GRANT AND CONTRACT AWARD DOCUMENTS

In conjunction with our 2001-02 financial statements audit, our auditors issued a management letter to Mary Spilde and Marie Matsen. One of their recommendations for improvement to adherence to Lane's system of internal controls was that "the college re-communicate the requirement for all departments to follow the college's grant procedures so that all grants are accounted for properly by the funded projects accounting team." This message is that re-communication.

Only the president and deputy clerks are authorized to sign grants and contracts which bind the college." The deputy clerks for this purpose are: Cheryl Roberts for Instruction and Student Services, and Marie Matsen for College Operations. Mary Spilde, the district clerk, may also sign agreements. Only the district clerk and deputy clerks may legally sign award documents.

TONIGHT: STAGED READING OF ANTI-WAR PLAY LYSISTRATA

Lysistrata, a 2500-year old play for Peace, makes a reappearance at the McDonald Theatre in Eugene tonight at 7:30 p.m. By now, 807 performances (and counting) will be held in 49 countries on that day. The cast of 25 readers, who rehearsed four times, will perform with scripts, in costume, with live music, visual effects, and some action. LCC student Mischa Fellez will play Lysistrata. Readers include community actors, citizens, and college students. Proceeds from the reading will go to WAND (Women's Action for New Directions) and CALC (Community Alliance of Lane County). In Aristophanes' 411 BC

comedy, Lysistrata and other Athenian women unite with women from opposing city-states to end the Peloponnesian War. They take over the Treasury and make a pact to withhold sex from their mates--until, desperate for intimacy, the men agree to lay down their swords and seek a treaty. The play has been described as "the world's first Peace play, the first Women's Lib play, and the first sit-com, all rolled into one." UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY WORKSHOP

When: Tuesday, March 4, 1-5 p.m., Downtown Center, Room 202

Goal: Introduce Basic Diversity Concepts

Objective: Recognition of assumptions, perceptions, stereotypes, prejudices and how they affect interactions.

Outcome: Acquire a basic understanding of diversity skills

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. We'll look at our own cultures and identities and how they are "interactive," rather than "additive." We'll very briefly look at population realities for who makes up the U.S., schools, and the workforce with factors such as race, age, economics, immigration, etc. and review some "diversity definitions," such as stereotype, power, privilege, prejudice, etc. We'll participate in a few short consciousness raising exercises that deal with issues of disability and sexual orientation. Then we'll view the award winning video, "Blue Eyes," which deals, primarily, with race and ethnicity, but can be used as a vehicle to think about diversity issues generally. We'll use the video as a touchstone to talk about some general issues of diversity. We'll wrap up with some ideas about taking an adversary path versus taking an ally path. NO EASY ROAD: UNLEARNING DISCRIMINATION IN OREGON EXHIBIT AT LANE

Discrimination occurs for a variety of reasons. Fear of the unknown, unwillingness to have them participate in our activities, not wanting to work with them, economic competition for jobs, or not want them as neighbors-all led to passing laws to keep "others" from settling comfortably among us. Oregonians have been guilty of discriminating against others since the first settlers made their way across the Oregon Trail.

"No Easy Road: Unlearning Discrimination in Oregon" consists of nine panels tracing our state's history on issues relating to racial, religious, economic, and social justice. BOND NEWS: HELICOPTER WORK CROWNS CENTER BUILDING

Last Sunday dawned wet and breezy, not the sort of weather we wanted for lifting air-handling units to the Center building roof by helicopter. The schedule had been set a month ahead and we knew that everything depended on favorable weather. At 8:30 a.m., main campus was partially closed and everything on the ground was ready--but there was no helicopter. It had been grounded due to weather at its home in Aurora, just south of Portland. We waited for the weather to clear and about two hours later, heard a familiar thump, thump, thump, and spotted the bright front light of a large helicopter flying over the hill toward us. It landed in the south parking lot amid open-mouthed gawks and cheers. The up close and personal experience of a helicopter landing was awesome, not at all like seeing it on TV. The sound was deafening and even though we stood 50-60 feet away it was difficult to withstand the blizzard caused by the rotors.

After landing, the pilot briefed us on procedures while the ground crew proceeded to hook up the lines around the first air-handling unit. When all was secured, the helicopter lifted the five-ton sheetmetal box and flew off towards the Center building where a crew was waiting to position it atop a support structure and curb. Five minutes later the pilot had properly set down the box and was back for the next one. We were amazed, having expected the exacting maneuver to take far longer. The second box weighed more than we had been told and pressed the load limit of the helicopter. A steady wind helped the 'copter lift the box and fly it to its new rooftop home. The second lift took seven minutes. By noon, after packing everything up, the 'copter and ground crew were on their way to Eugene airport for lunch before heading back to Aurora. We were happy and relieved that the event went smoothly.

Thanks to all who were inconvenienced by the campus closure for your patience and understanding. It was the only way we could get the air handling boxes up to the roof. - Bob Mention, Bond Project Manager

CULINARY STUDENTS ACHIEVE BRONZE STANDARD

Five first-year culinary students at Lane placed second in overall points and earned the bronze standard at a competition at the Western Culinary Institute in Portland on February 22 and 23. The competition was the first Oregon State Student Team Championship and was sponsored by the American Culinary Federation and the Chefs de Cuisine Society of Oregon. MARCH BOARD REPORT

A pilot program to test differential pricing for selected professional-technical and transfer courses will be included in the 2003/04 balanced budget proposal next month, following direction from the Board of Education at its March 12 work session. Staff presented hypothetical examples showing how charging

for contact hours, rather than credit hours, might affect a variety of classes. It was agreed to pilot P/T programs selected by cost-per-FTE, the possibility of external funding, market demand, and other criteria. Second-year students will be exempted for the pilot year.

In regular session, financial consultant Rebecca Marshall Chao answered questions about joining a community college pool to issue taxable pension bonds to cover the PERS unfunded liability. Last month, the board decided to join the pool but reserved the right to withdraw before pricing is set. Lane would need to average an 8 percent return over 25 years for a successful investment. In related action, the board appointed Preston Gates & Ellis LLP as special counsel for the bonds issuance due to the dissolution of the previously appointed firm.

The president's report included an update that legislators who said the governor's budget was 4 percent too optimistic are now saying it's 10 percent too optimistic, considering the latest state revenue forecasts. However, some legislators also are saying that community colleges have been hit too hard.

There were no statements from the audience.

The board passed a resolution authorizing the Oregon School Boards Association to appeal a rate increase notice from PERS.

Lane's thriving new west wing in Building 19 was named the Center for Meeting and Learning. The wing has classrooms, large and small meeting and training rooms, instructional and food preparation kitchens, and an auditorium. Culinary and hospitality instructional staff and students team up daily with operational staff to meet the meeting, training and catering needs of educational and community groups.

The board also authorized staff to develop an administrative policy for naming rooms and spaces. The Culinary, Hospitality and Food Service (CHFS) team recently raised \$297,195 in cash and \$17,020 in in-kind donations for the center and reported donor interest in room naming.

The board discussed three issues raised by the Oregon Community College Association including governance of community colleges at the state level; OCCA dues; and the idea of a statewide property tax for community colleges.

The board reviewed the president's revised evaluation instrument; benchmarks on transfer students and gender/minority status of graduates; and a monitoring report on president-board communications.

All action was by unanimous 7-0 vote. The next meeting is set for April 9. Report submitted by Joan Aschim.

BOND PROJECTS STATUS REPORT

The following monthly report was reviewed at the March 12 Board of Education meeting.

WORKFORCE TRAINING CENTER: The mediation process discussed at the last board meeting is continuing. [Bond Project Manager Bob Mention said construction of the preparation kitchen was not completed, as pre-written in the mailed report.]

CENTER BUILDING, 4TH FLOOR REMODEL: Demolition is about 95% complete. Light metal framing is about 85% complete. The electricians and HVAC subcontractor are about 60% complete with their rough-in work. Drywall is about 50% complete. Painters are about 25% complete. About 85% of the casework has been fabricated. Suspended ceiling grid is scheduled to be started March 3rd. The two rooftop air handlers are on site.
