courses and students, we are operating together under the same umbrella. As a result, many of our past practices are being modified.

We have identified a number of processes that will be different when we go live with Banner Student this summer term 2003, and some changes that will take place before that time.

Modifications to Current Practices Implemented for Banner Student Module, Summer 2003:

Annual Registration is now Advanced Registration. For the first year of implementation, students using Advanced Registration Advising will register ahead of other students. There will no longer be a confirmation process. For the 2003-04 academic year registration will be for one term at a time. Beginning with 2004-05 academic year, Advanced Registration will return to a fall, winter, spring advanced calendar.

ExpressLane will replace our Classline voice response system as the tool that students will use to register and more. Classline will be discontinued on May 24, 2003, and Gradeline will be discontinued on July 1, 2003.

The 100 percent refund deadline for full-term classes will be at midnight Sunday following the first week of the term.

The administrative withdrawal policy will not change, except to match the 100 percent refund deadline: first week of the term instead of the current two week time frame.

Students will see an annotation mark on their transcripts for classes that are dropped after the 100 percent refund deadline.

In Banner, variable credit courses are graded for the student's enrolled number of credits, without adjustment by instructors at grading time. To facilitate this change, variable credit students may alter their credit number through the final instructional week of each term (week 10 in an 11-week term).

Students who have not made any payments on their bills will be referred to collections after four months instead of the current six month practice.

## THE COPIA LECTURE SERIES CONTINUES

The Copia Lecture Series continues on Saturday, February 15 at 7:30 p.m. at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 13th and Pearl in Eugene, with a lecture entitled "Alcaid to Dubhe - Al-Queda to Dubya: The Politics of Bridging Gulfs of Difference," given by Mark Harris, LCC instructor in Ethnic Studies, African American Experience and Coordinator, Multicultural Substance Abuse Prevention.

# FEBRUARY 12 BOARD REPORT

The first steps toward selling bonds to finance the college's unfunded PERS liability were taken at the February 12 Board of Education meeting. Unless the board withdraws before pricing is set, Lane will participate in a pool with other Oregon community colleges to issue taxable pension bonds in April or later.

To begin the process, the board approved a letter of intent and a resolution by 6-0 vote; Robert Ackerman was absent. Legislative action may lower the unfunded liability. The board's action followed President Mary Spilde's announcement that current budget projections show a \$5.9 million funding gap for 2003/04.

In other unanimous action, the board approved the 2003/04 budget calendar (see <a href="http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/0304/budget0304.htm">http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/0304/budget0304.htm</a>); approved the college's new vision, mission and values; approved strategic goals for the president; and appointed Kevin Wells to the Budget Committee.

The board discussed differential pricing and directed administration to continue analysis of this issue. The idea is whether and how to charge more tuition or fees for costlier classes or those with more "consumable" use. Spilde said the discussion has come up because "access and affordability have collided."

The board commended efforts toward budget transparency goals; reviewed a benchmark on gender and minority status of graduates; reviewed a follow-up report to the policy on treatment of learners and consumers. In a review of the emergency succession policy, President Spilde said the vice presidents would serve as acting president in the event she is unable to provide leadership.

In other business, President Spilde presented a plaque to board chair Roger Hall from the Oregon Community College Association in recognition of his 12 years of dedicated service.

#### UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY WORKSHOP

When: Tuesday, March 4, 1-5 p.m., Downtown Center, Room 202

Goal: Introduce Basic Diversity Concepts

Objective: Recognition of assumptions, perceptions, stereotypes, prejudices and how they affect interactions.

Outcome: Acquire a basic understanding of diversity skills

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. We'll look at our own cultures and identities and how they are "interactive," rather than "additive."
