SAFETY REMINDER

Safety is something we all need to be aware of and work towards having a safer work environment for all staff and students. Each month I will be sending out a safety reminder. For March it is First Aid Kits.

Do you know where the first aid kits are located in your work areas and can you get to them? OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) requires that every department or isolated work area have a current first aid kit. The kit needs to be stored in a readily accessible location. Behind a locked cabinet door is not accessible. If stored in a cabinet it should be clearly marked on the outside. The kit needs to be checked periodically to ensure that it is properly stocked. At a minimum the kit should contain:

- gauze pads 3"x3' or larger
- gauze pads 8" x 10' or larger
- adhesive bandages
- gauze roller bandage 2' wide
- triangular bandage
- wound cleansing agent (soap and water at a nearby sink is fine)
- emergency blanket - those light space blankets that hikers use
- disposable gloves - at least two pair
- CPR shield

However, each department needs to identify the types of first aid needs that are likely to occur in their area and stock additional supplies to meet these needs.

The kit should not contain any OTC (over the counter) medications like Aspirin, Advil, Maalox, etc. The kit is for first aid, not treatment of minor illnesses. Staff can get single does of many OTC drugs by signing a sheet in Student Health or purchasing them in the Bookstore.

It is the department responsibility to purchase and stock the first aid kits.

Student health staff are available to come to your department and consult with you on what should and should not be in your kits. They are also available to come to a staff meeting and do a short presentation on how to decide whether to use the kit, call Student Health, and what to do until help arrives in a major medical emergency.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop offered Tuesday, April 22, from 1-5 p.m. in Building 5 (PE) Room 206, will provide a broad general overview of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. We will look at our own cultures and identities and how they are "interactive," rather than "additive." We'll very briefly look at population realities for who makes up the U.S., schools, and the workforce with factors such as race, age, economics, and immigration and review some "diversity definitions," such as stereotype, power, privilege, and prejudice. We'll participate in a few short consciousness-raising exercises that deal with issues of disability and sexual orientation. Then we'll view the award winning video, "Blue Eyed," which deals, primarily, with race and ethnicity, but can be used as a vehicle to think about diversity issues generally. We'll use the video as a touchstone to talk about some general issues of diversity. We'll wrap up with some ideas about taking an adversary path versus taking an ally path. UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop will provide a broad general overview of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. BOARD REPORT FOR APRIL

Budget recommendations for 2003/04 were presented to the Board of Education at its work session April 9. During regular session, the board moved toward the idea of dropping the transportation fee but raising tuition correspondingly, or another \$3. The board generally supported other budget

recommendations. More information was requested about the level of usage at community learning centers. Budget discussion will be continued.

Under statements from the audience, two students with disabilities cited some facilities issues; one student advocated a tuition increase to preserve quality such as small class size, and asked when the wastewater plant would be improved; and board candidate Rob Spooner said international student tuition was too high and that he opposed the transportation fee.

The consent agenda passed 7-0 including a three-year contract award to Oregon Lithoprint of McMinnville for printing the college catalog for \$25,912 per year; a contract award for printing the quarterly class schedules and annual schedule also to Oregon Lithoprint for \$92,267 per year for up to three years; authorization to purchase carpet for the fourth floor Center building remodel from Rubenstein's of Eugene for \$102,652; and authorization for routine budget transfers for 2002/03. An item on workers' compensation was pulled after staff explained that it was meant for next month's agenda.

The president was cleared to implement Phase II of strategic planning this spring, including the involvement of a community group. The strategic plan update should be completed by January 2004. Phase I resulted in the new Vision, Mission and Core Values and Strategic Goals available on the web at <http://www.lanecc.edu/research/strplan2003.htm>.

The board reviewed reports on the percent of recent high school graduates attending Lane, and the quarterly financial report.

The board will hold a forum for public comment on budget recommendations on Monday, April 21, 2003, 4:30 p.m., Center for Meeting and Learning (CML), Building 19, Room 104. Work sessions are planned for April 23 and 24, and a special meeting will be held April 28 to make final budget decisions, all at 4:30 p.m. in CML 104.

WEST NILE VIRUS UPDATE

News media and CDC (Centers for Disease Control) tell us West Nile is coming to Oregon this summer. West Nile is a virus transmitted by mosquitoes that acquire the virus from infected birds. While the virus can infect humans and horses, they cannot spread the virus to humans or other animals. To get West Nile you must be bit by an infected mosquito.

The first line of defense is preventing mosquitoes from breeding.

Since West Nile is spread by mosquitoes, and mosquitoes need standing water to breed, Facilities Management and Planning is being pro-active in eliminating standing water on campus. It is recommended that everyone look around their residences and eliminate standing water. Places to check are low spots on the property, buckets and barrels, clogged gutters, old tires, tree holes and other places where water stands for about a week. It doesn't take much water to allow mosquitoes to breed. Change water in animal dishes and birdbaths weekly.

The next line of defense is to keep from getting bit.

When out and about during times mosquitoes are active (dawn, dusk and early evening), or where the population is very dense, consider using a good insect repellent, and wearing long sleeved shirts and long pants. Install or repair window and door screens.

ENERGY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM NAMED LEAGUE INNOVATION OF THE YEAR

The League for Innovation in the Community College is pleased to announce that Lanes Energy Management Program has been selected as the 2002/03 Innovation of the Year. The Energy Management Program, begun in 1992 with a Bonneville Power Administration grant, has become a model of industry-supported education through the efforts of program director Roger Ebbage and his team, Coco Sutton, Ginny Young and Science Division chair, Kyle Hammon. In 1997 the program was eliminated from the college's general fund with the understanding that it could continue with outside funding. To generate revenue Ebbage created the financially successful Northwest Energy Education Institute which provides energy education to industry locally, regionally and internationally. In addition, recurring funds were secured from the Eugene Water and Electric Board. As Lane's Energy Manager, Ebbage served as technical director for the Partnership for Environmental Technology Education which received a Department of Energy grant to develop a national energy efficiency program model based on Lane's energy management program, now being piloted in six community colleges. Sufficient revenue is generated that Lane continues to offer the two-year Energy Management Applied Science Degree to students.
